"I realize, of course, that Glendale is not very far from Los Angeles, but I feel that that fact should not militate against them when the quality of service rendered is at stake."

De Valera's call for a meeting of the Sinn Fein parliament in Dublin August 16 aroused the keenest speculation here.

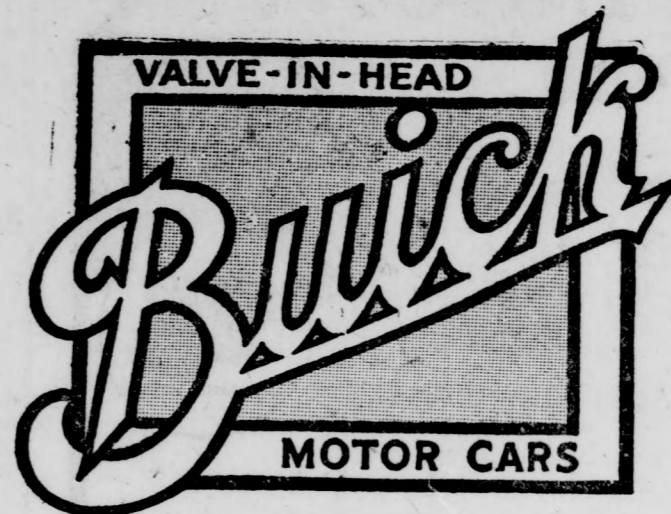
Poisoned Upon Eve of Intended Wedding

H. M. Parker Tells How Wireless Helps In Guiding Vessels

As the wireless becomes more highly developed more and more does its possibilities seem infinite.

The United States Department of Commerce is installing automatic wireless stations in addition to whistles and horns to guide ships through fog and stormy weather.

Three of these are being placed at the entrance to New York Harbor, according to H. M. Parker of the firm of H. M. Parker and P. A. Black, local Exide dealers who conduct the Autoletric Service Station at 113 West Harvard street.

"These stations", Mr. Parker explains, "send out their signals continuously during the fog or bad weather. The signals are picked up by the ships by means of an instrument known as a radio compass.

Just as the ordinary compass tells the pilot which direction or course he is steering, the radio compass registers the direction from which the signal comes.

Avoids Danger Spots.
"The captain is thus able to avoid the dangerous spots much easier than if he depended on the sound of the regular fog whistle or horn, which would be more or less at the mercy of the wind and other elements.

"The operation of this latest development in safe navigation depends greatly on Exide Batteries which the Bureau of Standards of Commerce Department have installed in the radio stations.

"The new system is different from any other wireless method for this purpose, in that a knowledge of the telegraphic code is not necessary either by the lighthouse keeper or the captain of the vessel receiving it. Any vessel equipped with the radio compass can receive the signals".

Radio signals have so far been installed on Ambrose Channel and Fire Island Lightships and Sea Girt light houses. Other stations, Mr. Parker says, are to be equipped later.

A deer recently appeared in the main street of Woonsocket, R. I., and headed for the business section of the city. Leaping over the railing of a bridge she landed on the roof of a yarn mill, crashing through a skylight and falling nineteen feet into a vat filled with water. She was caught and taken to the country and released by a deputy game warden.

Water Service Project to Property Changed

The city council in session Thursday night, on motion of Councilman Dwight W. Stephenson, reconsidered its action of a week previous in granting water service to Hamlin & Hepburn, owners of a sub-division in the Grand View district, and changed the service to agree with the following recommendations from T. W. Watson, city manager:

"In regard to the application of Hamlin & Hepburn for water service for Tract No. 4198 in the Grand View district:

"We have discussed this matter today with Mr. Hamlin and he agrees that it will be satisfactory to him to lay a line of two inch pipe on Vine avenue to furnish the frontage of his tract on that street and to lay a line of two inch pipe on Raymond avenue to serve the frontage of his tract on that street. This plan is much preferable to the laying of a line along the rear lot lines to serve this property inasmuch as this plan will involve a great deal of difficulty in the operation of the plant hereafter.

"Since last Thursday evening we have made considerable investigation as to the policy and practice of the cities of Los Angeles, Pasadena and Alhambra as regards laying pipes on easements over private property at rear lot lines and find that these cities require that all pipes be laid in the streets and that all those who have to do with the operation of water departments in these cities are opposed to laying service mains along rear lot lines. I have prepared quite an extensive report on this, copies of which we would be glad to furnish members of your council if you desire them. However since Mr. Hamlin has agreed to the plan suggested it is probably not necessary to discuss this matter further here.

"We would earnestly recommend that you reconsider your action of last Thursday in regard to this matter and grant permission to lay the two inch pipes on Vine and Raymond avenues as suggested herein".

NEW FOUR-CYLINDER BUICK LINE NOW UPON DISPLAY

Four Models Presented and Much Interest Is Shown by Automotive Public

Announcement is made today by Tanner & Hall of the presentation before the motoring public of Buick's new four-cylinder line. There are four models in the line, including roadster and five-passenger touring in the open cars, and three-passenger coupe and five-passenger sedan in the closed models.

Inasmuch as it has been known in the automotive trade for some time that Buick purposed adding a line of fours, considerable interest attaches to the specifications covering the new models. In motor construction Buick has adhered to the valve-in-head principle with which its name has been so prominently connected for twenty years. The cylinder bore is 3 and 3-8 inches with stroke of 4 and 3-4 inches. The motor develops between thirty-five and forty brake horse power and road tests have shown that the power plant will deliver up to fifty miles an hour with ease. Features of motor construction are the large three-bearing crankshaft and 12-inch long connecting rods, extra long rods being provided to reduce vibration to a minimum. A circulating splash oiling system gives automatic lubrication throughout. Another important feature, which is standard equipment on all Buick cars, is the automatic carburetor heat control through which ideal vaporizing conditions are obtained.

Sliding Gear Type
The transmission is of the selective sliding gear type, three speeds forward and one reverse. The universal joint is of standard Buick construction, being virtually an integral part of the transmission and automatically lubricated from the transmission. The clutch is of the multiple disc dry plate type, built in exact accordance with the principles which have guided clutch construction in Buick sixes. All moving driving parts are enclosed.

Front axle of the four-cylinder car is an I-beam forging. The rear axle is three-quarters floating type, all the weight of the car being carried on the axle tubes and only driving torque and steadying of the wheels being taken by the axle driving shafts. The third member is of standard Buick type of construction, designed successfully to eliminate all twisting or weaving in the rear axle. Gear ratio of the rear axle on high speed is 4 and 2-3 to 1.

Wheel base of all models is 109 inches. The spring suspension is designed to give fine riding qualities to a car of this wheel base. The front springs, semi-elliptic type, are 36 inches long, and the rear springs, also semi-elliptic, are 55 1/2 inches long.

Cord Tire Equipment
Cord tires are standard equipment on all models. These tires, which are 31x4, are the first straight side cord tires in this size ever manufactured and were built especially to meet Buick requirements for the new four-cylinder cars. The tires have been adopted as standard size.

The chassis is lubricated with the high pressure Alemite system. Delco starting and lighting system is standard equipment. All models are complete with tire carrier and extra rim and all are equipped with non-glare headlight lenses.

Shipping weights of the four models are: Roadster, 2310 pounds; touring car, 2380 pounds; coupe, 2430 pounds; sedan, 2650 pounds. Prices, f. o. b. factories at Flint, Mich., are: Roadster, \$935; touring car, \$975; coupe, \$1,475; sedan, \$1,650.

In adding the four-cylinder models to the seven models of six-cylinder cars now produced, Buick executives feel they have rounded out their line and constructed cars which are in every respect worthy of the Buick name.

New Model Dodge Not Contemplated, Says Geo. E. Clayton

Rumors afloat throughout Glendale to the effect that the Dodge Bros. motor works are contemplating a new model car and that this is the reason the company is unable to supply the present demand is declared erroneous by George E. Clayton, local Dodge agent.

The Dodge company will undoubtedly issue an official announcement through its local representatives when any change is contemplated, Mr. Clayton declares and in the meantime the persistent rumors may be judged as coming from the source of "marine zepthers."

Mr. Packer, who is a director of the Chamber of Commerce, and one of the most enterprising business men in Glendale, intends to enjoy a month's vacation with Seattle, Washington, as his destination. The Packers formerly resided in Washington and they will renew many old acquaintances.

Preparatory to the trip the Studebaker which will be driven by Mr. Packer was equipped with Houdaille (Hoo-dye) shock absorbers. Yesterday in company with Don Futey of the Studebaker service department, he made a trip of the roughest stretches of road in this vicinity and found the new accessory all it is guaranteed to be. "If anybody wants a rough ride," it is said, "let 'Slim' take them out in a car equipped with Houdailles. They will think they are on wings, even when jumping curbs."

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**DEMONSTRATION OF DESIRE TO TRAVEL
FORDSON TRACTOR
IS DESCRIBED
BEING FURTHERED
BY AUTOMOBILE**

**I. B. Groves Tells of Large
Gathering Held Recently
Near Huntington Park
Owners of Machines Placed in
Independent Position of
Traffic Annoyance**

The Ford dealers of Los Angeles and vicinity held a Fordson tractor demonstration near Huntington Park last Sunday, under the direction of the Ford Motor company. In describing the meeting, I. B. Groves, manager of the Los Angeles branch, spoke as follows:

"The demonstration was a rousing success and great enthusiasm was shown by the more than 200 members of our dealers' organization who attended. In one of the most unique stunts the Fordsons formed in line and showed how a field could be plowed, disced, harrowed, seeded and cultivated in one continuous operation. The Fordsons performing this entire seeding operation drove at a steady pace of three miles per hour, or considerably faster than a horse can pull a heavy load. Henry Ford's idea of making each operation a one-man job was strikingly illustrated, for every implement in the line was operated from the seat of the tractor which towed it. The ability of the Fordson to keep going at a steady rate all day long was shown, and many of those present contrasted this efficiency with the inefficiency of horses that must frequently stop for a breathing spell. It was pointed out that the tractor is not hampered by weather conditions nor insects, and that by the addition of electric lights, current for which is supplied by the famous Ford magneto, it is possible to use the tractor day and night during the rush season.

Simplicity of Operation
The simplicity of operation of the Fordson was shown, for many of the drivers had never sat in the seat of a tractor before, yet the work they produced would do credit to an experienced farmer.

"One of the most novel events of the day was a race up and down the field between six Fordsons. It is estimated that they traveled in the neighborhood of fifteen miles per hour over newly plowed ground, a remarkably fast pace considering the condition of the field. This race supported our claim that the Fordson is one of the fastest tractors on the market. During the afternoon any one who wanted to drive a Fordson was given the opportunity. All who drove became enthusiastic Fordson boosters, and the only difficulty we had was in persuading the pupil to jump off and give the next man in line a chance.

"About four in the afternoon the demonstration broke up, the visitors carrying away with them the feeling that no tractor of equal size can excel the Fordson for power, economy, utility and simplicity of operation."

Stanley in payment of the cost of certificate of title and claims against these lots as shown thereby, this and other property held by I. Ross Kurtz. Mr. Stanley reports that he has been unable to locate Mr. Kurtz and consequently has been unable to settle this claim. Mr. Stanley further states that this claim is outlawed and urges that the deeds be accepted as presented." On motion of Councilman A. H. The pavement on Milford street is to be five inch macadam, but inasmuch as the pavement on Orange street north of Milford street is three inch macadam and the pavement on Orange street south of Lexington drive is oiled gravel I believe this one intervening block might well be three inch macadam."

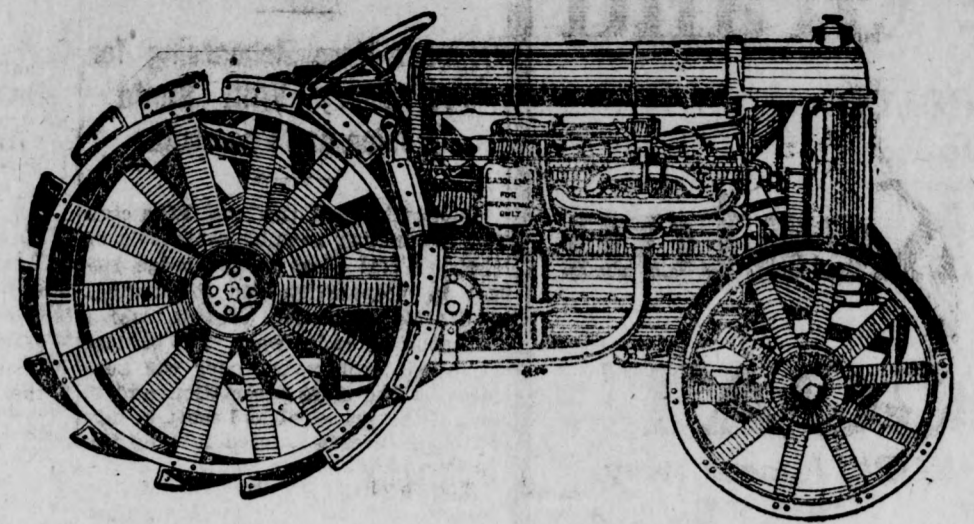
On motion of Councilman Dwight W. Stephenson the matter was ordered placed on the calendar for the next meeting of the council.

Repairing of Glendale Avenue Before Council

In regard to resurfacing excavations in the pavement of Glendale avenue for the purpose of installing thirty-inch water mains, T. W. Watson, city manager, submitted the following to the city council Thursday night:

"The estimated cost of replacing and resurfacing the macadam that was removed from the paving of Glendale avenue by reason of the laying therein of the thirty-inch water main extending from Doran street to the Verdugo reservoir is estimated to be \$1,528.

"I would respectfully recommend that such sum be appropriated from the water bond fund to pay the cost of such replacement and request authorization to have the said work done by the public works department."
