EVERBLOOMING BUSH ROSES

AMERICAN BEAUTY—(H. T.) Color a lovely shade of clear, red-crimson velvet; very fragant.

ETOILE DE HOLLANDE—(H. T.) Bright crimson, fiery-red center cup-shaped. Free in bloom

E. G. HILL—(H. T.) A new Red Rose, originated by Mr. E. G. Hill. Color is a dazzling scarlet shading to deeper red. Originator claims it never turns purple. Undoubtedly a fine new red rose.

RED RADIANCE—(H. T.) An even better Rose than its parent, Radiance, in habit, bearing big, globular flowers of deep rose-red on strong, individual cames which are freely produced all summer until frost.

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
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
