

# REMARKS.

The cultivation of Ornamental Trees and Shrubs is rapidly increasing, and with the increasing taste, a desire to possess a greater variety than has usually been enumerated in catalogues in this country. The publication of that magnificent work, the Arboretum Britannicum, by the late Mr. Loudon, has made known a vast number of trees and shrubs, which, through the exertions of foreign collectors, have been introduced into Great Britain and the Continent and have already added so much to the embellishment of their gardens and grounds. A great portion of these being perfectly hardy, their introduction into our gardens is an object of great importance ; for although our country is rich in hardy trees and shrubs, many of which are but little known, there are many among the numerous seedlings of recent origin, which rank among the most beautiful of Ornamental Trees. To introduce them into our collections, no pains or expense have been spared; a personal inspection of some of the most noted arboretums in England, Scotland and France, as well as the most extensive commercial establishments, has enabled us to select the most beautiful and desirable kinds, and has also enabled us to effect a correspondence, by which every thing new and rare, hereafter introduced, will be received as soon as it is offered for sale.

The annexed prices for trees are for those of fair size for transplantation and removal, with the exception of new and rare kinds, which are small. Trees of *extra size* of many kinds can be supplied, for which *extra prices* will be charged.

The proper seasons for transplanting trees are March, April and May, in the Spring, and September, October and November, in the Autuma. For the South and West, the most favorable period for transportation is the Autuma. For the South and West, the most distant parts of the Union with entire success. Orders, to ensure a good selection, both as regards size and variety, should always be forwarded early, as many sorts are often exhausted before the season is half over. Bundles of trees or boxes of plants will be delivered in Boston free of expense, and shipped either direct, or by the way of New York, or forwarded by any of the Express Lines or Railroads to any part of the country.

All letters of enquiries, or application for Catalogues, to receive any attention, must be post paid.

IF All orders for trees, from unknown correspondents, must be accompanied with a draft on Boston or New York, payable at sight, or within thirty or sixty days after the delivery of the trees. The fluctuations in exchange, and the expense and trouble of collecting bills at a distance, render it necessary for us to adopt this course.

Catalogues may be had at our Seed Store and Agricultural Warehouse, 7 Merchants Row, Boston, or on application by mail, (post paid.)

The Nurseries are situated on the Cambridge road to Mount Auburn, half a mile east of Harvard Colleges, and about two miles from Boston. Two large Conservatories and an extensive Green-house, each with span roofs, have been erected, which are filled with choice collections of Camellias, Roses, Pelargoniums, Ericas, Azaleas, and Miscellaneous Plants. All amateurs and lovers of plants are invited to visit the Nurseries. In the month of May, a splendid collection of Tulips will be in flower. In June, upwards of 800 varieties of hardy Roses. During the Autumn, an unrivalled collection of Perpetual, Bourbon, Bengal, Tea and Noisette Roses,—and in September, a magnificent collection of Dahlias. In the Conservatory, the Chrysanthemums will be in bloom in November.—the Camellias in January,—the Azaleas in February,—the Roses in March,—the Pelargoniums in April and May,—and the Japan lilies in June.

Omnibus coaches pass within a few rods of the Nursery every fifteen minutes during the day.

IF A liberal discount will be made to the trade and to individuals purchasing large quantities of trees.

# ORNAMENTAL TREES.

For the information of those unacquainted with trees, we have divided the following into three classes, the first of which (1,) includes only those which attain the largest size; the second (2,) those of medium size; and the third (3,) those which are of slow growth, or which do not attain a size much above the largest shrubs. The latter are best adapted for lawns and pleasure grounds.

The prices are for trees of moderate size, suitable for transplanting; those of *extra* size will be charged higher, and those of smaller size will be furnished at considerably lower prices by the quantity.

A few marked with a star (\*,) are considered rather tender in the latitude of Boston.
