Prussian Authorities Proceed Against Social Democrats at Instance of Russia.

Berlin, July 16 .- A trial which the Prussian authorities began July 12th at Keenigsberg, at the instance of the Rus-Keenigsberg, at the instance of the Rus-sian government, against seven social democrats accused of smuggling anar-chist literature into Russia, attracts very great attention. The newspapers throughout Germany are printing col-umns of verbatim reports of the testi-mony. The interest of the country was already strikingly directed to the case through the recent debates on the sub-ject in the Reichstag and Diet. 


