The details which are being received here of the result of the cartiquake shocks which were general throughout Guatemala on Friday and Saturday and Sanday, show that Solola, Nanahuda, Atamitlan, Santa Lucia and San Juan were badly damaged, and that Quescaltenago was partly obliterated, Added to the horrors there, two hundred persons were killed, mostly women, and many people were injured. Longthy Debate in the Imperial Commons The Duties Carried.

London, April 22.—In the course of a debate on the grain tax in the House of Commons this evening, the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, announced that "offal" or coarse meal for stock feeding would pay only three pence per hundred weight, instead of five pence. He added that in the case of flour and flug meals the farmers had been greatly disturbed by the fear that a beavy tax on "offal" would offset any protective advantage which they would gain by the grain duty. The chancellor alse expressed his belief that the advance in the price of bread, which had been a half-penny to one penny a hoaf higher through the United Kingdom since the budget assouncersont, would recede so soon as the trade had adjusted itself to the new conditions.

Hundreds continue escaping to the poximes, despite the quarantine cordon.
