Our Weekly Recipe

Ginger Cake

The ingredients are: 1 cup of sugar, I tablespoon of lard, I cup of milk, I tablespoon of butter, 2 cups of flour, I cup of molasses, egg, I teaspoon of baking soda, I tenspoon of ginger, I tenspoon of allspice. I tenspoon of cinnamou, and a pinch of salt.

Cream the lard and butter toether and work the sugar into it. Put the soda into the molasses and heat it mutil it is light colored. Add this to the butter, lard and sugar and beat again; then add the egg, well beaten, then the milk, and last, the flour with which the salt and spices have been sifted. Bake in a moderate oven.
