Course of Study.

The course of study in this Institution has been so arranged as to meet the wants of all classes of the school age. The Primary and Academic Departments of Instruction, though not strictly of the College, are nevertheless under the general super vision of the Faculty both as to the methods of teaching and discipline; thus investing them as adjuncts of the College with greater usefulness and value to all those children passing through the elementary stages of an education. It is a point seriously to be questioned, whether the great Universities are entitled to that pre-eminent superiority they so pretentiously claim, which disdain and ignore the necessity and importance of teaching among their "all things"—what be the first principles of human knowledge."

THE PRIMARY DEPARTMENT OF INSTRUCTION embraces the following studies:

Spelling Book, Webster; 1st and 2nd Readers, McGuffey's; Primary Arithmetic; and Writing on Slates and Black Boards, Spelling and Defining; 3rd and 4th Readers, McGuffey's; Primary Geography, Swinton; Arithmetic, Davies' Common School; Primary Grammar, Pinneo; and Language Lessons; Hart; Primary History of U. S.; and Penmanship, Spencerian System.

THE ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT OF INSTRUCTION embraces the following studies:

McGuffey's 5th and 6th Readers; Science of Common Things, Wells; Kiddle's Shorter Course of Astronomy; and the Sciences and Mathematics of the Preparatory Department of the Classical Course hereinafter mentioned.

REMARKS.

In this as well as in the Primary and Academic Departments, Spelling, Reading and Writing are regularly taught. It is designed to furnish, in addition to the above classical course, opportunity for a liberal academic education to both the sons and daughters of our patrons: and if the demands of female education require it, facilities will be provided at once for an enlarged and full course of classical, scientific and art study, embracing Painting, Drawing and Music.

The male and female departments of this seat of learning however, will be conducted apart in the main. The Board of Trustees, Faculty and friends of Weaverville College, are determined to make it an influential and leading educational centre



So that none need hesitate to send their sons or daughters.

Instruction in this department will be thorough, and satisfactory proficiency in the classical course will be required in order to admission into the Freshman Class.

In the Academic and Primary Departments competent and experienced female teachers are employed to the extent needed.

Scientific Course

This has been arranged to meet the wants of a class of students desiring to pursue a select course, exclusive of the Ancient The Mathematics will be the same as in the College department of the classical course, excepting Mechanics. It will embrace also a full course of Instruction in the branches of Natural Philosophy, Natural History, Book Keeping, Moral and Social Philosophy, General History and English Literaature.

Substitutions may be allowed to students intending to enter the ministry, or any regular profession; in which, after the Sophomore year, the Mathematics or the Greek may be exchanged for an equivalent in the study of Hebrew, Modern Languages,



Civil Engineering, or Commercial Science, whenever such branches are taught in the institution, and provided that the extra charge for tuition is paid in advance.

STATEMENT OF THE TERMS OF ADMISSION, EXAMINATIONS, EXPENSES, &c., AT WEAVERVILLE COLLEGE, WEAVERVILLE, N. C.

MATRICULATION.

For admission into the Freshman Class, a thorough preparation in the following requisites: English Grammar, Modern Geography, Arithmetic, Algebra to Quadratic Equations, and III Books of Geometry, Ancient Geography, Latin Grammar (Bingham's) and Reader, Cæsar, Greek Grammar and Reader, (Harkness'), and three Books of Anabasis (Xenophon's). The applicant must give satisfactory evidence of good moral character; be at least fourteen years of age; and if he has been a student of any other incorporated Institution, he must bring with him a certificate of honorable dismission, or other satisfactory evidence of general good conduct. Candidates for a more advanced Class will be examined on all the studies already pursued by the Class they wish to join.

Applications for admission should be made at the opening of the scholastic year (September), as much is lost by entering College after Classes have advanced.

If upon examination an applicant is found qualified to enter, he will be referred to the Treasurer, with whom he will make satisfactory arrangements for the expenses of the Term. He will then be required to sign a declaration, that it is his intention strictly to conform to all the Laws and disciplinary Regulations of the College until he shall be regularly dismissed.

EXAMINATIONS.

There are two kinds, oral and written, conducted at such times as the Professors may select. Two general oral examinations of each Class are held during the Session, which every student is required to stand. The first or intermediate exami-



nation is held about the middle of the scholastic year, in the presence of the faculty, embracing the subjects of instruction for the First Term. The second and final examination is held at the close of the Second Term, and is publicly conducted under the direction of a committee of Literary Gentlemen, chosen by the Faculty.

Monthly written examinations are required of each student, and graded on a numerical scale of 100, and $66\frac{2}{3}$ is the number required to pass on a study.

The questions propounded in these examinations have each a numerical value. If the answers of the students shall receive an aggregate value equal to 85 per cent. of the aggregate value assigned to the question, he is ranked in the first division, and if less than 85 per cent. and more than 75 per cent., in the second division.

Certificates of distinction will be awarded to those ranked in the first division and their names will be published or announced in the closing exercises of the session.

The general examinations will be sufficiently difficult and comprehensive to make it impossible for a student to secure a place in the first division without close application and diligent study. In every case, however, the result will be communicated to parents and guardians respectively, in the circular reports.

DEGREES AND DISTINCTIONS.

Students who complete satisfactorily either the classical or scientific course of study, and show themselves in their final examinations accurately versed in all the subjects treated of in the lectures and correlative texts, will be entitled to graduate and to receive a suitable diploma, on the payment of the usual fees, provided all dues to the College have been satisfactorily adjusted and set tled.

DISTINCTIONS.—A student whose conduct is at least 90, (on a scale of 100,) and whose average grade in studies is such as to put him in the first division, is classed as a First Honor Student, and a student whose conduct is the same and whose average grade in study puts him into the second division, is ranked Second Honor.

PRIZE MEDALS.

For the encouragement of proficiency in Oratory, Mr. J. E. Ray, of Asheville, has established a Gold Medal to be bestowed at each Annual Public Examination, upon the student in the Junior or Senior Class of the regular course, who excels in Original Composition and Declamation.

The College Prize Medal (Gold) is awarded to any student (not in the Senior Class,) who excels in Declamation.

The Sawyer Mathematical Medal (Gold) has been established by Mr. J. P. Sawyer, of Asheville, in the department of Mathematics, to be given to any student who, after obtaining a required standard, submits the best original solutions of Problems assigned by the professor of Mathetics.

A Latin and Greek Medal (Gold) has been established by Capt. M. E. Carter, of Asheville, to be given to the student who, after obtaining a required standard, submits the best examination on said Languages. Prizes are also awarded in the Academic School.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The Delphian and Cliosophic Literary Societies, established by the Faculty and Students, hold weekly meetings for literary exercises, are conducted with skill and form an interesting and important part of our Literary Organization. They have small though constantly increasing libraries, and the new Halls will be ready for them in a short time.

Secret Societies in connection with the College, are strictly prohibited, as utterly valueless and only productive of evil.

PRIVILEGED STUDENTS.

Ministers of the Gospel may attend any department of in struction in the College without the payment of Professors' fees. The same privilege will be accorded to any young man of any church preparing for the ministry, on the following conditions:

That he present to the Faculty testimonials that he is a member in good standing in his own church, is a bona fide candidate for the ministry, has a good intellectual capacity and is unable without aid to meet the expenses of education at the College. Provided, however, that no new class shall be formed for the benefit of such Students.

DISCIPLINARY REGULATIONS.

It is the aim of the Faculty to make the discipline of the Institution parental and kind and yet firm.

The College will seek to surround the students with an atmosphere of honor, purity and piety, and to inspire in them such an enlightened sense of true self-respect as will enable them to achieve for themselves one of the sublimest ends of a normal and symmetrical education—self-government.

The Faculty wish it to be distinctly understood that membership and good standing in Weaverville College, are conditioned simply and positively upon conformity to the sound morality of the Bible, gentlemanly behavior and the duly announced laws and prudential regulations of the College.

Want of moral character and reckless indifference to law and order will utterly disqualify any young man for admission or retention in this Institution. The use of ardent spirits and firearms, card playing or gambling of any kind, fighting, profanity or other gross violations of order, are forbidden.

CIRCULAR REPORTS.

These reports, sent at the close of each term to the parent or guardian of the student, will contain an account of his proficiency, and diligence in study, and also of his general deportment.

RELIGIOUS INFLUENCES.

Whilst the Institution is strictly non sectarian, the public duties of each day begin and close with a lesson from the Scriptures, singing and prayer. They are required to attend church at least once every Sabbath. Recitations are required once a week of all the students, in the Scriptures and on subjects connected therewith.

LOCATION.

Weaverville College is situated nine miles Northwest of Asheville, aloof from the contaminating influences of town or city.— Here young men are not exposed to the evil temptations that in cities and towns beset the young of that age when, youths are led astray, and when habits are contracted that determine the future character, conduct and consequent happiness of man. The charter of the Institution inhibits the sale of liquor near the College; besides, the laws of the State forbid liquor being sold or

given to a minor. This country is so very, very healthful, that epidemic diseases are wholly unknown in the country. There are no allurements to divert the mind from study and lead to the formation of bad habits; on the contrary, the College is situated in the midst of a moral, quiet, healthy, intelligent and religious community.

Students from North and South Carolina can come by Railroad to Old Fort, N. C., 23 miles East of Asheville, or to Greenville, S. C., and thence by stage to Asheville, which is near the College. From Virginia, Tennessee and the South generally, they can come by rail to Wolf Creek, Tenn., and thence 45 miles by stage up the beautiful French Broad to within 3 miles of the College. These Railroads will soon be finsihed to Asheville, from which a Hack will run regularly three times a week to the College. We rejoice in being located where we have health, nature, life real, life earnest and every wholesome stimulus to improve our opportunities for our own and our country's good.

TERMS AND VACATIONS

There are two Terms in the year. The Fall Term, or First Term, begins the First Thursday in September, and continues twenty weeks. The Second Term begins at the close of the first, and continues twenty weeks. Our Frst Term for the next Collegiate year begins on Thursday, September 6th, 1877.

PRICES OF BOARD, TUITION, &C.

The Board of Trustees and Faculty have adopted the policy of domiciling the Students in good private families, and in boarding houses, owned and conducted by private enterprise. The wisdom of the policy is abundantly sustained by the largest experience. In the best of such families board exclusive of lights and washing, can be obtained at from seven to ten dollars per month. If they prefer, Students can mess in comfortable dormitories near the College, at a cost from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per week. Students on arriving can learn from any member of the Faculty or Officers of the Board, in what families they can procure board, and on what terms.

Turrions.—One-half payable in advance, unless otherwise satisfactorily arranged. Board bills payable monthly. For instruction in Modern Languages there will be an extra charge of \$7.50 per Term. Instruction in Music, Painting and Drawing given to classes, if desired, at reasonable rates.

The most advanced study, pursued by a student in a mixed course, will determine the rates of his tuition.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Students are received at any time and charged from the time of entering. No deduction will be allowed in the tuition bills of those entering within three weeks after the opening of the term. No deduction will be made for lost time except in cases of sickness protracted one month or more. No student is allowed to absent himself from recitations or examinations without giving satisfactory reasons therefor. Students who voluntarily absent themselves from recitations, weekly exercises, or examinations, or quit the College without the written consent of the Faculty, will be degraded in their classes and become subject to suspension or expulsion from College.

No Student can be received for less than one Term. Funds remitted for the payment of bills should be directed to the Treasurer of the College. Pocket money for the students had best be deposited either with the President, or one of the Professors, who will attend to their wants and discharge their bills.

The College charges, in all cases, are required to be paid, or satisfactorily settled, before the students will be permitted to enter upon a second Term.

As all absences from College duties are so unfavorable to the standing and proficiency of the student, and so detrimental to

College discipline, the Faculty do earnestly request parents and gnardians in no case to encourage or sanction such absences, either at the commencement or at any other, period of the Term. Christmas is no exception.

The vacations are ample for relaxation and rest.

All necessary books and stationary are furnished in the vicinity on reasonable terms. These are required to be paid for at the time of purchase.


