

**HARKNESS TO FLY  
BIPLANE BUILT BY  
SAN DIEGAN**

Machine Is of Curtiss Type  
Equipped With Engine  
Of New Model.

SOON TO BE GIVEN TRIAL

Hangar Capacity on North  
Island to Be Enlarged by  
Additional Building.

Another aeroplane is to be added to the already long string of aerial craft now on the North Island field of the Aero Club of San Diego. Harry S. Harkness announced yesterday that the purpose of his recent trip to Los Angeles was to negotiate for the purchase of a biplane to be built for him by Charles F. Walsh of San Diego, who at present is connected with the McComber Aeroplane Engine company of that city.

The machine Harkness ordered is to be an exact duplicate of the Curtiss type of biplane in which Walsh has made so many successful flights at the Los Angeles aerodrome and Dominguez aviation field, and in which he carried his wife and two children as passengers in a successful flight last Sunday. It is to be equipped with a 50 horse power rotating McComber motor, the same engine used by Walsh.

Equal to French Engine

The first one of these motors constructed by the McComber company was a failure. Walsh had to build a machine during the recent aviation meet on Dominguez field and was unable to make a flight. It is said, however, that the Los Angeles concern has perfected the motor until it is now equal, if not superior, to the Gnome rotating motor made in France, and used by Louis Paulhan while touring the United States with his Farman biplane, and Heriot monoplane last winter.

John E. Kiley, chief mechanic at the Harkness camp, is to fly the new biplane. Harkness purchased it for Kiley, who will learn to fly the machine on North Island, in a preparatory to making an exhibition tour of the eastern states during the coming summer in company with his employer. Kiley said yesterday that he expects Walsh to deliver the machine in San Diego in about two weeks. It will be taken to North Island at once and assembled. Officials of the Aero club are awaiting the return of D. C. Collier, president of the club, to arrange for the construction of a new and larger shed for the accommodation of Harkness. It is probable that the new shed will be erected on the eastern side of North Island, near the exhibition field at the main line ways. The shed will be of sufficient capacity to store all four Antoinette machines owned by Harkness, with the huge trunks in which they were shipped from the east. Space also will be provided for the new biplane. If present plans of Aero club members are carried out.

The erection of a new shed for the Harkness camp will enable Curtiss and his staff to occupy all the present quarters on the Spanish night side of the island. With Ely here and others of the Curtiss corps of flyers expected, more room for their machines is necessary. Realizing this fact, Harkness is eager to vacate the shed he now occupies as soon as a haller can be provided for his ships elsewhere.

**MOORE GOES NORTH  
TO ARRANGE MEETS**

Edwin C. Moore, head of the Curtiss executive staff, left San Diego for the north yesterday. Moore expects to be absent several weeks, during which time he will visit Seattle and a number of cities on the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and other railways traversing Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin for the purpose of arranging aviation shows to be given by the Curtiss staff of flyers.

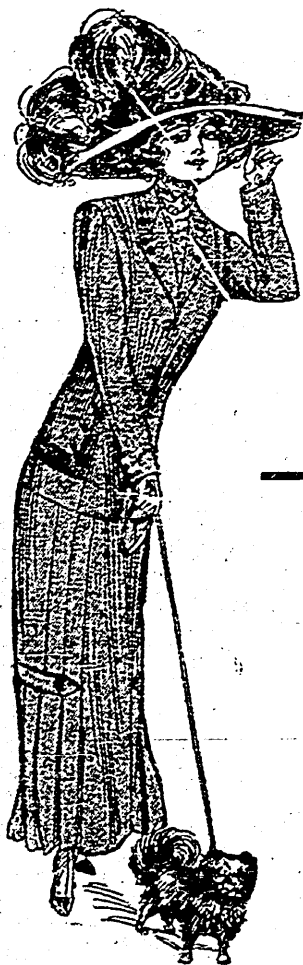

**NEW E. M. F. MODELS  
SHOW IMPROVEMENT**

Finish and Lines of Latest Cars Are Superior to Previous Types.

The Bateman-Buoy company has just unloaded a carload of six of the new E. M. F. models. Three of these are touring cars, two demi-tonneaus and one roadster. The chassis remains practically the same, except for adjustable valves and a few other minor improvements.

The general appearance of the car is changed entirely. The finish is superior and the lines are even superior to those on the E. M. F. cars that have come out previous to these cars. This is the first time that any E. M. F. demi-tonneaus or roadsters have appeared in San Diego, and the Bateman-Buoy company predicts that the cars will make a great hit. Warner M. Bateman, president of the company, says that the company is now ahead of its allotment of cars for 1911, although it has had a large contract to fulfill.

PUGILIST IN JAIL

New York, March 4.—Following the death of Anton Venzio, a pugilist in Newark, N. J., today from injuries which it is alleged he received in a four-round boxing bout, a charge of manslaughter has been placed against William Kennedy, his opponent. Kennedy was locked up with two companions of the dead pugilist, who are charged with aiding and abetting the fight.

Later Moore will tour the east on the same mission.

Inquiries have been received from Seattle, Spokane, Billings, Butte and Helena regarding the chances for seeing the Curtiss flyers the coming summer, and it is more than probable that meets will be booked in these cities.

H. A. Robinson, the young aviator who has been a big factor in the recent local aviation shows, is scheduled to fly in a meet at Oakland, March 18 and 19. Others of the Curtiss staff, whose names have not been announced, may participate in the Oakland meet. Robinson plans to take his machine north on the mill-take boat, leaving here a few days before the northern show. He has added several new features to the control of his machine and expects to do some sensational work on the spring tour.
