

A discount of twelve per cent, will be made if goods are paid for within ten days from date of purchase.

A remittance sufficient to cover the express charges both ways must always accompany C. O. D. orders from parties with whom we have no account.

In our specimens we have named the Point bodies, and would prefer to have all orders read on that system. We have on hand, however, a large stock of our old bodies, to fill the orders of those that prefer them.

As a large number of our faces are cast only on the Point system, we would expressly state that we can only furnish fonts on the old hodies of those sizes and series where they are indicated in parentheses. Where the old body is not so indicated the face is cast only on the Point body.

⇒OUR + TYPE + BODIES 怜

WE HAVE made a complete change in our system of type bodies, having concluded to discard the system we have heretofore used as our standard, and adopt one which, in all likelihood, will very soon become the universal system among American and English printers and type founders. We are casting all our plain and ornamental newspaper, book and job faces on a new series of sizes, which we call the "Labor-Saving System of Interchangeable Type Bodies," whose great

superiority over the old system will be readily apparent to all.

Of course, a great change of this kind, involving many thousand dollars outlay, cannot be effected instantly. It will be brought about as rapidly as possible, consistent with the mutual interests of printers and ourselves. We will at all times be prepared to furnish fonts or sorts cast on the old bodies when desired, Yet it would be best for the printers, as well as the founders, if they would co-operate heartly with us in this effort to abolish the old system, and as soon as possible throw out all material not made according to the Labor-Saving standard.

Although the question of a general change from the many different standards heretofore used, toward a uniform system of type bodies, had been agitated among American type founders many years ago, it was only in the last four or five that the founders and printerdom in general have awakened to the fact that the change is really desirable and practical, and that it MUST and WILL be made, despite the opposition which some founders have raised to it. The cry for perfect uniformity between the type bodies of the different founders and for a proper relationship of the different sizes with each other is growing greater every day, and founders can no longer afford to disregard it. In France, Germany, and other European countries, such a system is already firmly established. In the United States nearly all the foundries have adopted this system, and enrolled themselves under the banner of uniformity. A list is given elsewhere of the type founders who have the new standard we have adopted, or whose bodies agree and justify with it.

Pica and Nonpareil being the standard bodies by which all labor-saving rules, leads, slugs, quotations and furniture are measured and named, they have been used as the basis upon which the new series of bodies has been graded and arranged. 'The Pica and Nonpareil of the Johnson Type Foundry were selected for this purpose by the American Type Founders' Association, necessitating a change in every body made by us.

This new Labor-Saving System of Type Bodies (or by whatever name it may be called among its various ones, such as Aliquot, Didot, Fractional, French, Interchangeable, Justifiable, Parisian, Point, etc.) has for its unit a division of space called a POINT. This unit is exactly the twelfth part of the Pica, and all the other bodies are multiples of, and are measured by it. This enables the printer to use the different sizes in combination with each other, without any trouble in the matter of accurate justification, a thing almost impossible with the

Below we give a tabular exhibit of the new system, showing the various sizes, their relationship with each other, and which of the old bodies they will displace. Also what faces will be cast on them. In relation to space measurement, 83 ems of our new Pica (12-Point) body are equal to 35 centimeters of the metrical system of measures. Twelve-Point is also equal to .166 of an inch.

In order to avoid any confusion between the old and new systems, and to give

our customers no chance for making mistakes in ordering type cast on either of the two series of bodies, we have decided to call the new sizes by the names designating the respective number of Points in each. This is the method adopted by foreign type founders, and we see no reason why we should not also follow it. This nomenclature will also give the printer a more definite and better idea as to the relative sizes of the bodies when used either together or apart. It is easily comprehended, being as simple as the addition table. There never was much sense in the old names, being merely arbitrary and capricious, and we are in favor of abolishing them entirely. Suppose every different number of inches in a foot rule had a special or fancy name? What a fine hash it would be!

Each type under the new system, excepting the smallest, will have the number of its Points cast in the side, so that there will be no difficulty, even for the dullest apprentice, in distinguishing the difference between the various sizes. How much this will be appreciated when distributing "pi" hardly needs a suggestion.

Wherever it is possible, all new faces cast on these bodies will be made to line with each other by justification with 2-Point (Six-to-Pica) leads or 6-Point (Nonpareil) slugs, and in exceptional cases with 1-Point (Twelve-to-Pica) leads. The possibility of adding this feature to new type series is one of the chief recommendations for the Point System.

We believe that there will be very little, if any, confusion resulting from the introduction of these bodies into the printing office, whilst the advantages will be boundless as far as the saving of labor and worry is concerned. There are many printers (so-called) who confound Bourgeois with Brevier, or Minion with Non-pareil, and even mix Long Primer with Pica. If such "blacksmiths" are employed, confusion must always be expected, no matter what system of bodies is used. But with printers of average intelligence this cry of "confusion" made by some founders in opposition to the adoption of the uniform standard is the veriest bosh, and merits no attention whatever. If a workman lacks ability in

such a minor matter as distinguishing the difference hetween type sizes, he certainly can not be worth much for anything else, and had hetter be replaced by a more competent man.

It is only where we indicate the Old bodies (mosttimes in parenthesis) that we can furnish the faces shown in this book, on both systems. Where only the Point names are given the faces cannot be furnished on the Old bodies

Prices of fonts on the Old and New bodies, wherever cast on both, remain

The following are the Point bodies adopted by the Central and Boston Type Foundries. Those having an asterisk (*) prefixed are east only by the Boston Type Foundry, the Central deciding not to adopt them.

- 1-Point.—The unit of the system. Used for leads and rules, in place of the old Twelve-to-Pica.
- 11/2 Point. Used for leads and rules, in place of Eight-to-Pica.
- 2-Point.—Used for leads and rules, in place of Six-to-Pica.
- 3-Point.—Used for borders and leads and rules, in place of Excelsior, Half-Nonpareil and Four-to-Pica.
- 31/2-Point.—Used for type faces, in place of Half-Minion.
- 4-Point.—Used for type faces, leads and rules, in place of Brilliant, Half-Brevier and Three-to-Pica.
- 4 1/2-Point.—Used for type and rule faces, in place of Diamond or Half-Bourgeois.
- 5-Point.—Used in the place of Pearl.
- 512-Point.—Used in the place of Agate and Ruby.
- 6-Point.—Used in place of Nonpareil. Differs but very slightly from that body.
- 7-Point.—Used in place of Minion and Minionette.
- 8-Point.-Used in place of Brevier.
- 9-Point.—Used in place of Bourgeois or Two-line Diamond.
- 10-Point,-Used in place of Long Primer or Two-line Pearl.
- 11-Point.-Used in place of Small Pica, Two-line Agate and Two-line Ruby.
- 12-Point.—Used in place of Pica and Two-line Nonpareil.
- 14-Point.—Used in place of English, Two-line Minion and Two-line Minionette
- 15-Point.—Used for brass rules only. 16-Point.—Used in place of Columbian or Two-line Brevier.
- 18-Point.—Used in place of Great Primer, Two-line Bourgeois and Three-line Nonparcil.
- 20-Point.—Used in place of Paragon or Two-line Long Primer. Also used for small Double Small Pica faces.
- *22-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line Small Pica.
 24-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line Pica and Four-line Nonpareil
 We also cast large Double Small Pica and small Double English faces
 on the 24-Point body.
- *28-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line English.
- 30-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line English, Four-line Minionette and Double or Two-line Columbian. Large faces of Double English and small Double Columbian and small Double Great Primer faces will be cast on this hody.
- 36-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line Great Primer, Three-line Pica and Six-line Nonpareil. Also used for small Double Paragon and large Double Columbian faces.
- *10-Point.—Used in place of Double or Two-line Paragon.
- 42-Point.—Used in place of Double Paragon, Four-line Small Pica and Seven-line Nonpareil. Used also for small Canon faces.
- 48-Point.—Used in place of Canon, Four-line Pica, or Eight-line Nonpareil.
- 54-Point.—Used in place of Nine-line Nonpareil and Four-line English.
- 60-Point.-Used in place of Five-line Pica or Ten-line Nonpareil.
- 72-Point.—Used in place of Six-line Pica or Twelve-line Nonpareil.

A USEFUL WORD DEFINED.

OF COURSE all printers know the compositor's definition of the word "SET," but, aside from that and all its other meanings outside of typographical parlance, it has special meanings in the mechanical vocubulary of a type foundry. One of these meanings we think it important that printers should be made aware of, as it will be of use in making some of their orders a little clearer.

To explain: What is ordinarily considered as the "width" of a letter or type is in a foundry called its "set." Thus, when a printer speaks of a figure or point as being cast on an "en body" the founder says it is on an "en set." The term "body" is restricted to mean the size of the type up and down, and not its thickness or thinness. For instance, a 6-Point three-em space measures six Points "body-wise" and two Points "set-wise." The use of the word "body," when

speaking of the "set," is apt to cause confusion in a foundry, and we hope our friends will familiarize themselves with the difference between the two terms when used in this connection, and in the ordering of points, figures or other characters, or spaces and justifiers, which they may desire cast on a special "set" or width.

HINTS ON ORDERING.

THIS Book is issued to our patrons to aid them in making selections, and we would remind them that it is only necessary to give the Size, Name and Number (if any) of the Type, or Numbers of the Cuts or Rules desired, to insure the accurate filling of their orders.

Do not Cut the Book under any Circumstances.

TAKE a separate line or paragraph for each item in your order.

Shipping directions should not be neglected. State whether goods are to be sent by water or railway, freight or express, naming the route.

When cuts and other small items are desired sent by mail, enough extra should be remitted to cover postage.

HEREAFTER, in ordering any Type, Rules, Leads, etc., made by us, please be particular enough to state which of our two systems of hodies you prefer. This will avoid controversy and prevent mistakes. In filling orders our preference in the matter of Type Bodies may not suit you; therefore, be particular, as we cannot be responsible for errors if this caution is not taken.

When you are ordering Type for newspaper or book work, state whether or not you want the fonts to contain Italics, Leaders, Fractions or Commercial Marks.

STATE particularly what styles of Fractions and Italics you want to accompany your fonts. Make your own selections from the specimens shown. We do not desire to select for you.

In ordering Sorts to match Type you already have, state the Name and Number of the Face, as well as the Size of the Body; or, if you cannot do this, send a capital "II" and lower case "m" (as little used as possible) of the fout the Sorts are to work with. Also state the number of pounds or ounces you want of each particular Sort.

WE VERY often receive samples that are so much worn that is an utter impossibility to determine what the face is. Send the very newest and least worn that you can find, thereby preventing trouble, delay and dissatisfation on both sides.

you can find, thereby preventing trouble, delay and dissatisfation on both sides.

When you write "Enclosed you will find samples," always give another look in the envelope to corroborate the assertion. We frequently look for the samples in vain. This omission causes the writing of two letters and the loss of some time in the filling of orders.

Job fonts, such as Titles, Antiques, Ornamented, etc., (except Scripts) are put up without Spaces and Quads, and if you want them for any Size of Body it will be necessary for you to order them separately.

When you want Leads, Advertising Rules or Dashes, send one of your Leads; or, if you order them cut to certain ems long, be particular to state what particular ems you mean—whether Nonpareil, Brevier, Long Primer, Pica, etc.

SHOULD you order Brass Rule to be mitered to any size, give either the "inside" or "outside" measurement, and if it is to be cut from Double Rules state whether you wish the heavy line inside or outside.

WHEN you order Type, Rules, Borders, Cuts, etc., from any other Foundry's Specimen Book, do not cut out the sample, but mention what book (giving date of same, if possible) you select from, and give the Name and Number, if any, of each particular article required; also, when practicable, the page on which it may be found

IN ordering Printing Ink, state the quantity, and price per pound or ounce, of each kind you want.

WHEN you want Chases, give the "inside" or "outside" measurement, or, better still, send a diagram.

HOW TO ESTIMATE.

As an aid to our customers when estimating on Newspaper or Book Office Outfits or Renewals, the following tables will be found very useful. Although in some cases the figures given are approximate, all are sufficiently close for estimating and for general measurement.

The printed estimates for offices sent out by type founders are usually fair selections, but are intended only for general guides. You are expected to look through the specimens and re-select the details according to your own taste. It is especially difficult to select a job office to suit the tastes of different printers, and it is best that the man who is to manage the office have a hand in the selection.

To ascertain the Quantity of Plain Type required for a newspaper, magazine, or other work, find the number of square inches in the matter, and divide the same by four; the quotient will be the approximate weight. As it is impossible to set the case entirely clear, it is necessary to add 25 per cent. to large fonts, and 33 per cent. to small, to allow for dead letter.

Leaded Matter requires about 25 per cent, less type than Solid Matter. The following table shows the weight of 6-to-Pica Leads required to lead 1000 ems Solid, and contained in 100 ems Leaded Matter.

compartments for leads, from 1^4 ₂ to 4 Picas, of three thicknesses, 4, 6 and 12 to Pica; "g" compartment for Nonpariel slugs on one side and leads on the other, from 5 to 20 Picas in length, both inclusive.

"B" Lower Case; "b" space for galley. The unlettered space above "e" contains fine emery paper, to polish the flat surface of rules, leads, slugs, etc., that are not always washed clean, and interfere with correct justification.

This Case is intended as a substitute for the usual inverted Case or board commonly used. Every printer realizes the loss of time consumed while going to and from the lead or slug racks whenever he requires a short lead or slug in setting display matter, commercial or blank work, or justifying cuts or initial letters in book work, or in lining different sizes of type, and especially so in large book and job offices, where one lead and slug rack does service for all.

The moveable tray, containing removable figure and space boxes, is of great convenience in the correction of time-tables, tariffs and price lists. The figure and space boxes, being made to fit the figure boxes of regular cases, will be found very desirable when using high quads and spaces, or where the body of the work is in type of one kind and the figures of another, as it avords the necessity of clearing out the case boxes whether setting or distributing.

The compartment for time-tickets, proof, etc., is covered by a lid, thus preventing loss, besides keeping them clean.





HARRIS' IMPROVED LABOR-SAVING RULE CASE.



In these Cases the boxes are made of such proportionate width and depth that their diagonal is slightly less than than the height of a rule, consequently the different lengths are always held in nearly an upright position in the Case, with their face projecting above the partitions, even when only one or two pieces of rule remain in the box, and they can be readily and easily seized with the fingers.

The length of the boxes is so adjusted that the different lengths of rules fit easily the boxes to which they are apportioned, but the next longer piece of rule will not go into the next smaller box-greatly facilitating distribution and preventing the mixing of rule.

This arrangement of boxes gives great compactness with convenience and facility of selecting and distributing the different pieces of rule. The face of the rule is also less liable to become nicked when it is kept standing (as it always is in this case) than when part of it is lying flat in its box and part of it is standing upright, as frequently occurs in hoth the old style Rule Cases

Case No. 1 is exactly one-fourth the inside measurement of an ordinary blank Case, but it is made double, having two complete Cases in the same frame. It is designed for small offices and will hold two complete fonts or kinds of laborsaving rule of eight pounds each, or a total of sixteen pounds in the Case.

Taking 2-Point rule as a standard, each side of the Case has compartments for holding eighteen pieces of each length from 1 em to 9 ems, varying by ens; eighteen pieces of each length from 10 ems to 18 ems, varying by ems, and nine pieces each 19, 20, 21, 22, 24, 26 and 28 ems long; besides hoxes for five different lengths of mitered corners—10 right and 10 left miters of each size.

CASE No. 2 is of the same size as Case No. 1, and also holds sixteen pounds of rule-all of one font or kind, however. It has compartments for holding thirtysix pieces of 2-Point rule from 1 em to 9 ems, varying by ens; eighteen pieces of each length from 10 ems to 24 ems, varying by ems, and eighteen pieces each 26, 28, 30, 32, 34 and 26 ems long; besides boxes for mitered corners.

CASE No. 3 is now made in two sections, each of the same dimensions as the No. 1 and 2 size, and when placed together form a Case substantially as shown in the cut, the right-hand section being designated No. 03 and the left-hand section No. 04. The two sections are intended to be used together as one Case, and

will hold thirty-two pounds of rule, as follows: seventy-two pieces of each length from 1 em to 9 ems, varying by ens; thirty-six pieces of each length from 10 to 24 ems, varying by ems; and eighteen pieces of each length from 25 to 36 ems, varying by ems; hesides boxes for mitered corners.

The No. 03, or right-hand section, can also be used as a complete Case for a font of rule of sixteen pounds or less, when the longest piece is less than 20 ems in length. It is especially recommended for brass leaders and for fonts of 8-Point and thicker rule. Such rule, when cut to longer lengths than 20 ems is wasted capital, as the longer pieces, while costing as much or more than the rest of the entire font, are seldom used, and when wanted can he made up of two or more of the smaller pieces

An ordinary Blank Case will hold either: two of the No. 3; one of the No. 3 and two of the smaller; or four of either No. 1 or 2, or two of each. They can be easily taken out of the Blank Case in case it is desirable to have a certain style of rule nearer the compositor's stand when a job runs on same,

The No. 1 can also be used as a compositor's individual Lead Case with good results, and as the Point System is coming into general use these Cases will become especially valuable for holding 1-Point, 2-Point and 3-Point Leads, with which a large number of faces cast on the Point System can be made to line and instity accurately.

TYPE SIFTER CASE.

In all composing rooms more or less dust accumulates in the Type Cases. The Patent Type Sifter Case is made with a wire gauze top, and by means of clamps is fastened to the Case to be cleaned. After the Sifter is put in position, it is clamped at the four corners; then the Case is turned over, the clamps are removed, and if any dust has settled in the Case it can easily be removed with a duster. The operation of turning the type into the Sifter lets the dust fall through. Another feature of this arrangement is that when the Cases become short, it is very easy to fill them up by taking from another Case. The Type Sifter Case is manufactured in all sizes

ANNEX TYPE BOX.



In composing matter requiring characters usually kept in the upper part of the Cap Case, it is often very tiresome and comparatively slow work, on account of the extended movements of the hand necessary to reach them. To obviate this labor, and save time, is the object of this attachment. It can be readily attached to any of the full or half compart-

ments of the Lower Case, and the type placed in them can be taken out as easily and quickly as any of the 'Lower Case letters. They are constructed so that when attached to the Case the type in the Lower Case is fully as accessible as before, The capital letters commonly used, or most frequently used in special work, may be placed in these Type Boxes and attached to the several compartments containing

the lower case of the same letter, thereby saving much time and labor.

These Boxes are made scoop-shaped, so that the type may be easily taken from them by the compositor.





CUTTING AND MITERING MACHINES.

LEAD AND RULE CUTTER WITH STANDARD GAUGE.

The Standard Gauge principle, as applied in the Pica Standard Composing Stick shown above, is also applicable to Lead Cutters, Mitering Machines and Boxes, Saw-Tables for electrotype foundries, and similar machinery.

The illustrations here given represent the application of this principle to the Lead and Rule Cutter. The style of Cutter shown is the well-known and deservedly popular "Little Giant." The operation of the device is as easily seen as in




Fig. 1. - STYLE No. 1.

The milled headed screw, No. 1 (Fig. 1), actuates a lipped spring on the under side of the Gauge, which, when the screw is put down, engages in the notches in the raised portion of the Bed on which the Gauge slides, and thus holds the Gauge firmly in position wherever it is placed. A numbered brass strip is inlaid in the Cutter bed, parallel with the notches, to facilitate the setting of the Gauge to any desired measure. The Sliding Gauge is dovetailed upon the raised part of the bed.

The milled headed screw, No. 2 (Fig. 1), is to be used in setting the Gauge for bastard measures.

Fig. 2 shows the bottom side of Gauge on Cutter No. 1.

The device is simplicity itself, is warranted to be accurate, and will last a life-time.

Every practical printer should have this Cutter.




Fig. 3. - Style No. 2.

Fig. 3 shows the Standard Cutter Gauge No. 2, a different style for accomplishing the same thing as No. 1. A series of holes in the Cutter bed determine the Pica ems. The Gauge is held in place by pins projecting from its under surface (see Fig. 4), which engage in the holes in the bed. The Gauge plate is made of such length that by reversing it the Cutter may be set for any odd number of Nonpareil ems, so that the same Gauge may be used for both Nonpareil and Pica (or 6-Point and 12-Point) measures. The usual Gauge which accompanies the Cutter may be used for bastard measures.







The bed is twelve inches long, the guage extends eighteen inches, and the screw which holds the sliding guage works in a slot cut in the bed, giving a strong grip (to prevent slipping) and a quick adjustment.

Leads should be cut on the front section of the bed, and brass rule on the rear section only. When cutting rule, the bottom of the rule should be placed against the ridge in the centre of the bed.

MITCHELL'S PATENT RULE MITERING MACHINE.

This machine is made on the principle of a metal planer. The table carrying the rule moves forward and backward underneath the cutting tool, and at each reciprocation feeds the cutting tools down with a gradually




decreasing speed, until the cut or miter is completed, when it returns to the position at the commencement of the cut. The gauge is of sufficient length to accommodate pieces of rule two feet long; it is attached to the table by a set screw, and may be readily moved out of the way when not in use. The cutters are of tool steel, accurately ground and tempered, and so constructed that they may be sharpened by grinding on the face or flat side without changing their shape. The tools accompanying the machine are, a parting tool for cutting rule off square, and angle tools for cutting three, four, six and eight sided forms. tools are numbered according to the number of cuts required to complete the form. No amount of wear can in any way affect the accuracy of the work. One of the

principal features of the machine is in setting the tools. By placing a card or thin piece of brass underneath the gauge, the rule will not be cut quite through, so that after all the cuts are made, by bending the piece around, the corners are all perfect, the rule all in one piece, and as readily handled as a piece of type. 


In this Rule Shaper the rule is cut and both sides of a miter made at one operation, by means of a shaped cutter (1), which is clamped to a carriage operated by an eccentric on the fly-wheel shaft. The clamp (2) is first removed, or loosened sufficiently to admit the rule, which should always be clamped to the bed with the face toward the cutting tool. If the rule is less than 12-Point in thickness, the tool may be brought down to the rule by operating the feed-lever (3) without turning the wheel. Care should be taken not to lower it too far, as the point of the tool may be broken if forced to make too heavy a cut at the outset. Rule thicker than 12-Point can be mitered by raising the tool and making a double cut.

Five tools are sent with each machine—one for cutting off square, and one each for making figures with three, four, six or eight sides. The number of angles to the miter made by each tool is indicated by a figure stamped on the face. An adjusting screw will be found at the top of each tool. This should be set so that when the tool is at its lowest point it just clears the bed. This leaves a thin shell of brass after completing a miter, which serves to hold the rule together while being tied up or soldered. Should it be necessary to cut clear through the rule, this result can easily be attained, without changing the adjusting screw, by putting a strip of cardboard under the rule before clamping it to the bed. It will be found preferable, however, even when the rule is desired in separate pieces, not to cut clear through, but to break the thin shell which holds the pieces together, by bending the rule back and forth a few times. Good results cannot be expected if the bed has been deeply scored by the cutting tool. When this has been done by accident, the brass strip directly under the cutter should be forced out and reversed, or a new piece may be inserted. The fine feed—obtained by throwing up the pawl (3) on the side, near the feed-lever—should always be used for the finishing cuts on both thin and thick rules.

The burr formed on the bottom of the rule while making a cut can be removed with a file or a sharp penknife. If a burr is raised on the side of the rule, it shows that the tool is dull, or set too low. When dull, the tools are very easily sharpened by grinding the face of the tool, finishing with a few touches on an oil-stone. Do not change the angle of the face when grinding it. The sides of the tool, which form the angle, should not be ground.



GOLDING'S UPRIGHT MITERER.



This machine has all the advantages of the Upright Miterer in common use, with the following points of superiority:—


1. The cutter head is pivoted on an upright rod, so that the cut must be the same at the bottom as at the top, as the knife cannot slip away from its work, overcoming the greatest defect of the common Upright Miterer, on which the Knife has a tendency to slip outwards, cutting wider at the top than at the bottom. The lever at the same time has ample play, the distance between cutting line and knife when open being one-fourth of an iuch.

2. The knife is held by the screw (2) at the top of cutter head, and is regulated by two screws (3) at back of knife, overcoming the

difficulty of adjustment which is experienced in using the common Miterer. The knife may be removed for sharpening without changing the regulating screws, so that its position will be unchanged when replaced. The two screws afford means for squaring the knife.

- 3. The guage guide (5) is accurately graduated to multiples of 12-Point (new Pica), and numbered, and the movable guage (7) is set instantly by an indicator (8) without using quads. The movable guage is held at the bottom in a V-shaped groove (9), and the set screw acts on the beveled top in such a way that the greatest amount of pressure is obtained, to prevent slipping.
 - 4. For cutting short lengths, when it is inconvenient or impossible to hold the rule against the guage guide with the fingers, a novel rule-clamp (10) is provided.
- 5. The guage guide (5) is held to the bed plate by a screw underneath the bed, as in the common Miterer, but on this machine the screw is controlled by a lever (6), easier to get at.
 - 6. The bed plate can be moved when the knife gets dull in one spot, so that the full length of the knife can be used.
- 7. There are graduations on the bed for all angles commonly required, and these are marked in plain figures indicating the proper position of the guage guide for making any given number of angles, without need of calculation. Thus, for instance, to cut an octagon, set the guage guide at the line marked 8 on the bed.





To adjust the cylinder, take a plate that is type-high, lay upon it a piece of cardboard, and raise the cylinder until it will just slip under easily. Paste


the tympan sheet and fly the sheets the same as on a Washington Hand Press. Raise the cylinder by the lever, as the bed passes under it, until the form clears the cylinder; then take your hand off the cylinder lever, and as the bed returns the impression is taken. To add impression at any time, tighten the set screws upon the top of the springs.

For job work, place the form upon the end of the bed next the tympan, and put on the half tympan furnished with each press; fly the sheets and take the impression as in newspaper work, but stopping the bed when the tympan has passed under the cylinder, thus virtually using only one half of the bed, and saving one half of the travel. If less than a half-sheet job is to be printed, bearers may be used the height of type, placed at each end of the



form, outside the chase, and the regular impression need not be changed; but if the bearers are not used the impression should be regulated according to the size of the form.

THE ARMY HAND PRESS.



Resembles the modern or common Hand Press in having Ways, Bed, Tympan and Frisket. In place of a platen and levers it has a Cylinder, by the rotation of which the bed is moved and the impression given at each motion, back or forth. The tympan is covered with the best gum cloth. The frisket is covered with paper the same as other Hand Presses. The form is inked by hand. Impression is adjusted by screws under the bearings of the cylinder. The sheet is worked folded and turned, taking four impressions to complete each paper. The pressman can work from 200 to 300 impressions per hour, and do good newspaper work. There is nothing wonderful about this kind of newspaper work except the cheapness of the outfit for it. Where it is desirable to start on a very economical scale, commencing with a very small circulation, the outfit does admirably.

The Army Press should not be confused with the Adams' Cottage Press. The latter has no frisket, the former has; the latter has a loose cylinder, while, in the Army, the bed and cylinder are firmly geared together, and there are other important differences.

There is is no loss of power, for all that is exerted is applied directly on the knife-bar, as there are no intermediate connections between it and the lever.

The Hero will cut full 23 inches, and a pile $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick. The back gauge is 18 inches wide, can be run back $23\frac{1}{4}$ inches from knife, and drawn to within $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of knife. It is also very close to back side-gauge for convenience in squaring narrow as well as wide piles. The front table extends 12 inches in front of knife, and is provided with a fine brass measuring rule divided into eighths of inches. As a label cutter the Hero has no equal. #### ORIGINALITY IN DESIGNING.

VIEWS OF A SUCCESSFUL COMPOSITOR LAID BARE TO READERS.

There are very few job compositors who can get up original designs for general work fast enough to be of profit to the employer, and, at the same time, have them to compare in point of beauty and symmetry with those already existing and in common usc. There are but few, even among those who are recognized as first-class workmen, who will take the chances of obtaining satisfactory results by following their own ideas all the time to the entire exclusion of all other suggestions. They know that display and ornamentation are purely matters of taste and cultivation, and that very few unchangeable rules can be laid down in regard to them. They know that they must gain their ideas and knowledge from observation - by a thorough study of the productions of others, as well as by following their own ideas of what is right and proper in composition. They know that any workman, no matter how humble or obscure, can teach them something which they can make profitable; so they do not hesitate to adopt that which they know is good, even if it comes from the youngest apprentice in the office or from the worst smithy in the neighborhood. The successful workmen are those who sufficiently educate themselves in their business to be able to gather the good things which come under their observation and reject those that are faulty. really enthusiastic printer finds many objects worthy of his attention on all sides, and examples from which can gain good ideas are to be found in nearly every store, office, shop, and dwelling. There are very few pieces of printing so poor that some good ideas cannot be gathered from them and there are very few good enough to be entirely free from faults and inaccuracies; and he who studies his surroundings closely and intelligently will gather more useful information and practical ideas by comparing and thinking over what others have done and collecting and classifying the good points and correct principles, than he can by devoting his entire attention to original construction. There have been, and now are, many workmen of artistic taste in the printing business whose productions furnish abundance of material for thought and reflection to the progressive student, and until we become familiar with the standard rules, ideas, and forms which surround us, we cannot look for success.

#### THE GENIUS OF A COMPOSITOR.

AN ORIGINAL PIECE OF COMPOSITION AN UNKNOWN PRODUCTION.

A COMPOSITOR, unless he is a natural genius, should spend long years in study and patient practice, cultivating his taste and strengthening his judgment, before he enters very far into the domain of original designing, if he wishes to give satisfaction to his employers and to the eustomers of his employers. New beginners often bring forth new designs, never known before and which no one would probably ever wish to see again, at a marvellous speed. But in this, as in everything else, the farther they advance the more eareful they are of their opinions and ideas as authority for those whom they eonsider their inferiors in all respects. Newness, however, should not be their sole thought, unless they know that they can improve upon that which already exists in the same department. A new thing without merit is worse than an old thing worn threadbare. An entirely original piece of composition is an almost unknown production, when we consider the word original to mean the bringing into existence that which was unknown before. Original ideas are not so plentiful as many seem to suppose. They do not come spontaneously to those who imagine romantically that they were born for the sole purpose of revolutionizing some great department of human industry, but rather to those who have laboriously striven to gather and make good use of the results of their predecessors' labors as well as the fruits of the efforts of all those who are eontemporaneous with them. There are eontemporaneous with them. There are many things which are elaimed to be new and original that are nothing more than a and original that are nothing more than a variation in the combination of many old ideas. There is nothing wrong in a new arranging of old forms, because, by this means many important improvements in designing have been made, but the ones who improve, or try to improve, upon the productions of others should not claim to be originators. Those who claim to be truly "original printers" now are nothing more nor less than borrowers of the ideas more nor less than borrowers of the ideas of others. It requires an artist of the best order to be an original workman in the highest sense of the term; and when an ordinary compositor professes to be such we can safely conclude that he possesses an unlimited amount of "cheek," or that he believes his associates or acquaintances are verdant enough to form their opinions and give him their orders upon merest pretensions. The best and most honorable way to do is to gather all the good things we can find from every source within our reach, give proper eredit, and then leave the claims to originality until a later period in our lives, until a time when we we can sustain them. An ability for work that is original, if it is shown in a marked degree, is a gift of nature. Of eourse these natural inelinations can be cultivated by application, but if there is nothing to start with, it will be a very difficult task to force the growth of skill in this direction.

#### KNOWLEDGE AND IMPROVEMENT.

THE DISCOURSER PREACHES ON THE SUBJECT IN A MOST APPROVED MANNER.

ALL printers cannot be inventors of new ideas any more than all machinists can be inventors of labor-saving machinery. Such work requires a strong imagination and the power of close and continued application, and those who are without these qualities are wasting much time when they try to establish themselves as being original workers. They could put in their time much better in making their own that which others have formed, and in cultivating their taste, judgment and dexterity. improvement and advancement should possess all who make their living at printing. should never hesitate to make a step forward when they are sure of the ground upon which they are stepping. This age ealls too loudly for practical results to allow of very much for experimenting, especially by those who are not gifted with the qualities which go to make good experimenters. Practical forms, rules, and all appliances must be adopted, and then may be added as necessity demands, or as knowledge or convenience makes desirable. When some improvement is suggested to a good workman while attending to his daily duties, and after being carefully thought of by him and adopted in his practice, it is almost sure to be a benefit and addition to real knowledge, and will be well worthy of the study of his associates and neighbors in the same business. But when he insists upon making experiments for the mere novelty of the thing, or just to gain admiration without a desire to improve existing practices or add to their own knowledge or ability, the chances for advancement are very few when compared with the chances for failure. for practical results to allow of very much for

So much has been said about "artistie" printing that, at the first blush, one would naturally come to the conclusion that all that could be said had been said. Yet it is not so. We can scarcely open a trade organ without seeing something, either good, bad or indifferent, on the subject. In fact, our daily and weekly newspapers and literary journals must also have their say, with an amount of freshness, too, that betokens "a few more words." As yet, there seems no likelihood of arriving at a very speedy end to this chapter on the history of printing; and, speaking for ourselves, we are glad that it should be thus. It is an evidence of a growing desire on the part of those interested in printing to see it more worthily filling the exalted position for which it was surely destined. But when we take into consideration the long line of years throughout which our craft has suffered the depleting influences of those who have gone into it to make money, and that quickly, we must be prepared for a somewhat arduons task in our endeavors to right it again. It is hardly likely that with such an accumulation of evils as have been heaped upon us. Let us have patience. Rome was not built in a day, yet it did not take old Nero much longer than that to reduce it to ashes. Again, let us have patience. It is now (March 1889) over five years since the style of type known as 'Type-Writer" was first brought out. It was originated by the Central Type Foundry, and has had a larger sale than any face ever before produced. It was suggested by Mr. J. C. Blair, manufacturing stationer, a of Huntingdon, Pa., one of the most progressive men in typographic matters in this country.

The great usefulness of this face as a type with which circulars could be made to resemble genuine correspondence, and thus secure for them the attention which it was previously so hard to get, was so apparent at first glance that an immense demand sprung up for it, taxing the foundry to the utmost to fill the orders that came in.

After this type came into general use, the founders in different parts of the country began displaying their usual enterprise by copying and imitating the face.
