We have now fires in this city almost every night, sometimes highly destrucso long a period, has, we should almost be led to imagine, actually produced regulations to prevent crimes which involve such a wide and wanton destruction of property, which so sport with the forcunes of families and so endunger human life, can be too strict, and no punishmene in our penal code can be too severe for the offenders. A few salutary examples of the same severity applied to this crime with which cases f murder are visited, would, we imagine, have a salutary flect. But the great thing to be desired, and the most effectual mode of preventing a repetition of these crimes, would be a system that should take away the temptation o commit, them by insuring the cer-

tainty of detection and punishment. We have been induced to make these remarks from seeing the accounts given in the southern papers of the alarm that has prevailed in the city of Savannah in consequence of the repeated attempts to fire that city, an alann which has Arles doubtless been increased by the late terrible and destructive conflagrations in the neighbooring cities of Mobile Pategrasse do Even.
