TROUBLES IN CANADA. Accounts rep resent that there is great agitation and excitement throughout Upper Canada.— There is much reason to believe them exaggerated, although there is no reason to suppose them false. Even these des-patches speak of no concerted political action, and describe rather a popular outbreak than a movement tending to destroy ada. The following are the fullest details received :-

Montreal, April 28.-All day yester. day, a most fearful excitement existed

throughout the city.
At 2, P. M., the mass meeting called to take into consideration the best means of preserving the peace of the country, was held at the Champ de Mars, and an immense mu'titude was present. Strong resolutions were passed, and a petition to the Queen to recall Lord Elgin, was drafted and adopted.

At the earnest request of the principal eaders, the people dispersed quietly .-The five gentlemen arrested have been committed for rioting. A man by the name of Perry, the great leader of the firemen of this city, has been committed to jail on a charge of arson.

Towards evening a rumor rapidly spread that the French party were being sworn in as special constables, and armed. It proved correct. The British portion were persuaded by the leaders to wait till armed, and an encounter took place berween about twenty English gentlemen and these constables, who most wantonly fired on them.

Only a few of the small party had arms, which they discharged upon the mass, and slowly retreated, bearing off one of the party, wounded in the leg by a pistol ball. From the cries uttered by some persons in the crowd, one of the gentlemen who fired informs me that their discharge must have taken effect. During the whole night these were drilled, aimed with cutlasses and pistols, in the Bonsecours Market.

The military were under arms all night, and the artillery drawn up in the square. I have the best authority for stating that Sir Benjamin Durban, commander of the forces, at a meeting of the Executive Council last night, made remarks to the following purport to Col. Tache, one of the ministry. He demanded to know by whose authority those men had been armer. He said he was there to protect her Majesty's dominions, and by the aid of heaven he would do that. It was un constitutional to arm one portion of the population against the other.

Turning round to Gen. Gore he said, "Go to his Excellency the Governor Genthe French population. Disarm these men, and find by whose authority they were armed.'

It is understood that Col. Bruce and Col. Tache do it on an order from the government. The arms are refused to be given up.

THE NEWS FROM EUROPE. NEW YORK, July 14.

The London Shipping Gazette, in its grain article for June 29, evening, believes the potato blight to be much less in Ireland than last year. The top price of town made flour had not been altered, and American brought 24 to 25 shillings. The Gazette says-

"The reduced state of the stocks of foreign wheat in the kingdom, and the very sparing manner in which farmers have brought forward supplies, have caused a farther advance in the value of the article, notwithstanding the fineness of the weather, and the generally favorable reports respecting the growing crops. It would, therefore, appear that the prospects of future abundance will scarcely counteract the effect of present scarcity; and during the time which must yet elapse before the harvest can possibly be ready for gathering, prices may expected to be at least supported if they do not advance."

On the 27th of June the Lord Mayor of London gave a banquet to Sir Robert Peel, and the supporters of his free trade policy. The Lord Mayor toasted Mr. Bancroft, who was greeted with loud cheers upon rising to reply. He hoped Englishmen and women would soon become familiar with our land.
