Subject is leave for military personnel to ZI.  
Reference CINCFE ZX 29471 dated 2 Mar 52. This message in three parts.

Part 1. In cases of principals granted leave to ZI for purpose of accompanying dependents on voyage to Japan, this headquarters will accept requests from your command for teletype notification to SEPE or SFPE advising that principal will report to POD with dependents for purpose of coordinating their travel to Japan on same vessel.

Part 2. Principals should be advised that it is their responsibility, upon arrival in ZI on leave, to contact both Casual Officer Shipping Agency and the dependent shipping agency (of the ZI port thru which dependents will ship) and inform them of the date dependents are scheduled to sail, requesting sailing of principal be arranged on the same vessel.

Part 3. Sponsor who is eligible for but was not included on a priority list due to prohibition of travel of infant child under 6 months of age or wife in advanced pregnancy, may be integrated onto priority list where properly eligible on basis of administrative error in original exclusion of dependents from priority list.

For SA00A. Subject is Power Development Promotion Bill.

1. The Liberal Party intends to submit prior to 31 March a "Power Development Promotion Bill" to Diet now in session. Briefly, Bill provides:

a. Establishment of Power Development Coordination Council composed of the President of Economic Stabilization Board as Chairman, four Ministers (Finance, Agriculture and Forestry, International Trade and Industry, and Construction), Director-General of ESB, Chairman of Public Utilities Commission, Director of Local Autonomy Agency, and three members appointed by chairman. The duties of this council are to determine what hydro electric projects are to be developed, who will develop them, their size, make determinations as to water and land rights, apportion expenses on multi-purpose projects, and other associated matters.

b. The establishment of a special government corporation to undertake development of hydro electric generation projects and associated transmission and transformation facilities throughout Japan under the control of the competent government agency which is expected to be ESB.

c. Funds for the corporation to be raised by government ownership of not less than one-half the outstanding capital stock which may equal one hundred million shares at one thousand yen per share; and by sale of debentures not exceeding ten times the capital and reserves.

2. The proposed law would appear to contemplate the return of inefficient, uneconomic government control and manipulation of the electric power business similar to that established in 1939 by the militarists and found undesirable by the American consultants sent to Japan to investigate the situation and the Deconcentration Review

Board. The wartime created power organization was eliminated by Japanese law which established a Public Utilities Commission in December 1950 and effected reorganization of the electric power industry by dissolving the government controlled Japan Electric Generation and Transmission Company (Hassoden) and the nine electric distribution companies (Haidens) and replacing them, effective 1 May 1951, with nine electric power integrated generation and distributing companies (Denryokus). These are privately owned and operated companies, responsible for supply of electric power from generation to consumer, subject only to the regulatory control of the PUC (similar to regulatory control by State public utilities commissions in the U.S.) and relatively free from political interference.

3. The proposed law would restore conditions, objections to which would be as compelling today as they were under the previous government partial ownership and total control which led to reorganization.


4. In the past SCAP has interposed objection to the re-creation of the pre-war ultra nationalistic organization as inconsistent with sound economic policy and generally inimical to the national interest. The sponsors of the Bill are being informed that the headquarters does not agree in principle with certain provisions of the Bill but since the proposed plan will become operative after the Peace Treaty is in force, it is returned without approval either expressed or implied.

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

additional electric power generation facilities, particularly hydro-generation.

2. Opinion was divided among interested government agencies as to whether the development should be undertaken under government ownership and control or left to private exploitation under regulation of the Public Utilities Commission.

3. Since resolution of the differences could not be effected, a Cabinet approved measure for electric power development was not forthcoming. It is understood that the matter was turned over to the legislative policy committee of the Liberal Party which decided to sponsor a party bill embodying government ownership and control features.

4. The proposed law would restore conditions, objections to which would be as compelling today as they were under the previous government partial ownership and total control which led to reorganization of the electric power industry.

5. Since, however, the proposed plan will become operative after ratification of the Peace Treaty, it is being returned to the sponsors without action and without approval either expressed or implied. The DA is being notified of this headquarters' action by attached radio.

Subject is Personal Conduct and Behavior.

1. The recent signing of the Administrative Agreement and the publication of its terms, especially of those articles dealing with criminal jurisdiction, have focused the attention of Japan, the United States and the world at large on the relations which will exist between the personnel of our Armed Forces, including civilian employees and dependents, and the Japanese people after the effective date of the Peace Treaty.

2. There has been considerable opposition in certain Japanese circles to those provisions of the Administrative Agreement which provide for retention by United States authorities of off-post criminal jurisdiction over personnel of the Armed Forces. This opposition has manifested itself in recent comments in the Japanese press on reported crimes and misdemeanors charged to such personnel. As a result, any personal conduct or behavior which may bring discredit on the Armed Forces, whether criminal in nature or not, assumes greater importance than ever.

3. Each crime, each misdemeanor, each incident of public misbehavior, each public act indicative of disrespect for Japanese law enforcement agents or Japanese customs by United States Armed Forces personnel, including civilian employees and dependents, will be a potential weapon to be turned against us in our effort to maintain peace in the Pacific, jointly with a friendly Japan.

4. I consider this matter of such significance at this time that I am personally calling your attention to the necessity of intensifying and continuing your efforts to impress upon all elements of your command the impelling importance of reducing to an absolute minimum conduct prejudicial to the good reputation of the personnel of our Armed Forces.

5. It will, I think, be of very great importance that all concerned adopt and apply to the solution of this problem, a positive search for positive measures for increasing mutual respect and confidence between us and the Japanese. I shall continue to present the same need to the Japanese Government on all proper occasions.

6. Some aspects of this problem which may require increased attention of commanders of all echelons include, but are not limited to, the following:

- a. Decent and proper conduct in public.
- b. Control of passes.
- c. Respect for Japanese laws, customs and property rights.
- d. Safe driving of motor vehicles, to include strict compliance with all traffic regulations and instructions.
- e. Prompt apprehension of military personnel AWOL or in desertion.
- f. The prompt payment of fares and other indebtedness in Japanese communities.

7. In connection with paragraph 6, above, members of the United States Armed Forces, including civilian employees and dependents, should be informed that although the United States has reserved the right to exercise exclusive criminal jurisdiction over them in Japan, they will be subject to arrest by Japanese authorities, outside the facilities and areas in use by United States Armed Forces, for the commission or the attempted commission of an offense. They may also be arrested by Japanese authorities, upon request, when fleeing the jurisdiction of the United States Armed Forces. They should be further informed that they are also subject to search and seizure by Japanese authorities in connection with the above arrest, or where such search is required for the purpose of arresting offenders who are under Japanese jurisdiction.

8. To enable the wide utilization of measures which local commanders have found to be of material assistance in maintaining and improving relationships between Armed Forces personnel and the Japanese people, it is

This morning's radio news includes a happy item announcing the ratification by the United States Senate of the San Francisco Peace Treaty and the Japanese-American Security Treaty.

The Senate action demonstrates the unswerving American policy of reconciliation and trust toward Japan and of mutual reliance and cooperation with Japan for the defense of the peace of the Pacific; it also signifies a happy consummation of the Allied Occupation policy which has been consistently and vigorously pursued toward the spiritual regeneration as well as the economic and political reconstruction of Japan in order that she may, as is now assured she will, rejoin the community of free nations as a worthy and useful member.

On this auspicious day to you as the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers I beg to convey afresh the profound gratitude of the Government and people of Japan.

1. Pursuant to request Part 2 urmsg personal conferences have taken place between SCAP and CINCPAC concerning resolution of differences re entry of Japanese into Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands for commercial and other purposes. Considered in discussions were UN Trusteeship Agreement, particularly Article 8; JCS 1380/135; and position adopted by US and endorsed by UN when strategic trusteeship was discussed in UN Security Council 1946-47.
2. The agreed policy governing administration of the Trust Territory provides in effect that US may discriminate in favor of its own nationals (including companies, associations and corporations) but must accord equal treatment to all other UN nationals. Generally speaking non-US nationals will be approved for entry only for compelling reasons, under carefully controlled conditions, and then only when cleared for security by CINCPAC.
3. Although as a sovereign nation Japan will not immediately become a member of the UN, CINCPAC and SCAP agree that for purposes of this conference Japanese nationals may expect treatment equal to that of all UN nationals other than US.
4. The above principles are equally applicable to fishing, mining and salvaging activities in TERPACIS subj to specific interpretation as follows:
  - a. Fishing. Full freedom of the high seas will of course be enjoyed by Japan upon assumption of sovereign powers. This will include use of floating factory operations and other fisheries activities consistent with international conservation agreements. Restrictions upon entrance into territorial waters of TERPACIS and TERPACIS land-based fishing operations will continue.

b. Mining. Newly instituted mining operations are subject to general principles of according preferential treatment to US nationals. A specific modification of the principle has been agreed to in the case of Angaur phosphate mining. The Angaur operation began in 1947 and extension of this activity will be permitted. Such action is not considered inconsistent with the general principles outlined in para 2 above since it is merely an extension of an administrative agreement between two US agencies which will naturally conclude when the Angaur phosphate supply comes to an end.

c. Salvage of scrap vessels. Operations will be subject to principles enunciated in para 2 above.

d. Repatriation of war dead. It is agreed that any practical request by Japanese Government for limited party of governmental and religious representatives to visit Pacific islands under US control for purpose of token disinternment of Japanese war dead will be favorably considered providing no cost accrues to US.

5. The principles outlined above equally apply to all other Pacific areas for which CINCPAC/CINCPACFLT had administrative and security responsibilities. Signed RIDGWAY - RADFORD

Memo for Record:

1. Letter, SCAP to CG RYCOM, subject, "Petition for Return of U.S. Kanato Maru," dated 30 September 1949, (TAB A), with four inclosures, requests that the use of the Kanato Maru be investigated since reference g, (not filed), which submitted a petition for the return of the Kanato Maru, reported that the vessel had been lying idle for several months. Reference h directed that the Kanato Maru and the Toshima Maru be delivered "into the custody and operational control of the Military Government Ryukyu Islands." Both vessels are of Japanese registry and are owned by Jitto Village, a group of 10 small islands lying south of Japan proper. Establishment of Ryukyu Command placed 7 of the islands under Ryukyu Military Government, the other 3 remaining under SCAP. Reference g submitted a petition from the villagers of Jitto-Maru for permission to retain either the Kanato Maru or the Toshima Maru for the use of the villagers in the islands lying north of 30° north latitude. Reference h in reply to reference g informs the Japanese Government that the Toshima Maru will be returned to the use of the Jitto Islands north of 30° north latitude.

2. 1st indorsement from Military Governor Ryukyu Islands to SCAP in reply to SCAP letter of 30 September 1949 indicates that Kanato Maru had not been lying idle and gives strong justification for the retention of the vessel under control of the Military Governor (TAB B).

3. 2nd indorsement GHO, FPO to Military Governor Ryukyu Islands, dated 7 April 1950, in reply to 1st indorsement referred to in paragraph 2, above forwards an additional petition for the return of the Kanato Maru and informs

Military Governor that representatives of the 3 northern islands of Jitto village have been informed of the present need for the vessel by Ryukyu Military Government and that the vessel could not be released for some time. Suggestion was also made that an equitable solution would be to return the Kanato Maru, when possible, to the seven (7) islands of Jitto Village lying within the Ryukyus Command. Request was made for information as to the relative interests of the two island groups in the Kanato Maru, the present use of the vessel for Military Government purposes, and an estimate of the possible date of its release or other disposition. (TAB C). No reply to 2nd indorsement appears in ROAS files.

4. A memo for files, dated 14 December 1950, prepared by Mr. A. E. Jean, GPC, SCAP, subject, "Kanato Maru and Toshima Maru" outlines the results of conference between Mr. Kelly, Chief, Transportation Division, Ryukyu Command and Mr. Jean. This memo indicates desire on the part of Ryukyu Command to give up custody and control of the Kanato Maru and suggests a conference of all concerned for the purpose of making disposition of both vessels (TAB D).

5. Letter from Ministry of Transportation, Japanese Government to CINCPAC, subject, "Kanato Maru", with five inclosures, dated 26 June 1951, indicates that an agreement had been reached in February 51 between the two island groups concerning the partition of their common property (Kanato Maru and Toshima Maru). According to the terms of the contract the southern group (Under RRG) is to own the Kanato Maru and the northern group (Under SCAP) is to own the Toshima Maru. The agreement provided a method for the settlement of the financial matters concerning the two vessels including the payment of the outstanding principal and interest on a loan made by the Japanese Government for the construction of the two vessels. Also attached to this letter, for transmittal to Ryukyuan Property Custodian, was a certificate from Ministry of Finance, Japanese Government relative to their interest in the Kanato Maru. (TAB E).

6. Letter of 26 June 1951 (Paragraph 5 above), was forwarded to Deputy Governor Ryukyu Islands for appropriate action by 1st Ind dated 2 July 51. (TAB F).

7. 5 December 1951, SCAPIN 5771/ subject, "Governmental and Administrative Separation of Certain Outlying Areas from Japan. This SCAPIN transfers to the Japanese Government, subject to authority of SCAP, governmental and administrative jurisdiction over the Ryukyu Islands lying north of 25° north latitude. This placed all ten (10) islands of Jitto Village under Japanese jurisdiction. (TAB G).

8. Memo for Record, subject, "Conference on Jitto Sea", dated 28 December 1951. (TAB H). As a result of SCAPIN 5771 (Paragraph 7 above), a conference was held at Okinawa between representatives of the Japanese Government and USCAR relative to transfer of Jitto Village to Japanese control. Reference to the memo for record indicates that people of South Jitto Village had formed a corporation which was preparing to purchase the Kanato Maru from the Ryukyuan Property Custodian, a transaction not yet consummated. Property Custodian still has custody of the Kanato Maru. (See marked paragraphs of memo for record).

9. Letter from USCAR to the Governor, Ryukyu Islands, subject, "Report of Jitto-Son discussions with Representative of Jap Gov't," dated 31 January 1952. (TAB I). Paragraph 3 of this letter refers to discussions concerning the Kanato Maru. Indicates continued necessity for ship and that upon delivery of a replacement vessel, USCAR will be willing to discuss the question of disposition of the Kanato Maru.

10. R 02153, CG HYCOM (Dep Gov) to CINCPAC, 16 February makes reference to previous correspondence concerning the Kanato Maru and recommends approval of plan outlined in item B this message for returning title, custody, and control of Kanato Maru to Jitto Village. (TAB J). Item B indicates that the Jitto-Son stockholders are willing to exchange their stock shares in the Ryukyuan Corporation (Anami Shosen Kaisha) for their interest in the Kanato Maru and that the Jitto-Son is willing to accept the vessel on a where, as is basis.

11. In view of the reasons advanced by the Deputy Governor and the apparent willingness of the parties concerned to conclude a mutually satisfactory agreement, it is recommended that the plan proposed in item B of R 02153 (TAB J), be approved.

"Since basic governmental decisions regarding United States course of action under Article 3 of Treaty of Peace have yet to be taken, consider it undesirable that any action be taken at this time to secure title to Japanese Govt prop or convey such title to Ryukyuan Govt or indivs.

Article 4 B of Treaty was intended to validate disposition of prop in renounced areas made prior to signing of treaty, such as vesting by United States Mil Govt of Japanese prop in Korea, and was not inserted in order to cover action between signing and entry into force of treaty. Ref to Article 3 in Article 4 B was to cover any past vestings which might have been made in such areas prior to signing of treaty. While if proposed action were to be taken language of Article 4 B would legally protect United States, it should not be taken pending basic decisions pursuant Article 3.

However, in accordance with Paras 13 and 18 of JCS 1231/14 you may, of course, reduce to possession all Japanese Govt Prop in the Ryukyus, and it is recommended that if you have not already done so that you take measures to reduce to possession all such prop."

Ryukyu Islands, proposes the transfer to the Provisional Central Gov- (TAB A) ernment of the Ryukyu Islands of all right, title and interest in Japanese Government owned properties in the Ryukyus, and incloses a draft of a proposed Proclamation to that effect, to be issued by the Deputy Governor.

3. Pertinent authorities from Letter AG OGI.1 (SDec 50)RGA, (TAB B) and the Treaty of Peace (TAB C) under which this action may be taken are:

(a) Par., 1 a (7) (TAB B), which directs the Deputy Governor to "reduce to possession . . . Public Property belonging to the Japanese Government . . . as may be required by the United States Government, such property to be utilized without payment of compensation." Further, "upon the coming into force of a Treaty of Peace . . . the Gov- ernor will take action to the extent authorized by the Treaty . . . to secure title . . . in the name of the United States Government."

(b) Par., 1 b (10), (TAB B) "The Deputy Governor will take possession of all Japanese Government owned real estate not required by the United States Government. He may release to Ryukyuan Government instrumentalities without compensation such part of this property as is required for Governmental use. Should the United States secure legal authority to convey the title of this property, the Governor will convey such title to the Ryukyuan Government or its instrumentalities . . . ."

(c) Chapter II, Article 3, "Japan will concur in any proposal of the United States to the United Nations to place under its trusteeship system, with the United States as the sole administering authority, Rensai Shoto south of 29° north latitude (including the Ryukyu Islands and the Daito Islands), Nanyo Shoto south of Soya Gen (including the Boni Islands, Rokusio Island and the Volcano Islands) and Faraos Vain and Marcus Island. Pending the making of such a proposal and affirmative action thereon, the United States will have the right to exercise all and any powers of administration, legislation, and jurisdiction over the territory and inhabitants of these islands, including their territorial waters." (TAB C).

(d) Chapter II, Par., (b), Article 4, "Japan recognizes the validity of dispositions of property of Japan and Japanese nationals made by or pursuant to directives of the United States Military Gov- ernment in any of the areas referred to in Articles 2 and 3." (TAB C).

3. Conferences were held between REAS, JA, GS and DS relative to the action proposed by the Civil Administrator: REAS, JA, and GS, concurred in the propriety and legality of such action under the provisions of the basic directive, paragraphs 2 (a) and 2 (b) above, and the terms of the Peace Treaty, paragraphs 2 (c) and 2 (d) above.

4. DS, however, voiced strong objections, and in support of their non- concurrence exhibited msg BR 23000-3, State Dept. to SCAP, for USFORAD, which states that special arrangements will be negotiated with Japan concerning

SUBJECT: Restricted Area, Iwakuni, Japan

1. Basic is COMNAVFE letter, Serial 928 dated 21 Jan 52, subject: Restricted Area, Iwakuni, Japan. This is a request for authority to enlarge the present area in Iwakuni which is required for the increased seaplane operations at Iwakuni.
2. The Trans O by C/N 2 dated 1 Feb 52 and G3 by C/N 3 dated 4 Feb 52 concur in the requested action.
3. Currently there are two full and a detachment of a third seaplane patrol squadrons operating from Iwakuni. The Navy has experienced considerable difficulty in these operations due to the congested landing areas available and several serious accidents have occurred. The increase in the restricted area proposed in the basic letter will not materially restrict the shipping areas in the harbor but will cause a deviation in the approach channel. The deviation in the channel will not limit the capacity of the harbor.
4. It is necessary that additional minesweeping be accomplished and additional buoyage be planted. The Navy can accomplish this with facilities on hand.
5. Inasmuch as the Iwakuni Area is under the control of BRITCOM, Japan, CINCFE msg ZX 25711 dtd 9 Feb 52 to BRITCOM requested concurrence and/or comments on the proposed enlargement of the subject patrol plane landing area.
6. BRITCOM msg to CINCFE, KB 19056, dtd 14 Feb 52, states that the British entertain no objection to the subject enlargement.

This proposal varies from suggestions discussed with Herrington during latter's visit Japan since it assumes continued imposition SCAP restrictions rather than voluntary Japanese abstention from selected fisheries. As indicated Sebald's 1566 Yoshida has made this proposal over objections Foreign Office and presumably for domestic political reasons.

Feeling here that extension fishing area at this time would needlessly complicate general problem in view pending treaty ratifications and general negotiations with other Asian nations. Since policy expressed DA 90678 indicates restrictions will be abolished in near future, Yoshida proposal appears ill-advised.

Part I: Following is text Jsp note delivered Korean Dip Mission Jan 28. "The Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs presents its compliments to the Korean Diplomatic Mission in Japan and concerning the proclamation of the President of the Republic of Korea of January 18, 1952 claiming sovereignty over the shelf and seas adjacent to Korean territory has the honour to request the Mission to transmit the following statement to the Government of the Republic of Korea:

"The Japanese Government considers that the contents of the proclamation of the President of the Republic of Korea of January 18, 1952 not only are entirely incompatible with the long internationally established principle of the freedom of the high seas, but also run counter to the basic principle of international cooperation for the development and protection on an equal footing of the marine resources of the high seas. This unilateral proclamation is utterly untenable under any of the accepted ideas of international society, and therefore cannot be acquiesced in by the Japanese Government.

"While the Japanese Government is preparing in good faith to enter into negotiation with the Government of the Republic of Korea for the adjustment of the fishing interests of both countries in adherence to the principle of friendly cooperation underlying the Peace Treaty signed at San Francisco and for the mutual prosperity of Japan and Korea, it can not but take a serious view of the attitude of the Korean Government in making the proclamation in question just as a conference on fisheries, among other subjects, is about to be opened between the two Governments. The Korean Government, in taking such a step, will be destroying the necessary base for the success of the negotiations, and it is much to be regretted that doubt is thrown as to the good faith of the Korean Government in participating in the forthcoming conference.

"Furthermore, in the proclamation the Republic of Korea appears to assume territorial rights over the islets in the Japan Sea known as Takeshima (otherwise known as Liancourt Rocks). The Japanese Government does not recognize any such assumption or claim by the Republic of Korea concerning these islets which are without question Japanese territory."

Part II: General evaluation here that Korean proclamation intended purely for bargaining purposes in coming negotiations. Felt Koreans unable and unwilling enforce restricted area. However, to prevent incidents, Jap Govt has quietly advised fishing interests refrain from small area where "Rhee Line" overlaps MacArthur Line. Moreover, COMNAVFE thru UNC taking measures prevent use Korean naval craft for enforcement purposes. Request Pusan report any developments this subject.

Part III: SCAP received Jan 28 memo from Prime Minister Yoshida requesting extension fishing area currently authorized by MacArthur Line. This is modified version proposal discussed with Herrington during his visit Japan. Jap Foreign Office privately admits opposition this petition, but advises Yoshida acting for domestic political reasons. Foreign Office would prefer no action other than abolition MacArthur Line at this time. Will advise further this subject.

Part IV: Korean inclusion Takeshima within Rhee Line poses question sovereignty these islands. Japs have been deprived of govt and admin jurisdiction these islands by SCAPIN. However, by exclusion, terms of Peace Treaty appear reserve sovereignty to Japan. Presumably this is proper subject for negotiation between Japan and Korea without reference SCAP or Allied Powers.

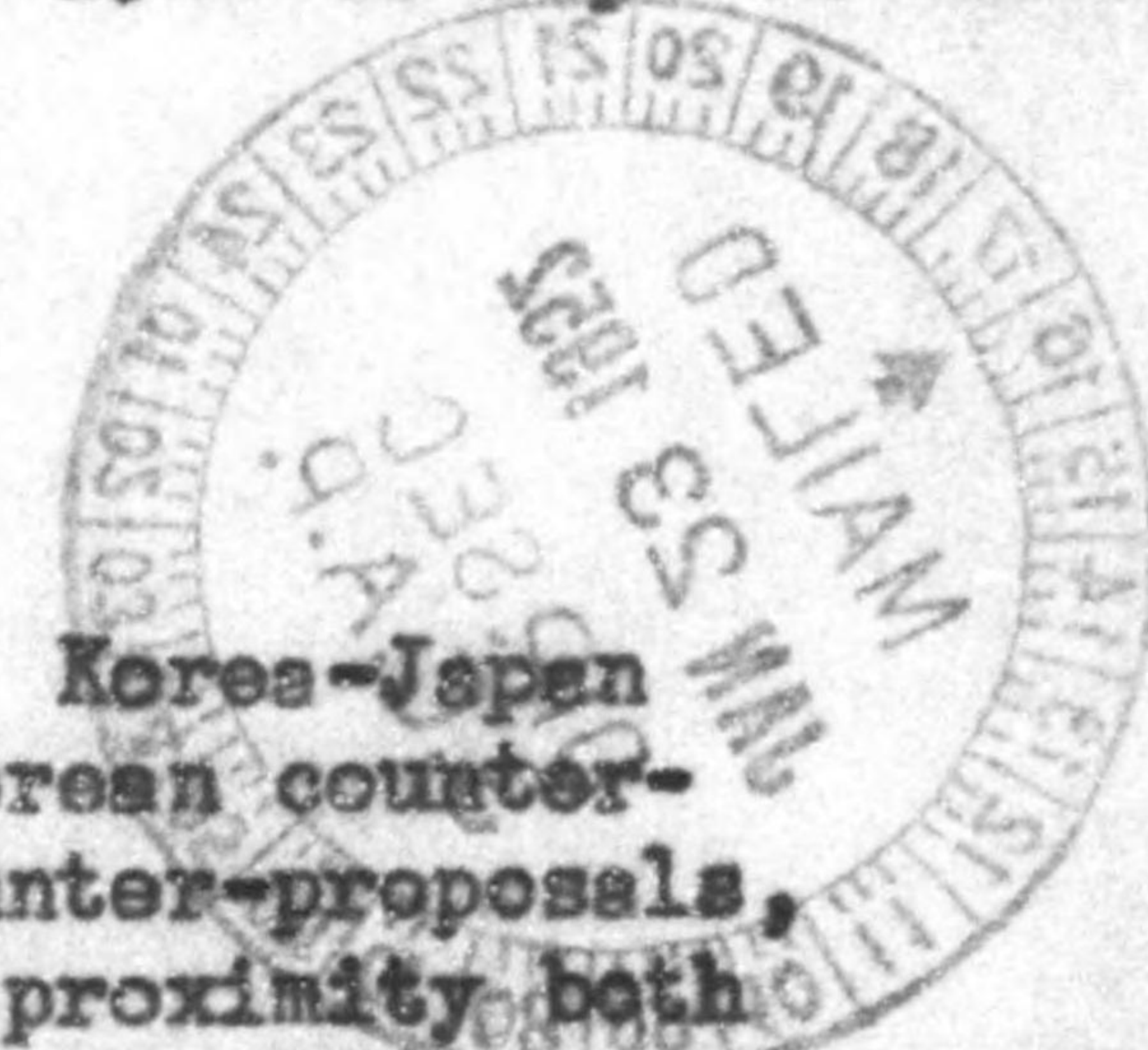

In consonance with the provisions of the notes exchanged between the Secretary of State and Prime Minister Yoshida, 8 Sep 51, it is considered that BCOF should retain the facilities and bases now being utilized in Japan until BCOF forces are withdrawn from Korea, and that the funding support incident thereto should be as mutually agreed upon between Japan and the BCOF nations concerned. However, certain bases, facilities and areas currently allocated to BCOF are now required by the US on a joint use basis and for rehabilitation and construction purposes to meet planned post-Korea deployments. Accordingly, there should be provision in any agreement that the bases, facilities and areas utilized by either BCOF or the US may be occupied as mutually agreed between the US and the BCOF nation concerned.

2. Post-treaty planning for US air and ground units is based on a requirement for all available facilities and areas in Japan, including facilities presently being utilized by BCOF in the Kure-Hiro area. NAVFE planning does not envisage utilization of the BCOF naval base at Kure

either during or subsequent to the Korean conflict. However, it is recommended that the requirement for BCOF ground, sea and air units in Japan and the facilities, areas and services incident thereto be examined immediately prior to their withdrawal from Korea and in light of forces available and conditions existing at that time.

3. It is not considered desirable for UN nations, other than as specified for BCOF, in para 1 foregoing, to maintain forces in Japan either prior to or subsequent to termination of the Korean conflict or to approach Japan on a unilateral basis to secure facilities, services and areas with a view to maintaining such forces.

4. Consistent with any suitable funding arrangements agreed upon, (see ref a), the Australian Bn can be trained and equipped in the Kure-Hiro area prior to its shipment to Korea as requested by CinC, BCOF. Lacking suitable funding arrangements, it is considered advisable to train and equip subject unit in Korea.

2. The staff study was returned to Trans O by G-1 and G-4 with comments as quoted below:

a. C/N 2, G-1 to G-4, 6 Dec 51:

"1. G-1 concurs in Trans. O proposal to discontinue operations at SANPAC and GUMPAC.

"2. To realize full economies by the discontinuances, the personnel spaces involved - one (1) officer and two (2) DACs at SANPAC and one (1) officer at GUMPAC - should be declared excess and manning level of Trans Sec decreased accordingly.

"3. In order to allow time to facilitate the administrative and personnel adjustments involved, recommend the effective dates of discontinuance be deferred to 31 Dec 51 in each instance."

b. C/N 3, G-4 to Trans O, 10 Dec 51:

"1. G-4 concurs in discontinuing the Air Ln Stations at Guam and San Francisco. This correspondence is returned for incorporation of the views of G-1 in compliance with para. 5, Staff Memo 15, 1949.

"2. The proposal to transfer the space and officer at Guam to TOKPAC is not supported by the staff study. Suggest the C/N to C/S be revised to account for the difference. It is noted also that the effective dates of the proposed communications will require revision to permit compliance."

3. C/N 1, Trans O to C/S, thru G-1 and G-4, subj as above, 19 Dec 51, resubmitted the proposed actions incorporating the views and proposed revisions of G-1 and G-4.
