

"HISTORY OF HICKS FIELD"

Hicks Field, where we, the thirty-fifth class of Aviation Cadets are receiving our Primary Flying Training, is rich in tradition.

Shortly after the start of World War I in 1917, Taliaferro Field was opened at Hicks Station north of Fort Worth by the Aviation Section of the U. S. Army Signal Corp, and the Royal Canadian Air Force. Here came for training courageous young men who not only distinguished themselves in combat, but, who with peace, carried on the Hicks tradition in civilian endeavors. Into aviation went C. V. Whitney, Jr., now Chairman of the Board of Pan American Airways, Roger Williams, one of those who pioneered the early trans-Atlantic Flights, George Goddard, famous for his aerial photos, Earl Carroll of the "Varieties," Rex Ingram and LeRoy Prinz of the movies, who are among some well known. Here in Fort Worth today is a strong organization of Hicks graduates, known as the World War Fliers, who do much to keep the tradition alive.

After the close of hostilities in 1918, Hicks Field was closed until August, 1940, when war again appeared on the horizon, and this field was one of the first Primary Flying schools in the Army Air Corps expansion program. There were 47 Cadets in that first class, 41-B, and classes have grown steadily since that time, until now, class 44-E, four years later, has 134 members.

Though steeped in tradition of an earlier war, the men of modern Hicks are fast making their own history; already they have distinguished themselves on the far flung fronts of this war. There was a Hicks graduate with Doolittle over Tokyo; other graduates have piloted Flying Fortresses over Europe, have distinguished themselves in the Pacific, the Aleutians, in Africa, Italy, and now over Germany; in fact wherever the Army has fought, there have been Hicks men. Already the "Hangar of Fame" contains the names of over twenty-five men decorated for bravery.

At Hicks Field today the 307th Army Air Forces Flying Training Detachment, under the command of Major Wm. S. Collinson, is training a fine group of cadets in their elementary flying. Daily eager groups fly for the first time, every man of them looking toward the day that he can join the earlier Hicks men in battle.

13. Hear instructions and be wise, and refuse it not; thus will thou fly safely; and length of days and life of peace shall be added unto thee.






"CADET SLANG"

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
There are times when feelings are pretty low.
