



For some years past the board of trade report has contained reference to the pulp industry, urging the disability of pulp industry, urging the desirability of pulp in this province. Matters have re-cently taken practical form and although work has not yet actually begun, all pre-liminaries have been arranged in connec-tion with its establishment. At the re-cent session of the provincial legislature an act was passed authorizing the govern-ment to enter thto arrangements with pulp companies on favorable terms both as regards areas of land and royalities and to reserve meas out of which selec-tions of pulp lands might be made. Under the provisions of this act arrangements have been made with the Industrial Power Co., ot Nelson, B. C., and the Pacific Goast Power Co., of Victoria, B. C. These companies have, acquired several large water powers, and in addition to timber already secured, reserves for the pur-pose have been placed on a number of bimber areas by the government. From, careful investigation of the subject it has been found that there are practically m-oxhanctible areas of pulp woods in the province in spruce, hemiock, Douglas fir and cotton-wood. It has also been defin-tilely ascertained that a very large market exists in British Columbia, the Pacific coast generally, the Orient and Australia for paper, and particularly in Japaa for pulp. But when the other birds in the feather-ed parliament undertake to chatter their opinions on subjects upon which their information is much inferior to that of the president. Billy is provoked to elocu-tion, and almost to eloquence. Teddy Roosevel occupies the cage next to the president, his quarters being slightly less luxurious, as is proper, than those of his more gifted colleague. Teddy, true to his appellation, is a fighter and distins to waste words, excepting when Billy has distinguished himself by a particularly good effort, when the hero of San Juan breaks out in a triumphant and militant series of "hoorays." A Times man dropped into the Quag-liotti home a few evenings since to wit-uess Billy's cleverness. He at first de-clined absolutely to exhibit his accom-plishment for the edification of stran-gers and it required all the tact and per-suasion of his mistress to provoke him to good works and conversation. 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


