



Safe Space Policy

ARTICLE I - PURPOSE AND SCOPE

1. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this Safe Space Policy ("Policy") is to ensure that the events and programs operated by Wikimedia District of Columbia ("Wikimedia DC") are free of harassment and other unwelcome behavior.

2. <u>Scope</u>. This Policy applies to all events where Wikimedia DC has both authority and reasonable means to implement the provisions of this Policy. It further applies to all programs operated by Wikimedia DC and all spaces, whether physical or virtual, under Wikimedia DC control.

The Free Encyclopedia

What's a Wiki?

- A website where anyone can edit
- Edits meant to be "quick"
- Remembers all versions (nothing ever destroyed)
- Hyperlinks between pages

Wikipedia: Five Pillars

- Wikipedia is an encyclopedia
- Wikipedia is written from a neutral point of view
- Wikipedia is free content that anyone can use, edit, and distribute
- Wikipedia's editors should treat each other with respect and civility
- Wikipedia has no firm rules



Wikipedia Policies

- **Neutral Point of View** written so all sides can agree (WP:POV)
- **Notability** significant independent sources -> importance (WP:N)
- Verifiability Using reliable sources to reference information (WP:V)
- No original research point to existing scholarship (WP: NOR)
- Assume good faith start with congenial spirit (WP:GF)
- **Conflicts of interest** disclose and abide by terms of service (WP:COI)

Wikipedia: Reliable Sources

Articles should be based on reliable, published sources. If no reliable sources can be found on a topic, an article should not exist.

Reliable sources per WP guidelines

- Published scholarship (print or online)
- News organizations
- Vendor and e-commerce sources (Can be used to verify awards won, album length, etc.)
- Biased or opinionated sources (Only when trying to report the existence of one side of a topic, debate, etc.)

Unreliable sources

per WP guidelines

- Questionable sources. (Those with a poor reputation for checking the facts or with no editorial oversight)
- Self-published sources including websites*
- Primary sources*
- Social media sites including Linkedin

* These can be added to external links section. When writing a biography, the subject's own website is not considered a reliable source.

Plagiarism

DO NOT copy and paste exact text from a source and add it to a Wikipedia article even if citing the original source.

Instead, rewrite the information in your own words and cite your sources properly.

- Your school
- Colleagues
- Your employer
- An employee
- Close relatives or friends

Article Deletion Process

Articles for deletion (**AfD**) - Nomination process that generates a discussion page. Users vote 'Keep' or 'Delete'. Comments are encouraged. An admin will close as a Keep' or 'Delete' after seven days.

Speedy deletion - Process where articles are nominated for deletion without discussion. Anyone can nominate, but only admins can delete.

Proposed deletion (PROD) - An intermediate process developed for articles that do not meet the criteria for speedy deletion but for which a full discussion is likely unnecessary. Articles are deleted after seven days if there are no objections.

All are initiated by adding templates to the articles in question.





Judith Scott (May 1, 1943 – March 15, 2005) was an American fiber sculptor. 



Judith had her first exhibition in 1999, at the Creative Growth Art Center where, some hours before the exhibition opened, she was reunited with pieces of work that she had not seen for years. She and, later, the visiting public gave the pieces a warm welcome.^[5] The exhibition coincided with the publication of John MacGregor's book *Metamorphosis: The Fiber Art of Judith Scott.* Together, these events helped propel her to worldwide recognition.^[8]




Scott's work has become immensely popular in the world of outsider art, and her pieces sell for substantial sums.^[10] Scott is now hailed as a contemporary artist, no longer just an outsider.^{[3][11]} Her art is held in the permanent collections of many museums, including: Museum of Modern Art (Manhattan, New York),^[1] the American Visionary Art Museum (Baltimore, Maryland), San Francisco


In 1985, after 35 years of complete separation and lengthy and difficult negotiations, Joyce Scott became her sister's legal guardian, and brought Judith to live with her in California, a state where all mentally disabled citizens are entitled to an ongoing education.^[7]


