BELGIAN-DUTCH PACT MAY BE FAILURE

Government Moves to Restore Financial Position of France

Part of Loan Which Will Be Raised Will Be Used to Retire Paper Money Now in Circulation-Importation Restrictions

Paris, Jan. 30.—M. Francois Marsal, the Minister of Finance, placed before the Cabinet at its meeting to day various questions having to do with the forthcoming loan. He also submitted his ideas of the principles on which an international conference on exchange should be based.

Paris, Jan. 30.—(Associated Press) —An important part of the proceeds of the new French loan will be applied to the retirement of paper in circulation. This will be one of the essential features of the Government's plan to improve the financial situation of France, the Associated Press is able to say.

Year's Timber Business Shows Large Increases

vey of forest production in British Columbia for the year 1919 and now issued for publication by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, are the noteworthy increases in the total value of the industry, the waterborne lumber shipments and the value of pulp and er sold. Although complete returns are not yet to hand for all the forest products industries the tentative estimate indicates that the total figures will not be less than \$62,000,000 as against

\$54,000,000 in 1918. Waterborne shipments show an advance over the pre-ceding year of 17,000,000, while the value of pulp and paper sold leapt from \$10,517,250 in 1918 to \$12,554,257 last year.

The Minister estimates the total log scale for the Province for the year just closed at 1,758,329,995 feet, as compared with 1,761,184,406 feet in compared with 1,761,184,406 feet in the preceding year. Increases are recorded in Kamioops and Fort George districts and on Vancouver Island, while decreases are shown in Cranbrook, Nelson, Vernon, Vancouver and Prince Rupert sections. The falling off in the last named district, of course, is largely due to the cessation of aeroplane spruce cutting operations, while labor difficulties and the extremely disastrous fire season are cited as the responsible factors which tended to reduce operations and output in other localities.

Demand For Lumber. Washington, Jan. 30.—Accrued interest on American loans to European countries totals approximately \$325,-000,000, according to a table submitted yesterday to the House Ways and Means Committee by the Treasury Department, which plans to defer collection for a few years pending reconstruction.

Demand For Lumber.

Detailed figures in relation to the forest product industries so far tabulated by the Department indicate that the value of lumber cut will amount to not less than \$31,000,000, the shingle industry \$12,801,584 and the box industry \$2,142,000. The report explains that the difficulty of both lumber and shingle manufacturers has been to cope with the demands made upon them.

The cessation of building operations furing the war years brought about a lively demand for all lines of building materials last year, and it is pointed out that it would have been much greater if labor troubles had not developed early in the season both in Prairie and Eastern Canadian centres. Prairie and Lastern Camban demand cemeraturers are now face to face with a heavy buying year, whereas depleted stocks emphasize more than ever the difficulties ahead unless there is a very much larger production.

New York, Jan. 30.—Day laborers employed in the plants of the United States Steel Corporation have been granted a ten per cent. wage increase, effective February 1, Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the Corporation, announced here last night. The wage rates of other workers employed by the Corporation will be "equitably adjusted," he said. The new rate for laborers will be \$5.08, instead of \$4.62, for a ten-hour day, including two hours' overtime.

On this basis the increase would expand the payroll of the Corporation by about \$24,000,000 a year, which is the equivalent of nearly five per cent. of the common stock. With the present increase included the annual payroll will be brought up to more than \$475,000,000.

SAYS IRISH ARE FOR A REPUBLIC

Arthur Henderson Speaks of Sentiment He Found in Island

London, Jan. 30. — (Canadiain Press).—Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson. Labor leader, speaking on his return from Ireland, where he and several colleagues made a ten-day tour of inspection and inquiry, says the people there frankly declare for an independent republic.

This spirit, he says, is not confined to Dublin, but it is almost universal, the Prime Minister's proposal being regarded with little short of contempt.

Duncan, Jan. 30.-A movement on foot to establish a woolen industry on Vancouver Island. A great volume ool passes through the hands of Vancouver Island Flockmasters' been assembled at Duncan during the past few years. A committee has been gathering data and the probability is that a joint stock company will be formed, and there is a strong possibility that Vancouver Island tweed may be on the market before long.

W. M. Cochrane, formerly of Cowichan, and now of Victoria, who has had experience and possesses a thorough knowledge of woolen mills, if giving the committee the benefit of his knowledge, both of the practical and the financial side of the woolen industry Mr. Cochrane and his people for generations have owned woolen mills in Scotland, and his help is proving invaluable.

Local wool often has been sold in Eastern Canada and the Eastern States. Vancouver city has knitting mills, but the yarn is bought from the states.

RAILWAY BLOCKED IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Severe Winter Endangers People's Lives; Provisions Are Running Low

Halifax, Jan. 30.—Bearing marks of a terrific and prolonged battle with the elements, Captain Pettipas, of the schooner Itasca, and Captain Shaw, of the schooner Cecil I. Beak, have reached their homes here from North Bay, Newfoundland, where their vessels were frozen in, owing to the unprecedentedly severe weather. Both mariners report apweather. Both mariners report appalling conditions along the line of the ice-bound Reid-Newfoundland railway, which they were required to traverse for a distance of 174 miles in order to reach a steamer. They state that the railway line is completely blocked with ice and snow and that there is no prospect of a resumption of traffic for weeks to come. Provisions are running low and there is an extreme shortage of floor.

Captain Pettipas said that he did not know "what was to become of the people."

In. Nova Scotia.

New Glasgow, N.S., Jan. 30.—Two months with scarcely any rain and twenty-five consecutive days of zero weather have caused a water famine in country districts. Wells and springs have gone dry and streams and sheet water are ice. In some places there is ice seven feet in thickness. Many farmers are hauling water a distance of two miles for their stock.

BOARD OF COMMERCE SAYS APPEALS ARE NOT PROVIDED FOR

among the Red soldiers in Northern Russia, ostensibly to halt the unnecessary killing of prisoners, especially Cossacks, has been received by the British War Office after having come into the hands of the North Russian Government.

The proclamation divides the whites into two categories—the first designated as the real enemies of the Soviet Republic, such as capitalists, their sons and officers; and the second, those who fight against the Soviets only because they are either forced to do so or are ignorant. Red soldiers are warned not to kill those in the second category, because "then white soldiers would be afraid to desert to us."

Regarding the first category, the proclamation declares:

"Naturally, mercy to officers, big landowners or capitalists, who all are permanently or consciously enemies of ours is out of the ones."

orandum contains this clear cut challenge:

"It is further submitted that if this Board is to continue to exist it must be permitted to function as by law it was intended it should do, and that if manufacturers or others may appeal or resort to the Cabinet Council from the Board's questioning of them and be heard with effect, the work of this Board might as well be now abandoned as be subjected to frustration."

Bolsheviki and Poland.
London, Jan. 30.—A Bolshevik wireless message received here yesterday afternoon from Moscow said that a declaration signed by Premier Lenie, Foreign Minister Tchitcherin and Minister of War Trottsky, addressed to the Polish Government on behalf of the Council of the People's Commissaries, invited a friendly settlement of all disputes and questions outstanding between Poland and Soviet Russia.

The declaration said that it was "insumbent on the Polish Government to decide whether or not to make war on Russia." It proceeded to accuse the agents of Winston Spencer Churchill, the British War Minister, and M. Clemenceau, the former French Premier, of endeavoring to incite Poland to a "senseless, criminal war against Soviet Russia."

MORF PAPER MILLS

London, Jan. 30.—(Canadian Press)

"As the trees are cut the source of supply recedes into the north and haulage to the mills becomes greater and expense of manufacture consequently is increased.

TWO DOMINION POLICE **FORCES ARE UNITED**

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—On Saturday at midnight the Dominion Police force as it is at present constituted will cease to exist, and the personnel thereof will be absorbed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the title of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police being changed with the coming into effect of the Act. Outside of Ottawa all detachments will be mounted, and will wear the red coats which have so frequently struck terror to the hearts of the lawless characters in the prairie provinces.

Immigration Total Shows Increase Over 1918; 57,251 From Britain

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Immigration to Canada for the calendar year 1919 totalled 117,633, an increase of 67,393 over 1918, or 134 per cent.

Of the 117,633 new settlers who entered the Dominion last year, 57,251 were from the British Isles, and principally soldiers' dependents; 52,644 from the United States, and the balance of 8,318 from other countries.





CIVIC PLEBISCITE

City Council, Mayor Says, Will Do Something,

The city will take some action to

The city will take some action to put into effect the people's decision supposed to be reflected in the plebistic scite on civic reform.

In making this announcement, and way or Porter was not in a position to forecast what action would be taken, and he admitted that the chief effect of the plebiscite was to confuse the public. At present Returning officer W. W. Northeott's report on the matter is filed away in the city archives, no action on it having been taken by the City Council.

The proposal that the city be governed by a council as at present constituted, but elected for a two-year term, half the alderman retiring annually, received the greatest measure of support in the plebiscite. At the same time, however, it is pointed out that the public was given no opportunity to vote for the present form of municipal government, and that a large proportion of the ballots were spoiled.

A number of influential aldermen for this and other reasons are in favor of dropping the whole question. They consider that the referendum was simply a farce. They do not feel justified in acting in accordance with the majority vote which, they claim, does not interpret the public will at all. They feel that the Council, it acts at all, should act independently of the piebiscite entirely.

"I am not in any position to make any announcement as to what will be done in the matter," the Mayor stated, 'but I can say this, the matter will be considered in the usual course of events, and action will be taken on it as the Council decides. I must admit that a decision will be pretty difficult, however, in view of the confusing character of the referendum."

FO-DAY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT MAY AID FISHERMEN

Returned Soldiers Suggest the Establishment of Loan Board

That it is the intention of the Do minion Government seriously to con-sider some means of giving financial assistance to returned soldiers desire to take up fishing and

assistance to returned soldiers who desire to take up fishing and who have the requisite experience was shown by a letter from Lieut.-Col. F. H. Cunningham, Inspector of Fisheries for British Columbia, read at the meeting of the executive of the Vascouver branch of the G. W. V. A. on Wednesday evening.

Col. Cunningham enclosed a copy of a resolution passed by a representative gathering of returned men from Vancouver and surrounding districts on January 23. The meeting had been called to gather information to assist the Government in formulating its policy.

Among the recommendations contained in the resolution were: Formation of a fisheries loan board consisting of representative returned men with fishing experience and representatives from Vancouver, New Westminster, Prince Rupert, Victoria, other Island districts and one from the Government. The duties and functions of this board would be to interview all applicants for loans with regard to general qualifications and experience, and to make recommendation to the Government in each case: to make recommendations as to the nature and extent of the aid to be furnished. The aid would be governed by applicant's previous experience, amount of time to be devoted to fishing each year; ability to handle a boat; recommendations of three other practical fishermen as to applicant's fitness.

The basis of assistance recommended is by way of renting or hirring boats-and gear to applicant, with proper safeguards for their secure use, giving the applicant the power eventually to become the sole owner of the outfit on the hire-purchase system.

Have Hampered Doctors Fighting Illness

Plymouth, Eng., Jan. 30.—Influenza raged on board the Cunard Line steamship Kaiser in Auguste Victoria during her passage here from New York, whence she sailed on January 17. The liner arrived here yesterday, twenty-four hours late because of encountering a hurricane. There were sixty cases of influenza among the passengers and crew, three of the patients developing pneumonia, from which one, a third-class passenger, died last evening.

It was declared on the steamship that the absence of stimulants on the ship which was sailing "dry" had hampered the surgeons in fighting the prevalent diseases. A supply of spirits and medicines was taken on board here before the steamship proceeded to Cherbourg and Liverpool.





"Mining operations in the Clayoquot Mining Division have been principally confined to development work on the Indian Chief group of mineral claims on Sidney Inlet by the Tidwater Copper Company under the general management of H. B. Price. The underground workings have been extended about 600 feet; the mill at the beach has been remodelled, its capacity being increased to treat 200 tons of ore a day, and water-power developed to run the mill, compressor, and electric light plants.

"A new ore-body has been discovered on the northerly side of the mineral zone, which has been crosscut for about 30 feet to November 4, 1919, with the face still in ore that assayed 2.8 per cent in copper. From a point 30 feet from the portal to the face on the date mentioned the ore averaged 3.96 per cent in copper from samples taken every 5 feet and assayed by W. Warren, the superintendent.
