

#### THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

#### TRUSTEES OF THE PEABODY INSTITUTE.

The Trustees of the Peabody Institute herewith present their thirty-seventh annual report.

Nothing has occurred during the past year to interfere with the continued prosperity of this great, invaluable gift to the citizens of Peabody.

The Treasurer's report shows that the funds are safely and well invested, and that the belongings of the Institute are in good order.

The accompanying reports of the Library and Lyceum Committee, and the Sub-Committees are so full and explicit that but little remains for the Trustees to report.

The new "Finding List" Catalogue which has lately come from the publishers, needs only the attention of those who patronize the library, to show its value and convenience.

In view of publishing this Catalogue, it was deemed wise by the Trustees at the beginning of the year, to appropriate a larger sum of money than usual to be expended for books, that they might be entered therein, and this expense, together with the cost of publishing the finding list, has caused a larger encroachment upon the interest of the reserved fund than has ever before been made. It might be advisable for the Trustees to make a law limiting the percentage of the interest of the reserved fund which may be used for any other than emergency purposes.

The Finance Committee have negotiated and practically purchased the "Harris Estate" for the sum of six thousand dollars, and are only waiting for a title conveyance of the property. This can but be a wise transaction, if for no other reason than to avoid a "Harris Lane" or a possible row of tenement houses, or perhaps a livery stable, to be a perpetual nuisance to the Institute.

If in the future it were found necessary to enlarge the Institute building, and as, by reference to the report of the Lycuem and Library Committee, it will be seen that an addition is already recommended, it could only be properly done by moving the "Wallis House" upon the "Harris Estate" leaving ample room for enlargement of the Institute buildings, or for beautifying the grounds.

The wise provision of the reserved fund was manifestly for such purposes, inasmuch as the contingency of loss by fire is largely provided for by insurance.

Under the cover of expiration of term of service, the writer will dare presume to call the attention of the Trustees and the Citizens to a few points which may be worth consideration.

In the "Trustees' Report" of 1884, the writer somewhat "musically" illustrated the singular powerlessness of the Trustees, by having many years before (in 1857) voted to delegate to the Library and Lyceum Committee the entire control and management of the library, also of the lectures and enterainments; reserving only to themselves the appointment of the Janitor and the regulation of his salary, limiting the Lyceum and Library Committee only by the amount of money which they could use.

Therefore as relating to the management of the library and the lectures, and entertainments the office of Trustee is little more than honorary.

When we recall our Librarians, past and present, good men and true, we have every reason to commend the wisdom of their selections. As the Library and Lyceum Committee are now chosen, it might happen that nearly an entire new committee could be selected. It must be perfectly apparent that such a method, to say the least is faulty. Would it not be better to appoint them for a term of years, the term of office of a certain number expiring each year something after the manner of the office of Trustee?

The Trustees at present have no voice whatever in the choice of the lecturers, or of the character of the entertainments. While we of course favor a liberal interpretation of this great trust, yet it would seem judicious that the Trustees should act conjointly with the Library and Lyccum Committee in the appointment of the Librarian and his salary; also in the matter of selecting the lecturers and the entertainments, for surely should trouble arise from these sources, the Trustees would in no wise be held blameless or irresponsible.

In this connection a word in reference to the character of some of the books entered for general distribution, may be timely.

Under the caption of "Classic Literature", books have been introduced, the character of which is so grossly immoral that they should not only be "Starred" but they should be destroyed. There are also books of modern date by American Authors, upon the library shelves, and which shall not be advertised by designating their titles, which should never be allowed general circulation, if indeed any circulation whatever. No one knows this better than our worthy Librarian who has often raised his voice in protest.

During the past two years our Treasurer has given a bond of Twenty thousand dollars, purchased of the "Guarantee Insurance Company of North America", at an expense of about one hundred and fifty dollars per year. If an arrangement could be made, whereby the Town Treasurer could be made a member of the Board of Trustees, or one of the Board of Trustees be elected Town Treasurer, this annual expense could be saved to the Institute.

In the selection of Candidates by the Citizens for Trustees, the selection is often complimentary, and not because of any special fitness for the position. Inasmuch as the trust is mainly a financial one, should not citizens of the best financial abili-

ty and standing be chosen?

In conclusion we are pleased to record that our Librarian and his assistants have carefully and faithfully fulfilled their duties. The Janitor also has faithfully cared for the interests and belongings of the Institute.

We are indeed fortunate in having such efficient officers.

#### REPORT OF THE

# LIBRARY AND LYCEUM COMMITTEE.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE PEABODY INSTITUTE:-

The Librarian, Treasurer of the Lyceum and Library Committee, and Sub-Committees, herewith present their annual reports, explaining in detail the work of this Committee for the year 1888-89.

A perusal of the Librarian's report will show that the circulation of the Library has largely increased during the past year, and that the increase consisted of a call for the better classes of literature. The new finding list will aid takers to make a more intelligent selection of their readings, and the usefulness of the Library is certainly steadily increasing. The Library Committee call for more shelf room to accommodate the steady accumulation of new books; the construction of additional alcoves will further encroach upon the Library Hall, and it is suggested that your Board early consider the advisability of adding an annex to the Institute building, for the purpose of providing a private office for the use of the Librarian. The growth of the Library necessarily increases the clerical work of the Librarian, the present facilities are inadequate for keeping a systematic management of the required working materials, and in the performance of such work, seclusion from the interruptions of borrowers and visitors is desirable.

The Lyccum Committee have given an excellent course of lectures and entertainments, instruction to such of our residents as were fortunate enough to gain admittance to the hall, but the non-residents, as usual, attended the course in large numbers, to the exclusion of many of our own townspeople, who desired to enjoy the privileges that rightfully belong to them.

#### REPORT OF THE

## LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE:-

The following report of the Library Committee for the year ending January 31, 1889, is respectfully submitted:—

In accordance with previous recommendations, the Trustees early in the year made a special appropriation to meet the expense of preparing a supplemental catalogue or finding list, to embrace additions to the Library from June 1878; its preparation was immediately commenced, and the contract for printing awarded to the "Salem Press" who have recently completed it, their work being done in a manner creditable to them and satisfactory to the Committee.

In this connection the Committee desire to acknowledge their appreciation of the services of the Librarian in the preparation of the copy for the printers, which involved an amount of labor not easily appreciated by those not familiar with such work.

Copies of the finding list have been placed on sale at the nominal price of ten cents, and a goodly number already sold.—

Figures in detail accompanying the Librarian's report, show a gain of some fifteen per-cent in circulation over that of last year; a slight decrease in the percentage of Fiction is to be noted, while the classes of Biography and Travels and Description of Countries have made material gains.

The Reading Room has been well patronized, mainly for the purpose of reading the periodicals, although the facilities it affords for the consultation of works of reference have not been overlooked.

There have been added to the Library by purchase during the year 916 volumes, in the selection of which the committee have

endcavored to keep abreast of the times by securing the best of current literature in all classes, at the same time procuring such works of permanent value published in previous years as tend to maintain the well balanced condition of the collection.

The matter of shelf room has again to be considered, several classes, Fiction in particular, being badly overcrowded.

The Committee would recommend the building at an early date, of two more "V" alcoves similar to the last, that being the form best adapted to our limited floor space, combining as it does the essentials of a large number of shelves easily accessible with the least possible sacrifice of space.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE:-

The report of the Librarian of the Peabody Library, for the year ending February 1, 1889, is respectfully submitted.

During the past year many cards and rules have been issued to new borrowers, many of whom are minors. The unneccessary damage to books issued has caused an expense of some thirty dollars, which means the cost of at least thirty volumes of a similar class of books which might otherwise have been added to the Library.

A most thorough examination of the books returned during the last few weeks has been made and will be continued. A list of the names of the persons misusing the property of the institution has been and will be kept and it is to be hoped that means will be provided for an improvement in this matter.

Added to the cost of such carelessness before mentioned, the time used to examine some six hundred to eight hundred volumes weekly is so much time taken from those persons who need as sistance in their consultation of books, and who require the Librarian's aid, as their familiarity with the library and their limited time is not sufficient for their desired purpose.

Poole's Index to Periodicals and its supplement have been much used and would be still more used if the sets of our Magazines were completed, and a few sets of other periodicals purchased.

An attempt was made some time ago to fill up the sets now in the library, but as yet no success has attended the effort. Perhaps, if a new list of the desiderata were given to some bookseller who makes this class of literature a specialty, a better result would be obtained.

Doubtless if some copies were bound in stout paper covers, they might be disposed of, if offered at a nominal price. These two catalogues contain the lists of at least two thirds of the books in the library.

With the exception of one of the assistants of last year the corps has been the same as last year, and with the added experience of another year, their services have been much more valuable to myself and the frequenters of the library.

My thanks are tendered to the Government of the library, to my assist ants, and our respected Janitor for their hearty co-operation with myself in the furtherance of the interests of the institution founded by our generous benefactor.
