

WILL NOT REVIVE NEW TAX QUESTION

Mayor Will Let Proposed Levies Drop; Calls Government Policy a "Lemon"

Following the City Council's refusal, Monday night, to consider the Provincial Government's plan whereby the municipalities of the Province would pay a \$5 poll tax and increase the amusement tax, Mayor Porter announced this morning that he had no intention of reviving the question. "I have spoken to members of the Council many times privately," the Mayor stated, "and none of them have seemed to want to enforce the proposed taxes. Finally, to get action one way or the other, I asked the Council, plain blank, whether it was going to use the two taxes or not. The result was that the aldermen refused to consider the matter, and adjourned without passing upon it. I certainly don't intend to revive it again, although I still hold that we should take official action in order that the Government may not be able to say that we did not consider it at all. We are in such a position now that the Government can rightly say this: 'There never has been any doubt, however, as to whether we would impose the tax or not. Not one member of the Council, so far as I know, would favor either tax. Thus the Government's assistance has been nothing at all. Their whole plan of relief to the municipalities has failed to give us a cent extra revenue. They handed us a lemon—that's all it was—a lemon.'"

SUGGESTS AERIAL MAIL DESPATCH

With Seaplanes or Flying Boats Would Link Up Victoria to Sound

Telegraphic dispatches from Seattle this morning state that the United States authorities are considering the advisability of establishing an aerial mail service between Seattle and Victoria. The advice says that Edgar M. Seattle, Seattle Postmaster; Edward McGrath, Otto Praeger and Edgar N. Gott (of the Boeing Aircraft Company) are in conference on the matter. The dispatch states that the average mail between the two ports on the arrival of the Oriental steamers is in the neighborhood of 400 pounds, and that this could be easily conveyed by air through the advantage of the American cities. A saving of a day would be effected, it is claimed, by the service over the present roundabout train method by way of Vancouver. If the preliminary arrangements can be successfully negotiated, and no international tangles crop up, the project is entirely feasible, and will be instituted by the American authorities.

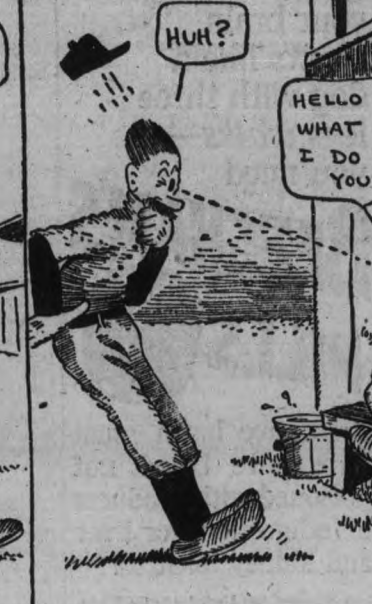

MAKE FINAL PLANS FOR HUGE PAGEANT

Arrangements Outlined at Meeting Forecast Unprecedented Spectacle

Final plans for the big Hudson's Bay Company's anniversary pageant, which showed clearly that the celebration will be unique in the history of this city, were laid before the chairman in charge of the various pageant committees by C. H. French, manager of the Hudson's Bay Company here, yesterday afternoon. All but the most minute details were given attention and were finally arranged yesterday, and it was apparent to all that the energetic committee chairmen had the preparations so well in hand that the long and varied programme should be carried through without a hitch.

As outlined to the meeting by Mr. French, the pageant will open with a huge parade which will be formed up ready to start at eleven o'clock. Two miles in length, it will include about a score of historical and other floats. Great interest in the parade had been taken by the public and business men of the city. Mr. French stated, and he felt confident that Victoria's effort in this direction would compare favorably with those of other Western Canadian cities.

Motor car owners, in particular, Mr. French said, had shown themselves anxious to make the parade an unprecedented feature. This phase of the proceedings, he felt, could be safely left to the motorists themselves. The only suggestion he had to offer was that car owners use a profusion of broom which would make the parade typical of Victoria.

The route of the parade, Mr. French stated, had been so arranged that it would pass through the business district and also swing out into the nearer residential districts. Its most impressive effect will be in front of the Parliament Buildings.

Indian Sports

One of the big attractions of the programme will be the Indian sports in the Gorge waters, commencing at three o'clock in the afternoon. Only Indians will participate in these sports, which will recall the early days of Fort Victoria.

Two hundred guests will be entertained by the Hudson's Bay Company at a banquet in the Empress Hotel in the evening, a number of early pioneers of the city, particularly those who recollect the early history of the company, being invited. Sir Robert M. Kindersley, Governor of the company, will be present at this as well as all other functions.

Early in the evening an elaborate fireworks display will be staged on James Bay. A feature of this display will be a number of sets depicting historical events in the history of the company.

Film Display

R. S. Hughes, representing the company, at present is in the city arranging for the showing here of the great screen romance of the fur trade—a film which will be run at the Royal Victoria Theatre in continuous performance on Monday and Tuesday of the anniversary week. The exhibition will be free but by ticket only, in order that there may be no confusion.

The pictures treat the subject in a comprehensive and yet most attractive manner. They show the first trip to Hudson Bay made by representatives of the company in a small sturdy craft 250 years ago. The scene is then shifted to the present time when the company's vessel, the good ship Nascobie, is seen taking on supplies at Montreal prior to sailing for distant parts. The audience is taken along on the voyage. Down the St. Lawrence, around the Labrador icebergs, weathering a forty-foot tide—all these and many other adventures befall the traveler upon the Nascobie.

On arrival at the H. B. Co. post at Lade Harbor the Esquimaux give the travelers a royal welcome, as they form the only link with the outside world for the Esquimaux in a period of nine months. "Knowing nothing of countries, they think the war just finished was waged between the Hudson's Bay Company and another company. Rejoicings and thanksgivings follow when they hear that the H. B. Co. has won."

The life story of a Baffin Island Esquimaux is then unfolded, the names of the actors being Inngmiluk, the hero of the tale, Goyanluk, his mother; Innotek, his sweetheart; Nooyeat, her mother. Courtship scenes are shown, as well as the wedding ceremony, followed by grotesque native dancing.

Another film shows scenes along the British Columbia coast, and includes Indian villages, totem poles and other views of interest. The camera man next transports himself to the Athabasca River, down which he floats on a scow, which becomes a part of the Grand Rapids. Many exciting adventures follow while navigating these treacherous waters.

At Fort Chipewyan pictures are taken of Battie Plakoti, the champion trapper of the Athabasca region, showing the methods he employs to catch the unwary animals. Many beautiful pictures of northern sunsets are splendidly rendered by combination tints and tones in the film.
