PREFACE

- SUCCESS is a favorable or prosperous result or termination of anything attempted, and the claim of success on the part of its author in presenting the first edition of Who's Who of the Colored Race is justified by the fact that it appears at all. Quite a few people withhold their confidence; but doubt lies altogether in the mind and has no force, while success is the result of a firm and fixed purpose and a constant grind to the end. Therefore there is a certain pleasure in presenting the first volume with the confidence that the book merits approval and meets the needs of the American people in general.
- BIOGRAPHY is properly a department of history, and this book records sufficient evidence of progress in the 50th year of freedom to prove that the Negro of America "has a place in the Sun"; therefore this work seems timely, and, it is believed, will be THE standard biographial dictionary of the colored people. No other biographical work extant, or extinct, has covered the field in such an authentic way, tho it is far from complete, of course.
- NAMES which should have been included will be missed, but in practically all cases the omission is not in the least due to the lack of effort of those having the preparation of the book in hand. By mailed request hundreds who were regarded as eligible were solicited, in a respectful way, to furnish personal data. The majority of those whose names appear in this volume furnished the data freely and in a courteous manner, and to them thanks is hereby extended. A few gave information with evident reluctance and others showed complete indifference and let the requests for data go unnoticed, due largely to the fact that the work was not understood.
- NOTWITHSTANDING the reasons named, which have prevented the inclusion of persons whose life-sketches it had been intended to give, the publication may make just claim to a greater degree of accuracy and a more dependable and authoritive record in regard to the leaders in business, professional, industrial, official and intellectual life of men and women of African descent than has ever been collected before.
- BISHOPS, as well as names of all general officers of the various churches, will be found in this edition, tho some of the sketches are not as complete records of their lives as is desired. The attempt was also made to include all the officers, professors, instructors, principals and teachers of the leading educational institutions. Requests for data were sent to principals of all the colored high schools; extra effort was made to give full recognition to the Anna T. Jeanes Fund by mention of all the supervising industrial teachers in the various states, whose work

is aided by that fund; the list is not complete, yet there is a creditable representation of the supervising industrial teachers.

THE JEWISH religion is represented by one subject in this volume. The only clergyman of the Movarian Church in the United States is . mentioned herein, also the only Greek Orthodox Catholic colored priest in the world. There are three of the Roman Catholic priests, and a considerable number of persons of the Catholic faith, as well as clergymen and laymen of practically all denominations. The sketch of the only Negro silk manufacturer will be found in the book, one proctor in admiralty, one municipal judge, the King of Uganda, President of Liberia, legislators, city councilmen, and persons filling various offices and positions in city, county, state and nation. In the professions and different lines of trade the representation is quite general. reader will think of twenty persons of prominence throughout the country it is safe to say he will find more than three-fourths of them represented in this book; furthermore, it may be mentioned that, the now famous book-Who's Who in America-began with 827 pages in its first edition, with a field of 80,000,000 people, therefore this volume is certainly a fairly good showing for the first attempt to produce a biographical dictionary exclusively of colored people.

THE WAR in Europe made the collection of data from foreign countries almost impossible. Letters sent to Germany were all returned, tho the addresses had been furnished from responsible sources. For some time we abandoned all hope of any representation from Abroad, but it will be found that some interesting sketches appear. The number of sketches secured from Africa will suggest what may be looked for in future editions; it will be the aim to present sufficient information in the second volume to make a special section of foreign subjects.

TO INFORM those who may not be familiar with the book and its purposes, the following statement is presented. It aims to give a brief, crisp, personal sketch of men and women of African descent in all parts of the world who are most prominent in all branches of effort, also persons who are identified with work of every description which tends to the advancement of colored people. Some of these may not be particularly prominent, in their own eyes, even if others do so regard them; it should be understood that all "must creep before they walk," and it seems a duty to recognize those who are making an effort in creditable lines. The book tells the things every intelligent person wants to know about those who are making progress in every reputable walk in life-birthplace, age, parentage, education, degrees, position and achievements, politics, religion, societies, clubs, business, profession, occupation, marriage, children; in fact the chief features of each career without any puffery of eulogy, praise or criticism (except that a word intended for information is regarded as such).

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FREE INSERTION of all sketches is the rule. Not a line in this book has been paid for. Not a single sketch can be paid for in future editions. Not even a subscription for a copy of the book is obligatory, the the hope for orders from all sources is frankly admitted. When a person pays a price for inserting business of personal matter he naturally exacts that "copy" be followed to the letter. On the other hand, when money will not buy the space, the editor exercises his right to reduce the data to pure facts. Therefore the information this book possesses may be relied upon in its use for all purposes. Portraits are not admitted in these pages, principally because there is a suggestion of charge; in fact we have been offered pay for their insertion surely a score of times. Plain language can not too strongly emphasize the fact that there are no "trade secrets" used in the preparation of this work, and no "book agent tricks" connected with its sale. Merit alone counts; men and women making an effort for self improvement and the advancement of the colored people are entitled to sketches in the book without other consideration, and the book is sold strictly on its Those who on first thought might wish to criticise the price per copy, will, on second thought, admit they know nothing of the labor and expense required to produce it. The printer may estimate the mechanical cost, but no author can estimate by his own works the time, labor and expense of producing this one. The fact that fifteen months were required to produce it will answer the critics.

TWENTIETH CENTURY BIOGRAPHY: The the term "biography" is modern, the kind of literature it represents is ancient. In the book of Genesis there are biographies, or at least memoirs, of Adam, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph and others. Homer's "Odyssey" may be considered to be an extended biography of Ulyssus, limited, however, to the most interesting periods of his life—that of his wanderings. The the "Ilaid" may be loosely called a history of the Trojan war, yet, more accurately, it is a chapter from biography of Achilles, describing calamities brought upon the Greeks by the revenge which he took on Agamemnon for carrying off his female captive Briseis. The most elaborate ancient Greek biography was Plutrach's Parallel Lives, consisting of 45 memoirs of Greek, Roman and other celebrities; it was published about A.D. 80. In B.C. 44, Cornelius Nepos had sent forth a biographical work, his Vitoe Imperatorum, Lives of Commanders.

Biographical dictionaries (much like Who's Who of the Colored Race) date from the Eleucidarius Carminum et Historiarum (Holland, 1498). But the nineteenth century was, as the twentieth is and promises to be, a flourishing period for them. Among the best general dictionaries are the Biographie Universelle, ancienne et moderne (new ed., 45 vols., Paris, 1843-65); and the Nouvelle Biographie Generale (46 vols., Paris, 1852-77). One of the best works of the kind published in the United States is Lippincott's Pronouncing Biographical Diction-

ary, by Dr. Joseph Thomas, often re-edited; others include Appleton's Cyclopaedia of American Biography (6 vols., New York, 1887-89), a seventh volume appearing as a supplement, and Lamb's Biographical Dictionary of the United States.

For contemporary biography we have Men and Women of the Time, Who's Who (London); Who's Who in America (Chicago); Who's Who in New York (New York). These are revised annually or biennially. They contain only the biographies of living persons, tho reference is made to preceding volumes in the case of distinguished men and women who have died.

Aspiring to the high standard and a place in all public and private libraries beside the famous works mentioned above, Who's Who of the Colored Race asks the co-operation and support of men and women of African descent throughout the world.

SUCCEEDING GENERATIONS will regard the Negro of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries with similar honor and respect that descendents of the Pilgrim Fathers regard their ancestors. Even at this early date in the advancement of the colored people the Bustill Family Association exists in Philadelphia, and there are several sketches in this book in which the ancestry is mentioned. Coming generations will value accurate records of the Negro of today more than any other one thing that the men and women of the twentieth century can hand down to posterity. This fact should move every person to aid in making these records of progress complete by furnishing date for insertion in WHO'S WHO OF THE COLORED RACE.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN 1809–1865

I do the very best I know how the very best I can; and I mean to keep doing so until the end. If the end brings me out all right, what is said against me won't amount to anything. If the end brings me out wrong, ten angels swearing I was right would make no difference.

EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION

Now, therefore, I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, by virtue of the power in me vested as Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States in time of actual armed rebellion against the authority and Government of the United States, and as a fit and necessary war measure for suppressing said rebellion, do, on this first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and in accordance with my purpose so to do, publicly proclaimed for the full period of one hundred days from the day first above mentioned, order and designate as the States and parts of States, wherein the people thereof respectively are this day in rebellion against the United States, the following, to-wit:

"Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana (except the parishes of St. Bernard, Plaquemine, Jefferson, St. John, St. Charles, Ascension, Assumption, Terre Bonne, Lafourche, St. Mary, St. Martin, and Orleans, including the city of New Orleans) Mississippi, Alabama, Florida ,Georgia ,South Carolina, North Carolina, and Virginia (except the forty-eight countries designated as West Virginia, and also the counties of Berkley, Accomac, Northampton, Elizabeth City, York, Princess Anne, and Norfolk, including the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth), and which excepted parts are, for the present, left precisely as if this proclamation were not

issued.

"And by virtue of the power and for the purpose aforesaid, I do order and declare that all persons held as slaves within said designated States and parts of States, are and henceforward shall be free; and that the Executive Government of the United States, including the military and naval authorities thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of said persons.

"And I hereby enjoin upon the people so declared to be free, to abstain from all violence, unless in necessary self-defense; and I recommend to them that, in all cases when allowed, they labor faithfully for

reasonable wages.

"And I further declare and make known that such persons, of suitable conditions, will be received into the armed service of the United States to garrison forts, positions, stations, and other places, and to man vessels of all sorts in said service.

"And upon this act, sincerely believed to be an act of justice, warranted by the Constitution upon military necessity, I invoke the considerate judgment of mankind, and the gracious favor of Almighty God.

"In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my name and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington, this 1st day of January, in the year of our Lord, 1863, and of the independence of the United States the 87th. "By the President: ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

"WILLIAM H. SEWARD, Secretary of State."

13th AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

Sec. 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appro-

priate legislation.

HOUSE BILL No. 919

A BILL

For an Act providing for an exhibition and celebration to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the emancipation of the Negro, creating a commission to conduct same and making an appropriation therefor.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: That there is hereby created a commission to consist of the Governor and eight persons, residents of the State of Illinois, two of whom shall be members of the Senate and two of the House of Representatives in the State of Illinois, all of whom shall be appointed by the Governor, to arrange for and conduct during the year 1915 at a place to be selected by said commission, an exhibition and celebration to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the freeing of the Negro from slavery. Such exhibition and celebration shall be so conducted as to show the industrial, educational and religious progress of the Negro inhabitants of this commonwealth. The commission shall serve without compensation, but shall be allowed such expenses for traveling, clerical help, stenographers and necessary employees as shall be actually and necessarily incurred in the performance of its duty: Provided however, that the secretary of said commission, who shall be elected by said commission, and who may or may not be a member of said commission, shall receive such reasonable compensation as shall be determined upon and fixed by said commission. Said commission shall have full power and authority to collect, maintain and properly house said exhibit, and pay the expenses thereof.

Sec. 2. To carry out the purposes of this Act the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated. . . All payments shall be made on warrants of the Auditor of Public Accounts on vouchers of the commission approved by him.

Sec. 3. As soon after the organization of the commission, notice shall be filed with the State Treasurer and State Auditor of Public Accounts, of the election of the officers of said commission who from time to time, shall be authorized through the president and secretary of said commission, to draw warrants on the State Auditor of Public Accounts for such salaries or expenses incurred by the State Commission, such warrants, however, to be subject to approval of the Governor of the State of Illinois, and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois is hereby directed and empowered to pay the same.

Sec. 4. The Commission shall annually make a report to the Governor, and within 60 days after the close of its exhibition, the commission shall make a complete report and statement of all its doings, which shall include all exhibits and representations made, and the awards made on such exhibits, if any, and such other matters as the commission may deem of value to the State of Illinois, together with a list of all receipts and disbursements, with complete vouchers therefor. The commission shall keep a strict account of its receipts and disbursements.

Sec. 5. The commission shall in no manner create or incur any indebtedness or obligation in behalf of the State of Illinois in excess of any appropriation herein made.

HOUSE BILL No. 132

Passed by House, June 10, 1915 Passed by Senate June 18, 1915

"That the sum of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) dollars be and hereby is appropriated under the terms of this Act to be expended as herein provided by the commission authorized and appointed under the Act entitled, "An Act providing for an exhibition and celebration to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the emancipation of the Negro, creating a commission to conduct same, and making an appropriation therefor," approved June 27, 1913.


Sec. 2. "Only so much of the said appropriation of \$25,000 to the Negro Emancipation Celebration Commission shall be paid from the State treasury as shall equal the sum raised by subscriptions, leases, concessions and from other sources, and paid in cash to the treasurer of the commission by said commission up to August 15, 1915, and the question as to the amount so raised shall be determined and certified by the Governor. And the commission shall in no manner create or incur an indebtedness or obligation on behalf of the State of Illinois, nor expend any fund of the State other than in the manner provided herein."

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PERCENTAGE NEGRO IN TOTAL POPULATION, BY STATES: 1910.



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

MARITAL CONDITION.

The United States census for 1910 shows that the Negro population 15 years of age and over, 64 per cent of the males and 73.1 per cent of the females had married. The percentage is larger for females than for males because females marry at a younger age. The fact that the percentage who have married is larger for the Negroes than for either of those termed by the census bureau as "the two classes of native whites" is likewise to be explained as indicating that in general Negroes marry at a younger age than whites.

The total difference is not so great, however, as statistics show that of the total population in the United States 60.8 per cent of the males and 70 per cent of the females had married, while 64. per cent of the males (Negroes) and 73.1 of the females had married.

DIVORCED.

The number of divorced persons reported by the census necessarily falls short of the number of persons who have been divorced, since many divorced persons have remarried, and the census reports simply the marital condition of the population at the date of the enumeration. Moreover, it is practically certain that census returns as to the number divorced persons not remarried are below the true total, some divorced persons having reported themselves as single, some as married, and some as widowed.

The number of Negro males reported as divorced was 20,146, female 33,-The proportion is 0.7 per cent for the males and 1.1 per cent for the females, both of these percentages being higher than the corresponding ones for any other classes of the population. the differences being nounced in case of the females. The reports show that of the males of all classes, 0.5 per cent were divorced, females 0.6 per cent. It should be kept in mind in this connection that a greater proportion of divorced persons is a natural result of earlier marriage on the part of the Negroes.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

There were 1,670,650 Negroes reported as allending school in the school year : 4.9-10, this number forming 9.3 per cent of the total number of persons attending school in the United States. The census tables give a comparison of the percentages attending school, for the Negroes and the native whites, by age groups, and show that the proportion is lower for? the Negroes in every group. The dif-ir ference appears to be most pronounced in the youngest group, 6 tom 9 years, and is less in the age groups 10 to 14, and 15 to 17. The proportion also shows that more Negro females: than males in each age group were attending school.

OWNERSHIP OF HOMES.

The aggregate number of all homest occupied by Negro families in the Southern states in 1910 was 1,917,391,2 of which 430,449, or 22.4 per cent, were reported as owned, including 314,340 reported as owned free from incumbrance, the owned-free homest constituting 16.4 per cent of all homes. The 98,987 encumbered homest formed 23 per cent of the owned, homes.

AGRICULTURE.

There were 893,370 Negro farms operators in 1910, and 5,440,619 white farm operators, the Negro operators forming 14 per cent of the total number, a considerable greater proportion than the proportion of the Negro population to the total population of the United States which was 10.7 per cent.

The total acreage of farms operated by Negroes was 42,279,510 in 1910, the average per farm being 47.3 acres, as compared with an average of 153 for the farms operated by whites. The average improved acreage of Negro farms was 31.2, as compared with 82.6 for farms operated by whites.

The total value of farm property operated by Negroes in 1910 was \$1,1141,792,526; in 1900 the same itemiwas \$499,941,234, so that there was an increase of 128.4 per cent during the

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decade, while the farm property operated by whites increased 99.6 per cent

The value of implements and machinery on farms operated by Negroes increased \$1.2 per cent during the 10 years 1900-10, the value of live stock increased 117.7 per cent, the value of buildings 131.6 per cent, and that of land 133.2 per cent.

The difference in the rate of growth between farms operated by Negroes and by whites is greatest when value of live stock is considered, the rate of increase being only 58.6 per cent on farms operated by whites, as compared with 117.7 per cent on those

operated by Negroes.

The average value of farms operated by Negroes in 1910 was \$1,280.75, as compared with an average of \$669.52 for 1900, and of \$299.21 for farms operated by whites in 1910; the average value of farm property per acre was \$27.01 on farms operated by Negroes in 1910, as compared with \$13.08 for 1900, and \$47.72 for farms operated by whites in 1910.

Three-fourths of the Negro farmers in 1910 were tenants and one-fourth owners, the number of managers being small. The proportion of owners decreased slightly and that of tenants increased slightly between 1900 and Among whites about thirds of the farms are operated by

owners.

It occurs that the census reports contain the term "colored" which inbesides Negroes, Indians, Chinese, and Japanese, but of the total of 678.118 farms operated by colored tenants, 672,964, or 99.2 per cent, were operated by Negro tenants, and therefore the figures for colored tenants approximate closely to those for Negro tenants alone.

RELIGIOUS BODIES.

The last report of Negro churches was a special census of religious bodies in 1906 based upon returns received direct from the local organizations. While the report shows 36,770 organizations consisting in whole or in part of Negro organizations, it is

deemed best to confine this to Negro organizations exclusively. The denominations consisting exclusively of Negro organizations numbered 31.393: the number of communicants or members, 3,207,307; church edifices, 30,-053; value of church property, \$44,-473,049. The Baptists (National Baptist Convention) led with bodies. members. 2.261,607 17.913 edifies, and value of church property at \$24,437,272; the African Methodist Episcopal Church second with 6.647 bodies, 494,777 members, 6538 edifices. property value, \$11,303,489. were 2,381 bodies of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Chrch, 172,996 edifices, property African Methodist members, 2.327 value, \$3,017,849. Episcopal Zion Church had bodies, 184,542 members, 2,131 edivalue. fices, property \$4.833,207. Colored Cumberland Presbyterian Church 196 bodies, 18,066 members, 195 edifices, and property valued at \$203,778. There were 3,750 Negro organizations in the Methodist Episcopal Church, 156 Congregationalists. 198 in Protestant Episcopal Church. 38 Reformed Episcopal Church, 36 organizations in the Roman Catholic Church with 38,235 members, and 2 bodies in the Moravian (Unitas Fratrium).

Only brief mention of the churches is given here because more detailed reports will be found in the Negro

Year Book.

OCCUPATIONS.

Of the total number of 7.317.922 Negroes 10 years of age and over enumerated at the 13th ensus, 5.192,-535, or 71 per cent, were reported as gainfully employed. As they are identified with practically every line of industry, trade and profession. much of which is understood and known to the general public, we will simply mention some of the more important ones, and those in special lines.

GREEK-LETTER FRATERNITIES.

Societies of students are found in nearly all the colleges and universities in the United States. In general they are secret in character; but this secrecy is largely nominal, consisting chiefly of extreme care in protecting their constitutions, mottoes, and grips from outside knowledge and in holding secret meetings. Aside from this they do not cultivate mystery in their methods of work.

The first Greek-letter society, Phi Beta Kappa, was organized at the College of William and Mary in England, 1776. The Yale chapter was established in 1780 and that of Harvard, 1781. In 1787 these two chapters united to found a chapter at Dartmouth College.

Quite a number of colored men are members of chapters of the older American universities. The first society organized in a colored college, however, is said to be Alpha Phi Alpha. The Boule fraternity seems to have been adopted from the ancient Greece advisory council. The boule

of the Homemic times was composed of princes and leading men and was purely a consultive body, and is traced to an age of more than 500 years B.C. More complete information will be collected for the second volume of Who's Who of the Colored Race, but at this time it was simply intended to name the following fraternities most often mentioned in the sketches in this volume.

Africa; studied Greek, Latin and other higher branches of learning; was also second master in a public school at Freetown: took course in the Church Missionary Society College at Fourah Bay in Freetown; appointed a missionary teacher and lay-reader under Rt. Rev. Samuel David Ferguson, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Liberia; after a number of years in W. Africa he returned to England and took up course of private studies. From England he came to America and worked among colored people, continuing as lay-reader: was accepted as a Postulant and candidate for Holy Orders in the Pro-Episcopal Church: during canonical period of waiting before ordination returned to England and was a student at Saint Aidan's Theological College, Birkenhead, and finally prosecuted his studies for Holy Orders at King's College, Univ. of London. Returned to America and was ordained to the Protestant Episcopal ministry, in the diocese of Delaware; appointed honorary curate in St. Matthew's. Wilmington: also taught in different public schools in Delaware. For many years he maintained serious doubts concerning the teachings of the whole Anglican Communion; the change that came over him resulted in more than 3 years special study of Anglicanism; he also studied the standards and formularies, and examined the dogmas and doctrinal teachings found in the Roman and Greek Catholic churches; it was his final conviction that the Holy Greek Orthodox Catholic and Apostolic Church is the pillar and ground of the truth; he therefore resigned from the Protestant Episcopal Church and entered upon an extensive Abroad; he spent a long time in Rusvisiting the convents. monasteries, cloisters and abbeys of the Holy Orthodox Catholic Church; after the foreign tour he studied in America under Greek priests about 3 years. He returned to Europe and received baptism by trine immersion by an archbishop of the Throne of the Holy See of Constantinople, and was confirmed with Holy Chrism in the presence of 3,000 people of the white race; in regular order of succession, at different times, he was ordained sub-deacon, deacon and priest; afterwards at a special service he was duly commissioned Priest-Apostolic from the Ecumenical and Patriarchal Throng of Constantinoble to America and the West Indies. He has

resided in Palistine, Syria, Joppa, Greece, Cyprus, Mitylene, Chios, Sicily, Crete, Egypt, Russia, Turkey, Austria, Germany, England, France, Scandanavia, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Switzerland, Bermuda and the United States: he is associated with the Greek Orthodox Catholic Church in Philadelphia, and is the only priest of African descent of that denomination in the world; founder and superior of the Order of the Cross of Golgotha, a religious fraternity.
