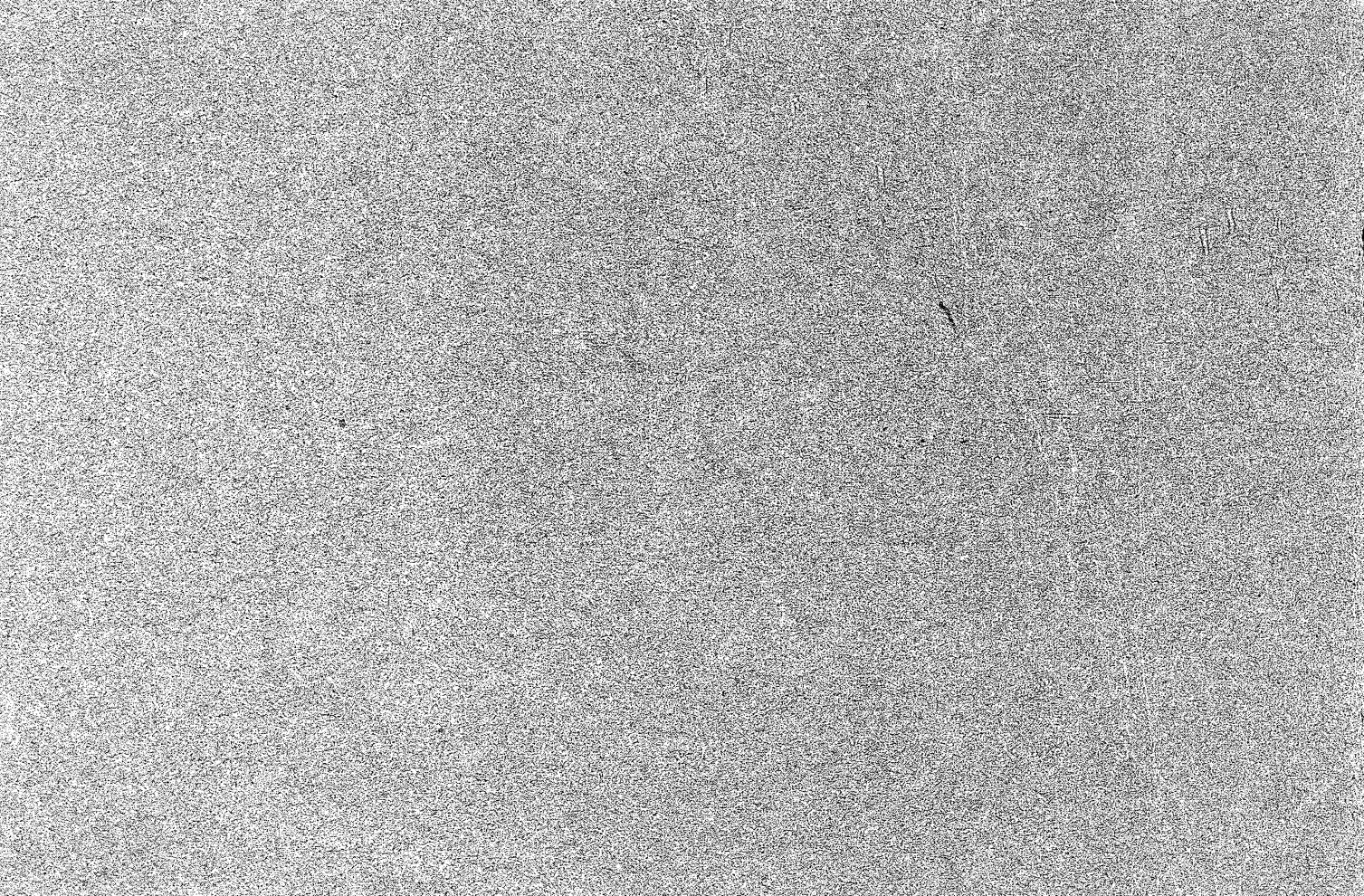

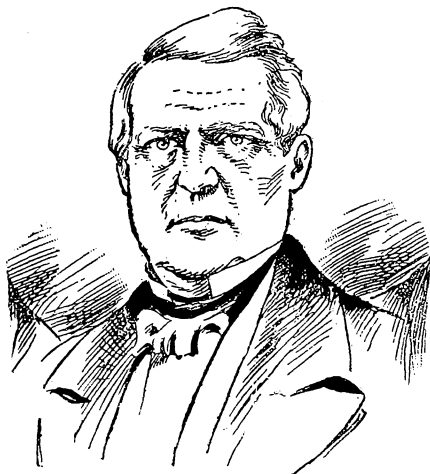

***I**N the ninety-six years which have passed since the first traders came to the present site of Ypsilanti, then but a trading post in the midst of a wilderness, the growth of the little city has been steadily forward. From a trading post of three inhabitants to a city of 7,958 is a far cry in a century for a little inland town, but from a wilderness whose only trade was the barter of skins and the results of their hunting trips for the rough beads and products of the crude civilization of the New England states, to the present city, with its thirty factories, its mills and stores, its churches and schools, is a still greater wonder.—Ypsilanti Evening Press, Feb. 14, 1905*

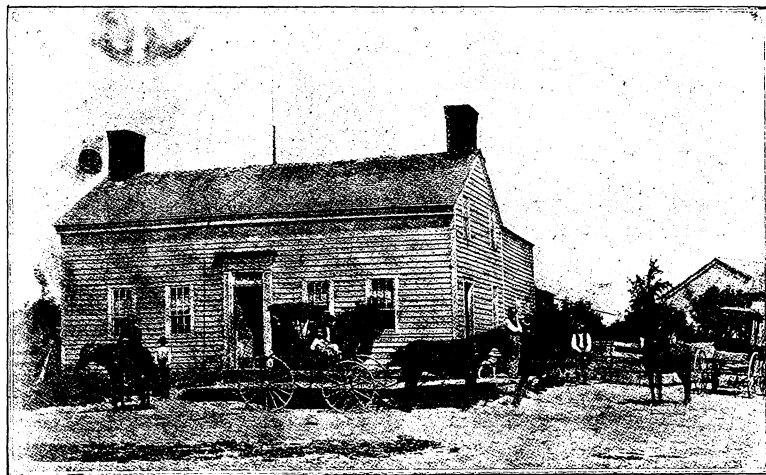

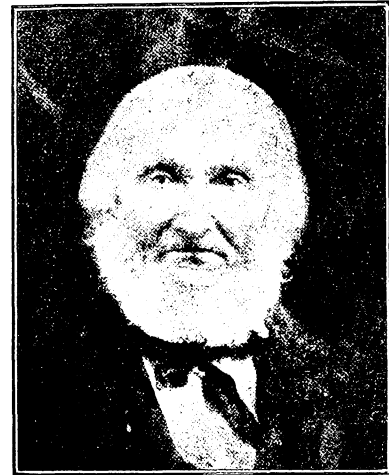

Old Stage Coach Stopping Place, Saline Road



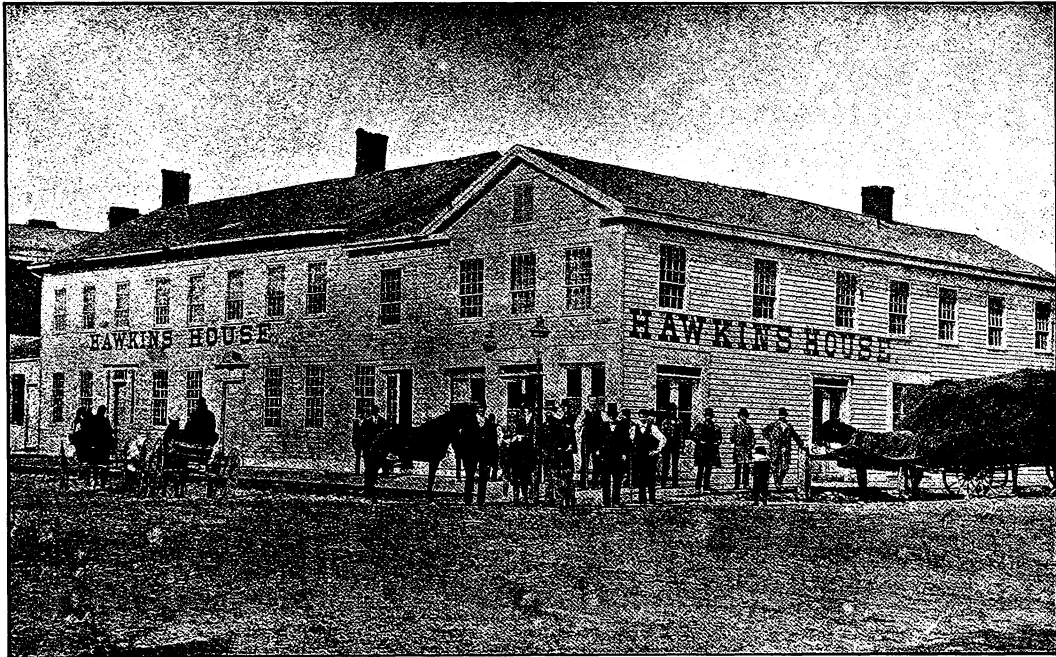

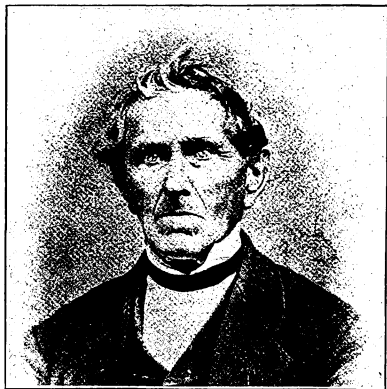


CAPTAIN ROBERT STITT

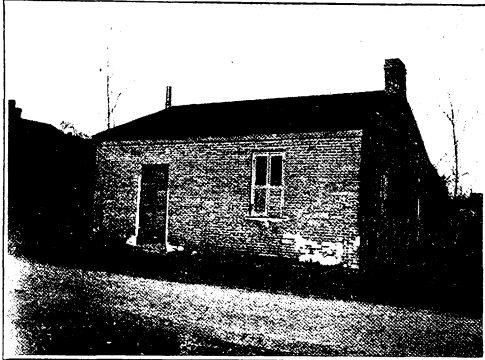
FIRST HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

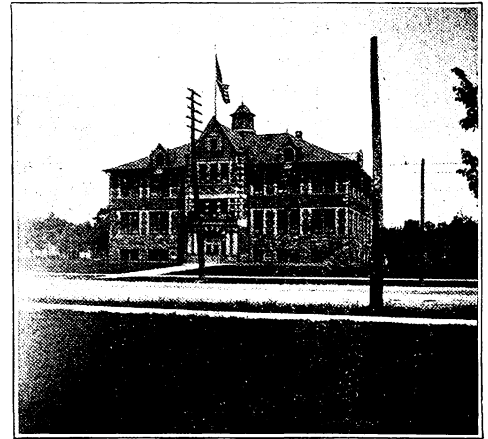

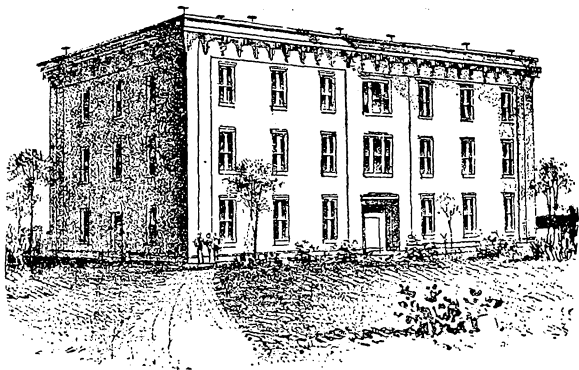

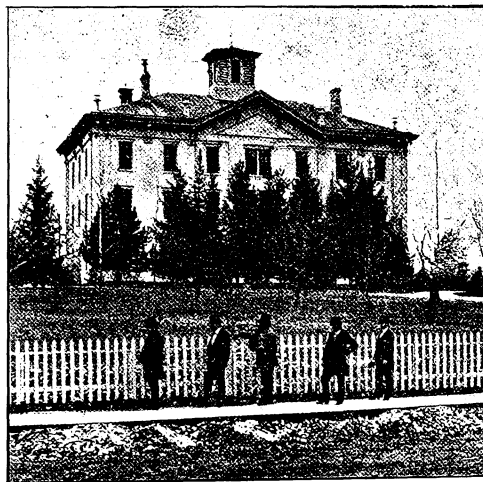

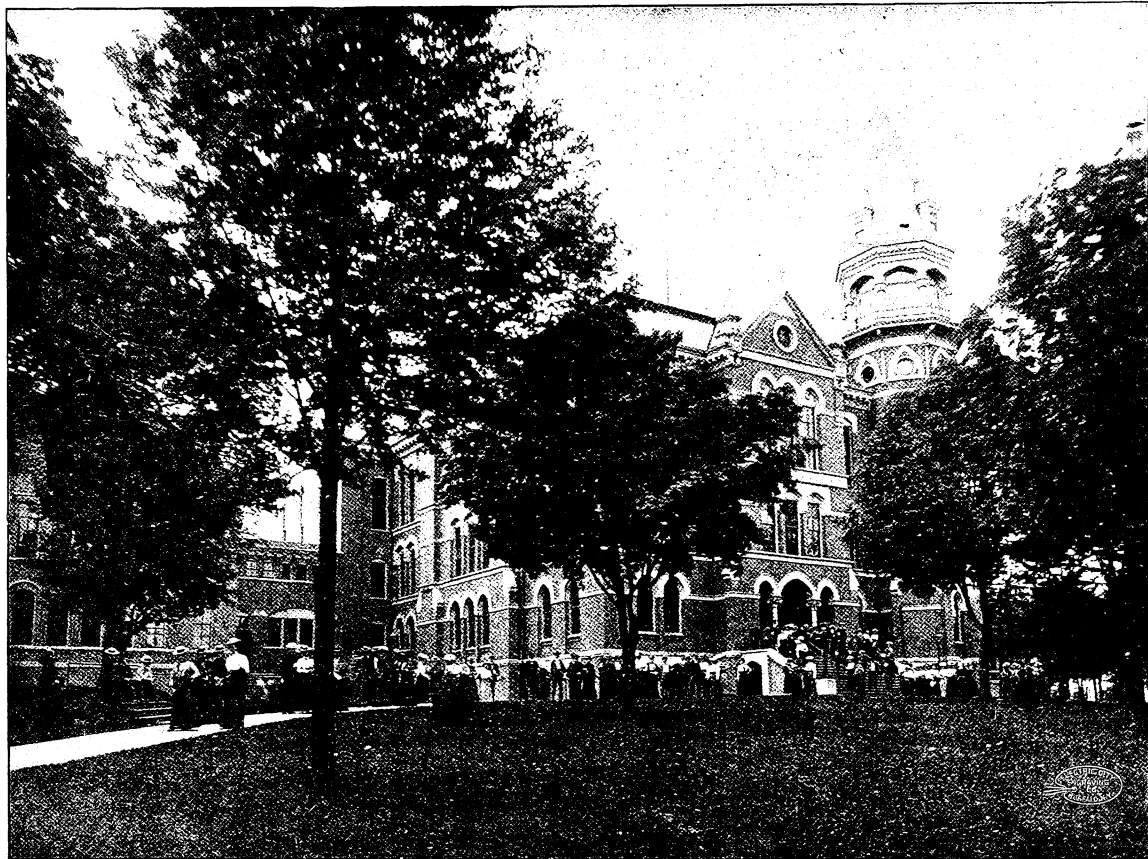

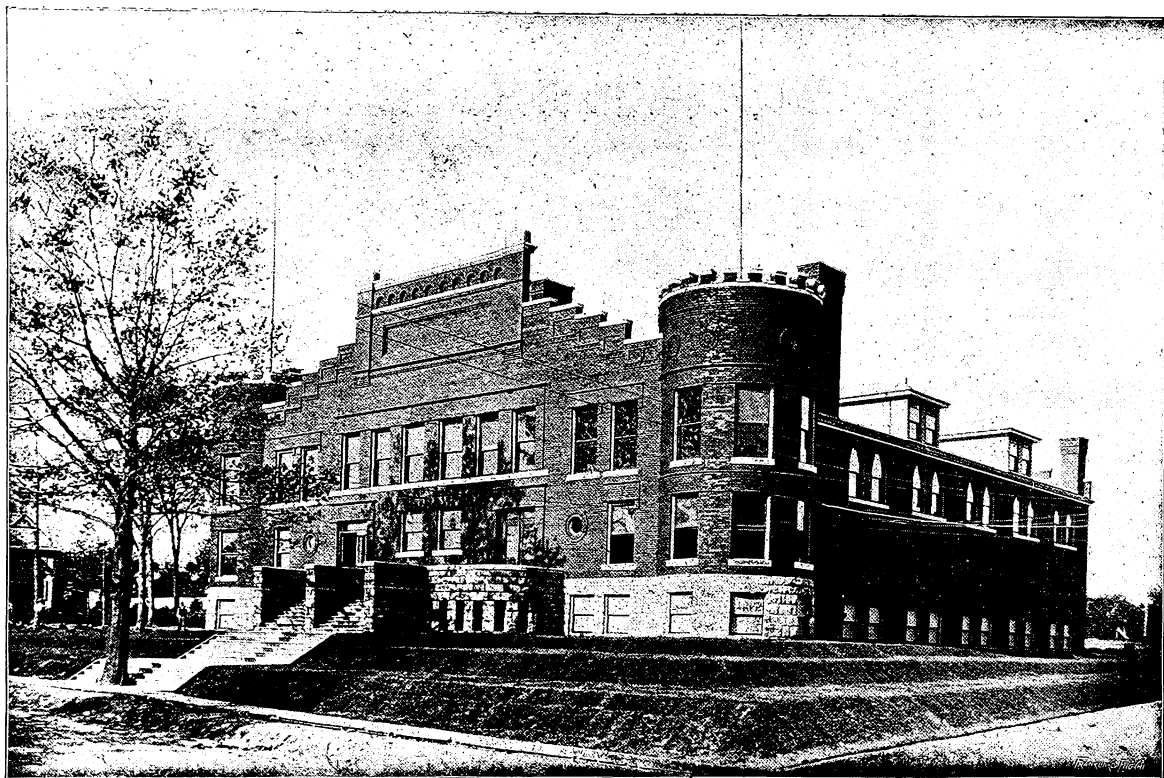

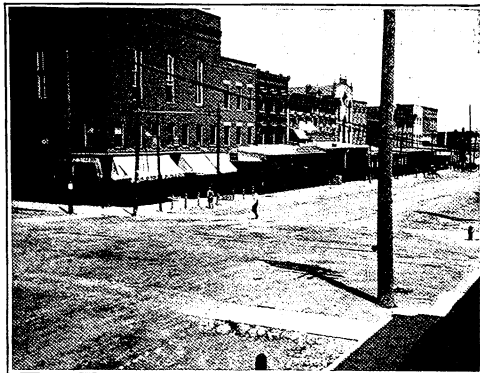

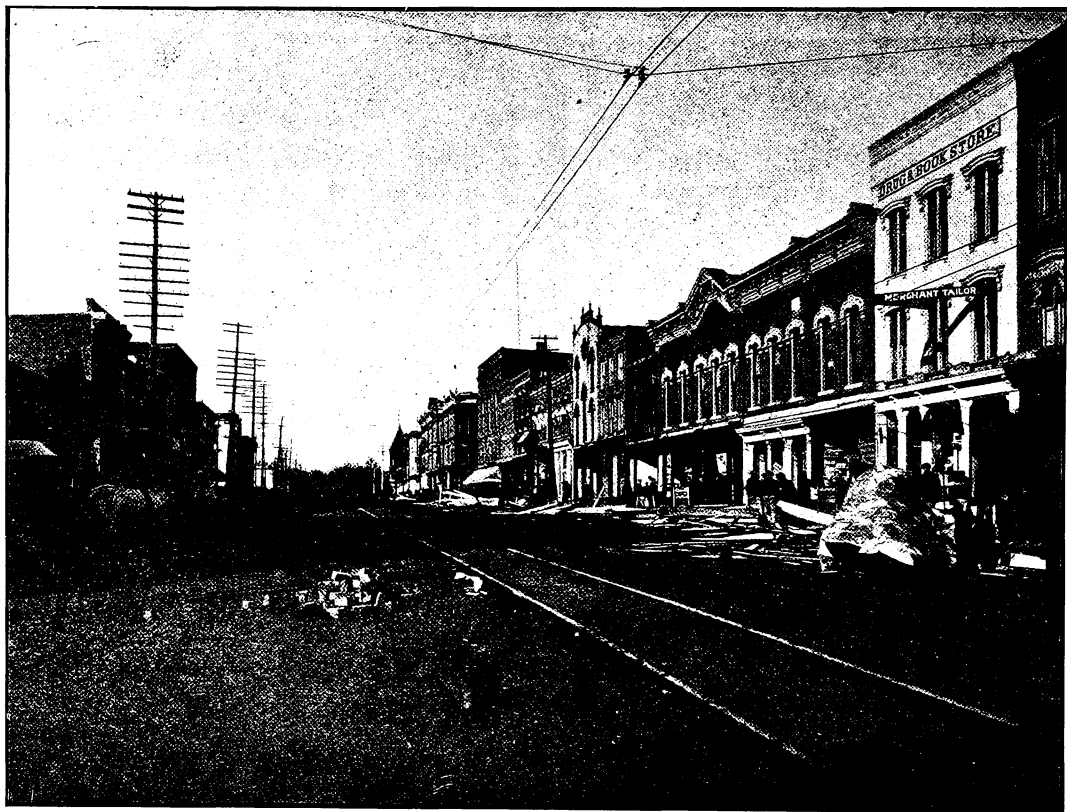

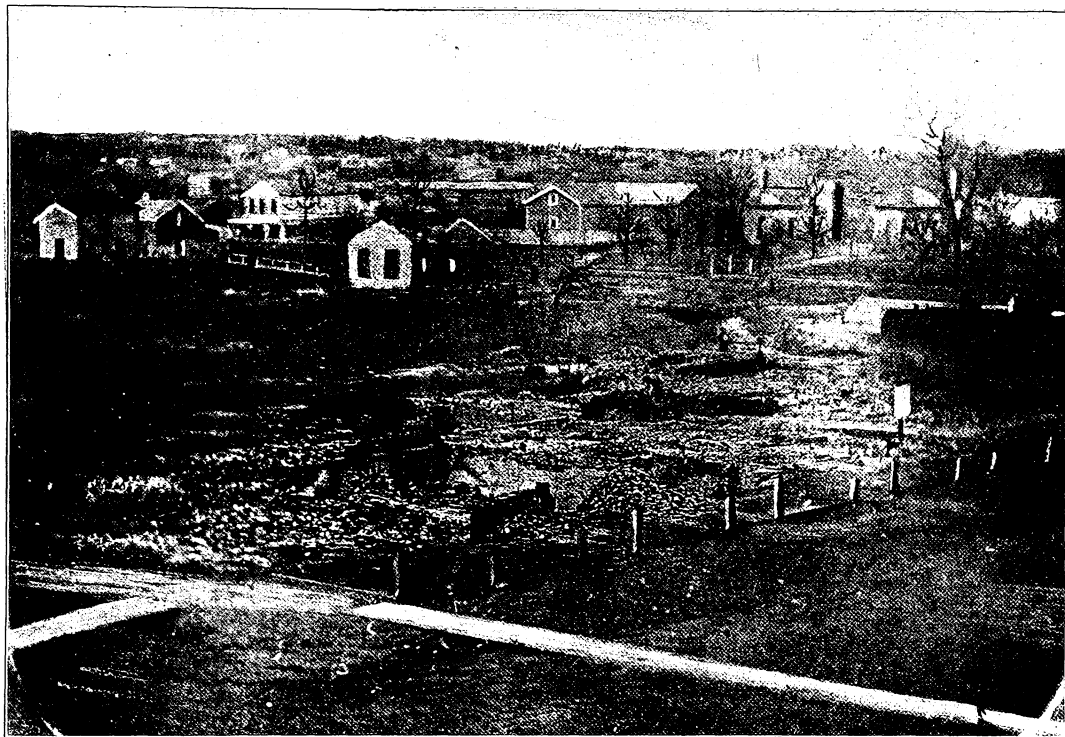
