that God we worship one:
In trinitie, and trinitie
in vnitie alone.

So as weneither do confound,
the persons of the three:
Ne yet the substance whole of one,
in sunder parted be.

One person of the father is,
an other of the sonne:
An other person proper of
the holy Ghost alone.
Of father, sonne, and holy Ghost,
but one the Godhead is:
Like glory coeternall eke,
the maiestie likewise.

Such as the father is, such is
the sonne in ech degree:
And such also we doe beleue,
the holy Ghost to be.
Vncreate is the father, and
vncreate is the sonne:
The holy Ghost vncreate, so
vncreate is each one.

Incomprehensible father is,
incomprehensible sonne:
And comprehensible also is
the holy Ghost of none.
The father is eternall, and
the sonne eternall so:
And in like sort eternall is,
the holy Ghost also.

And yet though we beleue, that each
of these eternall be:
Yet there but one eternall is,
and not eternals three.
As ne incomprehensible we,
ne yet vncreate three:
But one incomprehensible, one
vncreate hold to be.

Almighty so the father is,
the sonne almightie so:
And in like sort almightie is,
the holy Ghost also.
And albeit that euery one,
of these almightie be:
Yet there but one almightie is,
and not almighties three.

The Father God is, God the sonne,
God holy Ghost also.
Yet are there not three Gods at all,
but one God and no moe.
So likewise Lord the Father is,
and Lord also the sonne,
And Lord the holy Ghost yet are
there not three Lords but one.

For as we are compeld to grant,
by Christian veritie:
Each of the persons by him selfe,
both God and Lord to be.
So Catholike religion,
forbiddeth vs alway:
That either Gods be three, or that
there Lords be three to say,

Of none the father is, ne made,
nor create, nor begot:
The sonne is of the Father, not
create, ne made, but got.
The holy Ghost is of them both,
the Father and the Sonne:
Ne made, ne create, nor begot,
but doth procede alone.

So we one father hold, not three,
one sonne also not three:
One holy Ghost alone, and not
three holy Ghosts to be.
None in this trinitie before,
nor after other is:
Ne greater any then the rest,
ne lesse be likewise.

But euery one among themselves,
of all the persons three:
Together coeternall all,
and all coequall be.
So vnitie in trinitie,
as said it is before:
And trinitie in vnitie,
in all things we adore.

Therefore what man so euer that,
saluation will attaine:
This faith touching the trinitie,
of force he must retaine,
And needfull to eternall life,
it is that euery wight:
Of the incarnating of Christ,
our Lord belieue aright.

For this the right faith is, that we
belieue and eke do know,
That Christ our Lord the Sonne of God,
is God and man also.
God of his fathers substance got
before the world began:

And of his mothers substance borne,
in world a very man.

Both perfect God and perfect man,
in one, one Iesus Christ:
That doth of reasonable soule,
and humane flesh subsist.
Touching his Godhead, equall with
his father God is he:
Touching his manhood, lower then
his father in degree.

Who though he be both very God,
and very man also:
Yet is he but one Christ alone,
and is not persons two.
One not by turning of Godhead,
into the flesh of man:
But by taking manhood to God,
this being one began.


All one, not by confounding of

Who should Gods power to their race praise,
and all his workes of wonder.

5 To Iacob he commandement gaue,
how Israell should liue:

Willing our fathers should the same,
vnto their children gaue.

6 That they and their posteritie,
which were not sprung vp tho:

Should haue the knowledge of the law,
and teach their seede also.

7 That they may haue the better hope,
in God that is aboue:
And not forget to keepe his lawes,
and his precepts in loue.

8 Not being as our fathers were,
rebellling in Gods sight
And would not frame their wicked hearts,
to know their God aright.

9 How went the people of Ephraim,
their neighbours for to spoile:
Shooting their darts the day of war,
and yet they rooke the foile.

10 For why? they did not keepe with God,
the couenant that was made:
Nor yet would walke or leade their life,
according to his trade.

11 But put into obliuion,
his counsell and his will:
And all his works most magnifiquē,

12 What wonders to our forefathers,

60 Then he forooke the tabernacle,
of Silo where he was:
Right conuersant with earthly men,
euen as as his dwelling place.

61 Then suffered he his might and power,
in bondage for to stand:
And gaue the honour of his Arke,
into his enemies hand.

62 And did commit them to the sword,
wroth with his heritage:
63 The young men were deuoured with fire,
maides had no marriage.

64 And with the sword the priestes also,
did perish euery one:
And not a widow left aliuie,
their death for to bemone.

65 And then the Lord began to wake,
like one that slept a time:
And as a valiant man of war,
rested after wine.

66 With Emrods in the hinder parts,
he strake his enemies all:
And put them euen vnto a shame,
that was perpetuall.

67 Then he the tent and tabernacle,
of Ioseph did refuse:
As for the tribe of Ephraim,
he would in no wise chuse.

68 But chose the tribe of Iehuda,
whereas he thought to dwell:
Euen the noble mount Sion,
which he did loue so well.

69 Whereas he did his temple builde,
both sumptuously and sure:
Like as the earth which he hath made,
for euer to endure.

70 Then chose he Dauid him to serue,
his people for to keepe:
Which he tooke vp and brought away,
euen from the folds of sheepe.

71 As he did follow the ewes with young,
the Lord did him aduance:
To feede his people Israell,
and his inheritance.

72 Then Dauid with a faithfull hart,
his focke and charge did feede:
And prudently with all his power,
did gouerne them in deede.

Deus venerunt, Pſal. Lxxix. I. H.

The Iſraelites complain to God for the caluſtaty that they ſuffered when Antiochus deſtroyd their temple and in this, deſiring ayd againſt his tyranny left God and religion ſhould be condemned by beaſtes who ſhould ſee them ſoraken and periſh.

Sing this as the 77. Pſalme.

O Lord the Gentiles doe invade,
rhine heritage to ſpoile:
Hieruſalem an heape is made,
thy temple they deſoile.
2 The bodies of thy Saints moſt deare,
abroad to birds they caſt:
The fleſh of them that doe thee feare,
the beaſts deuour and waſt.

3 Their blond throughout Ieruſalem,
as water ſpilt they haue:
So that there is not one of them,
to lay their dead in graue.
4 Thus are we made a laughing ſtocke,
almoſt the world throughout:
The enemies at vs teſt and mocke,
which dwell our coaſts about.

5 Wilt thou O Lord thus in thine ire,
againſt vs euer fume:

with ſpeede ſome pittie ſhow:
And aide vs Lord in all aſſaults,
for we are weak and low.

9 O God that giueſt all health and grace,
on vs declare the ſame:
Weigh not our works, our ſinnes deſace,
for honour of thy name.
10 Why ſhall the wicked ſtill alway,
to vs as people dumme:
In thy reproch reioyce and ſay,
where is their God becom?

11 Require O Lord as thou ſeeſt good,
before our eyes in ſight:
Of all thoſe folke thy ſeruants blood,
which they ſpilt in deſpight.
12 Receiue into thy ſight in haſt,
the clamors, grieſe and wrong:
Of ſuch as are in priſon caſt,
ſuſtaining irons ſtrong.

Thy force and ſtrength to celebrate,
Lord ſet them out of band:
Which vnto death are deſtinate,
and in their enemies hand.

13 The nations which haue bene ſo bold,
as to blaſpheme thy name:
Into their laps with ſeuſen fold,
repay againe the lame.

14 So we thy folke and paſture ſt. eepe,
will praife thee euenimore:
And teach all ages for to keepe,
for thee like praife in ſtoore.

Qui regis Iſrael, Pſal. Lxxx. I. H.

A lamentable prayer to God to help the miſeries of the Church, deſiring him to conſider their ſiſt estate, when his fauour ſhined towards them, that he might finiſh that worke which he began.

Sing this as the 67. Pſalme.

THOU heard that Iſraell doeſt keepe,
give eare and take good heed:
Which leadeſt Ioseph like a ſteepe,
and doeſt him watch and feede.
2 Thou Lord I ſay whoſe ſeate is ſet,
on Cherubins ſo bright:
Shew forth thy teſt and doe not let,
ſend downe thy beames of light.

3 Before Ephraim and Benjamin,
Manaſſes eke likewiſe:
To ſhew thy power doe thou begin,
come helpe vs Lord ariſe.
4 Direct our hats vnto thy grace,
conuert vs Lord to thee:
Shew vs the brightneſſe of thy face,
and then full ſafe are we.

5 Lord God of hoaſts of Iſraell,
how long wilt thou I ſay:
Againſt thy folke in anger ſwell,
and wilt not heare them pray?
6 Thou doeſt them feed with ſorrowes deep,
their bread with teares they eate:
And drinke the teares that they doe weepe,
in meaſure full and great.

7 Thou haſt vs made a very ſtriſe,
to thoſe that dwell about:
And that our foes doe loue of liſe,
they laugh and jeſt it out.
8 O take vs Lord vnto thy grace,
conuert our minds to thee:
Shew forth to vs thy ioyfull face,

The Israelites pray the Lord to deluser them from their enemies, both at home and far off: also that all such wicked people may be stricken with his stormy tempest, that they may know his power.

nor make no more delay.

2 For why? behold thy foes and see,
how they doe rage and cry:
And those that beare an hate to thee,

10 Whom thou in Endor didst destroy,
and wast them through thy might:
That they like dung on earth did lye,
and that in open sight.

11 Marke them now and their Lords appeare,
like Zeb and Oreb than:
As Zeba and Zalmana were,
the kinges of Madian.

12 Which said, let vs throughout the land,
in all the coastes abroad:
Possesse and take into our hand,
the faire houses of God.

13 Turpe them O God with stormes, as fast
as wheelles that haue no itay:
Or like the chaffe which men do cast
with windes to flie away.

14 Like as the fire with rage and fume,
the mightie forestis spits,
