(Continued from page 1) lesten team any place on the field on Haymaker punted to Rollins' twentypard line.

With the ball on the twenty-ward line the Tare started a march down the field that ended on the one yard line when Jack Teure fumbled a pass from Ward. Charleston recovered. the ball and punted out to their fortyyard line. Again the Tars took the hill on end runs and bucks down to the four yard line, from which point Teurs took the ball across for the secand touchdown of the afternoon. Thomas again added another point by kicking goal.

With about fifty-five seconds to go the Charleston team elected to kick off to Rollins, the kick going to "Goof" Boyle on our twenty-yard line. "Goot" squirmed through the Charhoden team for about ten yards before being stopped. The next play netted the Tars about ten yards and then the whistle blew, ending the half.

The start of the second half was Initiated by Charleston kicking to Bullins on the ten-yard line. The hall was returned about twenty yards before the ball was down. Two end runs netted the Tars about thirty yards, after which Thomas passed to Wulf for a thirty-five-yard gain. The "Sailor" slowed the Charleston boys how it was done by carrying the ball to their three-yard line before Haymaker downed him from behind. Thomas carried the ball across on the next play and also kicked gonl. The score at this point stood 21-0 in fawar of the Tura-

floiling kicked off to Charleston on the four-yard line. By some trick of fate Harry Sileby and Ken Warner hit Haymaker at the same time. The Charleston man lost the ball at this point, Warner picking it up and carrying it over for a touchdown. This touchdown was probably the fastent thing ever seen in this part of the state, as it took just eight seconds for the dirty work to be done. Thomas fulled at good.

Rollins again kicked off to Charleston and on straight football they wured another touchdown inside af Efty-nus seconds, Door carrying the ball over. It looked and for the boys from Churleston, but they stuck to it and played out the game with the never-die spirit. The touchdown was the result of Charleston punting to their forty-yard line, Thomas catching the

hall and going through the entire Charleston team for a touchdown. Good interference had much to do with this topchdown.
