TERRITORY PASSES FROM CHINESE CONTROL

The Khu Tukhta Ascends the Throne-Russia Comments on the Change

St. Petersburg, Dec. 28.—The cere-mony of accession to the throne of the Khu Tukhta of Mongolia occurred to-day and many representatives of for-eign nations attended in an unofficial capacity.

eign nations attended in an ecclesiastic subordinate to the Delai Llama, the head of the religion of Lamai, a corrupt form of Buddhism, and his relations to the Delai Llama are about the same as those of a cardinal to the Pope, in the year 1888 the Khu Tukhta, who then occupied the office, counselled the Mongolian princes to elect a Manchu emperor to the throne, but the emperor always bore a special name in Mongolia as a mark of Mongolian autonomy. It is only during the last ten or fifteen years that China has attempted to introduce into Mongolia closer administrative dependency on China.

PERSIANS TELL OF TABRIZ MASSACRE

Declare Russians Killed Many Taking of Evidence Hampered Innocent Men and Women

London, Dec. 28.—The Russian government has decided upon stern measures to terminate troubles at Tabriz and other disturbed Persian towns. Doubts have been increased as to whether Persian independence ever will be restored to even the feeble status it had before this last assault by Russia. If parliament were sitting, undoubtedly there would be some questioning of the government and an arraignment of the foreign office.

The Persia committee, composed of prominent Englishmen interested in Persian frairs, has received the following telegram from the provincial assembly at Tabriz, sent through the Persian society in Constantinople:

"On December 21, Russian troops, attacked and seized the administration buildings, They shot children and killed."

Nationalists Submit Proposal in Russian Douma-The Tariff War

St. Petersburg, Dec. 28.—A supplementary legislative proposal of a frankly prohibitive character was introduced by the Nationalists in the Douma, yesterday it is aimed directly at the United States. According to its terms, American citizens of the Jewish religion are to be totally excluded from Russia, and in the second place customs duties are to be raised by 100 per cert unless the Russian normal per cent unless the Russian normal schedule is lower than the American

iroops consisting of nearly 1,060 rurales has been ordered from the provinces of Neuvo Leon and Tamalpais to the province of Morelos to co-operate in the campaign against General Emilio Zapata. In the opinion of government officials the releasing of troops in the northern districts through the collapse of the Reyes movement will lead to the speedy elimination of General Zapata.

Death may be the penalty General Bernardo Reyes will pay for his effort to overthrow President Madero. The least he can expect is ten years imprisonment. The Mexican law provides these extremes for the crime of inciting rebellion.

It is not generally believed the extreme penalty will be inflicted, but a term in the penitentiary for the venerable prisoner, with his 74 years, will doubtless be the equivalent.

A military court, drawn by lot from those eligible to service, will pass judgment on him. The court will consist of two generals of division and five brigadiers, with Gen. Alexandro Pezo, chief of Reyes' staff when he was minister of war under President Diaz, as presiding officer. Gen. Pezo long has been chief magistrate of the military court.

Aithough he had retired from the army, Gen. Reyes was entitled undermilitary usage to receive honor from the army as though in active service. On the other hand, as a retired officer he is liable to punishment by a military court for offences committed against the army. His offence consisted in calling upon the army to rise in rebellion.

Orders have been sent to General Trevino at Monterey to have Reyes and the results of the connection of the council at Moscow and Kursk have petitioned the Douma to act.



OAK BAY COUNCIL IS TO NAME COMMITTEE

Limits Under Boundary Extension Scheme Will Be Curtailed From First Proposal

The small audience at the meeting at Oak Bay council chamber last evening to discuss the Greater Victoria scheme doubled itself as the evening wore on, and after Councillor W. E.
