Are You Registered?

Two hundred thousand voters in California have failed to state party affiliation in registering and unless they do so they will lose their right to vote at the August primary election Theat the law as pinfers and by the supreme court, requires a voter to be registered by party in order to vote at the primary. The closing date for registering for the primary is July 29th.

Secretary of State Jordan has received reports on registration up to and including June 5th from twenty counties, including San Francisco, Sacramento and Los Angeles. The totals in these twenty counties are Republicans 264.092, Democrat 110, 055, Progressive 29,525, Socialist 17, state 165,030.

Reports from other counties will bring the number of those who "declined to state" up to 200,00 or over
