

shall be liable, on conviction before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace in a penalty of 200 Rs. for every Emigrant laborer so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall, after having cleared such Ship or Vessel at any such Port as aforesaid for Mauritius take on board any such Emigrant laborer as aforesaid without having entered such Emigrant laborer in such list as aforesaid, or without having obtained such duplicate as aforesaid containing the entry of such Emigrant, prior to clearance, he shall be liable, on conviction, before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, in a penalty not exceeding 500 Rs. for every Emigrant so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Master of any Ship or Vessel cleared for the Mauritius as aforesaid shall, after having obtained such Certificate as aforesaid fraudulently do or suffer to be done any act or thing whereby such Certificate shall become inapplicable, to the altered state of the Ship or Vessel, its Passengers, or other matters to which such Certificate relates, such Master shall be liable, on conviction in any Penalty not exceeding 5,000 Rupees, beside incurring a forfeiture of any Bond executed in consideration of any License obtained for the Vessel as originally described.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, for the greater security against Emigrant laborers being embarked for the Mauritius contrary to the provisions of this Act, that all the powers vested by law in the Officers of Customs in regard to the searching and detention of Ships or Vessels, or otherwise for the prevention of smuggling on board thereof may be exercised by such Officers for the prevention of the illegal embarkation of such Emigrants as aforesaid on board Ships or Vessels bound for the Mauritius, and of other offences against this Act; and it is further enacted that all Pilots in the service of the East India Company, shall be invested with the same powers and be charged with the same duties as Preventive Officers of Customs in this behalf.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every person who shall attempt by means of intoxication, or by false imprisonment, or other means of crippling to export any native on board any Ship or Vessel contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall be liable to be punished before a Magistrate in a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, provided that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the offender from being proceeded against by indictment; but the offender shall only be liable to one of these courses of proceeding.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Vessel shall clear from Calcutta for Mauritius with Emigrant laborers duly embarked thereon, the Customs Officer on board such Vessel shall countersign the Pass or Certificate brought on board by every such Emigrant laborer, and shall keep a Register of every such Emigrant laborer as may come on board. And such Customs Officer shall remain on board such Vessel until she has finally left the Port and shall come away along with the Pilot. And before leaving such Ship or Vessel he shall require the Master or Commander to take a general Muster of the Crew and Passengers and Emigrant laborers on board, and he shall bring away with him a copy of the Muster Roll so taken, countersigned by the Pilot. And any Customs Officer who shall omit to require such Muster to be taken and to make a correct copy of the Roll, or who shall wilfully make a false, erroneous or incomplete report of the Emigrant laborers on board of any Ship, or who shall connive at the unauthorized embarkation of any such Emigrant laborers, shall be liable, besides dismissal, to a fine of 500 Rupees, commutable if not paid, to imprisonment in the Calcutta Jail for six months, and the penalty shall be adjudged in like manner as similar penalties are adjudged for offences committed in respect to the Customs Revenue.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person shall forge or use, knowing it to be forged, any document required by this Act, shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding seven years.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that all the several penalties to which Masters of Ships or Vessels are liable by this Act shall be enforced by information laid before any Justice of the Peace at the instance of the Emigration Agent, or of any Officer appointed for the purpose by the Government of the Place or Presidency, or may be enforced by putting in suit the Bond given by the Master if such Bond has been given in consideration of the licence granted to the Ship.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3d day of September next.

No. 138 of 1842.—The Hon'ble the President in Council is pleased to direct that the following paras. of a Military Letter, No. 3, from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, to the Governor General of India in Council, dated 30th March 1842, establishing certain rules for the future rise to Regimental Lieutenant Coloncies of two or more Captains of the same Arm of the Service who may be promoted to Regimental Majorities with date of Rank on the same day, be published for general information:

Reply to Military Letter dated 10th Nov. 1841.—(No. 151.)

Offering observations on the subject of a claim preferred respectively by Majors T. Bullock of the 3d and F. Straton of the 8th Regiment Madras Light Cavalry, relative to precedence in the list of Majors of Cavalry for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, they having obtained Majorities on the same day.

Para. 1. Having given our most attentive consideration to these proceedings we have resolved that the following rules shall be established for the future rise to Regimental Lieutenant Coloncies of two or more Captains of the same Arm of the Service who may be promoted to Regimental Majorities with date of Rank on the same day.

If promoted in succession to two or more Line steps, or one Line and one Regimental step (not occasioned by Augmentations to the Army) to rank together for future promotion according to the order in which their respective Regiments previously stood for the Line step.

If promoted by Regimental steps or by an Augmentation of the Army, to rank together for future promotion according to their Army seniority as Captains.

2. We thus secure to Regiments the full benefit of their standing for the Line step, and as Regimental promotion is to the rank of Major inclusive, we at the same time secure to Regiments the last chance which the system gives of gaining or regaining precedence in the race of relative Regimental promotion.

No. 139 of 1842.—In continuation of General Orders No. 93, of the 6th April last, the Hon'ble the President in Council is pleased to direct that the following para. of a Military Letter, No. 5, from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors to the Governor General of India in Council, dated 6th April 1842, together with copy of a further Minute by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, therein referred to, be published in General Orders:

"With reference to our Despatches in this Department, dated the 19th January and 2d February 1842, Nos. 1 and 2, on the subject of the grant made by Her Majesty to the Troops employed in the late Operations in China, we now transmit copy of a further Minute* by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, containing additional instructions respecting its appropriation."

Treasury Minute.

"My Lords advert to their Minute of the 31st December last on the subject of the Donation granted by Her Majesty to the Forces engaged in the recent Operations in China."

"The Officers and Men entitled to participate in those operations are divided in the Minute into three classes, and the third class is described as follows, viz.

"Those employed only at Ningpo, Chusan and in the operations in the Canton River in 1840, or in one only of those operations."

"Representations have however been made to my Lords that some of the Officers and Men who were engaged in operations which took place in the Canton River in the early part of 1841, and who are not included in the two first classes will under the terms of their Lordships' Minute, be excluded from all participation in the Donation of Her Majesty, which would be altogether at variance with Her Majesty's Gracious intentions."

"My Lords are therefore pleased to direct, that the third Class be extended so as to include those who were employed in any of the Operations in the Canton River in the early part of 1841 previously to the commencement of those Operations against Canton, under the immediate pressure of which the 6,000,000 Dollars was paid by the Chinese Authorities for the ransom of that City, and who are not included in the 1st or 2d Class."

"At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 2d day of February 1842.

PRESENT

"The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
"Whereas, in the act of uniformity which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, provision is made for such alterations in the prayers for the Royal Family, as from time to time shall become necessary; it is therefore, this-day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that in the morning and evening prayers in the Litany, and in all other parts of the public Service, as well in the occasional offices as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following form and order shall be observed, viz.

"Adelaide the Queen Dowager, the Prince Albert, Albert Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family.

"And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be henceforth printed, but in the form aforementioned; and that, in the mean time, until copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this Realm do (for the preventing of mistakes) correct and amend all such prayers in the Church Books, according to the foregoing direction: and for the better notice hereof, that this order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

SIR,

I have the honor to forward a letter from Major General Sir Robert Sale, K. C. B., detailing the progress of events during the long and perilous siege sustained by the Force under his Command.

2nd. The gallantry of the Major General and his small Force are too well known to Government to require any commendations from me, but it is very pleasing to me to be the channel through which their many trials are brought to the notice of the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

I have had an opportunity of inspecting the works thrown up for their protection, by the indefatigable exertions of Sir R. Sale's Force, and my surprise at their strength and extent, has been only equalled by my admiration of the excellent arrangements which must have pervaded all Departments, since after a siege (by greatly superior numbers) of upwards of five months duration, I find the Garrison in excellent health and spirits and in an admirable state of discipline, with a good supply of ammunition, ready and anxious to take the field, and most willing to advance on Cabool.

SIR,

The relief of this place having been at length effected by the victorious advance through the passes of the Khyber, of the Army under Major General Pollock, C. B., I conceive that I owe it to the troops who have so long formed the Garrison here to address to you a Report, which may convey some notion of their conflicts and the severity of their duties, labours, and privations. It

has before been made known to Government, that I reached Gundamuck on the 30th of October 1841, under instructions from the authorities at Cabool, and there received intelligence of the breaking out of a terrific insurrection at the Afghan Capital on the 2nd November. My retracing my steps on that city was, in a military sense, impracticable, since the first inevitable sacrifice would have been of the lives of 300 sick and wounded, whom I could not have left in depôt with the treasonable Irregulars at Gundamuck, whilst my cattle was unequal to the transport of my camp equipage, and my ammunition insufficient for protracted operations. In the position which I occupied, I could not absolutely command a day's provisions or even water, and should have been hemmed in on every side by hostile tribes, amounting to 30 or 40 thousand men, part of whom might have seized Jellalabad and reduced it to ashes, or, holding it, have left me no alternative but a disastrous retreat towards Peshawur. I therefore came to the resolution of anticipating any movement of this kind, and by possessing myself of this city establishing a point on which the Force at Cabool might retire if hardly pressed, and restoring a link in the chain of communication with our Provinces. Two marches brought me after a successful contest at Futtahabad to Jellalabad. My breaking up from Gundamuck was followed by the immediate defection of the Irregulars there, the destruction of the Cantonment, and a general rising of the Tribes. I found the walls of Jellalabad in a state which might have justified despair as to the possibility of defending them. The enceinte was far too extensive for my small Force, embracing a circumference of upwards of 2300 yards. Its tracing was vicious in the extreme; it had no parapet excepting for a few hundred yards, which there was not more than 2 feet high. Earth and rubbish had accumulated to such an extent about the ramparts, that there were roads in various directions across and over them into the country. There was a space of 400 yards together on which none of the Garrison could shew themselves, excepting at one spot; the population within was disaffected, and the whole enceinte was surrounded by ruined forts, walls, mosques, tombs, and gardens, from which a fire could be opened upon the defenders at 20 or 30 yards.

The Garrison took full possession of the town in such a state on the morning of the 15th of November, and in the course of the day, the place and detached hills by which on one side it is commanded, were surrounded and surmounted by a force of not fewer than 5000 Insurgents. A general attack on the 14th of November ridded us of these enemies, and a similar array brought against us a fortnight afterwards, was dissipated by a second sally on the 1st of December. But we had seized the town having in our possession not quite two days' provisions and corn for our men and horses, and beheld the arduous task before us of striving to render the works defensible, and collecting supplies for our Magazine from the midst of a fanatical and infuriated people with very narrow means in the way of treasure to purchase them. I appointed Captain Broadfoot, Shah Soojah's Sappers, Garrison Engineer, and Captain Abbott, of the Artillery, Commissary of Ordnance. Captain McGregor, Political Agent, gave me the aid of his local experience, and through his influence and measures our Dak communication with India was restored, and a great quantity of grain collected, whilst the unremitting and almost incredible labours of the troops aided by the zeal and science of Captain Broadfoot put the town in an efficient state of defence. Captain Abbott made the Artillery dispositions in the ablest manner, and used every exertion to add to and encourage our resources in the way of gun and musquet ammunition, in both of which we were deficient for the purposes of a siege. Lead and powder were procured in and about Jellalabad, and a quantity of cartridges discovered in an old magazine, and thus the troops completed to 200 rounds per man. It is to be remarked that I might in the second week of November have marched upon Pesh Bolak, relieved from investment the Corps of Jazalchees under Captain Ferris, and with it operated a doubtful retreat upon Peshawar. But I felt it to be my duty to give support to the last moment to our Troops, straggling against their numerous enemies at Cabool, and maintain for them a point on which to retreat and rally if they met with reverse.

On the 9th of January, I was summoned by the leaders of the Afghan Rebellion to give up the place in fulfilment of a Convention entered into by the Political and Military Authorities at Cabool, but as I was fully assured of the bad faith of our enemies, I refused to do this, and on the 13th received the melancholy intelligence of the disastrous retreat of our Troops from the Capital, and their annihilation in the Ghilzie defiles by the rigours of the climate and the basest treachery on the part of those in whose promises they had confided. Almost at the same time it became known to us, that the Brigade of four Regiments marched to my succour from Hindoostan had been beaten in detail and forced to fall back upon Peshawur: my position was most critical, and I might, whilst our enemies were engaged in plundering the Force from Cabool, have attempted, and perhaps effected, though with heavy loss, a retreat across Khyber; but I resolved at all hazards on not relinquishing my grasp on the chief town of the Valley of Ningrahar, and the key of Eastern Afghanistan so long as I had reason to consider that our Government desired to retain it. The discouragements of my Garrison at this moment were very great, their duties most severe, their labours unceasing, and the most insidious endeavours made by the enemy to seduce the native portion of them from their allegiance. But their fidelity was unshaken, and their serenity amidst labours and privations unclouded. With reference, however, to the state of fanatical excitement and national antipathy which prevailed around us, I had been compelled as a measure of prudence to get rid, first, of the Corps of Khyber Rangers, and next of the detachment of Jazalchees, and a few of the Afghan Sappers and a body of Hindoostanee Gunners, who had formerly been in the employment of Dost Mahomed Khan. Works had in the mean time been completed of which the annexed reports and plans of Captain Broadfoot contain ample details. Generally, I may state, they consisted in the destruction of an immense quantity of cover for the enemy, extending to the demolition of forts and old walls, filling up ravines and destroying gardens and cutting down groves, raising the parapets to 6 or 7 feet high, repairing and widening the ramparts, extending the bastions, retrenching three of the gates, covering the fourth with an outwork, and excavating a ditch 10 feet in depth and 12 feet in width round the whole of the walls; the place was thus secure against the attack of any Asiatic enemy, not provided with siege artillery.

But it pleased Providence on the 19th February, to remove in an instant this ground of confidence. A tremendous earthquake shook down all our parapets built up with so much labour, injured several of our bastions, cast to the ground all our guard houses, demolished a third of the town, made a considerable breach in the rampart of a curtain in the Peshawur face, and reduced the Cabool gate to a shapeless mass of ruins. It savours of romance but is a sober fact, that the city was thrown into alarm, within the space of little more than one month, by the repetition of full one hundred shocks of this terrific phenomenon of nature.

The Troops turned with indefatigable industry to the reparation of their walls, but at the moment of the great convulsion, Sirdhar Mahomed Akbar Khan, Burukzye, the assassin of the late Envoy and treacherous destroyer of the Cabool force, having collected a body of Troops, flushed with a success consummated by the vilest means, had advanced to Murkhail within 7 miles of our gates. He attacked our foraging parties with a large body of Horse on the 21st and 22d of February, and soon after establishing his Head Quarters to the westward 2 miles from the place, and a secondary camp to the eastward about one mile distant, invested the town and established a rigorous blockade. From that time up to the 7th of April, the reduced Garrison was engaged in a succession of skirmishes with the enemy, who, greatly superior in horse, perpetually insulted our walls by attacks and alerts, and compelled us daily to fight at disadvantage for forage for our cattle. The most remarkable of these affairs were those of the Cavalry under Lieutenant Mayne, commanding detachment Shah Soojah's 2nd Cavalry, and Jemadar Deena Singh, 5th Light Cavalry, already reported; a sally under Colonel Dennie, C. B., to defeat a suspected attempt of the enemy to drive a mine on the 11th of March; the repulse of an assault upon the transverse walls to the northward of the place on the 24th of the same month, by detachments under Captain Broadfoot, (who was severely wounded,) and Captain Fenwick, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry; the capture of bullocks and sheep by Lieutenant Mayne on the 30th and 31st of January, and the seizure of large flocks of the latter, in the face of Mahomed Akbar's Army, by a force of Infantry under Captain Pattison, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, and of Cavalry under Captain Oldfield, on the 1st instant. These successes were crowned by Providence by the issue of the brilliant and decisive attack on the camp of the Sirdhar on the 7th instant.

I have to notice as a measure of defence, my having enrolled as a Provisional Battalion a large body of our camp followers, and armed them with pikes and other weapons. On all occasions of assault and sally these men were available to make a show upon our curtains, and I have pledged myself to them to recommend to Government, that they should enjoy all the pecuniary advantages of Native soldiers beyond the Indus. I at the same time held forth to the troops of Shah Soojah's Force, the expectation that they would be put, during the especial service, on the same footing with their comrades of the Bengal Army.

From the time that the Brigade threw itself into Jellalabad, the Native Troops have been on half, and the followers on quarter rations, and for many weeks they have been able to obtain little or nothing in the bazars to eke out this scanty provision. I will not mention as a privation the European Troops from the same period having been without their allowance of spirits, because I verily believe this circumstance and their constant employment have contributed to keep them in the highest health and the most remarkable state of discipline. Crime has been almost unknown amongst them, but they have felt severely, although they never murmured, the diminution of their quantity of animal food, and the total want of ghee, flour, tea, coffee, and sugar; these may seem small matters to those who read of them at a distance, but they are serious reductions in the scale of comfort of the hard working and fighting soldier in Asia. The Troops have also been greatly in arrears of pay, besides their severe duties, in heat and cold, wind and rain, on the guards of the gates and bastions. The Troops, Officers and men, British and Hindoostanee, of every arm, remained fully accoutred on their alarm posts every night from the 1st March to the 7th of April. The losses of Officers and men in carriage cattle, camp equipage and baggage, between Cabool and Jellalabad, were heavy, and their expenditure, during the siege and blockade, in obtaining articles of mere subsistence and necessity, has been exorbitant.

I feel assured that Major General Pollock will consider it a most pleasing duty to bring the series of labours, privations and conflicts, imperfectly sketched in the foregoing details, to the notice of the head of the Supreme Government in India, and through his Lordship to that of the Court of Directors and of our Sovereign, as a claim for public acknowledgment and substantial reimbursement and reward.

The report of Captain Broadfoot, in his capacity of Garrison Engineer, will meet with attentive perusal: I have already stated how much I have been indebted to his scientific attainments, as well as his distinguished activity and resolution during the siege. His fertility in resource obviated great difficulties in procuring iron, timber and charcoal, and to the foresight of his arrangements we owe our having had a very ample supply of tools. The Corps under his command performed, from Bouthkhal, the duties equally of good sappers and bold light infantry soldiers, and the Afghan Huzaree and Eusifzye portion of it have been singularly faithful in time of general defection. The two Infantry Regiments under the lamented Colonel Dennie and Lieutenant Colonel Monteath, have vied with each other in the steady performance of the duties of that arm; and it would be impossible for me to discriminate in favour of either, in awarding praise to the Squadron 5th Light Cavalry under Captain Oldfield, and the Resallah 2d Shah Soojah's Cavalry under Lieutenant Mayne; Lieutenant Plowden of the former, has been distinguished on several occasions. The Artillery practice of No. 6 Light Field Battery has ever been excellent, and has been equalled by that of the Mountain Train. Captains Abbott and Backhouse, and Lieutenant Dawes have proved themselves excellent Officers of Ordnance. I have more than once brought it to notice that Captain MacGregor, Political Agent, has cheerfully rendered very able assistance in serving the guns in every crisis of pressing danger. Of his labours in his own department, I ought not perhaps to attempt to constitute myself a judge; but I know that they have been unremitting, and their result in obtaining for my Force supplies and information, and keeping up our communi-

ation with India and with Cabool, and securing for us Afghan co-operation, I may be allowed to appreciate and am bound to point out to Government.

The medical duties of the Garrison have been ably fulfilled by Surgeon Forsyth, Superintending Surgeon Shah Soojah's Force, and Assistant Surgeons Robertson and Barnes, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, Hare, 35th Regiment, and Brown, late in charge of the Irregulars.

Captain Mauwaring, Commissariat Officer to the Force, has been indefatigable in his efforts to keep the Garrison well supplied, and his arrangements in very difficult times have merited my highest praise. Captain Moorehouse, 35th Regiment Native Infantry, has satisfactorily discharged his duties as Brigade Quarter Master; he was severely wounded on the 7th instant.

It is gratifying to me to forward the opinion of my second in Command, Lieutenant Colonel Monteath, C. B., placed on record without solicitation, of the merits of the 13th Light Infantry, of which Corps I am proud of being a member: I fully concur in the sentiments which he expresses, and hope the distinctions which he recommends for the Officers of his own Corps will be accorded. The cheerful and persevering manner in which the Native soldiers laboured with the shovel, mattock and hand-barrow were as surprising, as their steadiness and courage in the field were conspicuous.

I have to acknowledge the zealous manner in which Brevet Major Frazer, Light Cavalry, Brevet Captain Gerrard of the Corps of Jazalchees, Captain Burn and Lieutenant Hillersden of the Khyber Rangers, and Lieutenant Dawson, of the Janbazes, when their services could no longer be available with their Corps, volunteered to do duty with any Regiment in which they could be useful.

I must finally express my gratitude to Providence for having placed so gallant and devoted a Force under my command; in every way it has exceeded my most sanguine expectations, and I beg leave in the strongest manner to solicit the interposition of Major General Pollock, C. B., who has nobly laboured and fought to relieve it from its critical position in the midst of a hostile empire, in now committing it to the protection and favor of the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council, and through him of the Court of Directors and of our Sovereign.

I ask permission specially to recommend the following Officers for honorary distinctions or Brevet Rank, or both, viz.: Lieut. Col. Monteath, C. B., commanding 35th Regiment Native Infantry, now second in Command; Brevet Major Frazer, Light Cavalry, who acted as my Aid-de-camp on the 7th instant; Captain Abbott, Commandant of Artillery and Commissary of Ordnance; Captain Backhouse, commanding the Mountrain Train and Senior Officer of the Shah's Troops with my Force; Captain Broadfoot, commanding Sappers and Garrison Engineer; Captain Oldfield, 5th Light Cavalry, Senior Officer of that arm; Captain Seaton, 35th Regiment Native Infantry, particularly recommended for his conduct on the 7th instant by Lieut. Colonel Monteath; Captain Younghusband of the same Regiment, who was distinguished with the advanced guard in the Khoord Cabool Pass and there severely wounded; Captain Burn, late commandant of the Khybur Rangers and doing duty with the 35th Regiment N. I.; Captain Wilkinson, on whom the command of the 13th Light Infantry devolved in the field on the fall of Colonel Dennie, C. B.; Captain Fenwick, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, whose highly deserving conduct in the Pass of Jagdulluk was noticed then in my dispatch; Captain Havelock, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, Persian Interpreter to Major Generals Elphinstone and Pollock and attached to me as Staff, and who commanded the right column in the final attack on Mahomed Akbar's Camp; and Captain Hamlet Wade, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, my Brigade Major, whose exertions in the action of the 7th, I have elsewhere highly commended. Both these latter Officers rendered most valuable services throughout the investment and siege. The Officers of all ranks and Soldiers of all arms, European and Native, I have likewise to represent as generally and individually deserving of reward and encouragement, and I hope that the Government will sanction my calling upon Commandants of Corps and Detachments to send in Rolls of such Native Officers as they may deem worthy of the Insignia of the Order of "Merit and of British India."

SIR,

The exertions of the Garrison of Jellalabad beyond ordinary routine, having ceased since the decisive victory obtained over the enemy on the 7th instant, and now finally terminated by the arrival of the British Army under Major General Pollock, C. B., I trust I may not be considered as going beyond the limits of my proper duty in addressing you, to state as follows:

As doing but due justice on this occasion to Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry might be looked upon as a highly colored record of the merits of your own Regiment, and seeing that no such partial bias can possibly be supposed to guide my feelings in the estimate I have formed of their deserts, I have pleasure in sincerely declaring, that their conduct, throughout the painful and perilous position in which they have so long been placed, has been such as fully to deserve the applause and admiration of their country, and the confidence and best consideration of our well beloved Sovereign.

On our throwing ourselves on the 12th of November last, into the old and ruined town of Jellalabad, without money, without food, and almost without protection, with a nation of highly excited and barbarous enemies in arms against us, our situation seemed as hopeless a one as British Troops were ever called upon to confront; notwithstanding which the enemy was twice within twenty days attacked, and on both occasions defeated with signal success.

You yourself will doubtless detail the work performed by the Regiment, let it then be only my province, who have witnessed their exertions almost hourly during a period of five months, to record that their devoted perseverance and cheerfulness amidst all the gloom that surrounded them, after the destruction of their comrades of the Cabool force, could not have been surpassed by any troops in the world; and that after months of extreme toil, when an earthquake, such as man is not often in the habit of experiencing, in a moment left scarcely a vestige of their labour standing, their flying as they did with redoubled zeal to the work and completing it in ten days, (so that on the arrival of the enemy before Jellalabad, they declared that the calamity which had befallen the valley arose from nothing but English witchcraft; it being the only place that had escaped uninjured :) was what none but British Soldiers could have performed, and what no price could have purchased, for it was the labour of the heart, work of all others most deserving of distinction and reward.

In regard to the Native Troops of all arms, I shall refrain from saying much for a reason which has in a measure induced me to address this letter to you, but as you have yourself been a daily witness of their conduct under every description of circumstance, you have it fully within your own power to say all, of which the Government they serve may very justly feel proud, and it may serve to shew as an example for imitation, what noble enthusiasm and zeal may be lighted up in their breasts by the high bearing and considerate conduct of determined British Officers.

I shall conclude by observing that we can now, Sir, proudly march forth from this Garrison with the enemy's standards in our hands, and their captured cannon to fire a salute, on delivering over the care of the honor of the British name, which we have had within our keeping for the last five months, pure and unspotted, and without a single circumstance existing to cast a breath upon its lustre.

The conduct of the Officers of the 35th Regiment generally, as well as of those doing duty with it throughout the siege, I am proud to say, has been such as well to deserve any reward or distinction that can be conferred upon them.

Of those holding the rank of Captain and above it, which enables Her Majesty to advance them a step, I could strongly recommend Captain Seaton, 35th Regiment; Captain Younghusband, 35th Regiment, (severely wounded;) Brevet Major Fraser, late 2nd Light Cavalry, and Captain Burn, 1st Regiment Native Infantry, both doing duty with the 35th Regiment.

Of the Native Officers of the 35th Regiment, I could also strongly recommend; that six should, as a compliment to the Regiment for its gallant and meritorious conduct, receive the Order of "Merit" and of "British India;"—viz.

The Hon'ble the Deputy Governor of Bengal is pleased to direct, that the following Instructions received with a letter from the Acting Colonial Secretary to His Excellency the Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, dated the 21st March last, be published for general information:

INSTRUCTIONS

For entering Table Bay by Night, by the Plan constructed on the Observations made by H. M. Ship *LEVEN*,

November, 1825.

The Bearings mentioned in these Instructions are all by Compass, or magnetic.

1st. To enter Table Bay from the Northward, meaning to pass outside of Robben Island, a Ship should keep the Light to the Eastward of South—9 degrees East, or about South and by East, until she get soundings under 20 fathoms, at a little more than a mile from the Light House; she may then steer East South East, or East and by South, not to come under 10 or 12 fathoms until the Light bears West South West, she may then steer for the Anchorage, and may anchor in from 7 to 6 fathoms, as soon as the Lights are shutting in behind the Lion's Tail.—This track leads about a mile clear of danger on Green Point; but a Ship need not approach it so near, if she have, by seeing Robben Island, ascertained by its bearings, that she is clear of the Whale Rock, in which case she may round it at a greater distance from Green Point, if desirable, but the soundings in that case will not alone be a sure guide.

2d. In coming from the South-West, a Ship should not get less than 40 fathoms before the Light bears South East, or East South East, nor less than 20 fathoms before it bears South and by East, when the preceding directions may be followed.

From the Northward—inside of Robben Island—the Light should be kept about South West and by South, until a Ship have passed that Island; in doing which she may have some casts from 8 to 6 fathoms; and when on that course the Water deepens to 11 or 12 fathoms, she may steer for the Anchorage by the Plan as before directed.

In beating round Green Point, a Ship should never shoal her Water under 11 or 12 fathoms, until she have brought the Light to bear West South West, as before said.

In beating between Robben Island and the Main, to enter Table Bay, the soundings may be taken from the Island as it shoals to very regularly. In standing towards the Main, it appears prudent to tack at the first cast of the Lead after the Water shoals.

In these directions it is taken for granted, that a Ship will always keep her Leads going.

By Day, or when the Shores or Surf can be seen, or indeed under any circumstances, the Plan ought to be a sufficient guide.

There are two Lights at the Light House, which are in one about South West and by West; these appear to be of no other use than to assure the Navigator which is the Light House, if he should see other Lights. We have seen the Lights clearly off deck at 16 miles distance; but they will not make clear as two Lights until within 6 or 7 miles to the Westward of them; and from the Northward one Light only will be seen.

A Light House having been erected on the Mouille Point, with a Lenticular Light of the 4th class, for the better guidance of Vessels entering Table Bay during the Night, the following Instructions are appended to the Instructions by Capt. OWEN, R. N.

In standing in from the S. W. a Ship should not pass the Lights on Green Point nearer than a mile—nor should the course be altered from the Eastward to the Southward, with the intention of steering for the anchorage,—nor should the ship be brought into less than 14 or 15 fathoms water, before the Lights on Green Point bear S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. (they will then be in one,) when the Light on the Mouille Point will instantly be seen, (and not before,) bearing nearly S by W.—A Ship may then alter the course from the Eastward, and steer S. S. E. for the centre of the anchorage, and anchor whenever the Lights on Green Point are shut in (by Sand-hills near the Mouille) and the Light on the Mouille Point bears N. W. distant about a Mile, in from 6 to 8 fathoms water. Vessels of light draft of water may steer S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. for the anchorage, and anchor with the Mouille Light bearing N. W. by N. in from 4 to 5 fathoms of water.

The Ship's distance from the Shore, when the Light on the Mouille appears, may be readily ascertained by the bearings of the two Light Houses, and the distance between them, which is 1,215 yards—the perpendicular height of the Mouille Light above high water mark is 40 feet.

In coming in from the Northward (inside Robben Island,) the Lights on Grass Point will appear in one, (or nearly so,) and the Light on the Mouille Point will also be seen—the distance between the Light Houses being as above mentioned. The Directions by Capt. OWEN, and the appended Directions, will be a sufficient guide to the anchorage.

It is earnestly recommended to Strangers not to attempt to beat into Table Bay at night, in equally or thick weather.—The strictest attention should be paid to the Soundings, and the Leads kept constantly going. The Plan of the Bay by Capt. OWEN, (upon which the In-

structions are founded,) should also be at hand for reference.

MAKING ADVANCES IN INDIA UPON

The Goods and Merchandize of Individuals intended for Consignment to England, repayable to the Court of Directors of the East India Company.

1st.—The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve; and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Governments, an Advance not exceeding three-fifths of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East-India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

5th.—In case of default being made either in acceptance or payment of the Bills, the Court of Directors to be authorized, in such manner and at such times as they may see fit, to sell the goods, for the purpose of repaying the Company the amount of the Advances made thereon, including freight and any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred on account of the Consignment, together with Interest, should any have accrued; the Company, on the other hand, allowing Discount, where any part of the proceeds shall be realized before the Bills fall due, and the settlement of either surplus or deficiency shall be made with the Consignor; and if in India, by the Government from whom he received the Advance, at the rate of Exchange at which the Company may at the time be drawing bills upon such Government.

6th.—An Agent in England shall be appointed for each Consignment, to whom the Court of Directors shall be empowered to make over the goods, subject to all the conditions agreed upon with the Company, on payment of the bills; and with whom they shall be authorized to transact generally all business relating to such goods. The Consignor shall be at liberty to make provision, in case of the party upon whom the Bill is drawn (being also the Agent) having failed to accept the Bill, for the substitution of another Agent.

7th.—After the arrival of the goods in England, and when they shall have been placed in such deposit as may have been agreed upon, the Agent may be put into possession of them before the Bills become due, upon the amount of such Bills (less Discount) being paid, together with the Freight and any other charges and expenses which the Company have paid, or may be subject to on account of the goods.

8th.—The rate of Discount to be allowed by the Company shall be the same as that charged by the Bank of England; and in cases where Interest shall have accrued, such Interest shall be computed at the rate or rates per cent. at which the Company have allowed Discount during the period for which such Interest is chargeable.

9th.—Parties or their Agents will be required to insure the Goods from Fire, and deposit the Policies with the East-India Company; such insurance to take effect from the date of the termination of the Sea

Risk. Should however the Parties or their Agents fail to effect such Insurance, the East-India Company shall be at liberty to insure the Goods, the expense of which shall be reimbursed to them previously to their making over the Goods to those Parties or their Agents.

10th.—Parties receiving Advances, to address in each instance a Letter in quadruplicate to the Court of Directors, according to a form which will be furnished by the Officers of Government, signifying their assent to all the foregoing conditions, but more particularly for the purpose of expressly authorizing the sale of the goods by the Company (without either notice to or concurrence of any person whomsoever) at any period after default shall be made either in acceptance or payment of the bills; also authorizing, in such cases, the repaying to the Company the advances made, either Principal or Interest, together with any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred in respect of the goods, and appointing the Agent in England for each transaction.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 3d of June 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for regulating the Emigration of the Native Inhabitants of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company to the Island of Mauritius.

I. Whereas it hath been ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, as follows:

Whereas it is probable that the Laws now in force in British India for preventing the emigration of the Inhabitants thereof to Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions will be shortly repealed so far as regards emigration to the Island of Mauritius, and that such last mentioned emigration will be sanctioned by Laws to be for that purpose enacted in India, subject to various provisions to be in such Laws made for the protection of such Emigrants, and for the prevention of abuses. And whereas it is probable that amongst the provisions so to be made, as last aforesaid, will be a provision for enabling the Governor General of India to appoint at ports or places in India, Officers charged with the care, protection and superintendance of all persons proposing to emigrate as Labourers from India to Mauritius. And whereas it is probable that provision will be made by Law at Mauritius for defraying from the public Revenue of that Island the expense of introducing emigration thither from British India. And whereas it is necessary that effectual provision should be made by Law at Mauritius for regulating any such expenditure, and for the prevention of abuses in the introduction of Emigrants from British India into that Island—It is therefore hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, that in the event of any Law being made in British India, authorizing the emigration to Mauritius of the Natives of India, and repealing the restrictions now in force there in regard to such emigrations, and in the event of any such Laws, containing provisions, enabling the Governor General of India to appoint at the several ports of embarkation in India, Officers charged with the protection of persons emigrating from such ports to Mauritius, the various Rules and Regulations comprized, and set forth in the Schedule to this present order subjoined, shall within the Island of Mauritius have the force and effect of Law, and shall be observed and carried into effect by all Her Majesty's Officers, Civil and Military, in Mauritius, and by all Her Majesty's subjects within the same Island as to them may respectively appertain.

And the Right Hon'ble Lord Stanley, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary instructions herein accordingly.

The Schedule referred to in the preceding Order, comprising the Rules and Regulations to be observed at Mauritius in regard to Emigrants from British India, resorting to and arriving at that Island.

1st. The Governor of Mauritius may from time to time nominate such persons as he shall see fit to act as Emigration Agents at any port or place in India, while the Governor General of India may designate as a port or place for the embarkation of Emigrants to Mauritius, and may also from time to time nominate a proper person to act as Protector of Immigrants at Mauritius:—

2nd. The remuneration to be given to any such Agent in India, shall not depend upon or be regulated by the number of the Emigrants sent to Mauritius by him, but shall be in the nature of an annual salary.

3rd. Every such Emigration Agent shall ascertain by personal communication with every Emigrant previously to his or her embarkation from the port or place for which such Agent shall be appointed, that such Emigrant has not been induced to emigrate by any fraud, false nor unreasonable expectation, and is aware of the distance of Mauritius from the place where he or she is about to emigrate; and such Agent shall explain the real advantages likely to be derived by such Emigrants from a removal to Mauritius, at the same time cautioning such Emigrant against unreasonable and unwarrantable expectations; and such Agent shall also ascertain that every such Emigrant is in good health, and not incapacitated from labour by old age, bodily infirmity, or disease.

4th. It shall not be lawful to ship on board of any Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to Mauritius, any number of Passengers exceeding the proportion of one person for every two Tons of the Registered burthen of such Ship or Vessel, and no such Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants, and having more than one Deck, shall have less than the height of six feet at the least between Decks, and in case such Ship or Vessel shall have only one Deck, a Platform shall be laid beneath such Deck, and in such manner as to afford a space of the height of six feet at the least, and that such Platform shall not be so laid as that the lower beams shall project above the same, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall have more than two tiers of berths, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall carry Passengers on any such voyage to Mauritius unless there shall be an interval of six inches at least between the Deck or Platform, and the floor of the lower tier throughout the whole extent thereof; and whatever may be the Tonnage of the Ship or Vessel, no greater number of Passengers shall be taken on board of such Ship or Vessel than shall be after the rate of one such person for every twelve superficial feet of the lower Deck or Platform, unoccupied by goods or stores, not being the personal luggage of such persons.

5th. In the computation of the number of Passengers within the meaning of these Regulations, two children under the age of ten years, shall be considered as equal to and shall be reckoned as one person only.

6th. There shall be actually laden and on board of every Ship or Vessel bringing Emigrants into Mauritius at the time of departure of such Ship or Vessel from the port or place at which such Labourers shall be embarked good and wholesome Provisions for the use and consumption of the said Passengers over and above the victualling of the crew to the amount or in the proportion following, that is to say, a supply of water to the amount of five gallons to every week of the computed voyage for every Passenger on board such Ship or Vessel, such water being carried in Tanks or sweet Casks, and a supply of Rice, Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Oatmeal, or Bread Stuff, to the amount of seven pounds weight to every week of the computed voyage for every such Passenger. Provided always that when any such Ship or Vessel shall be destined to call at a port or place in the course of her voyage for the purpose of filling up her water casks, a supply of water at the rate before mentioned for every week of an average voyage to such port or place of calling shall be deemed to be a compliance with this Regulation. And provided that the preceding Regulation regarding food shall be deemed to have been complied within any case where it shall be made to appear that by the special authority of the Governor General of India, any other articles of food were substituted for the articles above enumerated as being in his judgment equivalent thereto.

7th. The number of weeks which shall be deemed necessary for the voyage to Mauritius from any port or ports in India, shall be such as shall from time to time be determined by any Law or Ordinance to be promulgated for that purpose by the Governor General of India in Council, and according to any such Law or Ordinance shall and may be further determined whether at different periods of the year different estimations are to be made of the probable length of any such voyage, and if by any such Law or Ordinance the removal of Emigrants should during any particular period of the year be prohibited altogether then any such removal during such prohibited period, shall in Mauritius be regarded dealt with and punished as an infringement of these present Regulations.

8th. Before any such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out, on any such voyage the Agents appointed under this Ordinance for the port or place from which such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out, shall survey or cause to be surveyed by some competent person, the provisions and water hereinbefore required to be on board for the consumption of Passengers, and shall ascertain that the same are in good and sweet condition, and also that over and above the same there is on board an ample supply of water and stores for the victualling of the Crew of the Ship or Vessel, and shall also ascertain that such Ship or Vessel is generally reputed seaworthy, and that the directions hereinbefore contained for insuring the health and safety of the Passengers have been complied with, and shall grant a Certificate thereof under his hand to the Master of such Ship or Vessel.

9th. The Master of every Ship or Vessel bringing Emigrants to Mauritius shall be bound to provide for and furnish to every such Emigrant and his wife and children a sufficient quantity of good and wholesome provisions, for his, her and their daily maintenance during such voyage, and during the space of 48 hours next after the arrival of such Ship or Vessel in Mauritius.

10th. Two copies of these Regulations authenticated by the signature of the Agent at the port or place from which such Emigrants shall come shall be delivered to the Master by such Agent on demand at the time of clearance, and shall be kept on board of every Ship or Vessel carrying such Emigrants as aforesaid, and one of such copies shall upon request made at reasonable times to the Master of the Ship or Vessel be produced to any Passenger for his perusal.

11th. The Master of every Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to Mauritius, shall before clearing out such Ship or Vessel deliver to such Agent at the port or place from which such vessel shall be cleared out a list in writing, together with a Duplicate of the same specifying as accurately as may be the names, ages and occupations of all and every the Emigrants on board such Ship or Vessel, and such Agent shall thereupon deliver to the said Master the counterpart of such lists, signed by such Agent, and the said Master shall on the arrival of such Ship or Vessel at Mauritius, and previous to the disembarkation of any such Emigrants give notice of the arrival of such Ship or Vessel, and deliver the said counterpart of such list to the Protector of Immigrants hereinbefore mentioned. And such Protector of Immigrants shall forthwith proceed on board of such Ship or Vessel and shall ascertain as far as possible by personal inspection of the Ship or Vessel and Passengers whether the directions hereinbefore contained with regard to the situation of the berth of such Ship or Vessel, the proportion of the Passengers to the burthens and measurement of such Ship or Vessel, and the maintenance of the Emigrants during such passage have been complied with, and such Protector of Immigrants shall personally muster such Emigrants and compare the number and names of such Emigrants with the said counterparts of such lists, and shall certify in writing under his hand upon such counterpart of the total number of Emigrants then living and being on board of such Vessel, and in case any such Emigrant shall have died during the passage, or the number of names of the Emigrants shall differ from the number or names stated in such counterpart, the Protector of Immigrants shall note such death or difference upon such counterpart, and thereupon shall grant a License under his hand for the disembarkation and landing of such Emigrants.

12th. If the Protector of Immigrants on such personal inspection of the Ship or Vessel and Emigrants shall be satisfied that the preceding Regulations have been complied with, he shall grant a Certificate under his hand of the arrival in Mauritius of such Emigrants respectively and the place from which, and the Ship or Vessel in which such Emigrants shall have arrived.

13th. No money shall be payable by the Colonial Treasurer of Mauritius in respect of any such Emigrants as

aforesaid except on the Warrant of the Governor of that Island, which Warrant shall not be issued except on such Certificate as aforesaid of the said Protector of Immigrants.

14th. The Protector of Immigrants shall keep a Register of all persons in respect of whom any such Certificate as aforesaid shall be granted, and of the Ship or Vessel in which the port from which and the time at which such person shall have arrived in this Colony, a copy of which Registry shall be laid before the Council of Government on the 31st day of March, the 30th of June, the 30th day of September, and the 31st of December in each year.

15th. If any Ship or Vessel bringing Immigrants from India to Mauritius shall carry any number of Passengers exceeding the proportion authorized and allowed by these Regulations a Penalty of Five Pounds per head shall be payable in respect of each Passenger so carried in excess of such proportion, or if such Ship or Vessel shall not be of the height between Decks hereinbefore required; or if such a Platform as hereinbefore directed shall not be laid and continued throughout the whole duration of any such voyage in such manner as is hereinbefore required; or if there shall be more than two tiers of berths, or if there shall not be throughout the whole duration of any such voyage, such an interval as is hereinbefore prescribed between the Deck and the Floor of the lower tier of berths, or if any such Ship or Vessel shall clear out, and put to sea not having on board such Water and Provisions as aforesaid for the use and consumption of the Passengers of the kind, and to the amount and in the proportion hereinbefore directed; or if any such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out before such lists of Emigrants shall have been delivered in manner and form aforesaid, or if any such lists shall be wilfully false; or if the copy of these Regulations be not produced as hereinbefore required, or if any Emigrant shall not be maintained during such voyage, and for 48 hours after his arrival; the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall for and in respect of each and every such offence be liable on summary conviction before any Stipendiary Magistrate at any time within the space of 12 calendar months next after the arrival of such Master within the Colony of Mauritius to the payment of a fine not less than £5, nor more than £20 British Sterling, and in default of payment of the fine abovementioned either immediately, or at the time fixed by such Stipendiary Magistrate at the time of making such conviction to imprisonment for any time not less than one nor more than three calendar months.

16th. Provided nevertheless that nothing herein contained shall take away or abridge any right of suit or action which may accrue to any Emigrant in any such Ship or Vessel, or to any other person in respect of the breach or non-performance of any contract made or entered into between, or on the behalf of any such Emigrant or other person, and the Master, Owner or Owners of any such Ship or Vessel.

17th. Provided always that nothing in these Regulations contained shall apply to any Ship or Vessel in the service of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or to any of Her Majesty's Ships of War.

18th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius shall be capable of entering into any contract of service to be performed in that Island, until he shall have been at least 48 hours on shore there, and every such contract of service made before that time shall be null and void to all intents and purposes.

19th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius, and engaging to labour in that Island shall within Mauritius be liable to any Action, Suit or Demand, for or in respect of any Debt contracted, or any contract made by such Emigrant before his arrival in the said Island.

20th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius shall in Mauritius be capable of entering into any contract for service except for the period in the manner and under the superintendance which by a Law in force there is required in the case of contracts for service made by other Labourers in Agriculture or Manufactures within the said Island.

21st. No payment shall be made from the Treasury of the said Island in respect of any Emigrants introduced there from India, unless on proof to the satisfaction of the Governor of Mauritius, that all Rules and Regulations, which may be established by Law in India, for the advantage and protection of such Emigrants have been duly complied with, such Rules and Regulations not being repugnant to any thing in these Regulations contained.

22d. In every case in which the Penalties hereby denounced against offences are imposed by the use of the words in the masculine Gender or in the singular person such words shall be understood as extending to the feminine Gender also, and to any number of persons unless

when the opposite construction is required in order to meet the object and to accomplish the ends with a view to which these regulations are established and made.

(Signed) C. GREVILLE.

In conformity with which said order, and for the purpose of giving effect thereto, it is hereby enacted, that Act No. XIV. of 1839, and all Acts repealed thereby, so far as the same are applicable to the emigration of Natives from the Port of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay respectively, to the Mauritius, shall be repealed from the day when the Governor General of India in Council, or, in his absence, the President in Council shall notify in the Gazette that it hath been duly certified to him that such Regulations have been provided, and that such measures have been taken by the Government of Mauritius as he may deem necessary for the protection of Emigrant laborers from India on their passage to the Mauritius, and during their residence there, and for their safe return at the expiration of five years, or any subsequent period, should they be desirous of returning to India. Provided always that the aforesaid Act No. XIV. of 1839 shall remain in full force in all the ports of India except the ports aforesaid, and in regard to Emigrants from India proceeding to other places than the Mauritius.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that after this Act shall come into operation, Emigrant laborers being Native Inhabitants of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company shall be allowed to pass and to be conveyed from India to the Mauritius from the ports of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay respectively, in compliance with the Provisions hereinafter mentioned, but not otherwise.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that at each of the three ports aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Government of the Presidency within which the port is situated to authorize the persons nominated by the Government of Mauritius, under the order hereinbefore inserted to act as Emigration Agents at the aforesaid ports respectively, and to exercise the powers conferred on Emigration Agents by this Act. And every such Emigration Agent shall make monthly reports to the Government to which he is subordinate of all matters transacted by him in pursuance of this Act.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful to convey any Emigrant, being a Native of India, who may embark for the purpose of laboring for hire in the Colony of Mauritius from either of the ports aforesaid, in any Ship or Vessel, unless a Licence be obtained for carrying Emigrants in such Ship or Vessel from the Government of the Presidency in which the port is situate. A fee of — Rupees shall be demandable in respect of every such Licence, and the granting or withholding the same shall be entirely discretionary with the Government, and in consideration of such Licence the Master of every Ship conveying or destined to convey Emigrants from India shall execute a Bond, binding himself and his owners in a penal sum of 10,000 Rupees to conform to the several conditions hereunder provided, and the said Bond shall be executed in duplicate that it may be put in suit either at the place of execution or in the Colony of Mauritius, and one copy shall be forwarded to the Government of Mauritius to be dealt with as the case may require. And every Ship or Vessel in which any such Emigrant shall be conveyed without a Licence being obtained as aforesaid shall be liable to be forfeited, and the Master thereof shall be liable as for a misdemeanor in a fine of 1,000 Rupees for every such Emigrant so illegally conveyed.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful for the Master of any Vessel licenced as above to receive on board any Emigrant laborer as above provided unless such laborer shall have in his possession and show a Certificate or pass to be given to him by the Emigration Agent of the port, stating his name and the name of his father and his age, and certifying that having appeared before such Agent he has declared his willingness and desire to proceed to work for hire in the said Colony of Mauritius.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel, so licenced to carry Emigrant laborers as above provided, shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid ports for the Mauritius, it shall be necessary for the Master of such Ship or Vessel, provided any Emigrant of the description aforesaid shall embark therein, to obtain from the Emigration Agent so nominated and authorized at such port as aforesaid a Certificate under the hand of such Agent to the effect following, that is to say—

1. That such Agent has, by personal communication, done what is required on the part of such Agent by the third Article of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted; provided always that every such Agent shall make the inquiries specified in such Schedule, in an open Court or public office, to which all persons shall have admission.

2. That all the directions contained in the 4th, 5th, 6th and 8th Articles of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted for ensuring the health and safety of Passengers have been duly complied with.

3. That (in addition to the directions contained in the said Schedule) such rules have been complied with as the Governor General in Council, or, in his absence, the President in Council, shall from time to time frame touching the Medical attendance and Medical Stores to be provided, the species of provisions suited to native habits, the number of women that should accompany the Emigrants, and other like matters.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that with reference to Article 7 of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted, the probable lengths of a voyage to the Mauritius from the respective ports aforesaid, shall, for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be for the port of Calcutta,

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid Ports for the Mauritius, it shall be necessary for the Master thereof to deliver to the Emigration Agent so nominated and authorised at such Port as aforesaid the list specified in Article 11 of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted, and to obtain such duplicate thereof as is required by the said Article.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall at any of the Ports aforesaid take on board such Ship or Vessel any Emigrant laborer of the description aforesaid, and shall clear such Ship or Vessel for the Mauritius without having fully complied with every particular hereinbefore required previous to clearance, he shall be liable, on conviction before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace in a penalty of 200 Rs. for every Emigrant laborer so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall, after having cleared such Ship or Vessel at any such Port as aforesaid for Mauritius take on board any such Emigrant laborer as aforesaid without having entered such Emigrant laborer in such list as aforesaid, or without having obtained such duplicate as aforesaid containing the entry of such Emigrant, prior to clearance, he shall be liable, on conviction, before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, in a penalty not exceeding 500 Rs. for every Emigrant so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Master of any Ship or Vessel cleared for the Mauritius as aforesaid shall, after having obtained such Certificate as aforesaid fraudulently do or suffer to be done any act or thing whereby such Certificate shall become inapplicable, to the altered state of the Ship or Vessel, its Passengers, or other matters to which such Certificate relates, such Master shall be liable, on conviction in any Penalty not exceeding 5,000 Rupees, beside incurring a forfeiture of any Bond executed in consideration of any License obtained for the Vessel as originally described.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, for the greater security against Emigrant laborers being embarked for the Mauritius contrary to the provisions of this Act, that all the powers vested by law in the Officers of Customs in regard to the searching and detention of Ships or Vessels, or otherwise for the prevention of smuggling on board thereof may be exercised by such Officers for the prevention of the illegal embarkation of such Emigrants as aforesaid on board Ships or Vessels bound for the Mauritius, and of other offences against this Act; and it is further enacted that all Pilots in the service of the East India Company, shall be invested with the same powers and be charged with the same duties as Preventive Officers of Customs in this behalf.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every person who shall attempt by means of intoxication, or by false imprisonment, or other means of crimping to export any native on board any Ship or Vessel contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall be liable to be punished before a Magistrate in a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, provided that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the offender from being proceeded against by indictment; but the offender shall only be liable to one of these courses of proceeding.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Vessel shall clear from Calcutta for Mauritius with Emigrant laborers duly embarked thereon, the Customs Officer on

board such Vessel shall countersign the Pass or Certificate brought on board by every such Emigrant laborer, and shall keep a Register of every such Emigrant laborer as may come on board. And such Customs Officer shall remain on board such Vessel until she has finally left the Port and shall come away along with the Pilot. And before leaving such Ship or Vessel he shall require the Master or Commander to take a general Muster of the Crew and Passengers and Emigrant laborers on board, and he shall bring away with him a copy of the Muster Roll so taken, countersigned by the Pilot. And any Customs Officer who shall omit to require such Muster to be taken and to make a correct copy of the Roll, or who shall wilfully make a false, erroneous or incomplete report of the Emigrant laborers on board of any Ship, or who shall connive at the unauthorized embarkation of any such Emigrant laborers, shall be liable, besides dismissal, to a fine of 500 Rupees, commutable if not paid, to imprisonment in the Calcutta Jail for six months, and the penalty shall be adjudged in like manner as similar penalties are adjudged for offences committed in respect to the Customs Revenue.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person shall forge or use, knowing it to be forged, any document required by this Act, shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding seven years.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that all the several penalties to which Masters of Ships or Vessels are liable by this Act shall be enforced by information laid before any Justice of the Peace at the instance of the Emigration Agent, or of any Officer appointed for the purpose by the Government of the Place or Presidency, or may be enforced by putting in suit the Bond given by the Master if such Bond has been given in consideration of the licence granted to the Ship.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3d day of September next.

PROCLAMATION.

With reference to the desirable object of preventing disputes and laying down some defined system regarding the circulating medium in this Settlement, His Excellency Sir Henry Pottinger, Bt., Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary, and Chief Superintendent of the Trade of British Subjects, in China, is pleased to promulgate the following brief Rules which are to be considered applicable to all common Bazaar Purchases, and Barter, Hire, &c. &c., but not to interfere with, or affect, what may be termed Mercantile Transactions, and are to be in force, on the Island of Hong Kong, pending the Gracious Pleasure of Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain.

1st. The following Coins are to be deemed legal Tenders.

" Spanish, Mexican, and other Dollars, and their component parts.

" Company's Rupees and their component parts.

" Cash," or the Copper Coin current in China.

2d. Dollars, of whatever denomination or device, and whether whole or chopped, are to circulate at Par with reference to each other, always providing that they be of the proper weight and Standard.

3d. Two and one Quarter Company's Rupees shall be considered equal to one Dollar.

One Rupee and two Annas (or half a quarter) equal to half a Dollar, and three quarters of a Rupee (or twelve Annas) equal to one quarter of a Dollar.

4th. Twelve hundred Cash (1200) Copper Coin shall be equal to one Dollar—six hundred (600) to half a Dollar.

Three hundred (300) to a quarter of a Dollar.

Five hundred and thirty-three (533) to one Company's Rupee.

Two hundred and sixty-six (266) to half a Rupee.

One hundred and thirty-three (133) to one quarter of a Rupee.

5th. Any other Coins, whether British or Foreign, not enumerated in the preceding Rules, are not to be deemed a legal Tender, but they can of course be sold, or otherwise bartered, in the Bazar, according to their intrinsic value.

6th. Cash (Copper Coin) at the rate laid down in the 4th Rule will be sold to any individual requiring it, in sums of not less than fifty Dollars, on application to the Treasurer, and Secretary to Her Britannic Majesty's Superintendent of Trade.

1st.—The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve: and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Governments, an Advance *not exceeding three-fifths* of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

Per Company's Rupee for Advances made at.....	Bengal.
Ditto..... Ditto	Madras.
Ditto..... Ditto	Bombay.

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

* Or such public officers as may be specified.

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East-India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

6th.—An Agent in England shall be appointed for each Consignment, to whom the Court of Directors shall be empowered to make over the goods, subject to all the conditions agreed upon with the Company, on payment of the bills; and with whom they shall be authorized to transact generally all business relating to such goods. The Consignor shall be at liberty to make provision, in case of the party upon whom the Bill is drawn (bring also the Agent) having failed to accept the Bill, for the substitution of another Agent.

7th.—After the arrival of the goods in England, and when they shall have been placed in such deposit as may have been agreed upon, the Agent may be put into possession of them before the Bills become due, upon the amount of such Bills (less Discount) being paid, together with the Freight and any other charges and expenses which the Company have paid, or may be subject to on account of the goods.

10th.—Parties receiving Advances, to address in each instance a Letter in quadruplicate to the Court of Directors, according to a form which will be furnished by the Officers of Government, signifying their assent to all the foregoing conditions, but more particularly for the purpose of expressly authorizing the sale of the goods by the Company (without either notice or concurrence of any person whomsoever) at any period after default shall be made either in acceptance or payment of the bills; also authorizing, in such cases, the repaying to the Company the advances made, either Principal or Interest, together with any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred in respect of the goods, and appointing the Agent in England for each transaction.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 3d of June 1842.

ACT No. — OF 1842.

An Act for regulating the Emigration of the Native Inhabitants of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company to the Island of Mauritius.

I. Whereas it hath been ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, as follows :

Whereas it is probable that the Laws now in force in British India for preventing the emigration of the Inhabitants thereof to Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions will be shortly repealed so far as regards emigration to the Island of Mauritius, and that such last mentioned emigration will be sanctioned by Laws to be for that purpose enacted in India, subject to various provisions to be in such Laws made for the protection of such Emigrants, and for the prevention of abuses. And whereas it is probable that amongst the provisions so to be made, as last aforesaid, will be a provision for enabling the Governor General of India to appoint at ports or places in India, Officers charged with the care, protection and superintendance of all persons proposing to emigrate as Labourers from India to Mauritius. And whereas it is probable that provision will be made by Law at Mauritius for defraying from the public Revenue of that Island the expense of introducing emigration thither from British India. And whereas it is necessary that effectual provision should be made by Law at Mauritius for regulating any such expenditure, and for the prevention of abuses in the introduction of Emigrants from British India into that Island—It is therefore hereby ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, that in the event of any Law being made in British India, authorizing the emigration to Mauritius of the Natives of India, and repealing the restrictions now in force there in regard to such emigrations, and in the event of any such Law, containing provisions, enabling the Governor General of India to appoint at the several ports of embarkation in India, Officers charged with the protection of persons emigrating from such ports to Mauritius, the various Rules and Regulations comprized, and set forth in the Schedule to this present order subjected, shall within the Island of Mauritius have the force and effect of Law, and shall be observed, and carried into effect by all Her Majesty's Officers, Civil and Military, in Mauritius, and by all Her Majesty's subjects within the same Island as to them may respectively appertain.

And the Right Hon'ble Lord Stanley, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary instructions hereina accordingly.

The Schedule referred to in the preceding Order, comprising the Rules and Regulations to be observed at Mauritius in regard to Emigrants from British India, resorting to and arriving at that Island.

1st. The Governor of Mauritius may from time to time nominate such persons as he shall see fit to act as Emigration Agents at any port or place in India, while the Governor General of India may designate as a port or place for the embarkation of Emigrants to Mauritius, and may also from time to time nominate a proper person to act as Protector of Immigrants at Mauritius :—

2nd. The remuneration to be given to any such Agent in India, shall not depend upon or be regulated by the number of the Emigrants sent to Mauritius by him, but shall be in the nature of an annual salary.

3rd. Every such Emigration Agent shall ascertain by personal communication with every Emigrant previously to his or her embarkation from the port or place for which such Agent shall be appointed, that such Emigrant has not been induced to emigrate by any fraud, false nor unreasonable expectation, and is aware of the distance of Mauritius from the place where he or she is about to emigrate; and such Agent shall explain the real advantages likely to be derived by such Emigrants from a removal to Mauritius, at the same time cautioning such Emigrant against unreasonable and unwarrantable expectations; and such Agent shall also ascertain that every such Emigrant is in good health, and not incapacitated from labour by old age, bodily infirmity, or disease.

4th. It shall not be lawful to ship on board of any Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to Mauritius, any number of Passengers exceeding the proportion of one person for every two Tons of the Registered burthen of such Ship or Vessel, and no such Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants, and having more than one Deck, shall have less than the height of six feet at the least between Decks, and in case such Ship or Vessel shall have only one Deck, a Platform shall be laid beneath such Deck, and in such manner as to afford a space of the height of six feet at the least, and that such Platform shall not be so laid as that the lower beams shall project above the same, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall have more than two tiers of berths, and that no such Ship or Vessel shall carry Passengers on any such voyage to Mauritius unless there shall be an interval of six inches at least between the Deck or Platform, and the floor of the lower tier throughout the whole extent thereof; and whatever may be the Tonnage of the Ship or Vessel, no greater number of Passengers shall be taken on board of such Ship or Vessel than shall be after the rate of one such person for every twelve superficial feet of the lower Deck or Platform, unoccupied by goods or stores, not being the personal luggage of such persons.

5th. In the computation of the number of Passengers within the meaning of these Regulations, two children under the age of ten years, shall be considered as equal to and shall be reckoned as one person only.

6th. There shall be actually laden and on board of every Ship or Vessel bringing Emigrants into Mauritius at the time of departure of such Ship or Vessel from the port or place at which such Labourers shall be embarked good and wholesome Provisions for the use and consumption of the said Passengers over and above the victualling of the crew to the amount or in the proportion following, that is to say, a supply of water to the amount of five gallons to every week of the computed voyage for every Passenger on board such Ship or Vessel, such water being carried in Tanks or sweet Casks, and a supply of Rice, Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Oatmeal, or Bread Stuffs, to the amount of seven pounds weight to every week of the computed voyage for every such Passenger. Provided always that when any such Ship or Vessel shall be destined to call at a port or place in the course of her voyage for the purpose of filling up her water casks, a supply of water at the rate before mentioned for every week of an average voyage to such port or place of calling shall be deemed to be a compliance with this Regulation. And provided that the preceding Regulations regarding food shall be deemed to have been complied with in any case where it shall be made to appear that by the special authority of the Governor General of India, any other articles of food were substituted for the articles above enumerated as being in his judgment equivalent thereto.

7th. The number of weeks which shall be deemed necessary for the voyage to Mauritius from any port or ports in India, shall be such as shall from time to time be determined by any Law or Ordinance to be promulgated for that purpose by the Governor General of India in Council, and according to any such Law or Ordinance shall and may be further determined whether at different periods of the year different estimations are to be made of the probable length of any such voyage, and if by any such Law or Ordinance the removal of Emigrants should during any particular period of the year be prohibited altogether then any such removal during such prohibited period, shall in Mauritius be regarded dealt with and punished as an infringement of these present Regulations.

8th. Before any such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out, on any such voyage the Agents appointed under this Ordinance for the port or place from which such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out, shall survey or cause to be surveyed by some competent person, the provisions and water hereinbefore required to be on board for the consumption of Passengers, and shall ascertain that the same are in good and sweet condition, and also that over and above the same there is on board an ample supply of water and stores for the victualling of the Crew of the Ship or Vessel, and shall also ascertain that such Ship or Vessel is generally reputed seaworthy, and that the directions hereinbefore contained for insuring the health and safety of the Passengers have been complied with, and shall grant a Certificate thereof under his hand to the Master of such Ship or Vessel.

9th. The Master of every Ship or Vessel bringing Emigrants to Mauritius shall be bound to provide for and furnish to every such Emigrant and his wife and children a sufficient quantity of good and wholesome provisions, for his, her and their daily maintenance during such voyage, and during the space of 48 hours next after the arrival of such Ship or Vessel in Mauritius.

10th. Two copies of these Regulations authenticated by the signature of the Agent at the port or place from which such Emigrants shall come shall be delivered to the Master by such Agent on demand at the time of clearance, and shall be kept on board of every Ship or Vessel carrying such Emigrants as aforesaid, and one of such copies shall upon request made at reasonable times to the Master of the Ship or Vessel be produced to any Passenger for his perusal.

11th. The Master of every Ship or Vessel carrying Emigrants from India to Mauritius, shall before clearing out such Ship or Vessel deliver to such Agent at the port or place from which such vessel shall be cleared out a list in writing, together with a Duplicate of the same specifying as accurately as may be the names, ages and occupations of all and every the Emigrants on board such Ship or Vessel, and such Agent shall thereupon deliver to the said Master the counterpart of such lists, signed by such Agent, and the said Master shall on the arrival of such Ship or Vessel at Mauritius, and previous to the disembarkation of any such Emigrants give notice of the arrival of such Ship or Vessel, and deliver the said counterpart of such list to the Protector of Immigrants hereinbefore mentioned. And such Protector of Immigrants shall forthwith proceed on board of such Ship or Vessel and shall ascertain as far as possible by personal inspection of the Ship or Vessel and Passengers whether the directions hereinbefore contained with regard to the situation of the berth of such Ship or Vessel, the proportion of the Passengers to the burthens and measurement of such Ship or Vessel, and the maintenance of the Emigrants during such passage have been complied with, and such Protector of Immigrants shall personally muster such Emigrants and compare the number and names of such Emigrants with the said counterparts of such lists, and shall certify in writing under his hand upon such counterpart of the total number of Emigrants then living and being on board of such Vessel, and in case any such Emigrant shall have died during the passage, or the number of names of the Emigrants shall differ from the number or names stated in such counterpart, the Protector of Immigrants shall note such death or difference upon such counterpart, and thereupon shall grant a License under his hand for the disembarkation and landing of such Emigrants.

12th. If the Protector of Immigrants on such personal inspection of the Ship or Vessel and Emigrants shall be satisfied that the preceding Regulations have been complied with, he shall grant a Certificate under his hand of the arrival in Mauritius of such Emigrants respectively and the place from which, and the Ship or Vessel in which such Emigrants shall have arrived.

13th. No money shall be payable by the Colonial Treasurer of Mauritius in respect of any such Emigrants as

aforesaid except on the Warrant of the Governor of that Island, which Warrant shall not be issued except on such Certificate as aforesaid of the said Protector of Immigrants.

14th. The Protector of Immigrants shall keep a Register of all persons in respect of whom any such Certificate as aforesaid shall be granted, and of the Ship or Vessel in which the port from which and the time at which such person shall have arrived in this Colony, a copy of which Registry shall be laid before the Council of Government on the 31st day of March, the 30th of June, the 30th day of September, and the 31st of December in each year.

15th. If any Ship or Vessel bringing Immigrants from India to Mauritius shall carry any number of Passengers exceeding the proportion authorized and allowed by these Regulations a Penalty of Five Pounds per head shall be payable in respect of each Passenger so carried in excess of such proportion, or if such Ship or Vessel shall not be of the height between Decks hereinbefore required; or if such a Platform as hereinbefore directed shall not be laid and continued throughout the whole duration of any such voyage in such manner as is hereinbefore required; or if there shall be more than two tiers of berths, or if there shall not be throughout the whole duration of any such voyage, such an interval as is hereinbefore prescribed between the Deck and the Floor of the lower tier of berths, or if any such Ship or Vessel shall clear out, and put to sea not having on board such Water and Provisions as aforesaid for the use and consumption of the Passengers of the kind, and to the amount and in the proportion hereinbefore directed; or if any such Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out before such lists of Emigrants shall have been delivered in manner and form aforesaid, or if any such lists shall be wilfully false; or if the copy of these Regulations be not produced as hereinbefore required, or if any Emigrant shall not be maintained during such voyage, and for 48 hours after his arrival; the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall for and in respect of each and every such offence be liable on summary conviction before any Stipendiary Magistrate at any time within the space of 12 calendar months next after the arrival of such Master within the Colony of Mauritius to the payment of a fine not less than £5, nor more than £20 British Sterling, and in default of payment of the fine abovementioned either immediately, or at the time fixed by such Stipendiary Magistrate at the time of making such conviction to imprisonment for any time not less than one nor more than three calendar months.

16th. Provided nevertheless that nothing herein contained shall take away or abridge any right of suit or action which may accrue to any Emigrant in any such Ship or Vessel, or to any other person in respect of the breach or non-performance of any contract made or entered into between, or on the behalf of any such Emigrant or other person, and the Master, Owner or Owners of any such Ship or Vessel.

17th. Provided always that nothing in these Regulations contained shall apply to any Ship or Vessel in the service of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or to any of Her Majesty's Ships of War.

18th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius shall be capable of entering into any contract of service to be performed in that Island, until he shall have been at least 48 hours on shore there, and every such contract of service made before that time shall be null and void to all intents and purposes.

19th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius, and engaging to labour in that Island shall within Mauritius be liable to any Action, Suit or Demand, for or in respect of any Debt contracted, or any contract made by such Emigrant before his arrival in the said Island.

20th. No Emigrant arriving from India at Mauritius shall in Mauritius be capable of entering into any contract for service except for the period in the manner and under the superintendence which by a Law in force there is required in the case of contracts for service made by other Labourers in Agriculture or Manufactures within the said Island.

21st. No payment shall be made from the Treasury of the said Island in respect of any Emigrants introduced there from India, unless on proof to the satisfaction of the Governor of Mauritius, that all Rules and Regulations which may be established by Law in India, for the advantage and protection of such Emigrants have been duly complied with, such Rules and Regulations not being repugnant to any thing in these Regulations contained.

22d. In every case in which the Penalties hereby denounced against offences are imposed by the use of the words in the masculine Gender or in the singular person such words shall be understood as extending to the feminine Gender also, and to any number of persons.

when the opposite construction is required in order to meet the object and to accomplish the ends with a view to which these regulations are established and made.

In conformity with which said order, and for the purpose of giving effect thereto, it is hereby enacted, that Act No. XIV. of 1839, and all Acts repealed thereby, so far as the same are applicable to the emigration of Natives from the Port of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay respectively, to the Mauritius, shall be repealed from the day when the Governor General of India in Council, or, in his absence, the President in Council shall notify in the Gazette that it hath been duly certified to him that such Regulations have been provided, and that such measures have been taken by the Government of Mauritius as he may deem necessary for the protection of Emigrant laborers from India on their passage to the Mauritius, and during their residence there, and for their safe return at the expiration of five years, or any subsequent period, should they be desirous of returning to India. Provided always that the aforesaid Act No. XIV. of 1839 shall remain in full force in all the ports of India except the ports aforesaid, and in regard to Emigrants from India proceeding to other places than the Mauritius.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that after this Act shall come into operation, Emigrant laborers being Native Inhabitants of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company shall be allowed to pass and to be conveyed from India to the Mauritius from the ports of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay respectively, in compliance with the Provisions hereinafter mentioned, but not otherwise.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that at each of the three ports aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Government of the Presidency within which the port is situated to authorize the persons nominated by the Government of Mauritius, under the order hereinbefore inserted to act as Emigration Agents at the aforesaid ports respectively, and to exercise the powers conferred on Emigration Agents by this Act. And every such Emigration Agent shall make monthly reports to the Government to which he is subordinate of all matters transacted by him in pursuance of this Act.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful to convey any Emigrant, being a Native of India, who may embark for the purpose of laboring for hire in the Colony of Mauritius from either of the ports aforesaid, in any Ship or Vessel, unless a Licence be obtained for carrying Emigrants in such Ship or Vessel from the Government of the Presidency in which the port is situated. A fee of — Rupees shall be demandable in respect of every such Licence, and the granting or withholding the same shall be entirely discretionary with the Government, and in consideration of such Licence the Master of every Ship conveying or destined to convey Emigrants from India shall execute a Bond, binding himself and his owners in a penal sum of 10,000 Rupees to conform to the several conditions hereunder provided, and the said Bond shall be executed in duplicate that it may be put in suit either at the place of execution or in the Colony of Mauritius, and one copy shall be forwarded to the Government of Mauritius to be dealt with as the case may require. And every Ship or Vessel in which any such Emigrant shall be conveyed without a Licence being obtained as aforesaid shall be liable to be forfeited, and the Master thereof shall be liable as for a misdemeanour in a fine of 1,000 Rupees for every such Emigrant so illegally conveyed.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall not be lawful for the Master of any Vessel licensed as above to receive on board any Emigrant laborer as above provided unless such laborer shall have in his possession and show a Certificate or pass to be given to him by the Emigration Agent of the port, stating his name and the name of his father and his age, and certifying that having appeared before such Agent he has declared his willingness and desire to proceed to work for hire in the said Colony of Mauritius.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel, so licensed to carry Emigrant laborers as above provided, shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid ports for the Mauritius, it shall be necessary for the Master of such Ship or Vessel, provided any Emigrant of the description aforesaid shall embark therein, to obtain from the Emigration Agent so nominated and authorized at such port as aforesaid a Certificate under the hand of such Agent to the effect following, that is to say—

1. That such Agent has, by personal communication, done what is required on the part of such Agent by the said Article of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted; provided always that every such Agent shall make the entries specified in such Schedule, in an open Court or public office, to which all persons shall have admission.

2. That all the directions contained in the 4th, 5th, 6th and 8th Articles of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted for ensuring the health and safety of Passengers have been duly complied with.

3. That (in addition to the directions contained in the said Schedule) such rules have been complied with as the Governor General in Council, or, in his absence, the President in Council, shall from time to time frame touching the Medical attendance and Medical Stores to be provided, the species of provisions suited to native habits, the number of women that should accompany the Emigrants, and other like matters.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that with reference to Article 7 of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted, the probable lengths of a voyage to the Mauritius from the respective ports aforesaid, shall, for the purposes of this Act be deemed to be for the port of Calcutta,

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that before any Ship or Vessel shall be cleared out from any of the aforesaid Ports for the Mauritius, it shall be necessary for the Master thereof to deliver to the Emigration Agent so nominated and authorized at such Port as aforesaid the list specified in Article 11 of the Schedule hereinbefore inserted, and to obtain such duplicate thereof as is required by the said Article.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall at any of the Ports aforesaid take on board such Ship or Vessel any Emigrant laborer of the description aforesaid, and shall clear such Ship or Vessel for the Mauritius without having fully complied with every particular hereinbefore required previous to clearance, he shall be liable, on conviction before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace in a penalty of 200 Rs. for every Emigrant laborer so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that if the Master of any Ship or Vessel shall, after having cleared such Ship or Vessel at any such Port as aforesaid for Mauritius take on board any such Emigrant laborer as aforesaid without having entered such Emigrant laborer in such list as aforesaid, or without having obtained such duplicate as aforesaid containing the entry of such Emigrant, prior to clearance, he shall be liable, on conviction, before any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, in a penalty not exceeding 500 Rs. for every Emigrant so taken on board his Ship or Vessel.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Master of any Ship or Vessel cleared for the Mauritius as aforesaid shall, after having obtained such Certificate as aforesaid fraudulently do or suffer to be done any act or thing whereby such Certificate shall become inapplicable, to the altered state of the Ship or Vessel, its Passengers, or other matters to which such Certificate relates, such Master shall be liable, on conviction in any Penalty not exceeding 5,000 Rupees, beside incurring a forfeiture of any Bond executed in consideration of any License obtained for the Vessel as originally described.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, for the greater security against Emigrant laborers being embarked for the Mauritius contrary to the provisions of this Act, that all the powers vested by law in the Officers of Customs in regard to the searching and detention of Ships or Vessels, or otherwise for the prevention of smuggling on board thereof may be exercised by such Officers for the prevention of the illegal embarkation of such Emigrants as aforesaid on board Ships or Vessels bound for the Mauritius, and of other offences against this Act; and it is further enacted that all Pilots in the service of the East India Company, shall be invested with the same powers and be charged with the same duties as Preventive Officers of Customs in this behalf.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every person who shall attempt by means of intoxication, or by false imprisonment, or other means of crimping to export any native on board any Ship or Vessel contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall be liable to be punished before a Magistrate in a fine not exceeding 500 Rupees, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, provided that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the offender from being proceeded against by indictment; but the offender shall only be liable to one of these courses of proceeding.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Vessel shall clear from Calcutta for Mauritius with Emigrant laborers duly embarked thereon, the Customs Officer on

board such Vessel shall countersign the Pass or Certificate brought on board by every such Emigrant laborer, and shall keep a Register of every such Emigrant laborer as may come on board. And such Customs Officer shall remain on board such Vessel until she has finally left the Port and shall come away along with the Pilot. And before leaving such Ship or Vessel he shall require the Master or Commander to take a general Muster of the Crew and Passengers and Emigrant laborers on board, and he shall bring away with him a copy of the Muster Roll so taken, countersigned by the Pilot. And any Customs Officer who shall omit to require such Muster to be taken and to make a correct copy of the Roll, or who shall wilfully make a false, erroneous or incomplete report of the Emigrant laborers on board of any Ship, or who shall connive at the unauthorized embarkation of any such Emigrant laborers, shall be liable, besides dismissal, to a fine of 500 Rupees, commutable if not paid, to imprisonment in the Calcutta Jail for six months, and the penalty shall be adjudged in like manner as similar penalties are adjudged for offences committed in respect to the Customs Revenue.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person shall forge or use, knowing it to be forged, any document required by this Act, shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding seven years.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that all the several penalties to which Masters of Ships or Vessels are liable by this Act shall be enforced by information laid before any Justice of the Peace at the instance of the Emigration Agent, or of any Officer appointed for the purpose by the Government of the Place or Presidency, or may be enforced by putting in suit the Bond given by the Master if such Bond has been given in consideration of the licence granted to the Ship.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 3d day of September next.

The importance of investigating the Course and Phenomena of Storms has been brought to the notice of Government by the Hon'ble Court of Directors and the Hon'ble the President in Council is, in consequence, desirous of obtaining local Registers of these Phenomena taken simultaneously at as many Stations of India as may be found possible. The public Officers of the different Settlements and Stations of India are accordingly invited and requested, upon the occurrence of any Hurricane, Gale or other Storm of more violence than usual, to note accurately the time of its commencement, the direction from which the wind first blows, whether in gusts or regular, and whether accompanied with rain, thunder and lightning, or other Phenomena. Also to note, with as much accuracy as possible, the changes of direction in the wind and the time of the occurrence of each; and lastly, the duration of the Gale and in what quarter the wind is when it ceases. The variations of the Thermometer and Barometer at each period noticed will also be of importance, if the means are forthcoming of making such observations.

The President in Council refrains from making it the business of any particular Officer to note the above circumstances, but relies on the known desire of all enlightened persons to promote objects of Scientific and useful Enquiry, that the public Officers will arrange in such manner as to ensure that the observations will be taken by some one in the vicinity of each Station.

Reports upon matters of the description, comprehended in this Order, may be forwarded to the Secretary to Government in the General Department, free of postage (Superscribed "Storm Report".)

A Scientific Gentleman in Calcutta has obligingly undertaken to combine all Reports that may be so received into a Synopsis for exhibition of the results in the manner adopted and recommended by Colonel Read, R. A.

SIR,
Observing by the Governor General's Orders, that the dispatch published, is that sent off by me on the evening of the action of the 7th ultimo, hurriedly written in Conjee water, I have to request that the Major General will do

me the favor to express to the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, how gratifying it will be to me, to have my amended dispatch (sent to you the day after the action) published in Orders, as that now before the public contains many slight inaccuracies, caused I fancy by the writing not coming distinctly out, on the application of the Iodine, and the names of Officers who distinguished themselves on that day, were unavoidably left out of my first dispatch.

I take the liberty to enclose a triplicate of my Dispatch, fearing the duplicate may have miscarried.

SIR.—Information was on the evening of the 8th instant brought into this place in the most positive and circumstantial terms by spies from the enemy's camp, to the effect that the Force under Major General Pollock, C. B., had met with a reverse in the Khyber, retraced its steps towards Peshawur, and about 10 A. M. on the 6th, a *feu de joie* and salute of Artillery were fired by Mahomed Akbar, which were said to be in honor of the same event. It was on the same day and through similar channels announced to me that the Afghans were sending additional reinforcements to aid in defending their frontier passes. Although I could not wholly depend on these statements which were improbable in themselves, and accompanied by counter reports of a new Revolution at Cabool, which was assigned by some as the cause of the rejoicing and of the defeat of the Ghazees in Khyber, and by an account of the intended and even actual retreat of the Sirdar into Lughman, I adopted, on a full consideration of the various circumstances and

rumours, the resolution of anticipating the last mentioned event, if it had not come to pass, by a general attack on the Afghan Camp, in the hope of relieving this place from blockade, and facilitating General Pollock's advance to our succour. I accordingly gave directions to form three columns of Infantry, the centre consisting of H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, mustering 500 Bayonets, under Colonel Dennie, C. B.; the left one also 500 strong, under Lieutenant Colonel Monteath, C. B., and the right composed of one Company 13th Light Infantry and one of the 35th N. I., and the Detachment of Sappers under Lieutenant Orr (the severity of Captain Broadfoot's wound still rendering him non-effective) the whole amounting to 360 men, commanded by Captain Havelock, H. M.'s 13th L. I. These were to be supported by the fire of the guns of No. 6 Light Field Battery under Captain Abbott, to which Captain Backhouse, S. S. Artillery, was attached, and by the whole of my small Cavalry Force under Captain Oldfield and Lieutenant Mayne. The Troops issued from the Cabool and Peshawur Gates at daylight this morning. So far from the Sirdar having made any dispositions to avoid the encounter, his whole force, not falling short in all of six thousand men, was formed in order of battle for the defence of his Camp, its right resting on a Fort, and its left on the Cabool River, and even the ruined works within eight hundred yards of the place recently repaired were filled with Ghilzie Marksmen, evidently prepared for a stout resistance. The attack was led by the Skirmishers and column under Captain Havelock, which drove the enemy in a most satisfactory manner, from the extreme left of his advanced line of works, which it pierced, and proceeded to advance into the plain, whilst the central column directed its efforts against a square Fort on the same base, the defence of which was obstinately maintained. With the deepest regret I have to record that, whilst nobly leading his Regiment to the assault, Col. Dennie received a shot through the body, which shortly after proved fatal. The rear of the work having been finally aimed by passing to its left, I gave orders for a combined attack on the enemy's camp, it was in every way brilliant and successful. The Artillery advanced at the gallop, and directed a heavy fire upon the Afghan centre, whilst two of the columns of Infantry penetrated his line near the same point, and the third forced back its left from its support on the river, into the stream of which some of his horse and foot were driven. The Afghans made repeated attempts to check our advance by a smart fire of musquetry, by throwing forward heavy bodies of horse, which twice threatened the Detachments of Foot under Captain Havelock, and by opening upon us three guns from a Battery screened by a garden wall, and said to have been served under the personal superintendence of the Sirdar. But in a short time they were dislodged from every point of their position, their cannon taken and their Camp involved in a general conflagration. The battle was over, and the enemy in full retreat in the direction of Lughman by about 7 A. M. We have made ourselves masters of two Cavalry Standards, recaptured 4 Guns lost by the Cabool and Gundamuck Forces, the restoration of which to our Government is matter of much honest exultation amongst our Troops, seized and destroyed a great quantity of Materiel and Ordnance Stores, and burnt the whole of the enemy's Tents. In short, the defeat of Mahomed Akbar in open field, by the Troops whom he had boasted of blockading, has been complete and signal.

The fall of an Officer, so distinguished as Colonel Dennie, will be felt as a public calamity. Lamenting it on every account, I must yet share with his country, his Regiment, and his friends, in the consolation afforded by the reflection that he was killed whilst most gallantly performing his duty. I have to express my entire satisfaction with the conduct in this action of Lieutenant Colonel Monteath, C. B., Commanding one of the two Infantry columns under my own eye, and of Captain Wilkinson, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, on whom the charge of the other devolved on the death of his Lieutenant Colonel, of Captain Oldfield and Lieutenant Mayne who led the Cavalry, and of Captains Abbott and Backhouse, and Lieutenant Dawes, Artillery. The able and judicious manner in which Captain Havelock, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, moved the Force under his Command, which acted on a line sufficiently distant to render its manœuvres independent of my immediate control, demands my particular and especial commendation.

My acknowledgments are also due to my Brigade Major Captain Hamiet Wade, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, whose exertions were on this day, as they have ever been, most meritorious; to Major Frazer, Light Cavalry, who acted as my Aide-de-camp, and to Captain Mainwaring, Commissariat Officer with the Force, who was present on and active in the field; Captain Macgregor, Political Agent, handsomely offered his services with No. 6 Light Field Battery, and was most useful in serving the guns. I enclosed Returns of Killed and Wounded, and of Ordnance and Stores captured. Lieutenant and Adjutant Wood, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, made a dash at one of the enemy, and in cutting him down his charger was so severely injured, as to have since been destroyed. Captain Havelock reports in the most favourable manner the gallant conduct throughout the day of Lieutenant Cox, H. M. 13th Light Infantry, and he was the first of the party which captured them to seize two of the enemy's cannon.

It will be seen from the preceding details that the force employed in this successful enterprise, amounted to about eighteen hundred men of all arms. The safety of the place was entrusted during the action to the ordinary guards of its gates and our Provisional Battalion of Followers of every description, armed with pikes and various other weapons, who manned the curtains, and made a respectable show of defence, as they had done on all occasions of attack on the walls. Captain Pattison, H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry, was left in charge of this diminished garrison. A sally was made from the Cabool Gate towards the conclusion of the engagement by Lieutenant Wade of H. M.'s 13th Light Infantry into the Fort, before which Colonel Dennie had fallen, and which the enemy were observed to be abandoning. All that it contained was set on fire, and some of its defenders intercepted and killed.

The enemy's loss during the day must have been severe. The field of battle was strewed with the bodies of men and horses, and the richness of the trappings of some of the latter, seemed to attest that persons of distinction had been among the casualties.

Lieutenant Colonel Monteath has noticed to me on high terms the gallant behaviour of Captain Seaton, 35th Regiment N. I., when in command of the Skirmishers of that Corps, and informed me of the fact of his having been the captor of a Howitzer from the enemy.

We have information to the fact that the following Chiefs were present and took part in the action, viz.

Sadar Mahomed Akbar Khan in person, Umeer Khan, Chief of Bajour, Uzeez Khan, Gurool Mahomed Khan, Mahomed Shah Khan, Burukut Khan, Azal Khan and Shookoor Khan, principal men amongst the Eastern Ghilzies; Myan Abdool Rahman of Kama, Meer Uzul Khan of Ghundaghur, Syud Oosman, and Oosmah Khan, Mohmunds, Syud Mahomed, son of the King of Kooner, Syud Hashim, the deposed ruler of the same place, Myah Hyder, Chief of Kivat, Mohamad Jan Khan, head of the Sungo Serai, Abdool Ghaffoor Khan, Achukzye, nephew of Abdoolah Khan of the same Tribe, and Abdool Ghuffoor Khan, Barukzye.

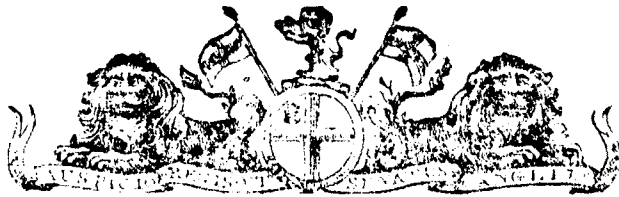

1st.—The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve: and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Governments, an Advance not exceeding *three-fifths* of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advances is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Sals and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

5th.—In case of default being made either in acceptance or payment of the Bills, the Court of Directors to be authorized, in such manner and at such times as they may see fit, to sell the goods, for the purpose of repaying the Company the amount of the Advances made thereon, including freight and any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred on account of the Consignment, together with Interest, should any have accrued; the Company, on the other hand, allowing Discount, where any part of the proceeds shall be realized before the Bills fall due, and the settlement of either surplus or deficiency shall be made with the Consignor; and if in India, by the Government from whom he received the Advance, at the rate of Exchange at which the Company may at the time be drawing bills upon such Government.

1st.—The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve: and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Government, an Advance not exceeding three fifths of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

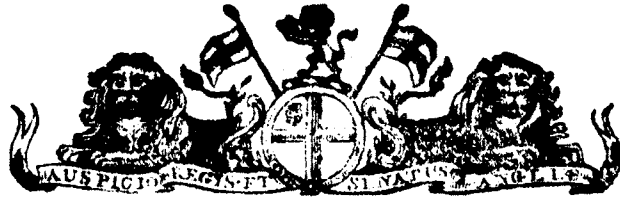

The Goods and Merchandize of Individuals intended for Consignment to England, repayable to the Court of Directors of the East India Company.

1st.—The parties to whom Advances may be made shall agree that the respective Consignments be delivered into such Warehouses as the Court of Directors may approve: and that they be subject to the control of the Court of Directors until the lien of the Company upon the Consignment shall have been satisfied.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Government, an Advance not exceeding three fifths of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

- Per Company's Rupee for Advances made at..... Bengal.
- Ditto..... Ditto Madras.
- Ditto..... Ditto Bombay.

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

* Or such public officers as may be specified.

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

5th.—In case of default being made either in acceptance or payment of the Bills, the Court of Directors to be authorized, in such manner and at such times as they may see fit, to sell the goods, for the purpose of repaying the Company the amount of the Advances made thereon, including freight and any other charges or expenses which the Company may have incurred on account of the Consignment, together with Interest should any have accrued; the Company, on the other hand, allowing Discount, where any part of the proceeds shall be realized before the Bills fall due, and the settlement of either surplus or deficiency shall be made with the Consignor; and if in India, by the Government from whom he received the Advance, at the rate of Exchange at which the Company may at the time be drawing bills upon such Government.

GENERAL ORDERS BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL
OF INDIA.

ALLAHABAD, 16th June, 1842.

The Right Honorable the Governor General of India having determined to incorporate the Troops recently raised in Hindoostan, for the Service of His late Majesty Shah Sojah-Ool-Moolk, with the Bengal Native Army, is pleased to direct the following arrangements to be adopted for giving effect to the measure :

The Corps, with the exception of those at Jellalabad, will remain embodied until their arrival at Ferozepore, on which date they will be paid up, and each Soldier being furnished with a Certificate of his previous Service, will be sent to join the Corps assigned to him.

Any Officer or Soldier who may desire not to enter the Service of the East India Company, is to be discharged with a Gratuity of three Months' Pay and full Batta, and any Officer or Soldier who may be pronounced by a Special Committee (to be assembled for the examination of the whole by the Officer Commanding at Ferozepore) to be physically unfit for the Line, is to be discharged with a Gratuity of three Months Pay and full Batta of his present rank, for every year he may have served West of the Indus.

Any Officer or Soldier who may, previous to his transfer to the Shah's Force, have served in the Line long enough to establish a claim to pensionary support, and who may be pronounced unfit for the Service, is to be transferred to the Invalid Establishment on the pension of the rank he held in his former Corps, as provided for in the General Order of the 1st of November 1838.

The European Commissioned Officers lately in the Service of the Shah, with the exception of those at Jellalabad, will continue attached to their present Corps until their arrival at Ferozepore, when, as soon as they have completed the arrangements now directed for the disposal of the Men, they will proceed and join the Regiments to which they severally belong.

The Staff Sergeants of the Infantry Battalions will remain at Ferozepore under the orders of the Brigade Major at that Station, until instructions for their disposal are furnished from Army Head Quarters.

The Quarter Masters and Bazar Establishments of the Jellalabad Corps are to be distributed among the Corps of that Force, at the discretion of the Major General Commanding, and on their return to the Provinces, they are to be paid up and discharged.

The Establishments with the other Corps will remain attached to them until their arrival at Ferozepore, when they likewise will be paid up and discharged.

As none of the Native Officers of the Shah's Force held a rank higher than that of Jemadar, when originally transferred from the Line, His Lordship has been pleased to fix that rank as the highest in which any Officer shall return to the regular Army, and their Commissions, as Jemadars, are accordingly to bear the date of this order: the Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates must enter their new Corps as the juniors of their respective grades.

The Native Officers and Men of the Mountain Train are to be attached to the 4th Company 6th Battalion of Artillery, and on their return to the Provinces, such of them as may be pronounced fit for the Service, are to be distributed equally amongst the three Native Troops of Horse, and the two Native Battalions of Foot Artillery, at the discretion of the Brigadier Commandant of the Regiment; the Subadar as a Jemadar.

The Sappers will be formed into two Companies, and added as Supplementary Companies to the Bengal Sappers and Miners; on their arrival at Ferozepore, they will be examined by a Special Committee, and any Officer or Soldier who may be found unfit for the regular Army, is to be discharged with a Gratuity of three Months Pay and full Batta, for every year he may have served West of the Indus.

The Detachment of Anderson's Horse, now at Jellalabad, will do duty for the present with the 3d Irregular Cavalry, but on their arrival within the Provinces, they are to be sent to join the Corps now assigned to them.

The Horse Artillery will be formed into one Troop, and added as a Supplementary Troop to the 1st Brigade of Horse Artillery.

All Ordnance, Ordnance Stores, Harness, &c., in excess to the proportion assigned by regulation to a Troop of Horse Artillery in Bengal, are, on arrival, to be deposited in the Magazine at Ferozepore, and such of the Horses as may be pronounced by a Committee unfit for the Horse Artillery, are to be made over to the Commissariat Department to be disposed of.

Such of the Officers and Men as may be pronounced unfit for the Service, and who, by previous servitude have established no claim to pensionary support, are to be discharged with the prescribed Gratuity.

Major General Pollock, C. B., will appoint the European Officers now at Jellalabad, and recently in the Service of the Shah, to do duty with the Troops under his Command, forwarding copies of the Orders he may issue disposing of them to Army Head Quarters, for confirmation.

All promotions in the Corps remaining embodied are to cease, and any which may have been made in them, or in the disbanded Corps subsequent to the 5th of April last, are to be cancelled.

MY LORD,

I have the gratification to inform your Lordship of the total discomfiture, and precipitate retreat of that portion of Commissioner Yih-King's force, which had been sent forward to exterminate us, and I feel most thankful to say, with wonderfully small loss on our part.

My letter of the 11th will have informed your Lordship of the attacks on this City, and Chinhae, on the night of the 9th and morning of the 10th. I deemed it right promptly to follow up these successful repulses, taking the attacking columns in detail, and understanding that General Yu-poo-yun was advancing from Funghwa with from 6 to 7,000 men, I moved out to meet him on the 13th, with 600 men of the 18th and 49th Regiments, and Madras Artillery, with 2 guns and 50 Sappers, flanked by the *Sesostris*, Steamer, which moved up the river parallel with our route, having on board three Companies of the 26th, and a small body of Seamen and Marines. Until I reached the village Litsao, about 7 miles from hence, where I understood the enemy had been posted on the 12th, I could obtain no satisfactory information of his movements; but I had the mortification to find on my arrival, that the Chinese had retreated over the hills the preceding night apparently moving on Shaa Hing.

Having thus got rid of this column, although not in the way I could have wished, and being joined by Sir William Parker, who on his arrival from Ta-Shan, with the zeal for which he is so conspicuous, at once followed me up the river with the two small Steamers, bringing with him 250 Marines and a party of Seamen, I determined upon moving on Tseekee, where I was informed, that

the Chinese were in considerable force under Generals Twan-Yung, Yang and Choo. It was reported that they had two entrenched Camps on the Segaoon hills, about half a mile North of Tsekee; that several guns had been placed on the walls, and at the gateways, and large stores of provisions laid up for the army in the City, and that 7 miles North East of these encampments, another force of from 5 to 6,000 men, under Commissioner Wun, with the military chest, was posted in a fortified camp in the hills at the Changki pass.

<p>The necessary arrangements having been made with Rear Admiral Sir William Parker, the troops named in the margin were all embarked by eight o'clock on the morning of the 15th, on board the Steamers, <i>Queen</i>, <i>Nemesis</i> and <i>Phlegethon</i>. Sir William Parker placed at my disposal 350 Seamen and Marines, making up about 1,000 bayonets. At 12 o'clock this force was landed about 4 miles from Tsekee, from whence we had a perfect view of the enemy's encampments, and I immediately pushed forward on the City. I feel it right here to observe, that Sir William Parker accompanied me throughout the operations I am about to detail, and from his sound judgment and excellent arrangements I received the most valuable assistance.</p>	<p>Madras Artillery with 4 eight-pounder guns, ... 83 18th Royal Irish, 201 26th Cameronians, 156 49th Regiment, 305 Rifles, 36th N. 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Upon our approaching Tsekee and occupying a hill, which commands the Southern face of the walls, and the South gate, the Chinese fired all the guns and ginjaes they had for the defence of this gate, but with so little effect, and at so great a distance, that it led me to believe that they (most unaccountably) did not propose to defend the City; and I was confirmed in this conclusion by observing that the ramparts nearest us were unoccupied, while the Segaoon hills at the opposite side of the town, on which were their encampments, appeared crowded with troops. Lieutenant-Colonel Montgomerie having with his usual promptitude brought up his guns, I determined at once to take the City by storm, pass through to the North gate, there reunite my force, and carry the enemy's encampments. I was led to this line of operation by the conclusion before mentioned that the Chinese did not mean to defend the City, as well as with a view to expedite the attack on the heights, as it would otherwise have been necessary (to provide for the possible case of the enemy's being in force within the walls) to make a detour out of range through the paddy fields, but my principal object was, to prevent the enemy from falling back on the City, when driven from the hills. In furtherance of these views, I directed the Naval Brigade, with a party of Sappers, covered by the guns and the Madras Rifles, if opposed, to escalate the walls in my front, assemble on the ramparts and move along them to the North gate. The 49th I instructed to move on the South gate, blow it open, and join the Naval Brigade on the ramparts. I had previously ordered the 18th to dislodge a body of the enemy that occupied a hill to the North East of the City, after which they were to move round the walls, out of ginjaal range, and threaten the North gate. Should the Naval Brigade and 49th meet with opposition, the 26th were placed in reserve and were directed to move with and protect the guns.

A few minutes placed the Naval Brigade on the walls unopposed, and the whole promptly formed on the ramparts. The Royal Irish meanwhile dispersed the enemy in their fronts and rapidly moved on the North gate: I accompanied the 49th, but finding that the bridge over the canal, close to the South gate, was destroyed, and that it would take some time to replace it, the corps passed along a canal under the walls, and I directed the Naval Brigade to move parallel with it upon the ramparts. The whole force thus soon arrived at the place of assembly, the North gate.

The City of Tsekee is surrounded on three sides with precipitous hills, and the North gate is on a low spur of one of these hills which terminates in an eminence with the walls. At the North Western extremity of a range of high hills, being a branch of the mountains that skirt the coast, are the Segaoon or Siguen hills on which were the encampments; both were of considerable extent, and the natural difficulties of the position strengthened by abattis. These camps which as well as the summits of the hills beyond them, were thickly occupied, were within long range of the walls, the intervening space being a tract of paddy fields with a few scattered houses. I at once perceived that the position was faulty, as the hills on our right commanded their left, while their left commanded their right, and I made my dispositions accordingly. The 18th with a Rifle Company 36th M. N. I., were ordered to move up a ravine and occupy a hill to the left of the position. The Naval Brigade was instructed to move under the walls, and occupy two rather large buildings in front of the right encampment, making a lodgement under cover ready to rush forward, when the 18th should reach the summit and turn the enemy's left. With the 49th I proposed to attack at the same moment the largest encampment in my front, my great object being to make a simultaneous attack with the three columns pushing the 18th down in rear, while the Naval Brigade should cut off all communication with the City. So rapid were our movements that only one gun could be brought up, notwithstanding the praiseworthy exertions of Lieutenant Colonel Montgomerie, who dashed his guns into the canal and entered the City by a water gate. This gun was ably brought up and did good execution under the direction of Captain Moore, of the Madras Artillery, who with his party merits great praise for the extraordinary exertions in dragging it through paddy fields and across canals.

The steepness of the mountain gorge, by which the Royal Irish and Rifles ascended notwithstanding the enthusiasm of their advance, occupied more time in surmounting than I anticipated; and finding that the Naval Brigade might probably suffer more by the delay than in an immediate attack, and that the enemy appeared to gain confidence by this delay, I ordered the advance to be sounded, when the 49th, with their accustomed spirit, rushed up the hill, overcoming all opposition, and crowned its height within a few minutes, driving every thing before them. From this height it afforded me no small satisfaction to witness the spirited rush of the advance of the Marine Brigade led by their gallant chief (I am persuaded Sir William Parker will excuse this expression of my admiration) who was ably supported by Captain Bouchier, Commanding the Naval Brigade; Captain

Richards of H. M. Ship *Cornwallis*, and Captain Watson of H. M. Ship *Modeste*, Commanding the Seamen Battalion. The whole Brigade soon reached the summit, carrying the enemy's works. At the moment when the Admiral had nearly gained the height, I perceived a large body of Chinese ascending the back of the hill which he was attacking, apparently ignorant of the conjoint attack, and I directed Major Gough, Deputy Quarter Master General, to push forward with the Grenadiers of the 49th, supported by a Battalion Company, to cut off their retreat. The carnage at the foot of this hill was extraordinarily great: the 49th in rear and the Naval Brigade in front almost annihilated this body, while the remainder of the 49th pressed the retiring enemy (I cannot say his columns) as the whole plain was covered with the dispersed and flying foe. The 18th and Rifles finding that they were too late to participate in the attack on the encampments, rapidly dashed into the plain and cut off the Chinese from their only safe retreat on the Changki pass, killing numbers; and one Company under Lieutenant Bernard followed up the pursuit for several miles towards Yuyaun. The 26th Cameronians, having left one company to protect the guns, pressed forward into the plain, and joined in the pursuit. It was 8 o'clock before the force re-assembled, when we occupied the enemy's encampment where the men found ample bedding and comforts.

Sir William Parker has brought to my notice, in addition to the Captains of the Navy I have already named, the spirited conduct of Lieut. Charles E. Tennant, (Flag Lieut.); Lieut. George Elliott, (slightly wounded); Mr. George H. Hodgson, Mate, (also slightly wounded in a personal rencontre with a Chinese); Mr. Wm. Bowden, Volunteer 1st class, and Mr. Hy. D. C. Cunningham, Secretary's Clerk, all of H. M. Ship *Cornwallis*; also of Lieutenant Harriott, Royal Marines of H. M.'s Ship *Blonde*. The Admiral also noticed (and it came under my own observation) the judicious and well directed fire of rockets by a party under Lieutenant James Fitzjames and Mr. Charles Keates Jackson, Mate, both of H. M.'s Ship *Cornwallis*. These Officers accompanied Sir William Parker with the advance. Lieutenant A. J. B. Hambly, of the Royal Marines, was severely wounded at the head of his company in the advance to the hill.

I cannot too strongly express my entire approbation of the enthusiastic manner in which the whole force maintained their character. Our loss, under Divine protection, was wonderfully small, but the enemy's troops stood well and disputed the hills until in many instances our Officers and men came into personal contact with them.

The conduct of the 49th came more under my personal observation, and I witnessed with great satisfaction the zealous exertions of Captain Reynolds (wounded); Lieutenant and Adjutant Browne; Lieutenants Ramsay and Mitchell of the Grenadier Company; Lieutenant Lane (whose left arm was amputated on the field) and Lieutenant Montgomery (severely wounded in the thigh.) I must also mention with much approbation the conduct of Brevet Captain Balfour, of the Madras Artillery. I almost feel it invidious to name these Officers when I am conscious that every individual zealously did his duty; but as their conduct came under my own eye, I consider it a duty to express my sense of approval.

The exact strength of the enemy I can hardly estimate, as various accounts give it at from 7 to 10,000 men. I conceive it to have been about 8,000 men: they were the elite of the Chinese army, including 500 of the Imperial body guard, remarkably fine men, the Kansuh troops from the frontiers of Turkistan, a strong and muscular race accustomed to border warfare and reputed by the Chinese invincible, and the Shanse troops, for whose arrival Yih-Kiug gave out that he had delayed his attack. Their loss must have been very great, not less than a thousand were killed upon the field or in the pursuit and drowned in the canals; a great proportion of Mandarins fell. These troops not having before met the English, apprehended, I presume, that we should give no quarter; and although the Officers and men showed great forbearance, calling to the Chinese to surrender, very few prisoners were taken. We have, however, three Mandarins, two from Kansuh, and one a Lieutenant of the Imperial body guard.

Fatigue parties from the several corps, together with the available native followers, were occupied in collecting guns, ginjals, and matchlocks left in camp or thrown away during the flight, until 12 o'clock on the 16th, when I set fire to the encampments, and to the several houses that the Chinese had occupied as arsenals. At daylight in the morning I had sent into the town to open the grain magazines to the populace, which eagerly flocked to them, and upon visiting them next morning, I found they had been completely emptied. From these and other causes I could not commence my march before half past twelve o'clock, when the column moved for the Changki pass, which I determined to carry, in order to destroy this, as I understood, formidable position, and capture the treasure chest. After a rapid march of three hours we reached the base of the hills under this pass. The position appeared remarkably strong, indeed, almost impracticable from the front, as the hills are lofty and exceedingly steep and the summits of the ridges were intrenched strongly. But here again as at Segao, I perceived that the position could be turned, and I at once directed the Royal Irish to ascend the hills on the left of the position, while I moved with the 26th Cameronians, and 49th, supported by the Naval Brigade, and occupied a wooded spur which led up direct to the left of the encampment. On reaching the summit of this spur, I found that the enemy had retreated, taking with him his guns, and I regret to say, his treasure; but a considerable quantity of good bread was discovered, also some ammunition. We halted for a couple of hours, and as there was not sufficient cover for all the troops, the works were set fire to, together with the magazine and a large Joss house where the Mandarins resided. The column returned to Tsekee, which we did not reach until nine o'clock that night; all the villages in the neighbourhood of our route were apparently deserted by the inhabitants; but I am happy to say, in no one instance was a house entered on our line of march, along which no trace was left betokening a movement of troops through a hostile country. Indeed, with the exception of a very few killed in houses where the Chinese troops sought refuge the preceding day, I did not see amid the slain one individual that was not habited as a soldier, which, as the peasantry were in many instances intermingled with the fugitives, goes far to shew the forbearance and discrimination of our men even in the heat of pursuit.

On the 17th I returned with the whole force to Ningpo, with the exception of two companies of the 26th, which I sent under Captain Strange, accompanied by Captain Pears, direct to

Chinbae, with a view to ascertain the fact of a canal communication between that place and Tseeke, and to clear the country of any struggling parties of the enemy. This duty was satisfactorily performed, and the detachment rejoined me here on the 18th.

Permit me now to bring to your Lordship's favorable notice the several Officers Commanding Corps who were most zealous in executing and even in anticipating my wishes, viz. Captain Bouchier, Commanding the Naval Brigade; Lieut. Colonel Morris, Commanding 49th Regiment; Lieutenant Colonel Pratt, Commanding 26th Regiment; Major Tomlinson, Commanding 18th Regiment; Captain Watson, R. N., Commanding the Seamen; Captain Uniacke, Commanding Royal Marines, and Captain Simpson, Commanding Rifles 36th Madras Native Infantry.

From Lieutenant Colonel Montgomerie, Commanding the Artillery, and Captain Pears, Commanding Engineer, I received the most zealous support.

I am greatly indebted to Lieutenant Colonel Mountain, Deputy Adjutant General, and Major Gough, Deputy Quarter Master General, for their valuable assistance; and I feel much obliged to Lieutenant Colonel Hawkins, Deputy Commissary General, and Major Moore, Deputy Judge Advocate General, who accompanied me and acted as my personal Staff. Captain Whittingham, my Aid-de-Camp, having been sent to convey my wishes to Sir William Parker, ascended the hill with His Excellency, who speaks most favorably of his exertions.

I cannot too strongly convey my approbation of the zealous exertions of Doctor French, the Superintending Surgeon.

I send this despatch by Lieutenant Montgomery, 49th, who, I am sorry to say, will not, from his wound, be fit for service for a considerable time; he is a most gallant Officer.

SIR,

I have the honor to acquaint you, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor General of India, that during the month of February, considerable numbers of the rebel forces under the command of Prince Suftur Jung and other Afghan Chiefs assembled in the vicinity of Candahar, plundering the villages, and by every possible means urging the inhabitants to join in an attack upon the British troops. In the beginning of the present month, the enemy approached close to the City of Candahar.

I made the necessary arrangements for the safety of the City, and leaving a garrison of about 2,600 men in it, I, on the 7th instant, moved with the remainder of my force against the enemy. They retired as I advanced; they were driven first across the river Turnuk, and then across the Urghundab. They would not allow our Infantry to come in contact with them. On the 9th, we got near enough to open our guns upon them with great effect; they were soon broken and fled; my want of good Cavalry saved them from being totally destroyed; they were dispersed in every direction.

During a march of five days, opposed to 12,000 of the enemy, who had upwards of 6,000 well mounted Cavalry, continually moving round our column, not a Camel was taken or a particle of baggage lost. The troops marched without tents, both Officers and men, and the conduct of my Artillery and Infantry was excellent.

I think this dispersion of the rebel force will have the best effect, as it will convince the inhabitants that the Chiefs cannot face us in the field with any chance of success. I am now doing all in my power to conciliate the villagers, and to induce them to return to the cultivation of their lands, and to live in peace under the assurance of protection.

During my absence, a strong detachment of the enemy made an attempt on the City, and succeeded in burning one of the gates, but they were repulsed with great loss by the gallantry of the troops in garrison, under the command of Major Lane, of the 2d Regt. N. I., whose report shall be forwarded for the information of Government by the first opportunity.

SIR,

For the information of Major General Nott, commanding, I have the honor to report the following particulars of an attack made upon Candahar on the night of the 10th instant.

During the forenoon of the above date, large bodies of the enemy, Horse and Foot, were observed assembling from all quarters, taking up a position near old Candahar and the adjoining villages; and in the course of the day their numbers rapidly increased, parties from the main body moving round and establishing themselves in front of the Shikarpore gate. As their object was evidently to attack the garrison, the Political Agent directed the inhabitants to shut their shops and remain within their houses, and precautions were taken to secure the gates by piling bags of grain inside.

About 8 o'clock P. M. a desperate attack was made upon the Herat gate, and owing to the darkness of the night some combustibles were placed near it and ignited unperceived, and in a few minutes the gate was in flames. I immediately ordered a party of 100 Rank and File from the 2d Regiment, and a Company from the Shah's 1st Infantry, to support the guard at the gate, and two guns were also placed in position commanding the entrance.

Dense masses of the enemy had now collected at this point keeping up an incessant and heavy fire, which was returned with great effect from the ramparts, but so reckless and daring were the assailants that notwithstanding the fearful havoc among them, eight or ten men actually forced their way, by tearing down the burning fragments of the gate, and scrambling over the bags of grain; these were instantly shot, and their fate, together with the galling fire from the walls, dismayed the attacking party, who retired about midnight after four hours resolute fighting.

Another attack took place at the Shikarpore gate about 9 P. M., and a similar attempt was made to fire it, which, however, failed, and the assailants were driven back; a small party also approached the Cabool gate, but the garrison being every where on the alert, the enemy was compelled to retire about 1 o'clock A. M. of the 11th, and when the day broke not a soul was visible.

The guards over the several gates were so completely sheltered, that not a single casualty occurred, whilst the well-directed and destructive fire which was maintained for nearly four hours must have done great execution. Upwards of 50 dead bodies were found in and near the Herat gate, and from the determined assault of the enemy who came close up to the walls, their loss must have been immense; report estimates it at 1,000 killed and wounded, and I am informed by Major Rawlinson, Political Agent, that Prince Suftur Jung, Meerza Ahmed, and other Sirdars were present encouraging the assailants.

A considerable quantity of grain was unavoidably destroyed at the Herat gate, but as it presented a strong barrier, I trust the sacrifice will be considered unimportant. This gate has been built up, and the others have been temporarily barricaded with grain bags.

Before concluding my report, I would beg to acknowledge the valuable assistance rendered me on this occasion by Major Rawlinson, Political Agent, and Captain Ripley, Fort Adjutant. The exertions of every Officer and Soldier in garrison were unremitting, and it affords me infinite pleasure to bear testimony to the admirable conduct of all parties during the attack.

SIR,

Having deemed it desirable to detach a Brigade under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Wymer, for the double purpose of foraging, and giving protection to the numerous villages along the left bank of the Urghundab river against the marauding system adopted by the rebel

army, commanded by Prince Suftur Jung and other Afghan Chiefs, I have now the honor to forward to you, for the information of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, a report from that Officer of an attack made on his detachment, and of the complete defeat of the enemy. I have ascertained that their loss was great, and that several of their Chiefs were killed and wounded, while our loss was comparatively trifling.

On my arrival on the field I was pleased with the judicious arrangements made by Lieutenant Colonel Wymer; and the cool and determined manner in which he opposed the enemy and protected his convoy did credit to our arms, and I beg leave to bring him under the favorable notice of Government.

The enemy were finally driven across the Urghundab in the greatest confusion and with very considerable loss. The Artillery and Infantry distinguished themselves.

Sir,

I have the honor to report for the information of Major General Nott, Commanding at Candahar, that in obedience to his instructions, I marched from that place with the force noted

miles, and large bodies of Cavalry grazing their horses between it and the river. I continued my march to the spot selected for my encampment, and shortly after reaching it at $\frac{1}{2}$ past 10, or 11, a large body of the enemy's Cavalry was observed forming and occupying the pass in my rear; on which I reinforced the rear guard with two guns and a wing of the 38th N. I., placing the convoy under the hills in the rear and protecting its front and flanks with the force at my disposal, which had hardly been effected, when finding the force above mentioned fast increasing, I deemed it highly necessary to move back for their dispersion taking with me two Horse-artillery guns under Lieutenant Turner, the 38th Regiment, and a party of Skinner's Horse under Lieutenant Travers, detaching two Companies 38th Regiment to drive the enemy from the tops of some low hills they had crowned with horsemen on my left, which was speedily done, and the well directed fire from Lieutenant Turner's guns soon drove in the body of the enemy collected on the Pass, commanded, I am told, by Salloo Khan and Taj Mahomed, who moved round to join the party then threatening the right flank of the convoy. On this I retraced my steps and rejoined the convoy, which had been left under Lieutenant Colonel McLaren's charge during my absence, and who had dislodged a third body of the enemy from the enclosed gardens and villages in his front with a part of the 16th Regiment. On my reaching the convoy, I directed Captain Macan, Commanding the Shah's 2d Regiment, to move his corps, supported by two guns and the half of Leeson's Horse under Ensign Chamberlain against the party on the right flank, which movement had been partly executed when the force under the Major General's personal command arrived to my support, at the time when the party of Cavalry under Ensign Chamberlain received a partial check from an overpowering body of the enemy, and that Officer was severely wounded, and Lieutenant Travers slightly, who acted in concert with him.

Enclosed I have the honor to forward a return of the killed and wounded on the occasion, and to express my entire approbation of the conduct of all Officers and men engaged in the action.

I trust I may be permitted to bring to the Major General's notice the admirable practice of the Artillery under Lieutenant Turner's guidance, every shot from which told with beautiful effect upon the dense masses of the enemy.

To Lieutenant Waterfield, Adjutant 38th Regiment, who acted as my personal Staff on the occasion, I am much indebted for the very able manner in which he conducted the various duties assigned him.

SIR,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 1613, dated 1st November 1841, and to acquaint you, that I have authorized the Officer Commanding at Hong-kong,

to embark the two companies of the Bengal Volunteers for Calcutta, as soon as he can, in communication with the Senior Naval Officer on the spot, obtain proper transport accommodation.

2. I beg to assure you, for the information of the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council, that I have consented with much regret to part with the Volunteers, and had their state of health been such in August last, as to admit of my bringing them with me to the Northward, I should have confidently anticipated the same advantage from the services of Major Mee and his fine detachment, that I derived at Canton.

3. Previous to my departure from Hong-kong, and subsequently to the wreck of their transport in the Typhoon of July last, I placed the detachment in Fort Victoria, on the Cowloon Peninsula, and flattered myself that from this time their general health began to amend: but, after my departure, consequent upon the determination of Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary not to occupy the Peninsula, they were removed to Hong-kong, and sickness has unhappily continued amongst them to such degree, that many have died, and nothing perhaps but an immediate return to their native country can save a large portion of the remainder.

4. Deeming it therefore expedient to let them go, I could not permit them to return without this renewed testimony on my part to their gallant services in the field, and to their uniformly good conduct in quarters.

2nd.—Upon each Consignment, the value of which is to be ascertained by the Officers of the Indian Government, an Advance *not exceeding three fifths* of such ascertained value will be made.

The rate of exchange to be determined from time to time at the place where the advance is made under the Court's orders.

3rd.—For repayment of the Advance, Bills of Exchange to be drawn in triplicate, at ten months' date, at the rate of—

4th.—The parties will be required to place in the hands of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium,* Bills of Lading of the Consignment and Policies of Insurance effected

thereon, both in triplicate. The Bills of Lading must be drawn deliverable to the East-India Company, or endorsed to the order of the East-India Company. The Policies of Insurance must be effected in the name and on behalf of the East-India Company, as the parties interested, or endorsed to their order; but persons desirous of effecting the necessary insurance in this country, and of depositing the Policies in the Company's Treasury, will be allowed to do so.

Provided always, that in case any lease shall be granted, or the rent of land be fixed for any longer period, the lease or engagement fixing the rent shall be null and void only for the excess beyond such terms respectively.

On receiving information of the date on which the Maharana will enter a Military Station, the Commanding Officer shall cause the proper Troops to be drawn out for his reception, and a Salute of 19 Guns to be fired on His Highness' arrival at, and departure from the Station. The Chief, Civil or Military, authority of the Station (as the case may be) will also go out a convenient distance to meet His Highness, and conduct him to his Tents, or he will depute some Officer of experience to perform this duty in his behalf, should the Chief authority be prevented from personally evincing this mark of deference to the exalted rank of His Highness.
