WAR REVIEW

A COMPILATION based on the Nippon Imperial Headquarters announcement gives the total British, American and Chungking losses for one year from November 30, 2603, to November 30, 2604, as follows: Manpower casualties, including prisoners of war, over 842,300; shipping sunk or damaged over 1,028 vessels of which 88 were aircraft-carriers and 31 were battleships; aircraft destroyed 14,471. The shipping losses have been mainly borne by the United States with a total loss of 997 vessels, including 87 aircraft-carriers and 30 battleships. Britain lost 31 vessels, including 1 battleship and 1 aircraft-carrier.

Resign Over Greek Issue

Lisbon, Dec. 8 (Domei)—Be-fore a crowded and tense House of Commons, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill this afternoon vigorously defended the British Government's mili-tary intervention in Greek political affairs as well as its general policy regarding other European terruptions, according to a London dispatch.

Churchill won a vote of confidence from the House but only after he threatened to resign over the Greek controversy, which has aroused widespread criticism from the United

Churchill Threatens To Netaji Broadcasts German Forces **Enemy Positions**

Lisbon, Dec. 8 (Domei)—After three weeks of failure to break through near Aachen, the enemy attacked yesterday only in the sector west of Julich in the Cologne Plain with major forces, but again was unsuccessful, the German High Command announced.

Anti-Axis reports said the Germans again cloaked their movements on the east bank of the Roer River with a smoke-screen on the United States Ninth Army front. To the south in the Saarlautern sector, Ger-man Grenadiers recaptured advanced groups of pillbexes which had been previously lost, the German communique said. Re-newed enemy attempts to cross the Saar River were checked by German artillery fire, the communique added. Large-scale attacks carried out by the enemy on a broad front east of Saaral-ben were also smashed, the enemy losing 22 tanks, the German communique said.

Paris dispatches said the Third United States Army's artillery is shelling Saarbrucken from three miles away. The British-Canadian front in Hol-

land remained quiet.

London and Antwerp were again bombarded day and night by German long-distance weapons, the German communique said.

Moscow dispatches stid that Red Army troops threatened the complete encirclement of Budapest by driving up west of the Danube to within 23 miles of the Hungarian capital. The High enveloping said Command manoeuvres by strong Soviet forces in the area south of Budapest made only small gains owing to stubborn German re sistance, however other Soviet forces were able to deepen their penetration north of Budapest.

In waters off Western Norway, German fighters shot down 11 British torpedo-carrying planes, thus preventing them from attacking a German convoy, the Berlin communique said.

Damaged In One Week To Caush Anglo-Saxons

Tokyo, December 9 (Domei)-Our special attack units of the army and navy airforces and other Nippon air units accounted for 56 enemy vessels either sunk or damaged in the Leyte Island sector during the week Dec. 1 to 7. Thirty-four enemy ships were sunk, including one battleship, two cruisers, three destroyers, ten torpedo-boats, one ship of unidentified category, and 17 transports.

Twenty-two ships were damaged, including one battleship or cruiser, two cruisers, one destroyer, six motor torpedoboats, three ships of unidentified category, and nine transports,

Rangoon, December 9 (Domei)— Major-General Aung San, Burmese War Minister, addressing a mass rally held yesterday in commemoration of the third anniversary of the outbreak of the Greater East Asia War, strongly reaffirmed Burmese determination to crush the Anglo-American powers, declaring "We are not fighting for greed", like the Anglo-American enemies, but "fighting to preserve our independence".

Praising Nippon's generosity in granting independence to Burma and the Philippines, and Premier Koiso's promise of coming independence for the East Indies, Aung San said Nip. pon's just war aim is clear as crystal in the Joint Declaration of East Asiatic Nations. "Thus, we can see Nippon's aim in fighting this war is to completely free East Asia from the shackles of the Anglo-Americans, and final victory will surely be hers".
