2. Mr [REDACTED] was interviewed by a representative, this office, at 1330 hours on 26 September 1952. [REDACTED] revealed that at 2310 hours, 23 September 1952, while at the Georgia Power Sub-Station, approximately one-half (1/2) mile south of 5th Street Gate, his base, he saw fifteen (15) to twenty (20) round yellow-white lights, approximately five (5) miles to the west southwest, at an estimated altitude of fifteen hundred (1500) to two thousand (2000) feet.

3. The objects appeared to be circling in a counter-clockwise direction, never gaining or losing altitude. The lights remained a steady yellow-white glow at all times.

4. [REDACTED] observed the objects for three (3) or four (4) minutes and returned to the Main Gate.

5. Upon returning to the Main Gate, [REDACTED] asked A/1C Clifton K. King and A/1C Miriam M. Bounds, two (2) Air Policemen, to accompany him to a spot below the 5th Street Gate and witness the objects. The observers then proceeded to a point approximately one hundred (100) yards below the 5th Street Gate. Dunn revealed that at this observation, which lasted for approximately five (5) minutes, he saw only five (5) or six (6) objects. This was in a due west direction, and the objects were at the same altitude and distance as when first seen by [REDACTED]. The objects were round and yellow-white in color.

6. Observer stated that the objects were about the same size as the surrounding stars and just a little brighter in color.

7. [REDACTED] on neither occasion, detected any sound, vibration, smoke, flame, or odor. He was not under the influence of intoxicants at the time of observation. Attached is a drawing made by [REDACTED] in an attempt to present in pictorial form the outline and position of the objects.

8. Observer has taken no particular interest in the subject of flying saucers and has read only what appeared in the newspapers about them.





Submitted herewith, in accordance with the provisions of Air Force Letter 200-5, dated 29 April 1952, report of interviews held by this office with [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], who sighted a group of unidentified flying objects at Warner Robins, Georgia, on 23 September 1952, together with drawings made by the respective interviewees. All observers identified the time of sighting at approximately 2325 hours EST.

2. Check with Base Weather Station, Robins Air Force Base, Georgia, and Weather Station, Cochran Field (Macon Municipal Airport), Georgia, revealed that no weather balloons were released on 23 September 1952.

3. Check with Base Control Tower, Robins Air Force Base, Georgia, indicated the following air activity at Robins Air Force Base on 23 September 1952, between 2300 and 2400 hours EST:

Fifteen T-6 aircraft were dispatched from Bainbridge, Georgia, at 2210 hours EST, 23 September 1952, and returned to Bainbridge at 0225 hours, 24 September 1952. Aircraft were in vicinity of Robins AFB at time of sighting.

4. Contact was made with Mr. J. A. Busby of the Communications Station at Cochran Field (Macon Municipal Airport), who reported the following aircraft in flight over the vicinity of Macon, Georgia, on 23 September 1952, between 2015 and 2400 hours EST:

2. [REDACTED] was interviewed by a representative, this office, at 1500 hours on 25 September 1952. [REDACTED] stated at approximately 2315 hours, 23 September 1952, he [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] had just completed an Air Police tour of town patrol in Warner Robins, Georgia, and returned to the Main Gate on the Base. Sgt. [REDACTED] of the Civilian Guard Force told them that he had seen a number of lights in the sky off to the west and wanted them to go down near the 5th Street Gate with him where they could be seen clearly.

3. The observers proceeded to a point approximately one hundred (100) yards to the south of 5th Street Gate. [REDACTED] stated that he then looked due west and saw five (5) or six (6) white lights just above a grove of trees at an angle of approximately five (5) degrees from eyesight. He judged the objects to be about five (5) miles away, and perfectly round in shape.

4. Observer stated that the lights were very similar to that of stars, but just a trifle brighter. Units appeared to be circling and never gained or lost altitude during the five (5) minute observation. Objects moved at uniform speeds and were in the same location at the end of observation.

5. [REDACTED] stated that during his observation, a plane took off from the field in a southwest direction and passed between the objects and his point of observation. He could not estimate the distance between the plane and objects.

6. Observer detected no sound, vibration, smoke, flame or odor. Attached is a drawing made by [REDACTED] in an attempt to present in pictorial form the outline and position of the objects.

7. King was not under the influence of intoxicants at the time of observation.

8. He has taken no particular interest in the subject of flying saucers and has read only what appeared in the newspapers about them.




2. A/1C [REDACTED] was interviewed by a representative, this office, at 0945 hours on 26 September 1952. Bounds revealed that at approximately 2315 hours, 23 September 1952, he (Bounds) and A/1C [REDACTED] returned to the Main Gate after completing an Air Police tour of town patrol in Warner Robins, Georgia. Upon arriving at the Main Gate, Sgt. [REDACTED] of the Civilian Guard Force, told them he had seen a number of lights in the sky and wanted them to accompany him to the 5th Street Gate and witness them.

3. They then proceeded to a point some hundred yards south of 5th Street Gate. Bounds stated that he then looked to the west and saw five (5) or six (6) round lights just above some tree tops at an angle of approximately ten (10) degrees from eyesight. The lights were yellow-white in color and looked very much like stars. The lights appeared to be some four (4) or five (5) miles away, and were moving in a circle. The units at no time gained or lost altitude, and retained the same location until the end of observation, which lasted approximately five (5) minutes. The observers then proceeded to Flight Operations and reported the incident. The objects could not be seen from Operations.

4. The objects maintained a steady light, and moved at a uniform speed which could not be judged by the observer.

5. Observer stated that the objects appeared to be the same size as stars in the vicinity.

6. Bounds detected no sound, vibration, smoke, flame or odor. Attached is a drawing made by Bounds in an attempt to present in pictorial form the outline and position of the objects.

7. Bounds stated that during his observation, a plane took off from the field in a southwest direction and passed between the objects and his point of observation. He could not estimate the distance between the plane and objects.

8. Bounds was not under the influence of intoxicants at the time of observation.
