**CITY TRUSTEES**

(Continued from Page 1)

The city engineer requested the board to have a new form of legal blanks in street work proceedings printed, the present ones being out of date and requiring correction, cost to be about \$75. On motion the same was ordered.

The city attorney stated that the Glendale Consolidated Water Company is now refunding amounts paid since 1912 for meters and service connections.

On motion, "an ordinance of the city of Glendale relating to the keeping of rubbish and waste matter and repealing ordinance No. 142," was taken up for the first reading.

On motion this ordinance was declared read for the first and second times, and laid over till the next regular meeting.

On motion, "an ordinance repealing ordinance Nos. 111, 112 and 117," was taken up for first reading.

On motion this ordinance was declared read for the first and second times and laid over till the next regular meeting.

Trustee Thompson offered resolution No. 750, "a resolution fixing the rates for water to be supplied to consumers in Glendale by the city of Glendale," which was read and on motion accepted and adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Grist, Lane, Tower, Williams. Noes—Thompson.

The rates thus fixed are as follows:

- To consumers within the city of Glendale: \$1.00 per month for the first 800 cubic feet used per month; for all in excess of 800 cubic feet, 6 cents for each 100 cubic feet. Minimum \$1.00 per month.
- To consumers without the city of Glendale, \$1.25 per month for the first 800 cubic feet used per month; for all in excess of 800 cubic feet, 7 cents for each 100 cubic feet. Minimum \$1.25 per month.

These rates apply only to the systems which have now become municipal plants, the Verdugo Springs Water Company and the Verdugo Pipe and Reservoir Company continuing as heretofore until transfer to the city shall have taken place.

Trustee Thompson took the view that the rate to consumers outside the city should remain as it now is, viz: \$1.50 per month; and that a reduction might be made as soon as the city could see its way clear to do so, according as the business might warrant it. On that ground alone he felt constrained to vote "no."

The manager of the public service department reported the sale of 114 water bonds at par with accrued interest to the Title Guarantee & Trust Co., and asked that the board ratify the sale. On motion of Trustee Tower, the board ratified the sale.

On motion of Trustee Tower the board ratified the purchase of the water plants of the Consolidated Water Company and the Miradero Water Company, purchase prices being as follows:

On motion the chairman of the board of trustees and the city attorney were instructed to make application to the state railroad commission for permission to transfer to the city of Glendale the pumping plant of the Miradero Water Company.

The manager of the public service department urged the necessity of the purchase of a Lung motor, to be at hand at all times for service in cases of accidents to persons connected with the electric plant, and other public service.

On motion he was authorized to make the purchase, payment to be made out of the funds of the public service department.

Trustee Thompson offered resolution No. 751, "a resolution fixing the salary of the city treasurer of the city of Glendale," which was read and on motion accepted and adopted.

On motion of Trustee Thompson the city treasurer was instructed to draw a warrant of \$100 to pay interest on note due the Bank of Glendale.

Demands were referred to the finance committee.

Demands previously referred to the finance committee were reported favorably by said committee and warrants were ordered drawn in payment of the same.

Reports for the month of September were received and placed on file from the following city officials: Building inspector, city clerk and city recorder.

Adjourned.
