## CITY SEEKS PERMIT FOR LOS ANGELES AUTO BUS LINE

**Pacific Electric Attorney Is Present When Glendale Is Before Utilities Board**

"Get the permit."  
That's the next step in Glendale's program for a municipally operated bus line between this city and Los Angeles.  
Mayor Spencer Robinson, City Manager W. H. Reeves, C. D. Gulick, consulting traffic expert, and members of the city council yesterday afternoon appeared before the Los Angeles board of public utilities to get their declared attitude in the matter.  
According to Mr. Reeves a permit from that board is desirable, thus eliminating the state railroad commission in the control of the municipal utility. Some very pertinent questions were put to the utilities board by the Glendale representatives and it is expected that an application for the permit will be filed within a day or two.

**P. E. Lawyer There**  
Attorney Frank Karr, representing the Pacific Electric, invited himself to the meeting and carefully watched the procedure after which he addressed the board and was made the target of another attack on the part of the riled Glendale city fathers.

If the Los Angeles board does not grant the permit immediately—and there are indications they will not in face of the strenuous opposition on the part of the electric railway—every effort will be extended through civic bodies in the city to bring the necessary pressure to bear.

In the meantime statistical work is being done on the check of passengers on the Glendale Pacific Electric line last Saturday which was efficiently accomplished by six policemen. It was found that 9000 passengers were carried to and from the city in the six hour period and Mr. Gulick will determine how many motor busses will be needed to provide ample accommodation.

**Anxious to Sell Buses**  
Motor car salesmen are besieging the office of the city manager with a bombardment of literature regarding the merits of their machines for passenger bus service. Everything is being done to get the city to purchase one of the first municipally owned bus lines in America.

Mr. Gulick comes from San Francisco where he has had seven years' experience battling with corporations and it is said he has succeeded remarkably well.

Hollywood, also, is making a strenuous fight to establish bus lines to care for its traffic, but being a part of Los Angeles it encounters difficulties which Glendale can overcome. Robert Young, attorney for the Chamber of Commerce at Hollywood, charges the utilities board with being unfriendly toward the district and its plans.

**MRS. HELEN P. SANBORN, CIVIC WORKER, PASSES AWAY**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—Mrs. Helen P. Sanborn, member of the board of education and widely known civic worker, died early today following a seizure of heart disease.

**LOSS BY FIRE IN CLAYVILLE, PA., IS ABOUT \$250,000**  
CLAYVILLE, Pa., Jan. 31.—Fire starting early today swept through the business section here, wiped out numerous business places housed in six buildings and caused an estimated property loss of \$250,000. In mid-forenoon it was believed the town was doomed, but firemen from Washington, Pa., got control of the flames at 10:30.

**FIREMEN SHOVEL THEIR WAY TO FIGHT THIS BLAZE**  
BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 31.—Firemen early today were compelled to shovel the way for their apparatus through snowbanks to reach a fire that destroyed the car repair shop of the Bethlehem steel corporation at Sparrows Point. The fire started from an overheated stove and caused an estimated damage of \$50,000.

**CONFERENCE PACKED AGAINST FARMER, IS CHARGED**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—President Harding's recent agricultural conference was "packed" against the farmer and the platform adopted by the conference does not represent the desires of the great body of American farmers, according to William H. Lyon, of Sioux Falls, S. D., testifying today before the senate committee on agriculture. "The farmers were out-voted by other interests," declared Lyon, referring to the representatives of so-called allied industries, packers, grain dealers, bankers, etc.

**SENATOR KENYON TO ACCEPT APPOINTMENT AS JUDGE**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—A political surprise was sprung today in capitol circles by the announcement of Senator William S. Kenyon, republican, of Iowa, that he has decided to accept an appointment as judge of the United States circuit court of appeals for the eighth judicial circuit. Senator Kenyon has been one of the leaders of the agricultural bloc in the senate and has been prominently identified with the so-called "progressive group" of mid-western and western senators who have frequently been in opposition to the administration in legislative matters of government.

**STATE CALLS MORE WITNESSES IN ARBUCKLE TRIAL**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—The trial of Roscoe ("Fatty") Arbuckle swung into its fourth week today after a three-day recess. The state had six or eight witnesses remaining to be called, including a "surprise" witness. District Attorney Brady and his assistants were reticent regarding this witness who was understood to be en route here from Chicago. Arguments on the issue of declaring Zey Prevon a hostile witness occupied the attention of the court upon convening today. The jury was not present.

**SOLDIER BONUS BILL BEFORE CONGRESS IN TWO WEEKS**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Representatives of the American Legion, appearing today before the house ways and means committee, were assured that a soldier bonus bill will be reported favorably to congress within two weeks. "We will have to work fast, though," said Representative Green, republican, Iowa, acting chairman. "You should," said John T. Taylor, chairman of the legion legislative committee. "From 600,000 to 900,000 ex-service men are out of work and there is ill will against the government."

**HARDING AND CABINET TO DISCUSS FORD'S OFFER**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Henry Ford's proposal to take over and operate the government's nitrate plants and water power projects at Muscle Shoals, Ala., will be laid before President Harding and his cabinet today by Secretary of War Weeks if an opportunity is presented for a discussion of the subject, it was announced at the war department shortly before the cabinet met at the White House. The secretary of war has virtually completed work on the recommendations which he will make to congress with respect to the Ford offer, but wishes to discuss it with members of the cabinet before transmitting the contract to the senate and house.

**DEMOCRATIC MOVE ON FOREIGN DEBT BILL DEFEATED**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—A new democratic move to fix the time for payments of interest on the \$11,000,000,000 foreign indebtedness to the United States was beaten decisively today when the senate resumed consideration of the administration's debt funding bill. An amendment offered by Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, ranking democratic member of the senate finance committee, providing that interest on the debt could not be deferred for more than three years, was defeated by a vote of 41 to 27. By a vote of 46 to 25 the senate rejected an amendment offered by Senator Jones, democrat, New Mexico, member of the senate finance committee, which would have required the proposed commission to collect additional interest on all deferred interest payments.

**FEDERAL JURY SEEKS TO FIX BLAME FOR BIG DISASTER**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The federal grand jury, under the direction of District Attorney Peyton Gordon, went to work in earnest today in its investigation to fix responsibility for the Knickerbocker Theatre disaster, while all Washington mourned and plans were completed for the funerals of the scores of victims. Estimates of the number of dead continue to vary around 100, but the list was expected to be augmented during the day by deaths of at least three persons who were injured in Saturday's crash. They are Dr. Clyde Gearhart, Miss Carolin Upshaw and Edward Williams. E. H. Shaughnessy, second assistant postmaster-general, who was in a serious condition yesterday was reported this morning as greatly improved. Hospitals were still crowded with the injured, many of the victims being permanently maimed. In addition to the grand jury investigation the senate is expected to take action on the resolution of Senator Capper, of Kansas, ordering an inquiry into the construction of the Knickerbocker theatre and all other large buildings erected in Washington during the war. After checking and re-checking the lists of dead and injured, the police announced this morning that the official list shows ninety-five persons lost their lives. This figure may still be changed. PARTY LEADERS STRIVING TO FORCE REFUNDING BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Still facing a raging storm of opposition from both republican and democratic senators, republican leaders bent again today to the task of forcing the passage of the bill which would give blanket authority to refund or convert the \$11,000,000 foreign indebtedness to the United States to a commission of five, headed by the secretary of the treasury.

Federal Reserve \$1 Raised to \$10 and Easily Pass If Caution Isn't Used
Ten Weeks of Play Ahead of Alley Enthusiasts; List of Entrants Announced

Bank note counterfeiters have passed raised \$1 bills as \$10 notes in Glendale, according to R. F. Kitterman, cashier of the First National Bank.

Federal authorities operating in the state have taken several notorious characters into custody, who will face a counterfeiting charge.

A \$1 Federal Reserve bank note is cleverly raised to \$10 by pasting ciphers opposite the figure one.

How to Detect Them
To distinguish between the counterfeit and original \$10 notes, the difference can be easily detected by glancing at the position of the figures on the corners of the back of the note, where they are printed on the original \$1 note in a rectangular position.

A teller at the First National Bank accepted one of these counterfeit notes during a rush period, which goes to show how cleverly these criminals have perfected their system.
