Elections in 1918

Next year there will be no less than five elections in Carmel.

In March the citizens will be called upon to select two members of the Sanitary Board.

The municipal election occurs in April, when three trustees, a clerk, and a treasurer are to be chosen. At another election in April, a school trustee is to be voted for.

In August the State and county primaries will nominate candidates to be voted for in November.

Registration will begin in a short time.

Pebble Beach Lodge Destroyed by Fire

At 1:30 a.m. yesterday the people living in the vicinity of the picturesque lodge at Pebble Beach were aroused by the cry of "Fire! Fire!"

Those who responded found the massive, high-ceilinged lodge building enveloped in flames. The building is a total loss.

It is not known how or where the fire started, but it is probable the blaze originated in kitchen, where a fire had been left when the place was closed for the night. A strong wind was blowing at the time.

There was no one injured. The Monterey and Del Monte fire departments arrived on the scene too late to save the property, but were most efficient in preventing the fire's spread to buildings and pine forest close by.

Del Monte Forest Lodge, as it has recently become known, was erected by the Pacific Improvement Company in 1908, and for the past five years has been under the management of Robert J. McCabe.

A spectator of the fire relates that he saw thousands of rats scurrying from the burning structure.

Airplanes After the War

It is not known how far the commercial development of the airplane would have proceeded by now if the work of inventors and builders had not been concentrated on military demands.

Some conception of what might have been accomplished may be had from instances of us to which the air ship has been put as a carrier.

For example, the Italians send supplies to Sardinia, and the French to Corsica, by air, to escape the submarine peril. Machines carrying 10 to 20 person, with baggage, travel from London to Rome.

These things afford an idea of what the possibilities are for air traffic when men turn to constructive efforts in aviation.

Our own government has begun to look forward in this matter by the creation of an aerial transport committee. Not long ago it was announced the air mail routes would be established between the islands off the American coast.

We shall see at the end of the war some rapid strides in the commercial development of the airplane.

Inasmuch as the national organization, division organization or any chapter have been able to verify a single derogatory report, it must be assumed that the libels are perpetrated as a part of the propaganda of the enemy.

Our Weekly Recipe

Sweet Potato Pie

Boil the potatoes until thoroughly done, then peel and mash them through a colander. To one pie allow 1 cup of potato, 2 eggs, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ginger, 2 cups milk, and enough sugar to sweeten to taste. Beat the eggs until light, and then beat them into the potatoes, together with the salt and ginger. Add the milk, and beat again until all ingredients are blended. Grate nutmeg over the top just before putting pie in oven. Should be baked with under crust only.

Interesting Letter From Herbert Hand

A South American Port,
November 19, 1917.

Mr. W. L. Overstreet,
Editor, Carmel Pine Cone.

My dear sir:

I wrote you not long ago that as soon as the order allowing us to write of our trip was posted I would send you an account of it.

We left San Diego, California, at 4 p.m., May 7, accompanied by the South Dakota, Pueblo, and Frederick, and stood south, making 18 knots. Met collier Naushan on May 10, and sent mail back to the States by her. Met strange vessel on May 11 and dispatched the Frederick to run her down and investigate; nothing unusual—commercial vessel.

The Pueblo broke battle formation on May 12 and proceeded ahead to Panama City. The other vessels changed their course and arrived at San Jose del Sor, Guatemala, on May 13. The Admiral and staff went ashore and paid respects to Guatemala's President the following day. We departed for Balboa, Canal Zone on May 17 and arrived there on the 20th.

The Pittsburgh anchored inside the Canal; the other ships tied up at the docks. Left Balboa and Panama City on the 24th and arrived at Cristobal and Colon on the same day.

The trip through the Canal was interesting. We took on coal by modern machinery, and left Colon for somewhere, and reached Bahia, Brazil, June 14 (cross the line June 10) and had a big time. Left Bahia on June 20, and reached Rio de Janeiro on the 22d. Many salutes were fired in welcome to us. Rio is a beautiful city; there was a splendid parade there on July Fourth, four nations being represented.

We departed for Montevideo, Uruguay, on July 10. We came inside amidst the whistling of many tugs and thousands of cheers from thousands of throats—and hearts. They cheered and cheered us until we cut loose and cheered them in return. Never was a nation more wonderfully received than we were; had a grand time. Left for Buenos Aires on July 23, arriving next day; big crowd; no welcome; fine time later made up for it—dancing, picnics, rides, etc. Left July 21 and made our way down the River de Plata to the open sea.

I have had to omit much that would be of interest. We're at war; you understand.
