A support flight of 2 TBM-3 and 4 FM-2 took off from USS MAKIN ISLAND on 5 March 1945, D plus 14, at 1530 (K), for Iwo Jima. VF pilots were Lt. Thomas R. Young, flight leader, and Lt.(jg) Wilber E. Ege. FM-2 were flown by Lts.(jg) Donald E. Skewis, division leader, Rex S. McDaniel and Ensigns Harold E. Chapman and Eric W. Kattwinkel. The flight joined 6 TBM-3 and 4 FM-2 of VC-85 which furnished the group leader. At 1615 the group attacked an area (235 Oboe Tare on local grid) 450 yards south of the northwest beach, containing mortar positions. Dummy runs by the Air Coordinator and Lt.(jg) Skewis VF leader preceeded the attack. VF fired rockets into the mortar positions from slant range of 1500 feet and strafed up to the beach making 5 runs. VF followed dropping (8) 500 lb. GP (VC-84) into a ravine containing troops and mortars. Their runs started at 5000 feet with release at 2500 and pullout at 2000. CSA advised the group that ground forces had reported the attack as excellent close support work. The flight returned to base at 1814 (K).
