

NOVELTIES FOR 1897-98.

The New Hardy Yellow Climbing Rose YELLOW RAMBLER, (Aglaia.)

We expect to have a good stock of strong fieldgrown plants, this variety, for the coming season, and we strongly recommend the Yeliow Rambler as being one of the most important introductions of recent years, it being the only yeliow climbing rose yet known that has any hardness whatever. In our nurseries the past winter unprotected yearing plants of the Yeliow Rambler withstood a temperature of *ten degrees below zero* without injury It is a very strong and vigorous grower, naking shoots 8-10 ft. high in a season, after becoming well established. It blooms in splendid large clusters after the manner of Crimson Rambler, and has frequently produced as many as 120 to 150 blossoms in a truss. It was originated by the well known German rosarian. Peter Lambert, who appointed us his azents for propagating and introducing it in this country, and we are the only firm to whom the originator sent any of his stock.

Lord Penzance's Hybrid Sweet Briars.

San Jose Scale Scare.

We consider the proposed law, given below, ill advised and dangerous to the business interests of both fruit growers and nurserymen. This law, if enacted, is likely to prove a greater pest than the San Jose Scale it seeks to restrict. We believe the best safe guard against injurious insects is the vigilence of fruit growers and nurserymen on their own premises. The scare now passing over the country concerning the San Jose Scale is aimost certain to lead to the enactment of a federal law, to restrict the spread of injurious insects, and if we must submit to such legislation, the best course for nurserymen to pursue is to see that the proposed law is properly amended before its passage.—W. F. H.

Convention of Entomologists and Fruit Growers at Washington-Seventeen States Represented.

(From the National Nurseryman.)

Pursuant to the call of the Ohio Horticultural Society, delegates frcm state horticultural societies generally assembled at the Ebbitt House, Washington, D. C., on March 5th to consider and recommend federal and state legislation for preventing the introduction or diffusion of noxious insects and fungi in the United States.

The following committee on legislation which was afterward made permanent, was appointed: William B. Alwood, Virginia; John Van Lindley, North Carolina; C. M. Hooker, New York; E. M. Wardall, California; E. S. Goff, Wisconsin; D. D. Denise, New Jersey; F. M. Webster, O.; C. M. Hobbs, Ind. This committee reported resolutions upon which was based the bill published below, the passage of which will be urged upon congress at the first opportunity:

AN ACT.

To Provide for the Inspection and Treatment of Trees, Plants, Buds, Cuttings, Grafts, Scions, Nursery Stock and Fruit, Imported into the United States, and for the Inspection and Treatment of Trees, Plants, Buds, Cuttings, Grafts, Scions and Nursery Stock Grown Within the United States, Which Becomes a Subject to Inter-State Commerce.

SECTION I.—BE IT ENACTED BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTA-TIVES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, That the Secretary of Agriculture be,

That the Secretary of Agriculture be, and he is hereby, authorized at the expense of the owner or owners to place and retain in quarantine all trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, nursery stock and fruit, imported into the United States at such ports as he may designate for such purposes, and under such conditions as he may, by regulation prescribe, and that he may appoint inspectors for the purpose of examining such trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, nursery stock and fruit for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are infected by any dangerously injurious insect or disease, the importation of which will be prejudicial to the horticultural interests of the United States, and provide for the treatment of such when found necessary.

SEC. 2. That when such trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, nursery stock and fruit shall be determined to be infested with any dangerously injurious insect or disease they shall be treated at the expense of the owner or owners in accordance with the regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture, or they shall be destroyed in case their condition is such as to warrant such destruction; but an appeal may be taken from the decision of the inspector to the Secretary of Agriculture if such appeal is taken within three days after such inspection; and the decision of the Secretary of Agriculture shall be final.

SEC. 3. That when such inspection shall show that such trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, nursery stock and fruit are apparently free from dangerously injurious insects or diseases, a certificate to this effect, made in accordance with the regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture, shall be issued to the owner or owners thereof by said inspector and this certificate shall operate to release all the objects above specified, when duly stamped or labeled with the same from

further quarantine or restriction either at the said port of entry or in inter-state commerce. Any person who shall forge, counterfeit, or knowingly alter, deface, or destroy any of the marks, stamps, or certificates, provided for in the regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture, on any such trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, nursery stock or fruit, or who shall forge, counterfeit, or knowingly or wrongfully alter, deface or destroy any certificate as provided for in said regulations, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

SEC. 4. That whenever it shall appear to the Secretary of Agriculture that any foreign country shall have provided proper and competent inspection and treatment, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, for the objects above specified as being subject to inspection and treatment, he may, by proclamation or otherwise, accept such inspection and treatment in lieu of inspection performed by officers appointed by himself, which acceptance or proclamation by the Secretary of Agriculture shall receive such articles specified in the foregoing section of this Act, when properly stamped or labeled, from further quarantine or restriction.

SEC. 5. That the Secretary of Agriculture shall cause to be inspected and properly treated at the expense of the owner or owners, prior to their shipment, all trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions, or nursery stock which are about to be transported from one state or territsry or the District of Columbia, into another state or territory or the District of Columbia.

SEC. 6. That the said examination shall be made in the manner provided by the rules and regulations prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture, and that after such examination the trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts scions or nursery stock found to be apparently free from dangerously injurious insects or diseases shall be marked, stamped or labeled for identification, as may be provided for by said rules and regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture, and when so stamped or labeled they shall not be subject to further quarantine or restriction in interstate commerce. Any person who shall forge, counterfeit or knowingly alter, deface or destroy any of the marks, stamps or said devices provided for in the regulations of the Secretary of Agriculture (Continued on page 12.)

We have for the past seventeen years offered in assorted lots, at St. Louis, in Spring, such stock as we had in surplus. Herein is a schedule of what we now have in St. Louis, Council Bluffs, Rochester and Philadelphia for immediate shipment. The stock is exclusively our own growing at Huntsville, Alabama, fresh dug this Spring, and packed in the best manner, in moss, and warranted in fine condition. Everything is fine of the grade, with full fibrous roots, and not culled, as we adhere to a strict system of grading.

BELOW THE BLIZZARD LINE.

Our Nurseries are far enough south to escape the severe freezing weather. Everything is bright, green and fresh—sound to the tips. Nearly all the sorts offered are standard sorts, such as most nurserymen can use in assortment with their own growing. Orders should be sent in as soon as possible; but the stock need not be shipped until wanted, as we are prepared to hold it in good condition. We have nothing for sale not offered on this list.

It will be noticed by some of our correspondents that we have refused orders the past season for several articles listed. Our fear of overselling, and some countermands, account for this. We ask attention to the small-sized trees offered, for transplanting into nursery rows. All of the small trees, as well as the large ones, are very nicely rooted, and everything is young, smooth and bright.

We can refer to nurserymen who have bought of us in nearly every State and Territory. We have given satisfaction, and guarantee it for these shipments.

TERMS:—Cash with order, or 30 to 60 days from date of shipment to responsible prompt-paying parties. In box lots the price of boxes is included, but the price of boxes on orders filled from bulk is extra. The cost of drayage will be charged in both cases.

For convenience in telegraphing, a cipher is given. The cipher word stands only for one box in cases where there are more than one in the same assortment.

on any such trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions and nursery stock, or who shall forge, counterfeit or knowingly or wrongfully alter, deface or destroy any certificate provided for in said regulations shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or by both such punishments at the discretion of the court.

SEC. 7. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to transport from one state or territory or the District of Columbia, into any other state or territory or the District of Columbia, or for any person, persons, or corporation to deliver to any other person, per-sons or corporation or to the postal ser vice of the United States, except for scientific purposes by permission or direction of the Secretary of Agriculture, for transportation from one state or territory or the District of Columbia into any other state or territory or the District of Columbia any trees, plants, buds, cuttings, grafts, scions or nursery stock which have not been examined in accordance with the provisions in Sections 5 and 6 of this Act, or which on said examination have

been declared by the inspector to be dangerously infested with injurious insects or diseases. Any person, persons or corporation violating the provisions of this Section shall be punished for such offense as provided in Section 6 of this Act.

SEC. 8. That whenever it shall appear to the Secretary of Agriculture that any state, territory, district, corporation, firm or person shall have provided proper and competent inspection and treatment in accordance with the provisions of this Act for the objects above specified as being subject to inspection and treatment in lieu of inspection and treatment by officers appointed by himself, which acceptation or proclamation by the said Secretary of Agriculture, shall relieve all such articles specified in Section 5, 6 and 7 of this Act, when properly stamped and labeled, from further quarantine or restrictions in inter-state commerce.

SEC. 9. That the sum of fifty thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury of the United not otherwise appropriated to carry into effect the provisions of this act.

SEC. 10. This law shall take effect on and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven.

Terms and Conditions Governing Quotations in the Price List of the Huntsville Wholesale Nurseries.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniformly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filed at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of ~ e variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

until about the first of March. We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buyt rees to sell again. You can depend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit directions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the contrary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows:

Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.—Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS.—We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substitution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the condition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

TERMS.—Cash. When desired, we will allow 30 to 60 days from date of shipment, to responsible.

prompt-paying customers. Parties with whom we have had no business transactions, will save time by sending reference, with order. We wish it expressly understood that payment is expected from the first collections made, and the time named is only intended as so many days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish tolay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

FORMS OF PAYMENT.—All bills are payable a; the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, however, accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no banking, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with exchange", or add ¼ of one cent. to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection. When graded by height or caliper, we include the lower number and exclude the higher. Instance: in a grade of 4 to 5 feet trees, the 4 feet trees are included, but not the 5 feet trees. If 5 feet trees are wanted, the 5 to 6 feet grade must be ordered.

GUARANTEE OF GENUINENESS.—While we exercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees, etc., true to label, and hold ourselves in readiness, on proper proof, to replace all trees, etc.. that may prove untrue to label, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, it is mutually understood and agreed to, between the purchaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of genuineness shall in no case make us liable for any sum greater than that originally received for said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue.

Inderess Shain in the case make us have for any said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue. ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by telegraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or protected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes in which they are packed, without notice of complaint to us and without our orders for their disposition


