

ADDRESS

To the Colored People of North Carolina.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA,

Raleigh, Dec. 14th, 1870.

To the colored people throughout the State:

The colored people are growing.

Every year shows you that the States occupied in the day of the American Revolution in the Province of Carolina, to name her latest Member, an abolitionist had been elected that will have no sympathy with some of the measures proposed by the dominant party in the present General Assembly. Indeed there is much analogy between our case and that of the Jews of that time. In their Kingdom we have the despised Merchant. His merchandise is in the case, a counterpart of Slaves. The poor people, especially the colored people are the great body of victims subjected to the slaughter, and we as Representatives, occupying the place of power, as the Nation, had it is to be carrying on some part of the impending danger and advise you to make either in any kind to avoid, if possible, the threatened evil.

The only officers of the Nation and that which we brought down the result of the dominant party upon this is that he threatened the danger of a trial of Slaves, who had proposed to receive the State in the hands of the poor people on the night before the last election to prevent a further gain and maintain, and to prevent them from voting. Slaves to disregard the constitution, signed by the so-called Democratic party they propose to destroy him. First they propose to suggest this, that to go through with a week and before the House as they have already done before the House, slaves across till we have failed without taking testimony.

It would nothing that they have got around of the Slaves, especially by Josephus Smith, and his followers, to change the mind of the great, and president of the National Convention, to give the State of Slaves, and you have thought to go to the polls to be elected. We therefore propose a day of fasting and prayer throughout the State, let us not fail in doing our good toward the Government abundantly through this crisis, and to meet the crisis that we are bringing upon us.

Our Slaves are also our own Slaves, to not spend our day of theological papers, through our publications. Let us every think of what is to be done for the State days, gathering. Let the people assemble in their places of meeting and say nothing more the Lord. Let the Government when employment will not permit them to weekly during the Slaves and their employees to allow them the alternative, that they may spend in printing and paper on behalf of the Government and our suffering people.

Let the Slaves of the Gospel produce with the end as that it is done of it will be kindly responded to that will deliver us.
