Our Extra Sheet.

We are decidedly of opinion that news is one of the articles still far above par in our California market. When the steamer came up on Tuesday, and before she anchored, one of us (making a neck and neck race of it with our respectable friend of the Custom house) went aboard of her at least the second, if it will not do to say the first, man—got back to our office at eleven o'clock with her news—and in one hour afterwards our Extras, containing what we trust our friends will call a clear and satisfactory summary of the domestic and foreign intelligence received by her, were going off as fast as we could hand them over our counter, until the very last sheet was gone. We could have sold thousands more in the course of a few hours if we could have printed them. We thank our readers for the cordial support they have thus far given to our enterprise, and we refer to our extra work of Tuesday as affording some proof that we mean to deserve it. Our friends will have observed that our sheet has been for the last two days' increased in size more than one-fourth—its price of course remaining the same as before. The great pressure upon our advertising columns has demanded this, and we have made the additional outlay required to do it, most willingly, notwithstanding the immense expensiveness of any printing establishment in San Francisco at this time. We have only to say, in one word, that we feel ourselves at present but on the threshold of our enterprise, and that on our part all that can be done shall be done to merit a continuance of the unlooked for degree of public favor by which we have been welcomed and cheered on our course.

Information from the mines.

We learn from a gentleman who has just returned from the Tuolumne, where he has been located during the last two or three months, that great success has attended the search for gold in that region. He informs us that two gentlemen, the names of whom he gave us, obtained in two days, a few miles above Rogers' Bar, eighty ounces of gold, and that the success of others was very encouraging.

The weather at the mines is daily becoming more agreeable, and sickness is to a considerable extent, abating.

Great numbers of emigrants were daily arriving in the mining district, overland, many of whom were from Texas.

A very small proportion of those who arrive at the mines are enabled to endure the fatigue and privations, which they are obliged to undergo; consequently many return to the States; others establish themselves in business at San Francisco and at the several places of deposit on the banks of the Sacramento, Tuolumne, and other rivers. Agriculture is beginning to attract the attention of a large number, who are convinced that this branch of business will pay as well as any other.

Sacramento City, New York on the Pacific, Benicia, and other settlements are rapidly increasing in population and business, and it is believed that in one year from the present time, California will vie with either of the states in the Union in importance.

THE BRIG TWO FRIENDS.—This vessel which left Panama on the 20th April, bound for San Francisco, with 165 passengers, and which was supposed to be lost, has been heard from. A gentleman who was a passenger on board has called on us and states that after exploring the Pacific Ocean during a period of about four months, and coming to the conclusion that circumstances warranted a separation between himself and "two friends," resolved to leave her and endeavor to reach land. Accordingly, in company with some seventy of the passengers, the effort was made and successfully accomplished—they having reached the shore some 150 miles south of San Diego. When he left the ship all were in good health on board, and it is believed that the ship will arrive at San Francisco in the course of a few days.

To the Editor of the Pacific News.

TUESDAY, Sep. 18th, 1849.

GENT: In your Tuesday's report of court proceedings, in the case of Breckenridge vs. Upham, I am made to say that an "ounce per visit is a reasonable charge for physicians here." I gave no such testimony in this case, and never gave such in any case. My testimony was this: That I graduated my fees by the importance of the case I was called to treat, and the responsibility involved in it, together with my patient's ability to pay. If a very serious case, requiring much discrimination and reflection, I charged a larger fee than in simple cases, which needed little more than good nursing. And that in all cases I placed my own estimate upon my own services.

In relation to established rates of medical charge in San Francisco, I would say that, I have not the honor of "Dr. Port's" acquaintance, and never before heard his name mentioned in connection with the medical profession of this town. His having graduated at a Dublin college, and practiced in Ireland, England, France, Spain, South America, and various other places, may be a good reason why his ipsi dixit should govern the charges of physicians here; but the fact that he had fixed the minimum and maximum charge per visit at five and ten dollars, ought in courtesy, to have been communicated to the profession, and it would then have awarded him due praise for his charitable assistance.

P.S. Will your reporter please inform "the doctors" what "Materia Medica" treats upon physicians fees? Among the many letters written in California and forwarded to the States, we now and then discover one which is entitled to consideration. A large majority, however, of the letters and communications that are forwarded from this section of country to our friends of the Press and others at home, are mere bagatelle stories and unworthy of credit. The following letter, which we find in the N. Y. Journal of Commerce, is so different in its tone from many which we have seen, that we transfer it to our columns.

Extract of a Letter, dated LEXINGTON, April 23, 1849. I have been so bothered by visitors and callers for information respecting California, that I have had scarcely a quiet hour to sit down with my family since my return.

The newspaper accounts of my wealth are not true. I have told no one what I have, and intend to keep what does not concern others to myself. I have a competence, and that is all I ever desired; and I now intend remaining home the rest of my days.

During two voyages, I have spent about 7 years on the coast of California, and after much hard work and many reverses, have at last been enabled to retire from there in better circumstances than I ever anticipated. You ask what I think of California, and whether it would be a good plan to take a cargo of goods there? I think and am confident that the country about San Francisco will increase in wealth and importance, and "go ahead" more rapidly than any other place of which we have any knowledge. It is a good agricultural country, and possesses a delightful climate. From its position and facilities in regard to commerce with the great East and West, it must, and that speedily, become a most important place. I believe a great destiny awaits it, and were I ten years younger, I should remove and settle there with my family. I speak of it independently of its precious metals, and rich minerals. They are inexhaustible. I was at the mines three different times, and knew what most of the people were doing, and I feel perfectly safe in saying, that a man by six hours' washing and digging each day, can average \$16 a day from the 1st of March to the last of July—this being the only part of the year during which a person can labor at the mines with safety. From August to November the heat is too intense to labor, and after that time and until February is the rainy season, during which most of the gold region is overflowed. As to taking out a cargo of goods there now, I would not advise it; such immense quantities have already gone that I think goods may be purchased cheaper there now than in New York.

I would caution you to beware of the many newspaper reports you may see with regard to California. There is at present no person in this part of the United States more recent from the mines than I am; and I would refer you to the official reports of Gov. Mason and Capt. Folsom of the U. S. Army, as being the only correct accounts I have seen published. [N. Y. Jour. of Commerce.]

SANTA ANNA has recently fulminated from his retreat at Kingston, Jamaica, an elaborate reply, in a volume of three hundred pages, to the accusations of treason brought against him in the Mexican Congress. The ex-President makes out, as usual, a good case, and shows apparently that his efforts during the recent war were fruitless owing to the want of co-operation on the part of the Government, the lack of funds, circumstances over which he had no control, &c. He enters into an autobiographical account of all his exploits, hardships, and reverses, and evidently aims more at making an impression for the future than at vindicating the past.

We obtain this information of the contents of Santa Anna's Manifesto from the New Orleans Delta. No copy of the publication itself has yet come within our reach. Whenever it does, we shall look through it with curiosity, in the anticipation of its probably shedding light on some things which are yet veiled in darkness pertaining to the history of our War with Mexico, and especially the particulars of the negotiation at Havana between the late Administration and Santa Anna, and the character of the understanding alleged to have existed between that Administration and the same General up to the battle of Buena Vista, the event of which battle was at the time openly alleged to have disappointed the calculations of the Administration. Voyage of the Ship Trecoff, of Mystic, Ct, around Cape Horn, 1849.

BY A PASSENGER.

Continued.

MONDAY, Feb. 12, Lat. 15 deg. 08 min. N., Lon. 35 deg. 30 min. W. This has been a day which will long be remembered by every person on board of the ship Trecoff at this time. At about 3 o'clock P.M., the alarming announcement that the ship is on fire! filled the mind of every one on board with horror. The smell of something, thought to be pine burning, had been noticed by a passenger during the evening previous, and he expressed his fears to the mate of the ship—but no additional cause of alarm being discovered, the subject was dismissed from their minds. To-day, however, the cook having occasion to go below to obtain potatoes, discovered smoke, and immediately communicated the fact to the mate, who upon examination, became satisfied that the ship was in reality on fire, and lost no time in acquainting the captain with the fact. I was sitting at the time on deck, reading; and never shall I forget the paralyzing sensation which I experienced when the mate approached the place near where I was seated, and said to the captain in a low tone of voice, "the ship is on fire!" The captain quickly issued his orders that the sails be "clewed up"—"wreath" and placed the ship before the wind, and to close the main and mizen hatchways. Then hastening from the upper deck to the place of damage, the work of removing the freight from the forward part of the ship between decks was commenced with energy. The smoke issued from the fore hatchway, when opened, to an alarming extent, plainly indicating the danger we were in. Arrangements were soon made and put into practice to hoist water from the ocean. A knowledge of the fact that a large quantity of gun powder was stowed forward, and probably in the vicinity of the fire, intimidated, to some extent, those who were laboring to save the ship from destruction. The captain had, as he supposed, collected all the gunpowder on board and packed it in a large water cask. The first object was, therefore, to get at this cask, which was finally accomplished, and it was placed on deck. At this moment it was announced that powder, in large quantities, was packed in boxes and stowed among the freight forward, the owners of which gave as an excuse for not producing it at the time of the general collection, that they could not get at it. Besides, there were a large number of barrels of Alcohol and other liquors stowed in the same vicinity, which if exposed to fire, might hasten the destruction of the ship, and all on board, as speedily as gunpowder. I need not say that the moment was one of intense interest and solemnity—yet it was surprising to witness the calmness of all. It was a moment when death, in awful form, stared each man squarely in the face—when it was momentarily expected that an explosion would send us all into eternity. Yet no more gathered around the place of danger than could conveniently work, nor did others create confusion—but all waited with commendable resignation, the issue.

By a reference to the map, it will be seen that at the time of this occurrence, we were some 600 miles west of the Cape De Ver Islands, and about 1200 miles from the nearest point of the South American coast. Escape by the boats, especially when the great number of persons on board, is considered, of course was not to be thought of. An attempt of this kind would have been productive of consequences of a serious nature. The fire was finally discovered under the cook's "cabin" and extinguished—not however until the cooking range was entirely removed with all the brick work, when it was found to have burned through the deck of the ship and ignited a beam which, providentially, was so situated as to prevent its immediate communication with the freight, although it had probably been burning several days. A delay of a few hours in the discovery of our perilous situation, and it would have been too late to have attempted a rescue of the ship or ourselves from destruction.

WEDNESDAY, Feb. 14, Lat. 12 deg. 15 min. N., Lon. 33 deg. 20 min. W. The weather since my last date has been pleasant with a good breeze blowing steadily from the N. E. Indications of dissatisfaction on the part of the steerage passengers have again appeared to-day with regard to the accommodations furnished them at meal times, as well as the great distinction made in the fare furnished to the first cabin passengers. It is claimed, and perhaps not without reason, that the table in the cabin is furnished with food of better quality and greater variety than are the heads of hogsheads on deck. Besides, it is asserted that the cabin passengers have on their table not only plates and cups, but knives and forks—while

they have no plates and cups, and are obliged to take their food from a tin pan with their fingers. Now if it be true that if the gentlemen between decks had the price charged for No. 1 fare, (knives and forks, plates and cups included,) it is undoubtedly wrong on the part of the captain to deny them the enjoyment of such luxurious keeping as the cabin table is furnished with—especially the use of knives, forks, &c.; and I do not blame them for showing their teeth. The captain, however, asserts that they have destroyed all the knives and forks furnished them at the commencement of the voyage, and swears, if they do not stop their grumbling, he will place them on short allowance. He says he never heard so much grumbling, even from whistlers.

Great excitement was occasioned on board, this afternoon, by the exclamation, "porpoise!" "porpoises!" These monstrous fish were observed at a distance of a 1-4 mile to the leeward, and came bounding towards the ship in a manner that forcibly reminded me of a pack of hungry wolves. There were at least 500 of them in number, and they sprang with amazing dexterity from the water, leaping at every jump from ten to fifteen feet. They were soon around the ship, darting, in pairs, to and fro with great rapidity, affording all on board a scene as novel as it was exciting.

SUNDAY, Feb. 18, Lat. 4 deg. 45 min. N., Lon. 26 deg. 10 min. W. Religious service was held on deck to-day. A due degree of attention was paid by those present, but a disturbance was created in the forward part of the ship by a young man, an Irishman, named —, and a foremast hand on board. At the close of the service a general expression of indignation was made on the part of all in favor of good order, and assurances were given by those having authority that the act would not be repeated. Monday, Feb. 19, Lat. 3 deg. 45 min. N., Lon. 25 deg. 40 min. W. The N. E. trade winds left us to-day, when it became variable and squally. Towards night we were becalmed. [TO BE CONTINUED.]

The above prohibition does not include bona fide grants of lands protected by the treaty of peace with Mexico, but the ungranted lands which the property of the United States the timber on which he is directed to preserve, from "waste, destruction, removal, and from every species of depredation."
