DUKE OF CONNAUGHT MAY REMAIN LONGER IF WAR CONTINUES

Ottawa, Aug. 3 .-- Word was received this morning that the Duke of Connaught will reach the capital between one and two o'clock to-night. It is not believed here that the duke will return to England, but will remain in Canada to advise the cabinet and assist in mobilization. If the war scare lasts any length of time it is thought likely that the term of the duke will be extended in place of Prince Alexander of Teck coming to Canada.

Excitement in official circles is dying out. Every possible preparation for the eventuality of hostilities has been made. Mobilization can be started at a minute's notice, the fortifica tions on the coast have been placed on a war basis, and arrangements have been made for protecting the canals and transportation routes.



Stockholm, Aug. 3.—A battle was fought yesterday between the German and Russian fleets off the Aland Islands, and resulted in the Russians being driven back. The Russian war vessels took refuge in the Gulf of Finland where they still remained

London, Aug. 3.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Paris to-day says German troops have taken possession of the Belgian town of Arlon.

A Brussels dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph says that the Belgian cabinet's response to the German note, offering an entente if Belgium would facilitate the movement of German troops has been given and is in the nature of a formal refusal.

Sir Edward Grey announced in the House of Commons to-day that a telegram from the King of the Belgians made a supreme appeal to Great Britain to safeguard the integrity of Belgium.

Neutrality Violation Will Involve Britain.

Violation of neutral territory by Germany during frontier raids by German, Russian and French troops, clashes between outposts, bombardment of a Russian Baltic port by a German warship and the seizure of merchant ships by Russia and Germany, constituted the striking features to day of the war on which virtually the whole continent of Europe has started.

The position to be taken by the British Empire remained still to be defined, but it was feared that German's seizure of Belgian territory would be a deciding factor which would lead Britons to take the sword in hand, as under the Treaty of London of 1839 Great Britain stands pledged to maintain Belgian neutrality.

Nation Not Yet Committed to War.

Sir Edward Grey stated in the House of Commons to-day that the House was free to define what the British attitude in the present European conflict should be. Sir Edward added that Great Britain had not committed herself to anything but diplomatic support.

Invasion of Russia Has Commenced.

Berlin, Aug 3.—The invasion of Russia by German troops began to-day when the first battalion of the 155th infantry, with a machine gun company occupied Kalisz in Russian Poland.

Allenstein, East Prussia, Aug. 3.—Fighting on the Russian frontier was confined to small engagements between cavalry outposts until 6 o'clock last evening, but an attack was then made by the Russian invaders on Johannesburg, which is occupied by a squadron of the 11th Pomeranian Dragoons.

The railroad from Johannesburg to Lyek, on the Russian frontier, has been cut and also the light railroad running to Blottoween.

The losses of the Russian troops are believed to have been about twenty men, while the Germans have not lost any killed, although several have been wounded.

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
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

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BRITAIN WOULD HELP FRANCE DURING WAR

Cabinet in Council for Hours International Irrigation Conat Whitehall; Deliberations Not Published

The European situation up to or o'clock to-day is as follows: Germany has violated the neutrality of Belgium sending troops into that country in pursuance of preliminary operations against France. This is bound to involve Great Britain, which has guaranteed Belgian integrity by treaty. Sir Edward Grey has declared in parliament that if the German fleet enters North Sea or the English Channel for the purpose of operating against France, the British navy "will provide all the protection of which it is capable." This declaration, taken in confunction with the order for the mobilization of the British army, makes it an absolute certainty that before many hours have passed Great Britain will be at war with Germany.

German troops invaded Russian Poland to-day and occupied the town of Kalisz. The Russians are attacking the town of Johannesburg in East Prussia. A battle is reported to have taken place between the Russian and German fleets in the North Sea, in which the former were repulsed, seeking shelter ir the Gulf of Finland, which is closely mined. 



GERMAN ARMY LIVES ON ITS REPUTATION

Military Writer Says Its Strength is Composed of Statistics

CANNOT PRACTICE WAR TILL FACING ENEMY

Whole Training of German Soldier Designed to Eradicate Individualism

There can be no doubt that in military and diplomatic matters judicious advertisement pays just as well as it loes in all trades or professions, says "En Avant" in the current London Magazine. The great essential of sucs is to establish a reputation, and sequently to maintain it by careful dvertisement.

For half a century Turkey existed upon the reputation her army had won at Plevna; for a similar period the Jerman army has been living on the reputation achieved in 1866 and 1870, against the Austrians and the French. Since the Franco-German war no state has dared to call in question the invin-

A plethora of statistics and a few well-selected complimentary criticisms have sufficed to make Europe believe,

most perfectly organised army in the world, but battles are not won by Clourishing sheaves of statistics in the enemy's face, nor is there any sound criterion by which the worth of an army for war can be judged in time of

There are a hundred and one qualiies which are supposed theoretically to make for efficiency in an army, such as numbers, material, discipline, leading, physique, training, organization, and so forth, but the great deciding factor —and those who have as much modern battlefield experience as my-self will doubtless agree with me—is the capacity of the individual soldier endure hardship and his individual letermination to win through

Now, the German system of life and of military training is not designed to encourage individual effort, but rather to stultify it, and to reduce the individual man or unit to the state of a dis ciplined automaton

In most professions and trades such training is excellent, for by dint of nuch practise each individual and unit becomes "part perfect"—each learns to fit into his appointed place, just as do the component parts of nice-ly adjusted pieces of mechanism.

The business of an army, however differs from any other, for it canno be practised in peace time. What men do at manoeuvres is no criterion what-ever of what they will do in war. An army can never really practise war until it is in the presence of the enemy

The army that has not been proven in war is like the piece of machinery that has nevel been set in motion. Now, the more nicely adjusted the machine, the more fatal will be the catastrophe when anything unforeseen occurs take the Titanic as an example—and it is common knowledge that it is always the unexpected that does occur in war time. Wherefore, an army should be

time. Wherefore, an army should be as elastic as possible in its organiza-tion and training. This is precisely what the German army is not.

The German army is obedient to a rule of thumb. To the German tacti-cien, the science of warfare is cut and Officers and men alike know what they ought to do under a hundred what they ought to do under a numered different conditions; they learn it all by heart, and when those conditions arise they act correctly, because they know their work by heart. But sup-posing, as will invariably happen, other conditions arise, conditions the anti-acte to which has not been studied, what will happen?

Untaught to think or act for them selves, they will ransack their memories for the correct reply.

Under modern conditions of warfare the best soldier is he who knows how "muddle through," "carry on" when in a tight place, with out waiting for instructions.

The whole training of the German soldier is designed to eradicate individualism and to reduce soldiers, battalions, regiments and brigades to a state of iron-bound automatism. the enemy's action could be equally re duced, then such training would be per fect, but, as things are, I maintain that it is fatal, for it entirely destroy the personal factor, and it is only the personal factor of each individual in an army which will carry that army to victory under modern conditions o

Discipline alone is only good so long as there is an ever-present authority as there is an ever-present authority to enforce it; on the modern battlefield it is impossible for an officer adequate-ly to supervise his men, and to enforce discipline. He can and should teach them in peace-time how best to handle the finest, greatest and most splendid the finest, greatest and most splendid fighting machine in the world.

Perhaps it is that familiarity is apt to breed contempt, but I for one am no believer in the invincibility of the German army. I shall endeavor to ings; all he can do is to lead his men and to encourage them. He is in exactly the same position as the father who has launched his son upon the certainly, but battle of life. He much rely upon the past training of his son certainly, but above all upon his individuality, courage, and devotion.

The German officer relies only upon discipline, and he runs the risk of be-

ing badly let down at the crucial moment. Courage, determination, "amour propre," and individual enterprise are all stronger than the fear of death, but it has yet to be proven that the modern educated man will risk death rather than contravens discipline. rather than contravene discipline. Wherefore, I maintain that in our present state of civilization the German system of organization and training is fundamentally wrong.

I do not believe that force of habit fallar disciplines along will induce men.

(alias discipline) alone will induce men to face, the dangers and hardships which have to be faced to carry on a successful war.

Let me cite a double example from he last Balkan war. The Bulgarian soldier is modelled and rained on Prussian lines, and is far and away the best-disciplined soldier in the Balkans. When he met the Turkish armles in October, 1912, the Turk was not ready, and had not completed his mobilization. The Bulgar had it all his own way, just as the Prussian had it all his own way in the Franco-German war.

Constitutionalist Army Begins Advance for Final Battle of Revolution

Saltillo, Mex., Aug. 2.—(Delayed)-An advance on Mexice City of more than seventy thousand well-armed and equipped constitutionalist sold-iers was begun to-day on orders from General Carranza.

Irapuato, Guanajuato, Mex., Aug. 2.
—General Alvaro Obregon, commander of the division of the northwest arrived here to-day and his troops are

mobilizing here for the movement on Mexico City.

This place is only 180 miles north of Mexico City. Obregon's forces probably will converge with those of General Jesus Carranza, who recently took Guanajuato. Irapuato was taken after heavy fighting.

After the troops under Colonel Mi guel Acosta drove back the federal outposts, General Lucce Blanco, Obre-gon's cavalry chief, attacked Irapuato on July 29. After a three-hours' fight the federals re-attacked but were defeated. Blanco promptly followed up his advantage and with his two cav alry brigades crushed the 2,000 fed-erals on July 31 at a ranch ten miles east of here. Cheers Greet Statement That Early Dispatch of Contingent Public Opinion at Home is With France

London, Aug. 3.-Dealing with the uestion of Great Britain's obligations, when speaking in the house of commons, Sir Edward Grey said: "Up to vesterday we had given no promise of diplomatic support. I was more than diplomatic support. I was asked at the time of the Algeciras crisis if we would give armed support and I said I could promise nothing to any foreign power unless it received the whole-hearted support of public

"I gave no promise, but I told both the French and German ambassadors that if war was forced on France, pub-lic opinion in the British Isles would really to France."

This part of the speech was received

with loud cheers.

The foreign secretary stated that the British fleet had been mobilized and the mobilization of the British army was taking place, but that no engagement had yet been made by the British government to send an expedition abroad. He continued: "The French eet is in the Mediterranean and the northern coasts of France are defence-less. If a foreign fleet engaged in war against France should come down and battle against those defenceless coasts ve could not stand aside.

Conservatives Gathered in Numbers Goldstream Saturday-References to War Situation. The Conservative association of the

Premier Sir Richard McBride was attended by his usual bodyguard, consist-ing of Hon. W. J. Bowser, Hon. Dr. Young, G. H. Barnard and R. F. Green, members of parliament for Victoria and Kootenay respectively; Messrs. Behnsen, Thompson and Davey, mem-bers of the legislature for Victoria city. Sir Richard McBride, who was the chief speaker, devoted himself to a brief discussion of the critical situa-tion which has arisen in Europe and dwelt upon the patriotic duty of Candwelt upon the patriotic duty of Canadians at the present time. Reverting
to the suddenness with which all
political bitterness and party strife in
the Mother Country had been dropped,
and all the strength of the statesmen
of the heart of empire devoted to the
solution of a most serious problem,
he declared his belief that political
parties in Canada were equally ready
to sink their differences and demon-

strate their devotion to the cause of empire. He declared that Canada would loyally accept any decision of Downing street, and "with both men and money" would show their deter-mination to stand with Britain in the threatening war.

As a province he believed British Co-lumbia to be as loyal and as ready as any part of the Dominion to contribute its share to the cause and support the "great empire on which the sun never ets." He said:

"If we in British Columbia have to confront war there is no need for ex-citement. Let us prepare ourselves to play the man; let us have a full realization of our manifest duty. There is no occasion to lose our heads. When the crisis is past we may be able to say we have acquitted ourselves as a law-abiding British community is expected to.

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
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
