

TO END STRIKES

AND LOCKOUTS

Law For Quebec Municipalities and Employees

Quebec, March 9.—The Gallipeault Bill, intended to put an end to locknuts and strikes in municipal services in Quebec, was put through the Legislature last night.

This new law will apply only to policemen, firemen, waterworks employees and employees in charge of the incineration of garbage. It will apply to municipallities having at least ten persons in their employ. It will apply to all disputes regarding wages, working hours or dismissals on account of membership in any labor union. Under this law it will be unlawful for any employer to declare a lockout or for any employee to strike without having submitted the dispute to a board of arbitration.

Fines.

The law provides for a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$1,000 on employers declaring or causing a lockout for every day or part day that such lockout lasts. It also provides for a fine of not less than \$10 and not more than \$50 on each employee going on strike contrary to the law, for every day or part of a day that such employee remains on strike. Any person who ingcites, encourages or aids any employer or employee to break the law shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than \$1,000.

MOVIES CAUSE OF CHARGE IN FRANCE

Paris, March 9.—Andre Himmel. reputed general manager of the Franco - American Cinematograph Corporation, was held to-day on a charge of having misused more than a million francs invested in the corporation by a Frenchman named R. M. Rivary, who caused the arrest of Himmel at Havre on his arrival from New York.

Himmel at, his preliminary examination yesterday, contended he had acted in good faith in connection with the corporation and that he would have fulfilled his promises if American associates had not defaulted on their agreements at the last moment.

Himmel last July announced the incorporation of the Franco-American Cinematograph Corporation in Delaware. He explained that the company was formed to facilitate the exchange of films between Europe and the United States. Among prominent Frenchmen interested were said to be M. Vivlani, former Premier, and Baron de Rothschild.





Another Version.

London, March 9.—Another version in a Central News dispatch from Helsingfors dated to-day. This says that fighting is continuing in the streets of Petrograd and that War Minister Trotshy and M. Zinovieff, the Soviet Governor of Petrograd, were reported to have taken refuge in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul. surrounded by a large number of protective troops.

All attempts by the revolutionaries to capture this fortress were repulsed, the message says.

When the motorcycle had drawn up even with the automobile, the two men in the side car and the driver of the machine opened fire upon the Premier, twenty-one shots being discharged. The whole tragedy was enacted in a few moments, and as the last shot rang out the motorcycle swung into a side street and vanished.

Boston, March 9.—Germany's participation in the Irish revolt which started at Dublin on Easter Sunday, 1916, was admitted by John Devery, a New York Sinn Feiner, in an address here last night. He said that this was brought about by Sinn Fein sympathizers in the United States who made a deal with the Germans for a shipload of arms to be delivered to Ireland.

Devery said the "Irish Republican Brotherhood" sent word to sympathizers in the United States of the plans for the Easter Sunday attack on the British forces in the previous January and requested that the Sinn Feiners in the United States furnish a shipload of arms, the arms to be delivered in Limerick as soon as possible.

It was not possible to get any such quantity of arms in the United States without the knowledge of the United States Government, Devery said. Therefore the aid of Germany in securing these arms was enlisted. He declared no other help had been received by the revolutionaries from German sources.

BUY IN GANADA DRAYTON'S ADVICE

Conditions Can Be Improved, Minister Says

Cornwall, Ont., March 9.—(Canadian Press)—Addressing the Cornwall Board of Trade last night, Sir Henry Drayton, Federal Minister of Finance, stated that an era of overproduction and extravagant buying had culminated last Summer and was succeeded by an extreme swing of the pendulum to a period of restricted production and an almost entire absence of public buying. The result was a condition of relative unemployment and industrial stagnation. He recommended as one means of relief, for both of these conditions and of the depreciated value of the Canadian industry, a campaign of purchasing Canadian products, grown and manufactured, where possible to obtain in place of imported goods.

Coal.

Sir Henry stated that the price of coal had been increased two dollars a ton by unwise buying abroad.

In reference to taxation, Sir Henry gave figures to show the enormous charges arising out of the war. He refuted the impression that the rich were escaping taxation at the expense of the poor, instancing the income tax in this regard.

Sir Henry said he believed if there was on the part of the producer an effort for cheaper production the trade situation in Canada would quickly right itself and the country return to a better prosperity than in the past.

NOVA SCOTIA NEEDS GREATER REVENUE

Legislature Meets to Solve Some Problems

Halifax, March 9.—Legislation looking to an increase in the sources of revenue of the province, the further extension of the public health programme and mothers' pensions, was forecast in the Speech from the Throne opening the first session of the thirty-seventh General Assembly of Nova Scotia this afternoon. The curtailment of production in the coal, iron and steel industries was referred to, and hope expressed that with wise counsel and full and frank understanding of prevailing conditions and with a friendly spirit of co-operation between employer and employee, any difficulty incident to the general industrial situation would be surmounted.
