- 2 Panormus (Siculo-Punic), about 400 B.C., obv. elaborate Head of Ceres to left, rev. the usual type of the Carthaginians, viz. Horse to right, over it the symbol called the Mihir, fine $size 6\frac{1}{2}$. 1
- 3 Panormus. Another, types as the last, but no symbol, in perfect condition, size 4¹/₂; one, size 1¹/₂; another, Palmtree, rev. Bust of a Horse, size ³/₄

- 4 Syracusae, obv. $\Sigma\Omega$ TEIPA. before the diademed head of Dian to right; behind, lyre and quiver; rev. Σ YPAKO- Σ I Ω N. before the laurelled head of Apollo to left, a lyre behind; of pale gold or electrum, fine work, extremely rare and beautiful size $4\frac{1}{2}$. 1
 - *** It is from this specimen that Noehden has engraved the coin represented on his 16th plate.
- 5 Syracusae, obv. ΣΥΡΑΚΟΣΙΩΝ., Head of Ceres to left, rev. Figure in fast biga to right,

 Beneath the horses' fore legs, fine and highly valuable, v. Torremuzza

- 6 Syracusae, ΣΥΡΑ., Head of Hercules, rev. a Female Head in centre of a sunk square, without ΣΥΡΑ. in the angles, extra fine and valuable; another, rev. with the letters, fair both size 1³/₄.
- 7 Agathocles, the Adventurer, 317 B.C., Head of Minerva to right, rev. ΑΓΑΘΟΚΛΕΟΣ. ΒΑΣΙΛΕΟΣ., winged fulmen, TP. in mon. beneath, as it came from the die size 3¹/₂.
- 8 Hicetas, obv. ΣΥΡΑΚΟΣΙΩΝ. before the head of Arethusa to left, behind a crook (ut videtur), torch or javelin; rev. EΠΙ. IKETA., a Victory in fast biga to right, star above, and ear of wheat beneath, fine size 3¹/₂.
- 9 Hieron II, obv. beautiful Head of Arethusa to left, tripod behind; rev. Female in a biga to left, E under the horses and IEPΩNOΣ. on the exergue, B.C. 270, very fine

10 Panticapaeum Tauricae, obv. Head of Pan, bearded and crowned with ivy-leaves to left; rev. IIAN., a Griffon, horned, to left, walking upon a spike of wheat, holds a javelin in its mouth, in perfect condition, boldly executed, of ancient style, rare, and of fair weight, as coins are always somewhat below the standard weight

- 12 Lysimachus. Another, of superior execution, struck at Tomi, ΔIO . beneath Victory, TO. under the seat of Minerva-Victrix, and trident with dolphins on the exergum, a most desirable aureus size 5. 1
- 13 Philippus II, young Head of Apollo, laureate, in high relief, rev. ΦΙΛΙΠΠΟΥ., Biga, trident's head beneath, beautiful work, and in fine condition, minted at Potidea, and not at Amphipolis, v. Fr. Lenormant, "Cat. Behr." size 4.
- 14 Philippus II, the Hecta, or $\frac{1}{6}$ th of a Drachm, obv. Head of
Apollo, rev. fulmen, $\Phi I\Lambda I\Pi \Pi OY$. and bee; another, rev.Trident, both are fine and raresize $\frac{3}{4}$.
- 15 Alexander Magnus, the valuable Double Stater, or Gold Tetradrachm, obv. with serpent on the helmet of Minerva; rev. ΑΛΕΞΑΝΔΡΟΥ., Victory to left, thunderbolt, and A. or AO. (mon.), extremely scarce of this denomination, weight, and good condition

- 18 Miletus Ioniac, or Cyzicus, obv. Lion's Head to right, and star; rev. oblong shapeless incuse rough square, thick, of an early period, at least 500 B.C., fine size 3. 1

- 20 Sardes Lydiae, attributed to Croesus, but probably even . earlier than the Darics (large elongate-shaped Stater of pure Gold, most likely the oldest type of any Collection), obv. foreparts of Lion and Ox facing; rev. two irregular deep indented Squares, extra fine, and extremely rare and valuable size 3¹/₄, wt. 123¹/₁₀ grs. 1
 - *** Made probably from the gold of the Lydian river Pactolus, and found with Darics. From the Pembroke Collection.
- 21 Cyzicus Mysiae, obv. Triton, bearded, seated to right on tunny fish, holds a coronet, and is looking to left; rev. indented Square, four triangular compartments, an extra fine and rare, rather archaic hecta (general weight 39 to 40 grs.) size 2. 1

22 Phocaea (Smyrna?) obv. beautiful Head of Cephalus, with petasus; rev. Leopard in quadratum incusum, see Mt. pl. 55, of fine art, and rare size $1\frac{1}{2}$. 1

- Abydus Troadis, obv. youthful Head of Ammon or Bacchus, with ram's horn; rev. Eagle to right, looks to left, in quad. incus., fine style of art size 1¹/₂.
- 25 Lebedos Ioniae, or Lesbos, obv. bearded old Head of a Faun or Silenus to right; rev. two Rams' Heads butting, floweret above them, in quad. incus., a very rare and fair hecta
- 26 Mytilene Lesbi, obv. Lion's Head (as usual, without any letters), rev. Calf's Head, incuse, a fine hecta 1
- 27 Troas, Ram's Head to right, a bird beneath, rev. incuse Head of a Lion with open jaws; another, head crowned with ivy, to left, and "long hair," rev. Quad. incusum, fine hectae
- 28 Parium or Pergamus, obv. Head of Ceres to right, crowned with wheat, rev. Bull in square butting to left, as some coins of the Thurii, fine size 2 1
- 29 Sigeium Troadis (or Lebedus or Athenæ?) helmeted Head of Pallas to right, rev. fine Owl standing in quad. incusum, a fine and scarce hecta
- 30 Ionia, Head of Sapho to right, in quad. incus., rev. Male Head crowned with ivy, varied Hectæ, both are desirable 2
- 31 Pergamus, veiled Head of Ceres, rev. a Tripod ; one bearded Head of Æsculapius, rev. Serpent, fine hectæ 2
- 32 Persia, uncertain very early King, Daric, crowned bearded King as Archer, with bow and javelin, kneeling to right, a primitive, fine and valuable specimen, more spread than usual

- 33 Another, slightly varied, not quite so fine
- 34 Ptolemaeus I, Soter Ægypti, the famed Pentadrachm, obv.diademate Portrait, rev. fine Eagle to left on fulmen, ΣI (or M.) in field, extremely finesize $5\frac{1}{2}$.

- 35 Arsinoe-Philadelphi, veiled Portrait of the beautiful Queen, and K. (Cyprus), behind it, rev. a double Cornucopia or Diceros, with fruit, pendant grapes, taenia, &c., very fine octodrachm size 7. 1
- 36 Another, with O. (Tyre) behind the head, equally desirable at least size 7. 1
- 37 Octodrachm, struck by Ptolemy III (Evergetes), in honor of his immediate ancestors, *obv.* $\Theta E\Omega N$. over the united portraits of Soter and Berenice, *rev.* $A\Delta E\Lambda\Phi\Omega N$. over those of Ptolemy II (Philadelphus) and Arsinoe, a small oval buckler behind, *fine and valuable size* 7. 1
- 38 Gold Tetradrachm, same types, also with the small shield size 5. 1
- 39 Ptolemæus III, obv. Bust of the Monarch, with radiate diadem and draped with the chlamys to right, tridentlike sceptre, rev. Cornucopia with diadem and "aureole" of rays, in field ΔI ., this octodrachm is in fine condition and extremely scarce size 7. 1
- 40 Hemi-Drachm of Ptolemy I, rev. Eagle, MI. in monogram, very fine, size 1¼; Cilicia, obv. Hercules-Pugnans to right; Asiatic and Egyptian Crux-ansata, &c. rev. Lion seizing a deer, with Phœnician legend in square, in excellent condition and of much rarity, size 2¼; one, obv. Bucranium, rev. quad. incus. size ¾
- 41 Byzantine Aurei, Theophilos, "tiers du sol," &c.; Heraclius I and II; Const. XIII, Ducas; Manuel I, Comnenus, all well preserved 4
- 42 Indian and Turkish, varied modern, fine, sizes 2 (2), $2\frac{1}{2}$, 3 and $6\frac{1}{2}$ 5
- 43 Charles I, obv. Bust and v., rev. CVLTORES., &c., Arms; Belgian Ducat of 1831, fair coins 2
