Paris, Nov. 10.—A statement issued by the Franco-British staff at Salonica yesterday and transmitted to the Havas Agency says:

"British troops, reinforced by a new division, occupied solidly the region north of Doiran and are operating in the direction of Strumnitza, where encounters between British and Bulgarian patrols have been reported.

Berlin, Nov. 10 —A defeat for the French and British troops in Southern Serbia, with losses which are described as enormous, is reported in a dis patch from Sofia by way of Budapest. According to this information the battle occurred batween Krivolak and Perlege. The prices made a violent at-tack upon defensive positions of the Bulgarians.

In addition to heavy losses in killed and wounded of the allies, it is re-ported that large numbers of their soldiers were captured.




