# THE RURAL TEACHER

Bears Heavy Burden of Civilization.

By Peter Radford. Lecturer National Farmers' Union.

With the new development of rural life there comes the demand for increased educational facilities and the impulse of universal education which is sweeping the country calls for in-telligent and consecrated leadership in our rural schools. He can organize around the school the main interests of the boys and girls and develop the impulse for cooperation, which in time will displace the old competitive individualism and make rural social life more congenial and satisfying. The possibilities for making the rural school the social and economic center of the community are almost endless, and the facul-ties of the rural teacher may have full play, for it will take all his time and ingenuity if he attains the full measure of success.

#### Must Be Community Leader.

A noted college professor recently A noted conege professor recently said that three things are now re-quired of a rural teacher. The first requirement is that he must be strong enough to establish himself as a leader in the community in which he lives and labors; second, that he must have a good grasp on the organization and management of the new and scientific farm school and, third, that he must show expert ability in dealing the modern rural school curriculum. If he lives up to the opportunities offered him as a rural leader, he will boys and girls distinctly for rural life, not only by giving them the rudiments of agricultural training, but by enabling them to see the attractive side of farm life, and to realize that it is a scientific business, and one of the most complex of all pro-fessions with opportunities as great as those of any other calling.

## "School for Parents" Needed.
