Sir Arthur, who commanded the Canadian forces in Flanders, has been filling the post of Inspector-General of the Forces in Canada since his return.

#### **CANADA TAKES** FRÂNCE WILL REAP STEP FORWARD

New York Post Refers to Outlook Very Encouraging; Canadian Minister at Washington

"A long forward step in the development of the idea of Imperial unity within the British Empire will have been made when a Canadian Minister Plenipotentiary appointed by King George, on the advice of the Canadian Cabinet, takes his place at Washington. To the extent that he will be the channel of communication with our Government on matters of 'purely Canadian concern' it is true for the present that the diplomatic unity of the British Empire remains formally intact. Nothing affecting, for example, the question of Canadian severeignty would be interpreted as of a purely Canadian concern, and to that extent the formula is justified. That the Canadian Minister will be in some respects part of the British diplomatic establishment is indicated by the provision that in the absence of the British Ambassador, Canada's representative will be in charge of all Imperial affairs at Washington.

#### SAID ADMIRALTY **ALMOST HELPLESS**

President Wilson Scored British in Message to Sims During War

Washington, May 12.—A confidential cablegram from President Wilson to Rear-Admiral Sims in London, sent during the war, was read to the Senate naval investigating committee to-day by Secretary Daniels. It expressed surprise that the British Admiralty had falled to "use Great Britain's great naval superiority" effectively against the German submarines and called on Admiral Sims for comments and suggestions based on "independent thought," and without regard to "the judgments of anyone on that side of the water."

The Admiralty was "helpless to the point of panie" in the face of the submarine situation, the message said. "Every plan we suggest they reject for some reason of prudence," Mr. Wilson added. ## Polish Troops and Ukrainians Carrying Out New Offensive

Forcing Bolsheviki Back Along Front of 420 Miles; Achieve Success Along Beresina River; Two Soviet Regiments Wiped Out at One Point

Warsaw, May 12.—(Associated Press)—Polish and Ukrainian forces have struck a mighty blow at the Russian Bolshevik front far north of Kiev, and have driven the enemy back along the Beresina River. Betchitza, an important Dnieper River crossing, has been captured and serious losses have been inflicted on the Soviet army. Fighting is now going on over a front of approximately 420 miles

Necessity of straigtening the Polish line after the capture of Kiev is said to have led to the new offensive, which extends from almost directly west of Vietebsk to below Kiev on the Dnieper, Polish forces have crossed the Beresina River at several points and have taken Wielatisch after heavy fighting.

#### PROFITS ON SUGAR IN UNITED STATES BEING KEPT DOWN

Washington, May 12.-Telegrams were sent by the Department of Justice to-day to all United States attorneys reiterating the Depart-ment's policy of holding the margin of profit on sugar sales to one cent for wholesalers and two cents for retailers.

Ottawa, May 12.—In the Senate resterday the Deputy Governor-Gen-eral, Sir Louis Davies, says the royal assent to the Grand Trunk Purchase Agreement Bill.

Senator Robertson on the second reading of the bill respecting the Director of Coal Operations, explained that its object was to continue in effect this office for another year. In 1917, by Order-in-Council, he said, a Director of Coal Operations had been appointed for District No. 18, which comprised Southern Alberta and the Crow's Nest, to regulate production, prices and wages. This control would cease at the end of this season unless continued by legislation. Senator Robertson said that the control of coal operations in the district had been a marked success, and in preveing disruption had saved the prairie population from disaster. There had been in the district a hard fight between the United Mine Workers of America and the One Big Union for control. While the United Mine Workers were in the ascendancy, the extreme radical elements were still dangerous. 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### **CENTENARY OF** LADY OF THE LAMP

Sketch of Florence Nightingale, Founder of Modern Nursing

Florence Nightingale, the famous aurse, and the acknowledged founder of modern nursing practice, was born just one bundred years ago to-day. In keeping, with this centenary the local nurses are celebrating the occasion with a function this aftermoon. This is one of thousands through the far-flung countries of the civilized world, which has learnt from the lessons of the Red Cross in the late war what a splendid system was created when Miss Nightingale laid amid the chao's and suffering at Scutari the foundations of modern nursing in war and peace time.

The Lady of the Lamp was born of British family, of the aristocratic class in Florence, and was named after the city of flowers. She was the daughter of William Edward Nightingale, of Embley Park, Hampshire, and Lea Hurst, Derbyshire.

As a child Miss Nightingale showed special aptitude for her life work, and many tales are told of her kindness to animals, and her interest in social welfare work. At a time when the young women of her class were idle, She spent her time visiting hospitals, reformatories, and other charitable institutions. Later she crossed to the Continent, and visited various hospitals there. She definitely decided to study nursing, and took her laborious training in the Institute of Protestant Deaconesses at Kalserswerth. She also took up nursing at Paris, and particularly studied the work of the Sieters of St. Vincent de Paul. She soon came to appreciate that the work of the French and German nurses was ahead of the British, and on her return to England began reforms in that regard. Until that time nursing was not regarded as the career of a gentlewoman, but she soon showed the new order of things. She organized an institution in Harley Street, London, and put it on a satisfactory basis.


The neglect of the British wounded in the Crimea War, and the superior methods of the French, together with the wonderful pen pictures of suffering sent home by Sir Wilam Russell, stirred the British public in 1854.4 Her old friend and neighbor, Sidney Herbert, later Lord Herbert of Lea, was War Secretary, and he invited Miss Nightingale to go out to the front. She quickly complied, organized her corps, and on arrival at Scutari found the treatment of the wounded in chaos. She had also to meet with many obstacles from the medical men out there, who were not accustomed to a competent service, Arriving on the eve of the Battle of Inkermen the corps of nurses was quickly engaged with the wounded arriving from the front. Every one know how she toiled, how by her visits to the wards she won the title of the Lady of The Lamp, eften working twenty hours a day. She eventually put the organization in such a shape that she was able to move to the Crimea, where she nearly died in Balaciava hospital of fever. After the war she returned quietly to England.

With the £50,000 raised in recognition of her services she founded the nightingale Home for training nurses at St. Thomas's and King's College Hospitals. She also turned her attention to the question of army sanitary reform and army hospitals, and to the work of the Army Medical Colge at Chatham: In 1858 she published her 'Notes on Nursing,' which gave an enormous stimulus to the study of this subject in England.

Miss Nightingale followed with interest all the later, improvements in sanitation, and was frequently consulted about hospital plans. 





#### **WILL NOT REVIVE NEW TAX QUESTION**

Mayor Will Let Proposed Levies Drop; Calls Government Policy a "Lemon"

Following the City Council's refusal, Monday night, to consider the Provincial Government's plan where by the municipatities of the Province can levy a \$5 poll tax and increase the amusement tax, Mayor, Porter announced this morning that he had no intention of reviving the question. "I have spoken to members of the Council many times privately," the Mayor stated, "and none of them have seemed to want to enforce the proposed taxes. Finally, to get action one way or the other, I asked the Council, piont blank, whether it was going to use the two taxes or not. The result was that the aldermen refused to consider the matter, and adjourned without passing upon it. I certainly don't intend to revive it again, although I still hold that we should take official action in order that the Government may not be able to say that we did not consider it at all. We are in such a position now that the Government can rightly say this. "There never has been any doubt, however, as to whether we would impose the tax or not. Not one member of the Council, so far as I know, would favor either tax. Thus the Government's assistance has been nothing at all. Their whole plan of relief to the municipalities has failed to give us a cent extra revenue. They handed us a lemon—that's all it was—a lemon."

He made some surveys, and as a consequence came before the Saanich Council in 1912 with a project which eventually became the Shelbourne Street scheme for a new road to Mount Douglas Park.

Mr. Williams entered the Council for Ward III at the election of 1913, in order to further the construction of the road, and soon found himself lined up with Councillors Borden and McGregor, both of whom were afterwards reeves, against the Nicholson administration. They voted solidly on every question, and organized the opposition which carried the campaign of the following January. In fact, Mr. William's foar-lessness in that campaign, which he took a large part in Circcting, had much to do with its success. He retired from the council at the end of 1914, having carried the Shelbourne.

## MAKE FINAL PLANS FOR HUGE PAGEANT

Arrangements Outlined at Meeting Forecast Unprecedented Spectacle

Final plans for the big Hudson's Bay Company's anniversary pageant, plans which showed clearly that the celebration will be unique in the history of this city, were laid before the chairmen in charge of the various pageant committees by C. H. French; manager of the Hudson's Bay Company here, yesterday afternoon. All but the most minute details were given attention and were finally arranged yesterday, and it was apparant to all that the energetic committee chairmen had the preparations so well in hand that the long and varied programme should be carried through without a hitch.

As outlined to the meeting by Mr. French, the pageant will open with a huge parade which will be formed up ready to start at eleven o'clock. Two miles in length, it will include about a score of historical and other floats. Great interest in the parade had been taken by the public and ousiness men of the city. Mr. French stated, and he felt confident that Victoria's effort in this direction would compare most favorably with those of other Western Canadian cities.

Motor car owners, in particular, Mr. French said, had shown themselves of the proceedings, he felt, could be safely left to the motorists themselves. The only suggestion he had profusion of broom which would make the parade typical of Victoria.

Sir Robert M. Kindersley, Governor of the company, will be present at this as well as all other functions.

Early in the evening an elaborate fireworks display will be staged on James Bay. A feature of this display will be a number of sets depicting historical events in the history of the company.

Down the St. Lawrence, around the Labrador coast, in among the ice floes, dodging icebergs, weathering a forty-foot tide-all, these and many other adventures befall the traveler upon the Nascoble.

On arrival at the H. B. Co post at Lade Harbor the Esquimaux give the travelers a royal welcome, as they form the only link with the outside world for the Esquimaux in a period of nine months. Co. has won.

Another film shows scenes along the British Columbia coast, and includes Indian villages, totem poles and other views of interest. The camera man next transports himself to the Athabasca River, down which he foats on a scow, which becomes caught in the Grand Rapids. Many exciting adventures follow while navigating these treacherous waters.

At Fort Chippewyan pictures are taken of Batties Plakoti, the champion trapper of the Athabasca region, showing the methods he employs to catch the unwary animals. Many beautiful pictures of northern sunsets are splendidly rendered by combination tints and tones in the film.


