We have this morning received letters from Jellalabad dated 15th August, stating that General Nott had advanced on the 10th to Ghuznee, and that the Jellalabad Force would immediately proceed to Cabool. All the Camp was astir, and every one in the highest spirits.

We regret to learn that Captain John Connolly had died very suddenly of Brain-fever at Cabool on the 7th August; his remains had been sent in to Jellalabad. Captain Mackenzie had in a great degree recovered and the other prisoners were enjoying good health.

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
