The foreign office here has not yet received the Sultan's reply to the note which M. Bapst, councillor of the French legation at Constantinople, presented to the Turkish government, askink how Turkey proposed to pay the Lorando claim and requesting satisfaction regarding France's rights.

The correspondent here of the Associated Press is enabled to make the following statement: When the French government decided to send a squadron to Turkish waters, it debated whether to seize the customs at Salonica, Beyrout or Smyrna, as it was realized that only the receipts of one of these three big ports could produce a sufficient sum to pay off the French clams without a long occupation, which was considered inadvisable. The choice of M. Deleasse fell on Smyrna, which offers advantages equal to the other ports without having their political drawbacks. On Saturday, however, came the dispatch from M, Bapst, announcing the issuing of the Sultan's irade, accepting the Lorando claim in its entirety as France had demanded. It was moved that the communication be tabled, but Ald. Williams contended that no such discourtcous action should be answered. Ald. Hall held a similar view, Ald. Cameron remarked that this tax was an unfair one, and it was necessary that it be either collected from none or from all. It was hardly right that those who had paid their business tax should be compelled to pay the impost on vehicles which constituted necessary parts of their business. He advised that Mr. Eden be informed that the by-law would be enforced until repealed. This course was decided upon.






