GAZELLE HUNTING.—The Arabe recognize three varieties of this animals; the ledmi, or great gazelle, the sin, or little gazelle, and the rim, one of a size intermediate between those two. They go in herds of from four to one hundred though sometimes as many as two or three hundred have been seen together, looking at a distance, like the flock of

looking at a distance, like the flock of some nomad tribe on the move.

When a caravan halts in a gazelle district, the hunters of the party go out in force, taking care to walk up the windfor the same sense of smell of this animal is remarkably acute, and the least suspicion of manxind, tainting the breeze, causes it to turn and fly. In stalking his game, the hunter glides cautionsly from bush to bush imitating now and then the cry of the gazelle, which stops on hearing it, and gazes curiously around for its lost companion, while the hunter easily approaches within gun-shot.

There are two other methods of hunting the gazelle; with the thar el-hoor, or falcon. and the slougoui, or greyhound. These methods, however, especially the former, are seldom practiced, except by persons of rank.

A falcon that can seride down a little gazelle is valued at a dromedary. A grey-hound that can pull down a middle sized gazelle is worth a good she-camel; and one that can catch a ledmi, or great gazelle, will exchange for a blood horse.— They are broken in early to the chase; and if they do not show an appetite for it before the age of two years, they will never be fit for anything

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 6th, 1860. My resume of events opens with an affray between two Greasers, one of whom was badly cut in the back. At the time of the infliction of the wound it was thought the sufferer could not survive; but he was better than could have been expected the next day, and has now, I believe, been pronounced out of danger. The occurrence took place in a dance house in this city, on Thursday night last. Whatever may be the result of the wound, however, is of very little consequence to the community at large, and the more especially to your readers.

The city has presented a very lively appearance this week thus far. On Monday the Douglas County Convention met and transacted a portion of the business before them and adjourned over until Tuesday. When the Convention met it elected as temporary Chairman Dr. Charles Duncombe-the same gentleman, you will recollect, which the Legislature of 1859 twice ousted from his seat in that body. When permanent officers were chosen, G. W. Colby was made President. W. S. Long was nominated for the Senate, and N. Greene Curtis, J. Powell, Amot Adams, and P. J. Hopper, of Folsom, for the Assembly.

On Tuesday, however, the different delegations to the two State Conventions for a new trial. nearly filled all the public houses. Wednesday was a perfect jam, and has continued so up to this time. The Bell and Everett State Convention was quite fully attended, and among its members were some of the best men in the State. It was presided over by Judge D. O. Shattuck, of San Francisco, than whom there is no purer or better man in the State. On taking the Chair, he made one of the best speeches which I have heard for many a day. And when to-day the Convention closed its labors he made another able speech which was received with enthusiastic applause. This Convention nominated for Presidential electors Col. J. B. Crockett, of San Francisco: G. W. Bowie, of Sacramento; Phineas L. Miner, of Red Bluff, and James Lander, of Los Angelos. The Convention closed its labors and adjourned to-day.

The Douglas State Convention also met on Wednesday, and was called to order was also very fully attended, large numbers of spectators occupying all the space the house would hold which was not otherwise filled by delegates. Last night the Douglas Democracy held a ratification meeting in front of Toll's Hotel, corner of K and 7th streets, which was addressed by half a dozen gentlemen, but the greatest of them all was J. P. Hoge.

Mr. EDITOR:-Having heard of some enormous threshing done in this County during the present season by Russell's Improved Theshing Machine, I concluded to-day (Monday) to take a little ride up to Mr. Caleb Davis' ranch, about nine or ten miles west of Knight's Landing, on the Cache Creek plains, where he had his own machine in operation, and I witnessed it thresh and clean 2855 bushels of barley, (allowing 50 lbs. per bushel) besides having to remove and set during the day. This is the greatest day's work by about 353 bushels ever done in this State by a ten horse power machine. Mr. Davis told me that if he had no mishaps with his machine, that he is positive he can thresh 3500 bushels on a trial of speed in one day from sunrise until sunset. The foregoing machine was fed by Messrs. Lee Lane and Monroe Snyder of this County, and if I am a judge of such things, their equals are hard to find. It took 1710 sacks to hold this grain, and it was all sewed up by a young man named Watson Barnes, only 16 years old, he lives on the adjoining ranch with his father.

Mr. EDITOR :- Although your paper is independent in politics, I will venture so far upon your indulgence as to offer for publication a short article somewhat partizan in its character, hoping that if not so well written as it might be, its brevity will make it admissible.

That was the grand idea, the sole idea, and every other idea dwindled into insignificance in comparison to it, he fairly howled upon it-in fact one would have concluded that was the only and all of the doctrine without any qualification whatever. He read the resolution an asked with emphasis, without further comment or explaining its meaning, if all that was not true, old democracy, if there was a sentence or word there that was orthodox &c. He furthermore quoted the resolution of the convention which nominated Latham for Governor, which he declared the charge was a stigma that the national democracy was in favor of a slave code. and he denounced the Breckinridge party as being for a slave code for the terri-

Now I should like to know what the Wickeliffe resolution means. It says that in case the judiciary has or shall decide that slave property is entitled to protection in the territories, then it is the duty of all good citizens to abide by such decision, and it is the duty of every department of the general government to carry out such decision. THE "GREAT EASTERN" OFF FOR ENGLAND !- The Troubles of her Last Days at New York.—The correspondent of the Bulletin says :- The Great Eastern sailed for New York direct for England on the 16th, carrying less than 100 passengers. She did not sail a day too soon. Public interest in the monster had ceased entirely. Few persons assembled to witness her departure, and no guns were fired on the occasion, except a few from the docks of the Cunard steamers. Her officers and crew seem to have made themselves exceedingly unpopular during her Cape May trip, and the excursion of the vessel to Chesapeake Bay. At An-napolis they were charged with insulting female visitors, and several of them were badly beaten on her decks by Baltimore rowdies. The "lady visitors" said to have been insulted were, no doubt, female roughs, who put on airs upon the occasion that deserved rebuke from all but their rowdy champions. The police took the matter in hand and wards to arrest the Plug Uglies, but the Britishers declined to make any complaint against their assailants. They did not get out of New York harbor without incurring a number of vexations. First, some one filed a suit against the company on the ground that her wheels infringed upon a patent taken out by him a few years ago. Then she was formally boarded and taken possession of by the Sheriff, for a debt of about \$300 contracted by the steward, and not released until security was given by Grinnell, Minturn & Co., her agents. Finally, as she went down the bay, she was boarded by constables, who seized the clothing and other effects of two or three of her petty officers who wanted to leave unpaid bills behind them. Two or three small steamers, partly filled with ex-cursionists, followed her out to the Narrows, and these were all that assembled to do her reverence. The number of persons who visited her during her stay in the United States is estimated at 175,000 all of who paid fifty cents for the privilege, excepting 8,500 who paid a dollar before the price was reduced. She had not a pound of freight on board when she took her departure.

THE OPIUM TRADE OF CHINA.-The Portuguese have the merit, if we are to regard it as such, of having commenced the trade in opium between India and China. A hundred years ago it was of very trifling extent, and it was not until after the British East India Company made an adventure in 1773 that it gave promise of becoming a large trade. For many years the quantity shipped from British India did not exceed 1,000 chests per annum, and even so late as the year 1820 it did not quite reach 6,000 chests or about 900,000 lbs. Since that time, however, notwithstanding that the Chinese have latterly largely cultivated the plant from which it is produced, their imports of opium have rapidly increased. At the present date it amounts to between 10,000,000 and 11,000,000 lbs. annually from India, besides a small amount from Turkey.—N. Y. Tribune.

NEW STEAMSHIP LINE.—The Panama Herald and Star of Aug. 18th, gives the following in relation to the co ment of a new line of steamers designed to run from New York via Jamaica to Aspinwall:

We some time ago announced that a new line of steamers was to be opened between New York and Aspinwall, touching at Jamaica. We have heard a report that the first of the line-a small steamer called the Baltimore-has already arrived at Aspinwall, and sailed again for New York; But the event appears to have been kept very secret, as very few persons, beyond those directly interested, have been aware of the fact.
