Now, many years past, the prohibition on the importation of woollens, the production of which countries besides Great Britain and its dependencies, had been removed; and, therefore, the woollens of Great Britain stood in no favor, so far as the policy of the government of Portugal was concerned, over the woollens of other countries.

On the fifteenth, Mr. Hume brought forward his motion to adopt measures for withdrawing the settlement at Sierra Leone, which he urged had been a total failure. He made a statement of the frightful morality which had carried off the population there in different years. After a debate, in which General Gascoyne made a worthless attack on the friends of negro emancipation, Mr. Hume withdrew his resolution, and moved for the appointment of a Committee of Enquiry, which was agreed to.

Duty on Sugar.—It will be seen by the Liverpool Times "that the Chancellor of the Exchequer has at length been induced to consent to a slight and partial reduction in the present extravagant duties on sugar. This reduction although it only applies to the coarser kinds, and although it is to be counterbalanced by an increase of the duty on rum, is good so far as it goes, and will, we hope, lead in a short time to a general revision of the sugar duties, which are at present ruinous to the producers, and extremely burdensome to the consumers of that article.

Prince Frederica of the Netherlands is said to have declared, with regard to Greece, that he has no intention of accepting a crown which Prince Leopold has refused. Prince Emilius of Darmstadt is now spoken of as the new sovereign.

Mr. Robinson admitted that the monopoly of the Oporto Wine Company was a monstrous evil, and that it would be highly desirable, if practicable, to enter into a more extended commercial intercourse with France, but thought this could hardly be accomplished at present, and that it was necessary to act with the greatest caution and consideration, as British manufacturers were almost exclusively consumed in Portugal, and that country formed the market for one-third of the fish cured in Newfoundland, which was admitted at a rate of duty ten per cent. lower than the fish of other countries.

The Algemeine Zeitung of the 2d inst. contains an announcement of the junction of Neapolitan with the French fleet in the Meditated attack upon Algiers, which we had previously heard from others quarters.

An English corvette having gone to Oran to take his Britannic Majesty's Vice-Consul on board, the Dey would not allow this agent to embark. It appears that orders in this respect. The Journal de Rouen, gives some further particulars of the fires in the

partments of Cavados and La Manche from which it appears that since the 15th of April, more than 400 houses have been burnt between Avanches and Mere. The peasantry were greatly excited, and had apprehended several individuals, supposed to be the incendiaries.  
Private accounts from Constantinople state, that differences have arisen between the French Ambassador and the Reis Effendi on the subject of the expedition against Algiers. It was rumored at Constantinople that the Ambassador was about to proceed on a special mission to Egypt.

Berlin, June 6.—A steam carriage is to ply between Dresden and Leipzig, and to perform the journey in five hours. The hurricanes of the 25th May threw down in the circle of Krossen 160 houses, three windmills, and a church. 400 sheep and oxen and two men were killed, and many received serious injury. Immense damage is done to the forests, and several thousand fruit trees destroyed.

ATROCIOUS PIRACY AND MURDER.—The Mygale's ship *Ahali*, Sierra Leone, May 31st.—I have the honor to acquaint you that the Hon. Company's schooner *St. Helena*, arrived here this day on her way to England, with despatches from Commodore Collier. She was attacked on the 6th April, in lat. 1, 30, south, long. 90, west, by a piratical felucca under French colours, and manned with a crew of from 40 to 50 men of all nations, who, I regret hear, murdered Captain Harrison, the chief officer, and 12 of the crew, besides Dr. Waddle, of the Hon. Company's medical service; and plundered the vessel of all money that could be found on board, a great deal of her cargo, cut away her masts, scuttled the vessel in order to sink her, and after they left her, fired many shot through her, and abandoned her, not knowing that the carpenter and five men were left on board concealed, by whose exertions the vessel has been saved, and brought into this port. I am sorry that the mail, the Commodore's despatches, and almost all the letters, appear to have been destroyed, at least they are no where to be found.

PROCLAMATION:  
CHARLES, by the Grace of God King of France and Navarre. To all whom these present shall come, greeting:  
Frenchmen! The last Chamber of Deputies have misconceived my intentions. I had a right to calculate on their concurrence in accomplishing the good I mediated. It was refused me. As the father of my people, my heart is affected at this: as King, I am offended.—I pronounced the dissolution of the Chambers.  
Frenchmen! Your prosperity is my glory! your happiness is mine. At the moment when the electoral colleges are to open in every part of my kingdom, it is right that you should listen to the voice of your King.  
To maintain the Constitution and the institution which are founded upon it, has been and always will be the end of my efforts. But to attain this end, I must act freely, and cause to be respected, the sacred immunities which appertain to my crown.  
These constitute the guarantee of public repose and your liberties. The nature of the government would be changed if culpable encroachment should enfeeble my prerogatives, and I should be false to my oath were I to permit it.  
Under the shade of the government, France has become flourishing and free. She owes to it her privileges, her credit, and her industry. France finds nothing to envy in other states, and has nothing to desire but the preservation of the rights she possesses.  
Be firm then, for your rights. I associate them with my own, and will protect them with equal solicitude.  
Be not seduced by the insidious words of the enemies of your repose. Repel with indignation the suspicious and hypocritical fears which shake public confidence, and are intended to excite serious disorders. The designs of those who propagate these false apprehensions, shall be overthrown before my immovable resolution. Your security and your interests shall no more be compromised than your liberties. I guard them equally.

Electors! Hasten to your Colleges. Let not a culpable negligence prevent your attendance. Let the same sentiments animate you, for under the same banner you rally!  
It is your King who demands it: it is your father who calls you.  
Fulfill your duties: I shall accomplish mine.
