

### READY FOR THE BIG RED CROSS DRIVE

**TWENTY-THREE TEAMS PREPARED TO OPEN RED CROSS WAR FUND CAMPAIGN ON MAY 20—INSTRUCTIONS TO TEAM CAPTAINS AND WORKERS**

The Red Cross War Fund Campaign for raising \$100,000,000.00 for expenditure by the National Red Cross in war relief, will begin May 20th and close May 27th.

Glendale's quota is \$6,000.00, and in view of the magnificent success of the Liberty Loan Drive, that amount and much more ought to be easily raised.

Subscriptions will be taken by canvassers on an official form of pledge card and an official receipt will be given for all money paid at the time of payment. The amount subscribed may be paid in full during the drive, or it may be paid in four equal installments—July 1, August 1, September 1, October 1. Twenty-five per cent of the amount of each subscription may be retained by the local chapter; seventy-five per cent goes to the National Society.

A definite plan of campaign has been mapped out by the National Society which can not be deviated from in any manner.

During the first four days of the drive canvassing will be done entirely from lists of names provided by the Committee, and no person will be authorized to canvass a name not assigned to him. Beginning with Friday, May 24th, promiscuous canvassing by authorized canvassers will be permissible.

The week of May 20th to May 27th has been designated by the President as "Red Cross Week."

Sunday, May 19th, has been designated as "Red Cross Sunday" and all ministers of this jurisdiction preach special sermons concerning the Red Cross, its purposes and its work.

A bulletin will be published at the close of the drive which will contain the name and address of each contributor, with the amount contributed. It will be the "Honor Roll" of the campaign.

#### Instructions to Team Captains

Please see that each team worker is properly instructed concerning his duties before he begins canvassing.

Tact and courtesy are essential under any and all circumstances.

Captains will issue to their team members the white cards with names and addresses of those to be solicited. Instruct your team members in the use of cards, pledge cards, receipt books and envelopes, in accordance with the campaign plan as outlined.

The name and address of the team member must appear on cover of receipt books and holder will be responsible for each and every receipt contained in the receipt book. If a mistake be made in issuing a receipt to a subscriber, tear out both the white and the yellow slips of the same number and return in envelope with daily report noting "void" on both slips.

On back of Pledge Card under heading, "Record of Collections," leave name and address blank. Under "Collections" have members insert date, amount collected and receipt number issued to subscriber for this amount. Receipts must be issued for amount collected only.

See that your team number is noted on every card issued to your team members.

If the subscriber wishes to pay his subscription in full when solicited, have your team members write "Paid in full" across the face of Pledge Card. Also see that your team number and name of solicitor appear on Pledge Card in blank spaces for same.

Each day the captain must collect from his team members the money collected, together with the duplicate receipts and Pledge Cards. Check up the account, see that it is correct and place in the team member's individual envelope. Enter the total of Pledges and cash of each solicitor in proper space on face of large yellow team captain envelope furnished for this purpose, together with solicitor's name. Fill in blank spaces at head of envelope correctly and return envelope to Red Cross headquarters. This is to be done each day of the drive, May 20th to 27th, inclusive.

#### Instructions to Team Workers

Cards with names and addresses of persons to be solicited are issued through Team Captains to the workers under him. Workers shall not solicit others during the first four days of the drive, but shall make every effort to secure a subscription from each person for whom a card is held.

#### Instructions for Filling Pledge Cards

A sample canvassing and report card is furnished each team captain and should be examined by all workers and followed closely. The name of each worker should be entered on lower edge of card before its return, with notation of success or failure to secure a subscription.

Write all names, addresses and amounts subscribed very carefully and plainly, securing correct spelling of the name.

Pledge cards must be filled in as indicated by the blanks. Team number and name of solicitor securing a pledge must be plainly written on the pledge. If amount subscribed is paid in full, so state by writing plainly on pledge side of card, "Paid in full." Should a person subscribe, say, \$10.00 and pay \$2.50 cash, which represents the first payment, the full amount of the pledge should be neatly written on pledge side of card and the first payment of \$2.50 on record side of card under heading of "Collections," with number of receipt issued and date.

An official receipt for cash collected shall be issued in all cases. The yellow duplicate will be retained in receipt book. Each authorized solicitor will have in his possession an official receipt book, for which he will receipt to his captain. The captain receipts to the cashier for all books issued to a team.

An entry of each transaction will be made on the solicitor's envelope provided for the purpose, which is to be returned to the team captain each day.

Each team of ten workers will have approximately 100 persons to solicit, each represented by a card. The card canvass should be completed on the first four days of the drive, and ALL CARDS WILL BE RETURNED TO HEADQUARTERS THROUGH TEAM CAPTAINS.

In Los Angeles one day's pay from every employed person is expected by the campaign committee. Glendale should not expect less. An effort should be made to secure subscriptions of larger sums. Ten dollars, at least, should be expected from every person in comfortable circumstances and more in proportion from those classed as wealthy.

It is important that each worker's name should be the first entered on the report envelope with the amount of pledge. Thus armed you can consistently "face the music," knowing that you have "done your bit."

#### Luncheons

A luncheon will be given at the Masonic Temple each day during the drive between twelve and one o'clock, except Saturday, May 27th, with 30-minute talks by able and interesting speakers. All Captains should attend these luncheons with as many of the workers as can be there. Fifty lunch tickets will be furnished each Captain, ten for each day. These tickets are to be sold to as many of the team members as can attend, and a report of the tickets sold to be made to J. G. Hunchberger, Chairman of the Luncheon Committee, two days in advance. For example, for Monday and Tuesday luncheons those wishing to attend should purchase tickets Saturday, May 18th, and for the remaining days get orders in early in order that the ladies in charge can intelligently provide for same. Others may purchase tickets and attend the luncheons up to the capacity of the tables.

### REDUCE COUNTY TAX LEVY

**L. A. COUNTY SUPERVISORS' FINANCE COMMITTEE CUTS DOWN EXPENSES FOR THE COMING YEAR**

### WILSON OPPOSES INVESTIGATION

**PRESIDENT RENEWS HIS PROTESTS AGAINST SENATE PROBE IN VIEW OF JUSTICE DEPT. INVESTIGATION**

WASHINGTON, May 16.—President Wilson today renewed his emphatic protest against the Senate Aircraft investigation. He told Senator Thompson of Kansas that in view of the appointment of Charles E. Hughes to assist the Department of Justice investigation he considered the Senate probe unnecessary and urged Senator Thompson to help defeat the proposition.

### COMPLETE AUSTRO-GERMAN TREATY

ZURICH, May 16.—Austrian and German diplomatic officials arrived in Berlin today to take up the Austro-German treaty discussed by the Kaiser and Emperor Karl. The treaty, which is to be of twenty-five years' duration, covers political, economic and military arrangements.

### MOBILIZE COUNTRY'S INDUSTRIAL FACILITIES

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The War Industries Board today appointed Charles A. Otis, president of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, to undertake a survey of the country's industrial facilities. The plan is to map out the country into zones corresponding with the Federal Reserve districts and make each an independent industrial unit for war work.

### ITALIAN WARSHIP PENETRATES POLA HARBOR

ROME, May 16.—It is officially announced that an Italian warship successfully penetrated Pola harbor, an Austrian naval base, and torpedoed a large Austrian battleship.

### HINDENBURG'S BIG WAR MACHINE READY FOR SMASH

ON THE BRITISH FRONT, May 16.—Nearly a million and a quarter rested or fresh German infantrymen are on the West Front ready for immediate battle. Hindenburg's patched-up war machine is said to be in running condition. A million and a half are facing the British, French and Americans in the actual line and a million more are in reserve. The front is comparatively quiet. North of Kemmel the French have regained Hill 44. The armies are jostling each other for positions, the Germans desperately eager to win a few advantageous points before the big smash. Aviators on both sides are busy.

### AMERICAN AVIATORS DOWN THREE ENEMY PLANES

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN LORRAINE, May 15.—American aviators downed three German planes today. Capt. Marr, a California aviator, poured a machine gun volley into one plane and sent it crashing to the earth. Capt. Peterson later downed two German fliers in a fight behind the German lines.

### TODAY'S LIST INCLUDES EIGHT KILLED IN ACTION

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Today's casualty list includes eight killed in action, four dead from wounds, four dead of disease, one accidentally killed, one death from another cause, fourteen missing, four severely wounded and fifteen slightly wounded.

### ARTILLERY ACTIVE ON WEST FRONT

LONDON, May 16.—Allied and German artillery dueling continues practically all along the West Front, Field Marshall Haig reported. The gun fire is particularly heavy in the Somme and Ancre valleys, east of Arras, and on the north battle front.

### GERMAN ABOLISHED

**HIGH SCHOOL TRUSTEES DECIDE TO SUSPEND THE TEACHING OF THAT LANGUAGE**

Two important rulings were made by the Board of Trustees of Glendale Union High School at their meeting Tuesday evening. One was the abolition of the teaching of German in the school after May 17th, when examinations will be had and credits given the pupils who have been studying that language. The period which has been given to German will be devoted during the remainder of the year to the study of the German ideas which led to the war. This action by the Board appears to meet with the approbation of all loyal citizens.

The Board also decided to close the school Friday, May 31st, as well as Thursday, May 30th, which is Memorial Day, a national holiday. This is in line with action taken by other school boards of Southern California.

### LEGAL MATTERS

**CITY ATTORNEY DISPOSES OF SEVERAL MATTERS WHICH HAVE BEEN PENDING**

A case which has hung fire for nearly four years, or since 1914, was disposed of Tuesday, the decision being in favor of the defendant, the City of Glendale, as already recorded in this paper. It was a piece of litigation inherited from the former city of Tropic. The suit was brought by Daisy Mason, who claimed damages of \$10,350 for injuries received from a fall over rocks left in the street at the junction of San Fernando and Brand boulevards. The boulevard improvements were made in 1914 and suit for damages was not instituted until about a year after the alleged injuries were received, according to the report of the case made by City Attorney W. E. Evans, who represented the City in association with Attorney Claud Van Etten, when the suit was heard before Judge Duhurst of Department 3, Superior Court, last Tuesday. Full dockets and various other hindrances prevented the case from coming to trial before. Attorney M. O. Graves represented the plaintiff, Miss Mason.

City Attorney Evans also states that the papers are now completed for the transfer of the water system which supplied the former city of Tropic, which is being purchased by the city. Yesterday application was filed with the Railroad Commission for a permit to make the transfer.

### HAVE YOU VOLUNTEERED?

Next week is the special Red Cross week when a drive will be made to secure \$100,000,000., to continue the work of the American Red Cross. Glendale is expected to get at least six thousand dollars. Probably she will make it a round ten thousand.

**LINCOLN AVENUE**

**J. F. LILLY MAKES ANOTHER SUGGESTION IN STREET NAMING**

Editor Glendale Evening News:  
 I find that there is a widespread sentiment in favor of giving to Brand boulevard a new name that is distinctive and will mean something from an historical or sentimental standpoint, and which at the same time can be used, not only through Glendale, but which may also be adopted in Los Angeles, thereby making one great highway extending almost from the heart of Los Angeles to the mountains.

In discussing the matter with those who occupy the same office with me, we were of the opinion that no better name could be selected than that of "Lincoln avenue." To every true American, whatever his political faith, this name has an especial appeal. Fortunately, it has so far been used only upon short and comparatively remote streets in both Glendale and Los Angeles, so that it would involve no particular sacrifice to give up the name where already used in both cities. Our own Lincoln avenue is at the remote eastern part of Glendale, and is only one block long. Lincoln avenue in Los Angeles is a short street in the neighborhood of Occidental College, and is almost unpopulated.

Let both Los Angeles and Glendale give other names to these short streets, and adopt the name of Lincoln avenue for the splendid boulevard which is to connect the two municipalities, and which is destined to become one of the most widely used avenues in Southern California.

This avenue will have scenic beauty that will give to it a high place among the beautiful roads of this favored region.

Under this plan it would be extremely simple to direct anyone to Glendale, for they would only need to go out Second street a short distance to where it joins the through boulevard, after which the course would be almost without angles. 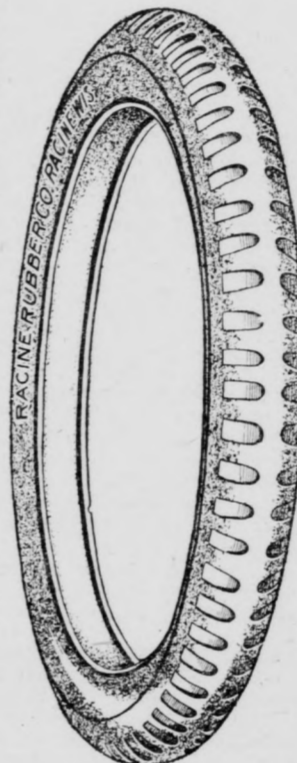

## ORDINANCE NO. 332

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SAID CITY TO CALL AN ELECTION IN THAT PART OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE CONTAINED WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF A PROPOSED MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT, TO BE KNOWN AS "MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 2, OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE," FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO SAID QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT THE PROPOSITION OF AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS OF SUCH DISTRICT.

Whereas, a petition was filed in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Glendale on the 4th day of April, 1918, requesting that proceedings be taken in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled, "An Act to Provide for the Formation of Districts within Municipalities, for the Acquisition or Construction of Public Improvements, Works and Public Utilities therein for the Issuance, Sale, and Payment of Bonds of such District to meet the Cost of such Improvements, and for the Acquisition or Construction of such Improvements," approved April 20th, 1915, for the purpose of acquiring and constructing works for distributing and supplying electricity to the inhabitants of such district for lighting, heating, power and all other useful purposes, including the acquisition of lands, easements, rights of way, structures, poles, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, wires, fixtures, transformers, meters, services, apparatus, and all other property, and the construction of mains and lines and other works necessary for such purposes, and

Whereas, it appears and is hereby found that said petition is signed by not less than ten (10) per cent of the qualified electors residing in the territory which is proposed to be formed into the said Municipal Improvement District, and

Whereas, the public interest and necessity require that proceedings be taken as requested in said petition;

Now Therefore, the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale to call an election in that certain proposed Municipal Improvement District having boundaries as hereinafter described, or as may be changed in the manner provided in the aforesaid Act, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District the proposition of authorizing the issuance and sale of bonds of such district in the manner prescribed in said Act, approved April 20th, 1915, for the purpose of acquiring and constructing works for distributing and supplying electricity to the inhabitants of such district for lighting, heating, power and all other useful purposes, including the acquisition of lands, easements, rights of way, structures, poles, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, wires, fixtures, transformers, meters, services, apparatus, and all other property, and the construction of mains, and lines and other works necessary for such purposes.

SECTION 2. That the exterior boundaries of the proposed Municipal Improvement District to be known as Municipal Improvement District No. 2, of the City of Glendale, are bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest corner of Lot 45 of Watts' Subdivision of a part of the Rancho San Rafael, as per map recorded in Book 5, pages 200-201 of Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, California, said corner being situated upon the south line of that certain 97.2 acre tract of land allotted to Julio Verdugo, as shown on the map filed in District Court case No. 1621 of aforesaid Los Angeles County; thence westerly along the south line of said 97.20 acre tract of land to the southwest corner thereof; thence northerly along the westerly line of said 97.20 acre tract of land to the southeast corner of Lot 1 of the "Subdivision of Lot 34 of Watts' Subdivision of a part of the Rancho San Rafael," as per map recorded in Book 36, Page 4, Miscellaneous Records of aforesaid Los Angeles County; thence westerly along the southerly lines of Lots 1, 2, and 3 of said subdivision, to the southwest corner of said Lot 3; thence southerly along the westerly line of said Subdivision to a point midway between the center lines of Ninth Street and Acacia Avenue (formerly Tenth Street); thence westerly along a line midway between the center lines of said Ninth Street and Acacia Avenue to the easterly line of "E. S. Butterfield's Subdivision," as per map of same recorded in Book 18, page 29, Miscellaneous Records of aforesaid Los Angeles County; thence along the easterly line of last mentioned Subdivision to the southerly line of Lot 9 of said "E. S. Butterfield's Subdivision," produced easterly; thence along the production of, and along the southerly line of said Lot 9, and along the southerly line of Lot 10 of said Subdivision and its production westerly, to the westerly line of Glendale Avenue; thence along the westerly line of Glendale Avenue to a point midway between the north and south lines of Lot 30 of "Watts' Subdivision of a part of the Rancho San Rafael as afore-referred to; thence

westerly along a line drawn midway between the north and south lines of Lots 30 and 29 of said Watts' Subdivision, and the production westerly of said line, to the center line of Central Avenue; thence northerly along said center line of Central Avenue to its intersection with the northerly line of the aforesaid subdivision; thence westerly along said north line of Watts' Subdivision to the southwest corner of Lot 20 of J. W. Inler's Replat, as per map recorded in Book 10, page 35 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County; thence westerly to the southeast corner of Lot 47 of Riverdale Heights, as per map recorded in Book 4, page 1 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County; thence westerly along the south line of said Lot 47 to the southwest corner thereof; thence northerly along the west line of said lot to the northwest corner thereof; thence westerly along the north line of Lots 49, 51, 53, and 55 of said Riverdale Heights and the westerly prolongation thereof to its intersection with the easterly boundary line of the territory annexed to the city of Los Angeles by the election of February 18, 1910; thence southeasterly along said easterly boundary line of the City of Los Angeles, following the various courses and curves thereof to a point where said easterly boundary line is intersected by the southwesterly prolongation of the southeasterly line of Block F of the Santa Eulalia Tract, Sheet No. 1, as per map recorded in Book 16, pages 78 and 79 of Maps, Records of Los Angeles County; thence northeasterly along said southwesterly prolonged line to the most southerly corner of said Block F; thence northeasterly along the southeasterly line of said Block F and the northeasterly prolongation of said southeasterly line of said Block F of the Santa Eulalia Tract, Sheet No. 1, to a point situated 183 feet northeasterly, measured at right angles from the center line of San Fernando Road as said center line is shown on County Surveyor's Map No. 7268 of said road on file in the office of the County Surveyor of said Los Angeles County; thence northwesterly parallel with said center line of San Fernando Road to the easterly line of Glendale Avenue as shown on Santa Eulalia Tract, Sheet No. 1, aforesaid; thence north 15 degrees, 33 minutes, 15 seconds east parallel with the east line of Lot D of said Tract and distant therefrom 66 feet to the southerly line of Watts' Subdivision of a part of the Rancho San Rafael as aforesaid; thence easterly along said southerly line of Watts' Subdivision to the southwest corner of aforesaid Lot 45 of Watts' Subdivision; thence northerly following the various courses of the westerly boundary of said Lot 45 to the northwest corner thereof, being the point of beginning. The same being all that territory included within the city boundary lines of the former City of Tropic as incorporated on March 7, 1911;

That the proposed improvement in said District is the acquisition and construction of works for distributing and supplying electricity to the inhabitants of such district for lighting, heating, power and all other useful purposes, including the acquisition of lands, easements, rights of way, structures, poles, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, wires, fixtures, transformers, meters, services, apparatus, and all other property, and the construction of mains and lines and other works necessary for such purposes; that the estimated cost of said proposed improvement is Forty-three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$43,600), and the estimated amount of the incidental expenses in connection with said improvement is Four Hundred Dollars (\$400).

That on the 4th day of June, 1918, an election will be called in said District for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters thereof the proposition of incurring indebtedness by the issuance of bonds of such district to pay the cost and expenses of said proposed improvements;

That a map showing the exterior boundaries of said District with relation to the territory immediately contiguous thereto, and a general description of the proposed improvement are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Glendale;

That the 23rd day of May, 1918, at eight o'clock p. m. in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, in the City of Glendale (that being the place where the regular meetings of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale are held), is hereby fixed as the date, hour, and place for the hearing of protests which shall be in writing, and filed with the Clerk of said Board of Trustees at or before said time of hearing, as provided for by said Act, approved April 20th, 1915.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this ordinance by a unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees of said City, and cause the same to be published once a day for six days in the Glendale Evening News, a daily newspaper, printed, published and circulated in the City of Glendale and in said District.

## ACTIVITIES OF CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS IN WORLD WAR RELIEF WORK

(Contributed)

There are many splendid organizations for war relief throughout the country and there is none more effectual than that in which the members of the branch Christian Science churches are engaged in connection with the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

This movement was organized almost two and one-half years before the United States joined the Allies in the war with Germany, in October, 1914. At that time a request came from the Mother Church for funds for war relief work, and over \$100,000 was contributed.

The relief work was handled by William D. McCracken, C. S. B., of Boston through committees in England, Canada, Australia, Jamaica, Germany, France, Italy, Armenia, Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Turkey in Asia and Mexico, until by the end of May, 1917, little more than a month after war was declared, a fund approximating \$300,000 had been disbursed.

Relief work done in countries where the Mother Church had no committees of Christian Scientists, such as Armenia, Belgium, Lithuania, Poland and Serbia, was carried on through responsible organizations.

At all times contributions to the fund from branch churches or individuals reached those for whom they were intended without cost of administration and "The far-reaching humanitarian results obtained in this work," according to the directors of the Mother Church, "were limited only by the amounts at the disposal of the committees."

When war was declared it became necessary to broaden the work and in November, 1917, came the organization known as The Christian Science War Comforts Committee, having as its purpose the manufacture and shipping of garments needed by the men in the Army and Navy and for civilian relief in the countries affected by the war.

A branch of this War Comforts Committee was organized some time ago by individual members of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Glendale, and has recently moved to new headquarters at 1017 West Broadway, where the work of preparing garments for French and Belgian relief and knitted garments for the soldiers and sailors in the service is now under way. Any information in regard to the work may be obtained at the above address.

While keenly mindful of the physical needs of humanity at this great crisis in the world's history, as these activities indicate, Christian Scientists place this work second in importance to the business of "praying without ceasing." The directors of the Mother Church, in a recent issue of the Christian Science Sentinel, state in this connection that these "activities can only supplement the primary metaphysical responsibilities for which their membership in the Church of Christ, Scientist, stands, and that prayer without ceasing, based upon the realization and demonstration of the facts of Divine Science, is the hope of the world."

Another department of war relief work instituted by the board of Directors of the Mother Church at Boston is the Welfare Work now being established in all the large camps and cantonments.

Clarence M. McDaniel of Santa Barbara has been chosen to take charge of this work at Camp Kearny, where a Christian Science reading room has been established. While waiting for his headquarters to be made ready Mr. McDaniel was given a welcome and desk space in the Y. M. C. A. administration building.

For the convenience of the many young men of the Christian Science faith in all parts of the world who are enlisted in the service of their country, a special vest pocket edition of the Christian Science text book, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, bound in khaki-colored leather, is now being put out by the Christian Science Publishing Society in Boston, Mass.
