# Town Clerk's Report.

## RECORDS.

Some valuable additions to the town's records have been made during the past year. The "Proprietors' Records of The Elbows, Kingston, Palmer and Ware" from 1733 to 1818 have been bound by the "silk" process; this process consists of preserving the original documents between thin sheets of silk so that they can not be injured by handling, at the same time leaving them perfectly legible. The records of the "Proprietors of the Elbows" from 1733 to 1752 have also been bound by the same process, as well as the records of the "District of Palmer" from 1752 to 1756, and the records of the selectmen of the town from 1782 to 1800.

The town records from 1781 to 1807 have been gathered and bound in book form, and the vital statistics from the time of the earliest record to 1850 have been copied, verified and printed; the vital statistics books from 1843 to 1905 have been rebound.

A complete file of the printed reports of the town officers, from the first one in 1853 to 1905, has also been secured and placed in the town's fireproof vault, and will be bound in book form.

## Report of Overseers of Poor.

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The Overseers of the Poor of the Town of Palmer present the following report:—

The past year has been one calling for more than the ordinary expenditures in several lines. The running of the mills on short time—four and three days a week for six months during the summer and fall—resulted in numerous applications for aid from persons previously self-supporting, and assistance from this board has been necessary. Several accidents and unusual cases requiring hospital treatment have added to the expenses of the year. There are several cases still in the hospitals.

Unusual expense has also been compulsory at the Town Farm. It was found that for the proper conduct of the farm work a new pair of horses was an absolute necessity, and they were procured at a cost of \$425. The animals are five and six years old, have been worked constantly since their purchase and are thoroughly acclimated and hardened; they are now considered to be worth considerably more than was paid for them. A new heating apparatus was also found to be imperative. The old one, which consumed twice the amount of fuel which should have done the work, failed to heat the building, and on account of its construction there was extreme danger of fire from the overheating of the chimney—even to the roof—when the apparatus was pushed on cold days. About \$300 was spent on the new heater and changes in the piping. Large quantities of kitchen utensils and household furnishings and materials had to be bought to replace old and worn out and worthless articles. The latter are included in figuring the weekly cost per inmate, but not the horses nor the heater, these being classed as permanent improvements. So many of the potatoes and other vegetables raised on the farm last year had been sold that it was necessary to buy every-

thing of this kind from June 1st until those raised on the farm were available. There are now in storage at the farm a sufficient quantity to last until the new crop comes in, with a probable surplus for sale. The cellar of the house having proved a poor place in which to keep vegetables, a vegetable cellar has been constructed in which they can be kept as long as necessary.

It will be noted that the inventory at the Farm is \$465 less than a year ago. This is due in part to a change in the method of inventorying, whereby one item of \$350 for bathtubs and closets, which has previously been counted in the "Furniture and Fixtures," is by this board considered as properly belonging to the building and counted as a part of it. Wherever articles have been in use for some time and have materially deteriorated, they have been inventoried only at their present condition value, which is responsible for another portion of the deficit.

In the cutting of wood attention has been paid to the needs in the way of timber and lumber at the Farm, and whenever possible logs have been saved from the trees cut and will be converted into material for use or sale. There is a considerable quantity of these now on hand.

The town farm, while ample in area, is not well adapted for the most economical care of the town's poor. A large portion of its acres are of light soil, on which good crops cannot be raised without intense fertilization with commercial fertilizers. A careful study of the situation has convinced the Overseers that the greatest returns can be had from the building up of a dairy and the raising of vegetables. Something along the former line has been accomplished during the past year; the number of milch cows has been increased as fast as possible and the milk shipped to Boston, \$366 being received from this source from April 1st to January 1st, a period of nine months. This source of income might be greatly increased were it not for the lack of good hay growing land, and a scarcity of pasturage; there is very little of either. In an endeavor to overcome to some extent the latter defect, a piece of land was cleared last summer and this spring will be broken and converted into pasturage as soon as possible. There is also on the "Pest House" property belonging to the town and adjoining the Town Farm property, a piece of ground which it is thought can be made into

pasturage; the selectmen gave permission to cut the few trees upon it, and an attempt will be made to add pasturage there. It is imperative however, if the dairy is to be materially increased, that additional pasturage and hay land be acquired.

A portion of the land is well adapted for the raising of early vegetables, and if a market can be found for them this will probably be done. There is absolutely nothing in the way of small fruits, etc., on the Farm, and as these can undoubtedly be raised to advantage it is planned to make a start this year by setting out roots and nursery stock. It is also proposed to start an apple orchard, there being no trees of value on the place.

The greater portion of the property at the Town Farm is in good condition. There is urgent need however of a one-horse two-seated wagon, there being nothing of the kind at present. The beds in many of the rooms are the ancient riveted-iron-slat kind, and should be replaced with something more conducive to the comfort of the inmates. New floors must also be laid in the kitchen and the men's room.

Mention should be made of the work of the warden and matron at the Town Farm. They have labored hard and faithfully to keep the expenses at the lowest possible point consistent with the proper management of the institution.

Attention is called to the slight overdraft in the "Contingent" account. At the beginning of the year it was found necessary to purchase many things which properly belonged in the contingent account but which were charged to the expenses of the Farm for fear that the contingent account would not be large enough to cover them. Later it was decided to put them where they properly belonged, even though an overdraft result.

The only outstanding account of which the Overseers have any knowledge—with the exception of state hospital and similar bills—is the one of The C. D. Holbrook Co., which has been in dispute for several years.

When the Overseers asked for an additional appropriation of \$1500 at the special town meeting, the amount was based on the average pay rolls for the ten months previous; the bills at the last of the year did not prove to be so large as expected however, which accounts for the balance on hand.



Because of a lack of knowledge of what the absolute needs of the year may be in the several departments, the Overseers are of the opinion that it would be more advantageous if their appropriation were in a lump sum and therefore available wherever needed, and accordingly recommend an appropriation of \$8,000.

## Report of Board of Health.

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report :

The year now closed has called for less work by this board than for several years. Contagious and infectious diseases reported to the board have been less than half the number reported the year previous. This we believe to be due largely to rigidly enforced quarantine and the isolation of cases until all danger of communicating the disease has passed.

Fewer complaints of nuisances have been received than last year and none of a very serious nature.

The State Board of Health furnish a fine quality of vaccine virus to the board for free distribution among the physicians of the town. Its endorsement by the State Board is a guarantee of its purity, and any who may use it can be sure of its being the best.

## REPORT OF THE BACTERIOLOGIST.

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., February 28, 1905.

*Board of Health, Town of Palmer, Mass.*

GENTLEMEN:—I hand you herewith my report of the bacteriological work for the year ending February 28, 1905.

Thirteen (13) cases have been referred to me for examination for diphtheria during the past year. Nine of these showed the diphtheria bacilli, and four did not. A total of 37 cultures from these cases were examined.

In conducting the work of the bacteriological diagnosis of diphtheria, it is important to remember that in case the laboratory findings differ from the clinical diagnosis, secondary cultures should be submitted; and in case of a negative report from a case in which membrane is present, secondary cultures should also be sent. This is important because there are occasional cases in which the first swab taken does not show the real nature of the infection, due to various causes such as food in the mouth, recent taking of medicine or failure to get a thorough swab of the throat.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn all the inhabitants of the Town of Palmer, qualified to vote in elections of town officers, to meet at the several polling places, in said Palmer, designated by the Selectmen, to wit: In Precinct A, at the Engine House on Park street in the Depot Village; in Precinct B, at Temperance Hall on Commercial street in Thorndike; in Precinct C, at Ruggles' Hall on East Main street in Three Rivers; and in Precinct D, at Holden's Old Store in Bondsville, on Monday, the 20th day of March, A. D. 1905, at six o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to give in their votes on one ballot to the precinct officers of the several voting precincts of said town, for the following town officers, to wit: Three Selectmen, three Assessors, a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, five Constables and three Fence Viewers, all for the term of one year; one Overseer of the Poor for three years, two members of the School Committee for three years, one member of the Board of Health for three years, and one Cemetery Commissioner for three years; also to vote by ballot, which shall be Yes or No, in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

The polls will be open at 6 o'clock in the forenoon and may be closed at three o'clock in the afternoon.

And you are further hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Palmer, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet

at the Town House at Four Corners, in said Palmer, on Monday, the 27th day of March, A. D. 1905, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz :

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose two or more Field Drivers, Measurers of Wood and Bark, and all other usual town officers.

ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to hire the present tramp room and lockup.

ART. 4. To act on the reports of the town officers.

ART. 5. To raise money and make appropriations to defray the expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see if the town will authorize its treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes of the ensuing year, the same to be paid from said taxes.

ART. 7. To see if the town will authorize its treasurer to borrow money not to be paid from the taxes of the ensuing year.

ART. 8. To hear and act on the reports of committees.

ART. 9. To choose committees and give them instructions.

ART. 10. To see if the town will allow a discount and determine what interest shall be paid on the taxes to be assessed for the ensuing year.

ART. 11. To determine the manner and state the terms and conditions of collecting the taxes for the ensuing year, and fix the compensation of the collector of taxes.

ART. 12. To determine the manner of repairing the highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors.

ART. 14. To act on the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

ART. 15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money for the Young Men's Library Association.

ART. 16. To see if the town will raise money to convey pupils to and from the public schools, and instruct the School Committee as to the manner of letting the contract for such conveyance.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the celebration of Memorial Day.

ART. 18. To see what action the town will take in relation to sewers.

ART. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting the streets, and whether it will authorize the Selectmen to make contract therefor.

ART. 20. To see what action the town will take in reference to the planting and preservation of shade trees.

ART. 21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

ART. 22. To see what action the town will take in regard to sidewalks.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to maintain night police in the several villages, and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 24. To see what action the town will take relative to suits and claims now pending against the town.

ART. 25. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for necessary aid to soldiers and sailors and their families, and the families of the slain, and entrust the same to L. L. Merrick Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, under the provisions of law.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer in Park street in the Depot Village from its intersection with Walnut street to its intersection with Thorndike street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer in South Main street in the Depot Village to a point opposite the car barn and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 28. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money for the erection of a hood, or other protection against water from the roof, over the door entering the Memorial Hall from Pleasant street, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to locate an arc electric light on the common at Palmer Center.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk from the car station near the Catholic cemetery to the common at Palmer Center and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 31. To see what action, if any, the town will take in reference to claims for labor, teams, and material in connection with the construction of the masonry for the Burleigh bridge as follows :

Philip LaPlant, \$13.50; Michael McKelligott, \$41.25; John J. Daley, \$4.00; John Connor, \$16.62; Peter Wemette, \$16.75; Edward Wemette, \$17.25; W. E. Kenyon, \$4.81; M. F. Bowler, \$25.00; Michael St. John, \$16.78; Michael Laford, \$25.40; C. D. Holbrook Company, \$23.80; J. F. Holbrook & Son, \$16.51; a total of \$221.67.

ART. 32. To see what action the town will take, if any, relative to the claim of Hamilton & King for labor and materials employed and furnished and for expenses paid and incurred in connection with the construction of the masonry for the Burleigh bridge.

ART. 33. To see if the town will vote to enlarge the High School building and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 34. To see what action the town will take regarding the maintenance of evening schools.

ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to elect its Selectmen and Assessors in the manner authorized and provided in Section 339 of Chapter 11 of the Revised Laws.

ART. 36. To see if the town will appoint a committee to investigate the sources of a water supply for the town, to collect facts and data and make surveys of routes for conduits and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to pay the bills incurred by the committee appointed to investigate the needs of the town for high school accommodations and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 336 of Chapter 11 of the Revised Laws relative to the election of a highway surveyor.

ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to buy a portable stone crushing plant and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 40. To see if the town will vote to have the records of lay-out of highways and town ways, location of pole lines, and similar orders, indexed, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Revised Laws, Chapter 11, Section 335, relative to the election of the Town Clerk for the term of three years.
