UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT REPORT

Pages 2 and 3 contain a report on an unusual light seen in the nightsky by two civilian guards at Anniston Ordnance Depot, Bynum, Alabama. This
is the second report on such phenomena in the last month. While no reasonable
explanation of these objects is known here, it is likely that civilian
guards were aware of the first occurrence, and were sensitive to any
unexplaned lights, etc.

It is of note that this is the second UFO report out of Anniston Depot within a month (re our IR-1-58). The power of suggestion here is apparent.

The possibility of a wx freak was suggested to the AWS, but

the weather was stated to have been normal.

The manner of movements of the object suggest that the occurrence could have been a 'mirror effect' from some source of reflected light; or, a powerful light reflecting from multilayered clouds and giving both the effect of vertical and circular movements.

No further information is available to this headquarters. It is important to note that the 'grapefruit size' description of the object may not have been arrived at using the 'arms length' rule of AFR 2 00-2, and is therefore unreliable. Further, no reliability estimate of the observers is submitted; this info not having been forwarded.

Local area flying would not seem to be a possible explanation

for the phenomenon.

Adequate info is also lacking as to the angle of elevation during the appearance and disappearance of the object, and the manner in which it disappeared.
