

SCHOOL for Japanese, by Japanese and in Japanese has been conducted in Glendale on Los Feliz road with sessions from 3 to 5 o'clock in the afternoons and all day Saturday. The Japanese come to our public schools and gather in every child of their race and take them to this school and during the daytime they teach all those who are able to toddle.

"But our last legislature has passed a law that all schools in California must be taught in the English language. This will probably

shut our only foreign language school whose pupils are brought here from all over the valley."

These illuminative statements by Richardson D. White, superintendent of the city schools at last hight's meeting of the American legion were made in connection with a review of the joint committee report by the Legion and National association. Mr. White returned last week from Des Moines, Ia., where he attended the convention of the latter.

Among the planks in this report of teachers and legionnaries, the following were outstanding, according to the speaker:

All teachers in all schools in the United States must be American citizens. All lessons must be taught in English. Greater patriotism must

instilled in the pupils. Nine months education a year must be compulsory.

Mr. White stated that the legion had offered to furnish speakers on all patriotic occasions and he extended an open invitation to members who wished to aid in patriotic programs.
