Our theory of change for the Live Tutorial pilot:

New* editors completing the training will better understand core Wikipedia policies.	New* editors completing the training will complete more non-reverted edits following the training.	Existing growth of active editors in sub-Saharan Africa will be amplified by increased retention of new editors as well as their edits; the 'big funnel' approach can be adapted based on the results of this pilot to most effectively support growth and retention in the region.
New* editors completing the training will feel more confident contributing to Wikipedia.		
New* editors completing the training will feel equipped to handle setbacks like reverts, conflicts, or deletions.	New* editors completing the training will continue to be active editors in the months following the training.	

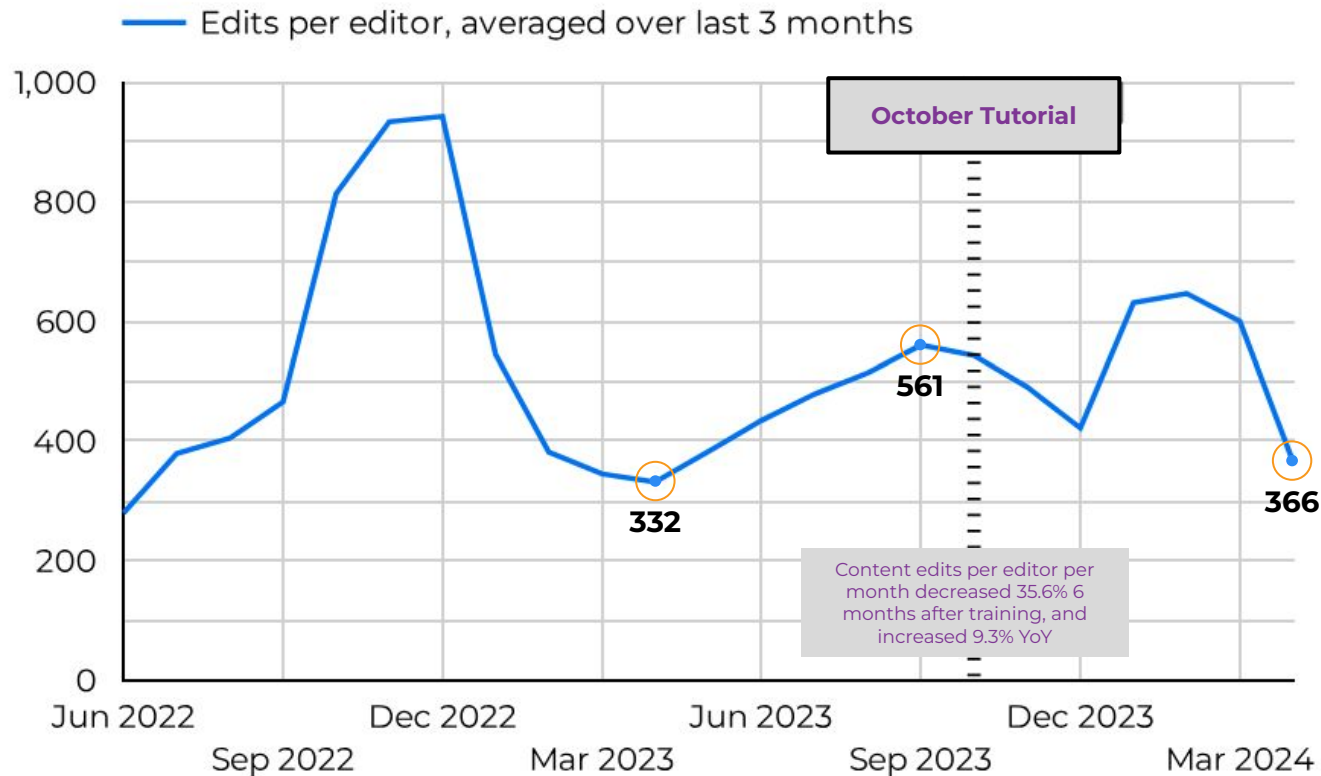
*While our original hypothesis focused on new editors, **participants in this pilot were existing editors**, the majority of whom had been active on projects for at least a year.

Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

	Did this happen?	How do we know?	What else is important to note?
<p>New editors completing the training will complete more non-reverted edits following the training.</p>	Yes, on enwiki	<p>At 6 months, participants' content edits overall were more likely to be reverted (0.91%) than before (0.60%). On enwiki, while rate of reversion crept up from where it was 3 months after the tutorial, at 6 months enwiki edits were 62% as likely to be reverted as before the tutorial (2.05% pre, 1.28% post).</p>	<p>Average number of edits per editor decreased following the training, but YoY the cohort's overall edit rate was up at 6 months (9.3%) and especially so on enwiki (43% increase YoY).</p>
<p>New editors completing the training will continue to be active editors in the months following the training.</p>	Yes, on enwiki	<p>At 6 months, as among editors in SSA more broadly, participants were less likely to be active in a given month YoY. On enwiki, however, activity increased YoY while broadly SSA activity decreased.</p>	

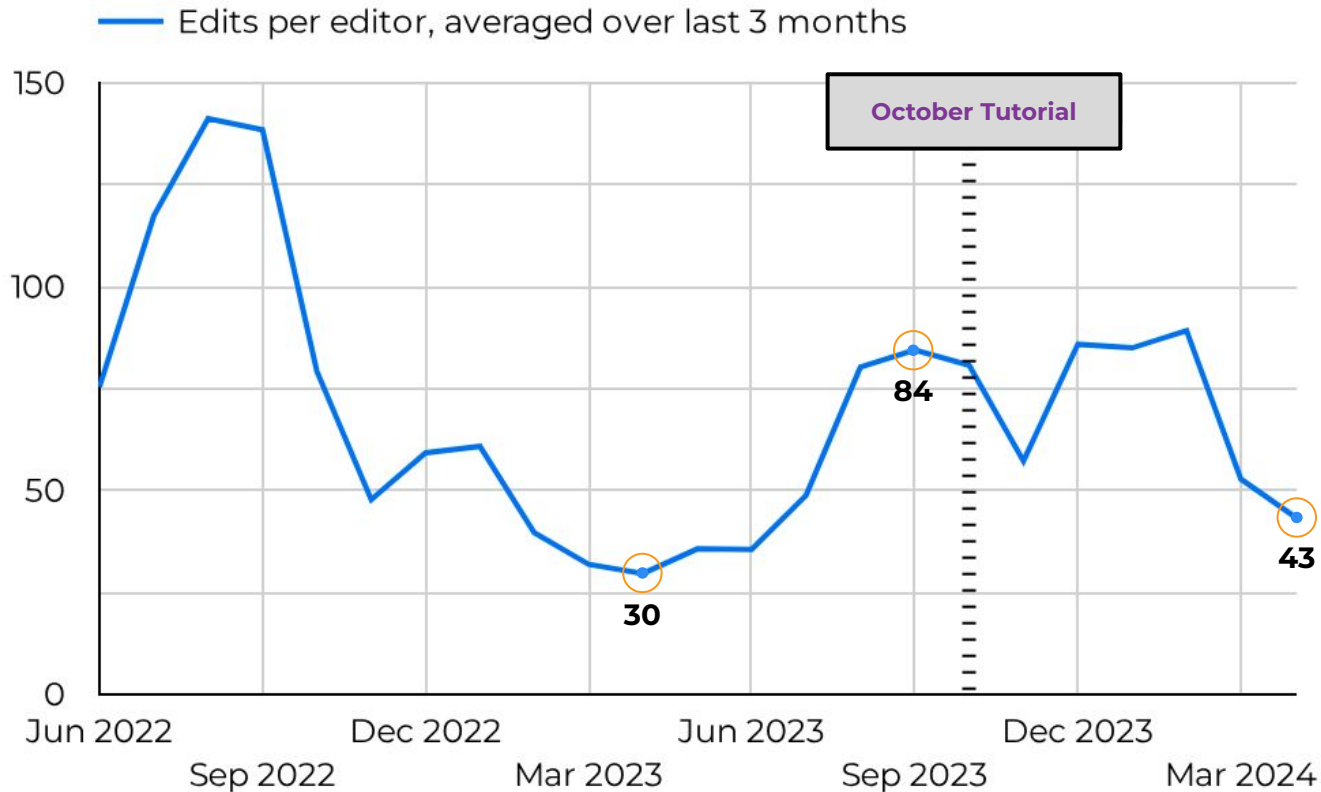
Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Of tutorial participants active on any project (1+ edit), average monthly number of content edits decreased 35.6% in the 6 months following the training and increased 9.3% YoY.



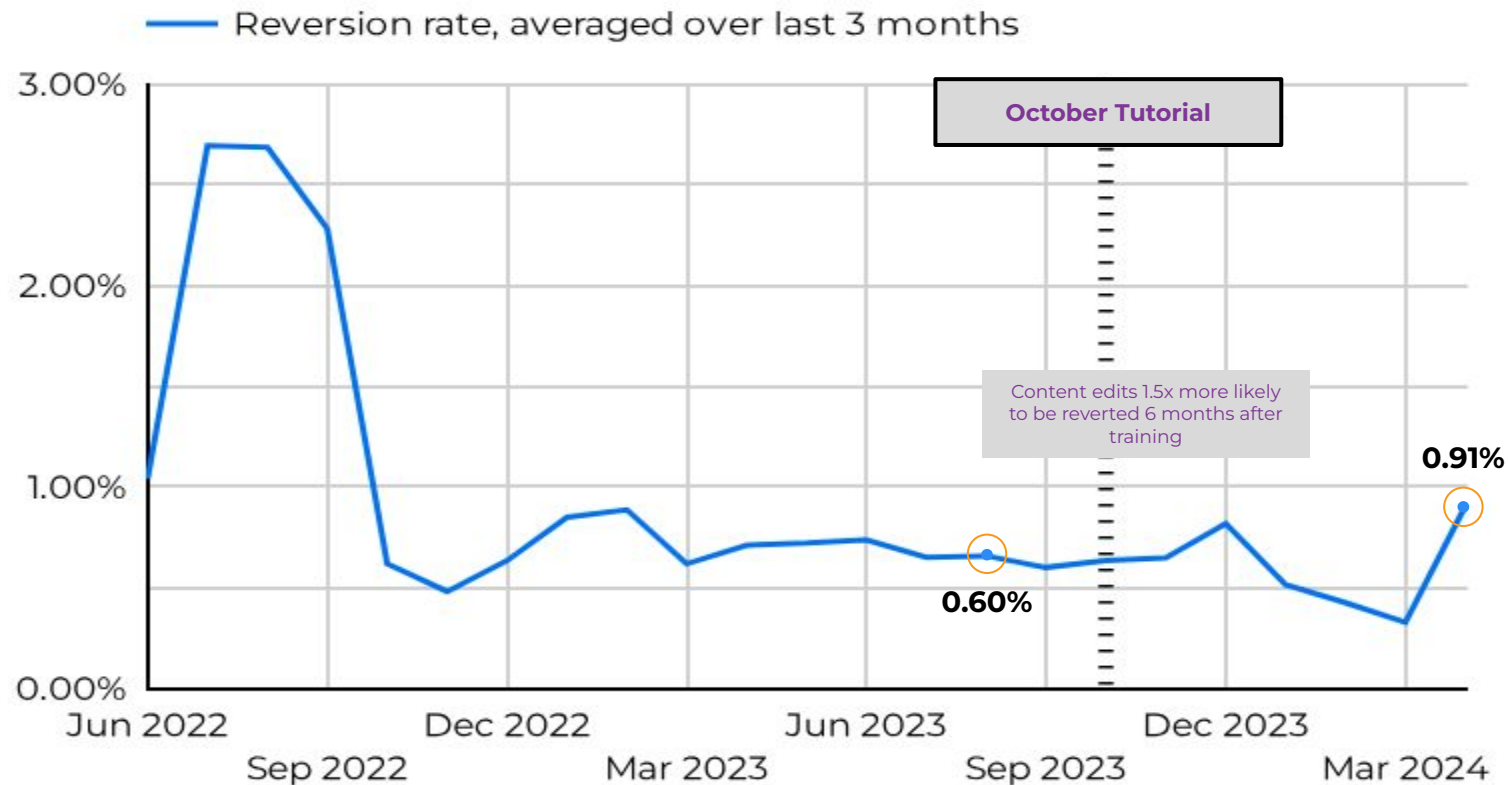
Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Of tutorial participants active on enwiki (1+ edit), average monthly number of content edits dropped by 48.8% in the 6 months following the training, but increased 43.3% YoY.



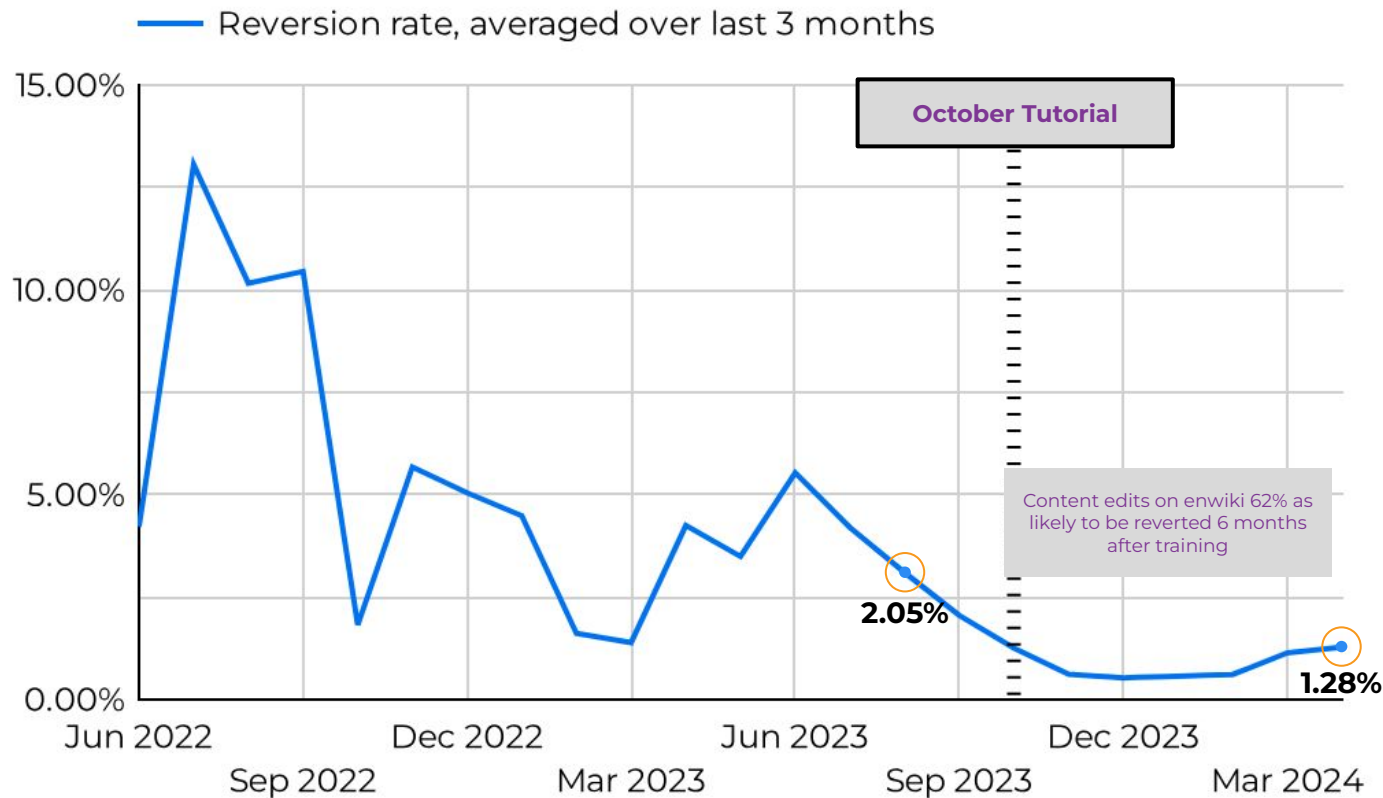
Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Despite an earlier dip, tutorial participants' content edits were 1.5x more likely to be reverted 6 months following the training.



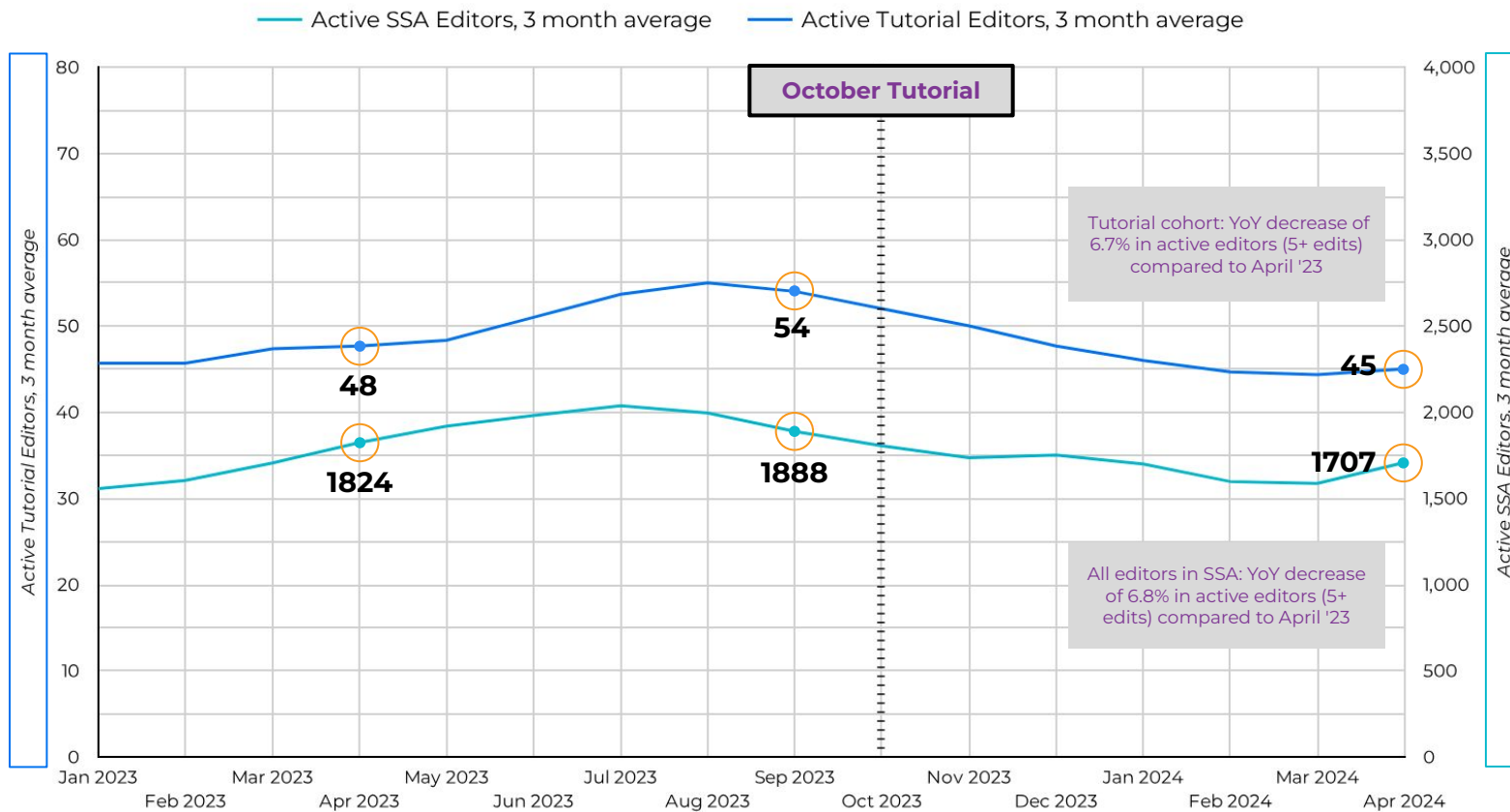
Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Tutorial participants' content edits on English Wikipedia were **62.4%** as likely to be reverted 6 months following the training.



Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Tutorial participants' activity (# with 5+ edits) declined slightly YoY, similar to other editors in SSA.



Action Outcomes: Did They Happen at 6 months?

Tutorial participants' enwiki activity (# with 5+ edits) increased YoY, whereas other editors in SSA decreased over that period.
