The court's decision is based on the following reasons: first, the defendant acted negligently; second, the defendant's negligence caused the plaintiff's injury; and third, the plaintiff's injury was a direct result of the defendant's negligence.

Therefore, the court awards the plaintiff the sum of \$10,000 in damages. The defendant is ordered to pay this amount to the plaintiff within thirty days of the date of this judgment.

This judgment is final and subject to appeal.

the usual road in going to and returning from the seat of government.

The Congress must assemble, at least, once in every year, on the first Monday in December, if not otherwise provided by law. The President of the United States may convene them at any time, upon giving forty days notice. Neither House can adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other, nor to any other place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting. In case of disagreement about the adjournment, the President of the United States may adjourn them to any time as he thinks proper. The Senate and House each have their own rules; and are, respectively, judges of their own proceedings.

Both Senators and Representatives are, in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective Houses, in going to, or returning from, the same; and for any speech or debate in either House, they cannot be questioned in any other place. They cannot hold offices under the federal government while acting as members. Bills for raising revenue must originate in the House; and the House, solely, has the power of impeachment.

Members of Congress are prohibited by law, either directly or indirectly, from undertaking, in whole or in part, any contract, with the United States.

Each Senator and Representative has the privilege of franking packets and letters, not exceeding two ounces in weight, during the session, and for thirty days before and afterwards. The Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House have the same privilege. In case of larger documents, a special order is passed, exempting them from postage.

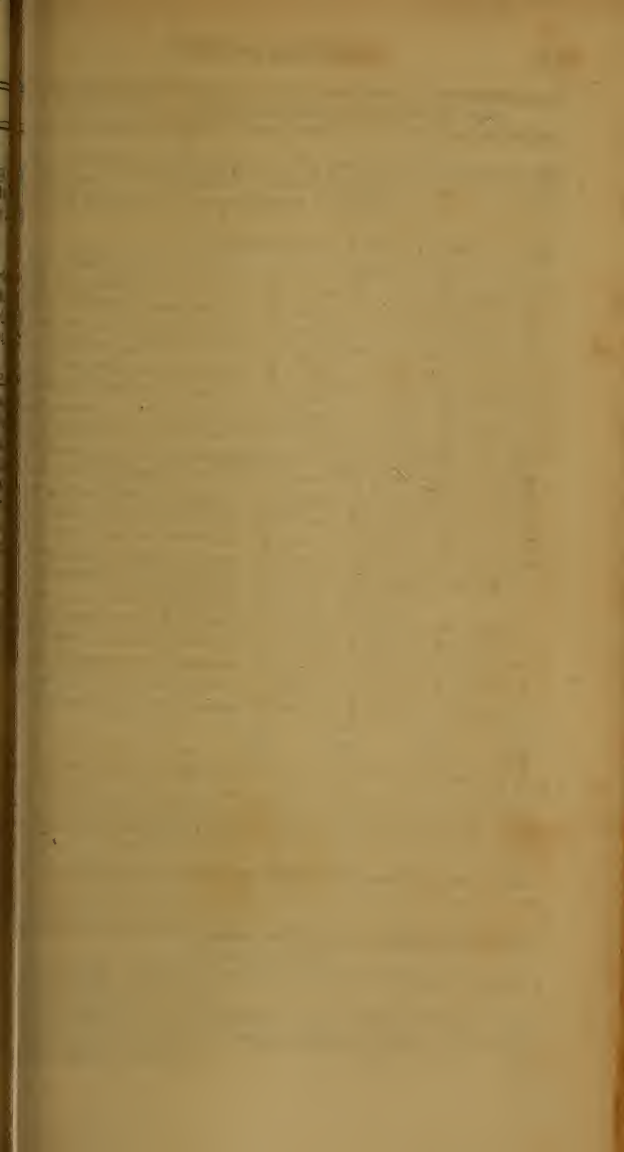

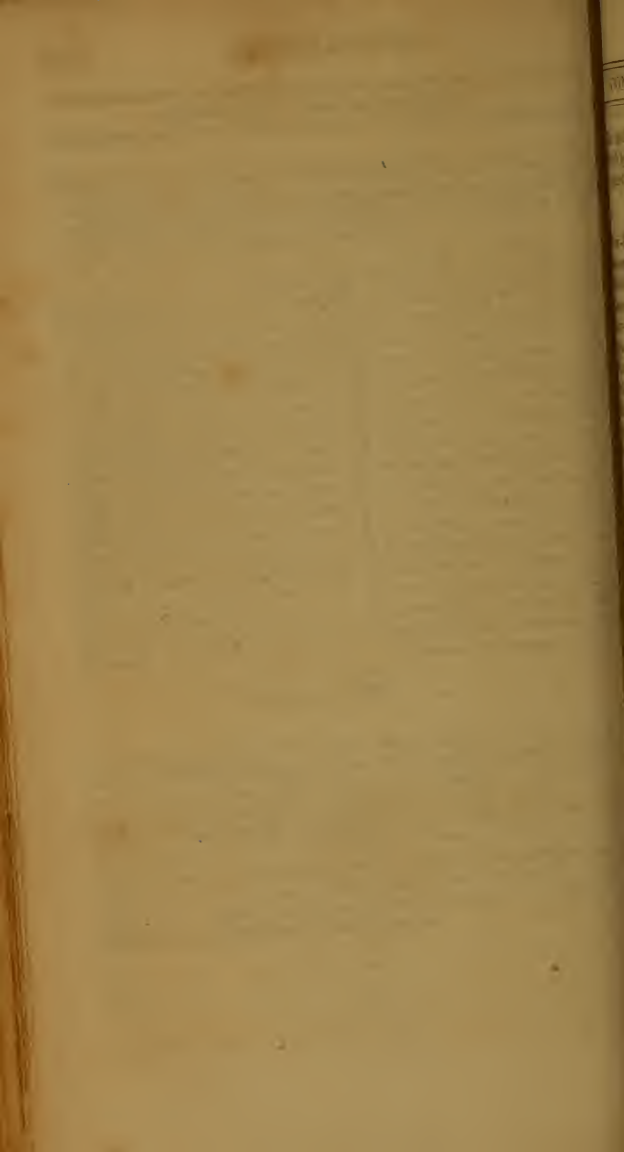

Since the above was framed, which was in 1811, the Territory of Orleans has been erected into a State, called Louisiana and Indiana, Mississippi, Illinois, and Alabama, have been admitted into the Union as independent States, and are entitled to one Representative in Congress each. There are also the Territories dependent on the United States, namely: Missouri and Michigan, which each send a Delegate to Congress, (who has a seat in the House,) and Arkansas—the latter but just organized. Delegates have all the privileges of a Member of Congress, excepting the right of voting.

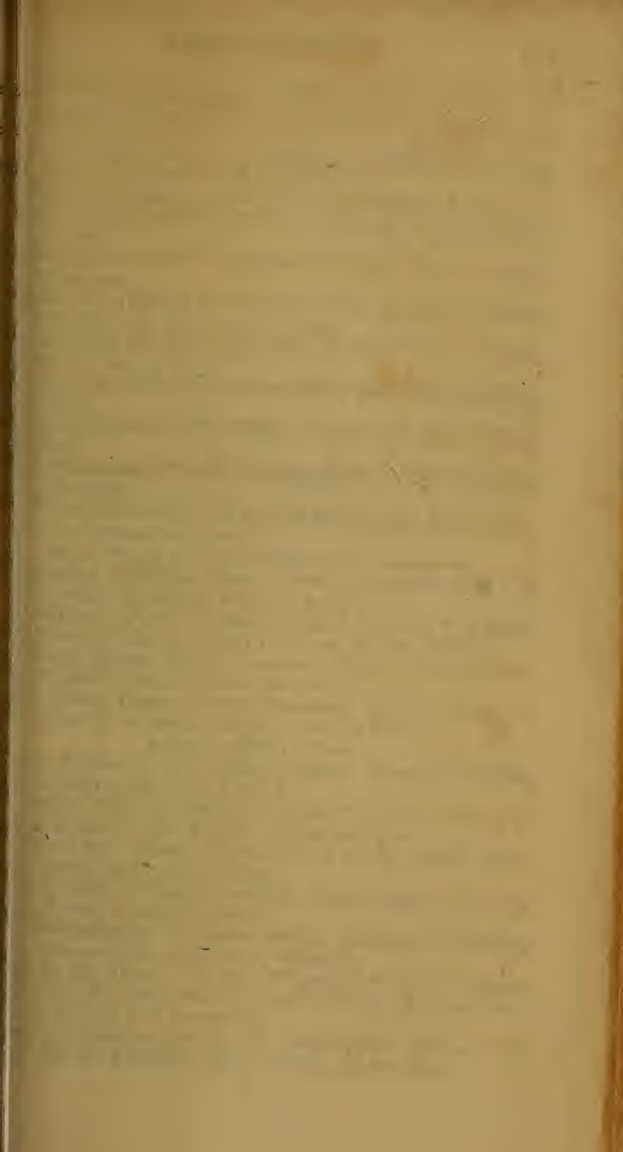

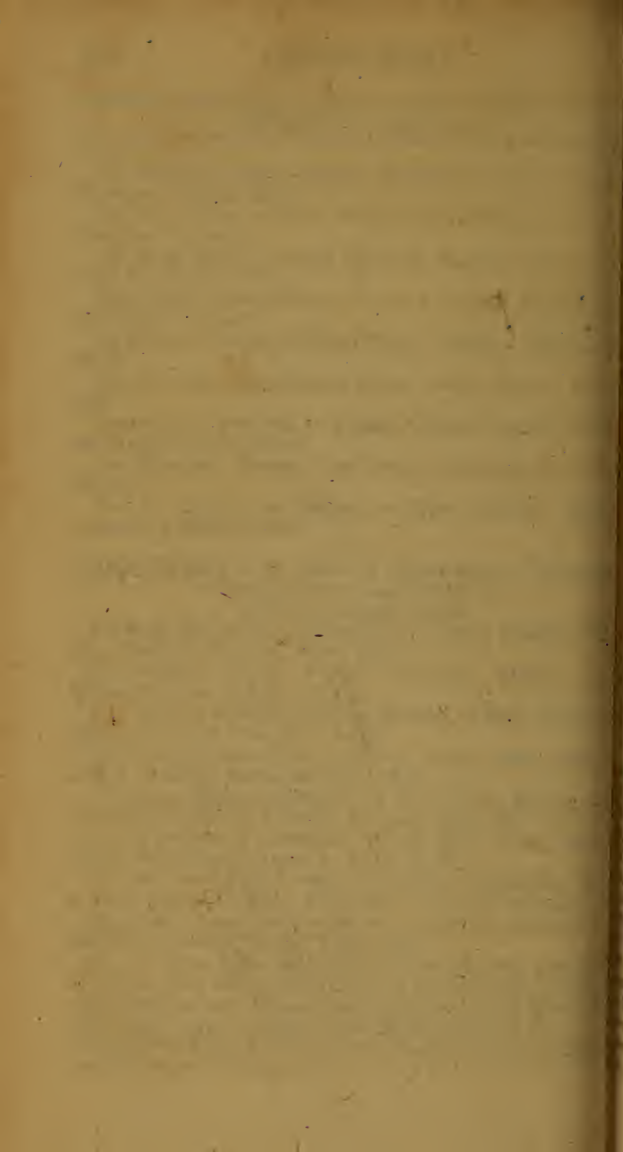

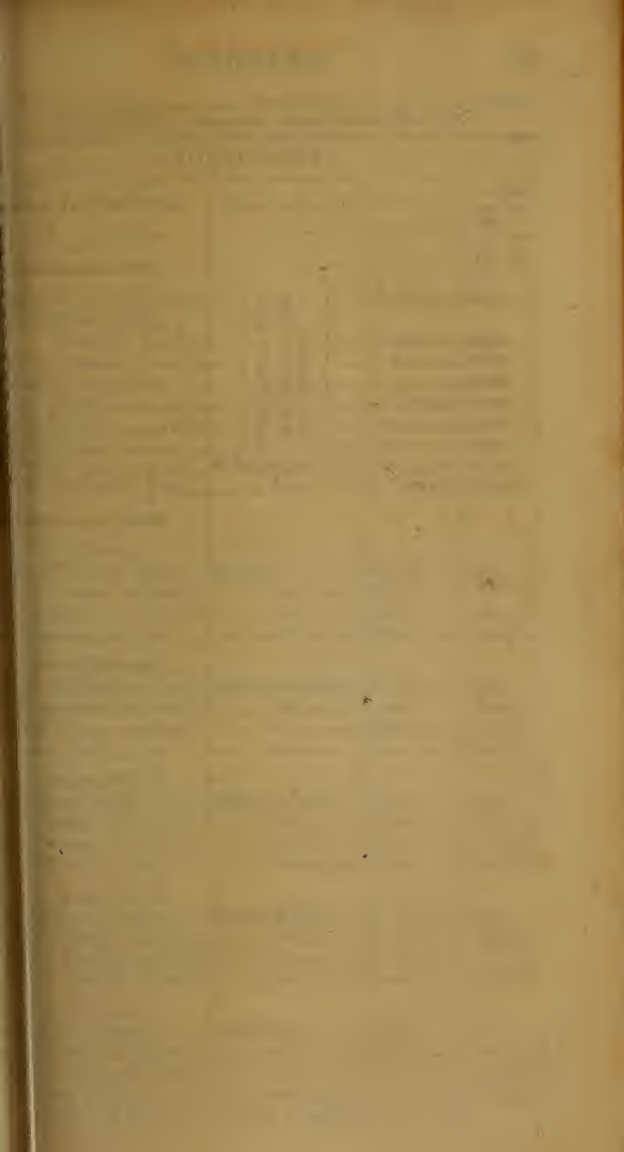

The Committees of the Senate are elected by ballot. Those of the House are appointed by the Speaker.

To these committees, in either House, is confided the initiation of business. They report to the Senate or the House, bill or otherwise; and, upon such report, the Senate or House go in committee of the whole; in which form of proceeding the whole body of members is regarded as one committee; the president or speaker quits his chair, and some one member is called to preside as the chairman. In this committee a wide latitude of discussion is allowed, and having made progress, it comes to some determination on the subject under consideration; it rises and reports progress, asks leave to sit again, or to be discharged from that business, or reports in a conclusive manner, affirmatively or negatively; and the Senate or House grant or refuse the leave or discharge, or confirm or reject the report of the committee. This form of procedure is eminently calculated to prevent precipitation in measures of importance; and it is only in committee of the whole that the president or speaker can take part in the debate.



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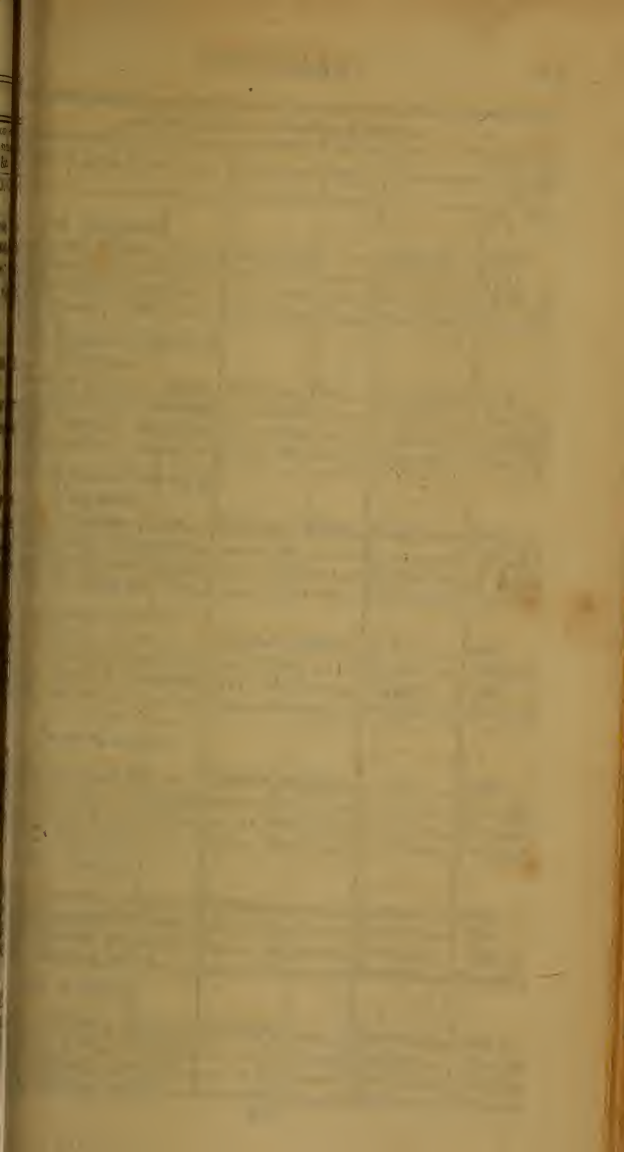

 ORGANIZATION OF EXEC. DEPART. *President.*

THE PRESIDENT.

He must be 35 years of age, 14 years a resident of the United States, a natural born citizen, or a citizen at the time of the adoption of the constitution. In case of his removal, death, resignation, or inability, the duties of his office devolve on the Vice President; and by act of 1st of March, 1792, in case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of President and Vice President, the president of the senate pro tempore; and in case there shall be no president of the Senate, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the time being, is to act as President.

The President's official household consists of himself and a private Secretary, whose salary is paid by himself. The present Secretary is J. J. Monroe, Esq.

The legal title of this officer is *The President of the United States*; and he is, by the constitution, commander in chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the service of the United States.

The President receives 25,000 dollars per annum salary, which cannot be increased or diminished during the term for which he is elected. His salary was fixed by act of 18th February 1792.

He, as well as the Vice President, is elected by electors in the several States, who are chosen as the legislatures of the respective States may provide. His period of service is 4 years and there is no restriction as to his re-election; but there is no instance of any President's having served for a longer time than eight years. The following are the names of the Presidents of the United States under the present form of government, and the dates at which they were sworn into office:

GEORGE WASHINGTON, 1st term, 4th March, 1789.

2d term, 4th March, 1793.

JOHN ADAMS,.....1st term, 4th March, 1797.

THOMAS JEFFERSON,....1st term, 4th March, 1801.

2d term, 4th March, 1805.

JAMES MADISON,.....1st term, 4th March, 1809.

2d term, 4th March, 1813.

JAMES MONROE,.....1st term, 4th March, 1817.

Under the present constitution, the seat of the general government was, in the first instance, New-York, then Philadelphia, and finally Washington City; to which the public offices were removed in the year 1800. Congress held its first session in the latter place, on the 17th day of November of that year.

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 ORGANIZATION OF EXEC. DEPART. *Secretaries.*

VICE PRESIDENT.

The Vice President of the United States is elected in the same manner as the President. He is, ex-officio, President of the Senate; and, as President of the Senate, in virtue of an act of 8th of May, 1792, one of the commissioners of the Sinking Fund. His salary, of 5000 dollars per annum, is fixed by the act of 18th February, 1793. The Vice-President is not a member of the Cabinet.

.....

SECRETARY OF STATE.

This officer was created by the act of 15th September, 1789. Previous to that period, by act of 27th July, 1789, he was designated Secretary for the Department of Foreign Affairs. He is, ex-officio, a commissioner of the Sinking Fund, and by usage, a member of the Cabinet. He corresponds officially with the public ministers of the United States at foreign courts, and with the ministers of foreign powers resident here. He performs the main duties of what, in other governments, is called the Home Department; and has the superintendence of the office which issues patents for useful inventions, and of copyrights. He holds his office at the will of the President.

.....

SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY.

The office of Secretary of the Treasury was created by act of 2d of September, 1789. He superintends all the fiscal concerns of the government, and, upon his own responsibility, recommends to congress measures for improving the condition of the revenue. He holds his office at the will of the President; and, by usage, is a member of the cabinet.

.....

SECRETARY OF WAR.

The War Department was erected by act of 7th August, 1789. The Secretary of War, at first, had the superintendence of Naval affairs. On the 30th of April, 1798, however, a separation took place, and a Navy Department was established. The Secretary of War superintends every branch of the military department; and is, by usage, a member of the cabinet. He holds his office at the will of the President.

.....

SECRETARY OF THE NAVY.

This officer was created by act of 30th April, 1798. He issues orders to the Navy of the United States, and superintends the concerns of that establishment generally. To aid him in the discharge of his duties, a Board of Navy Commissioners

was instituted by act of 7th February, 1815. The Secretary of the Navy is, by usage, a member of the cabinet and holds his office at the will of the President.

 ATTORNEY GENERAL.

This officer was created by act of 24th September, 1789. His duty is, to prosecute and conduct all suits in the supreme court in which the United States are concerned, and to give his advice and opinions upon questions of law, when required by the President of the United States, or when requested by the heads of any of the departments, touching any matters that may concern their departments. He is, ex-officio, a commissioner of the sinking fund; and, by usage, a member of the cabinet. He holds his office at the will of the President.

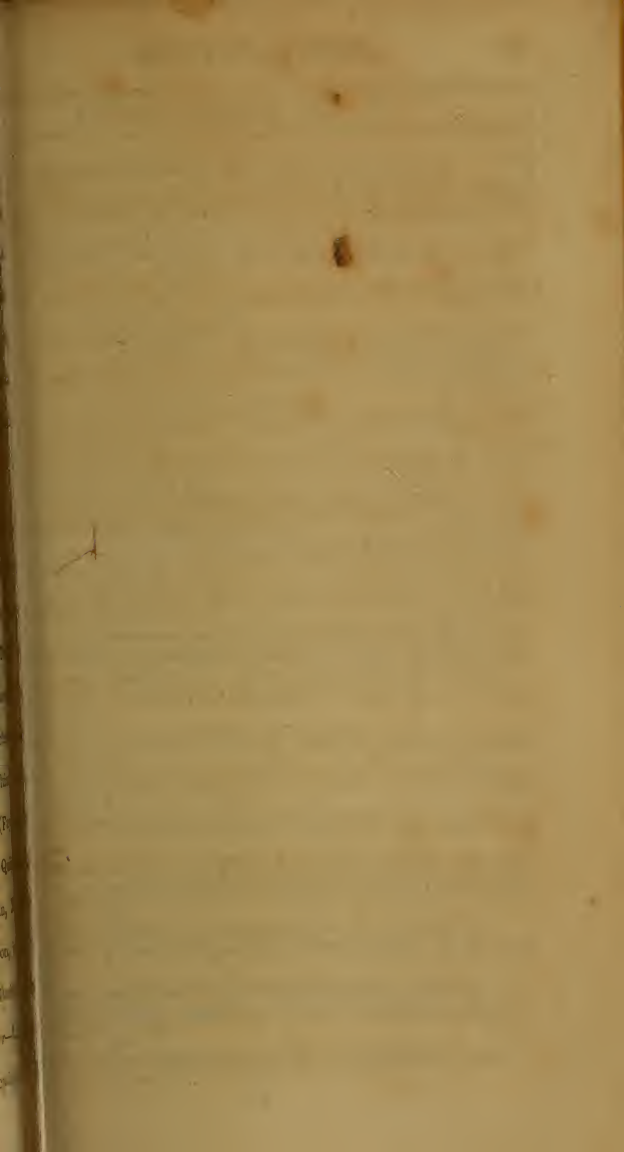

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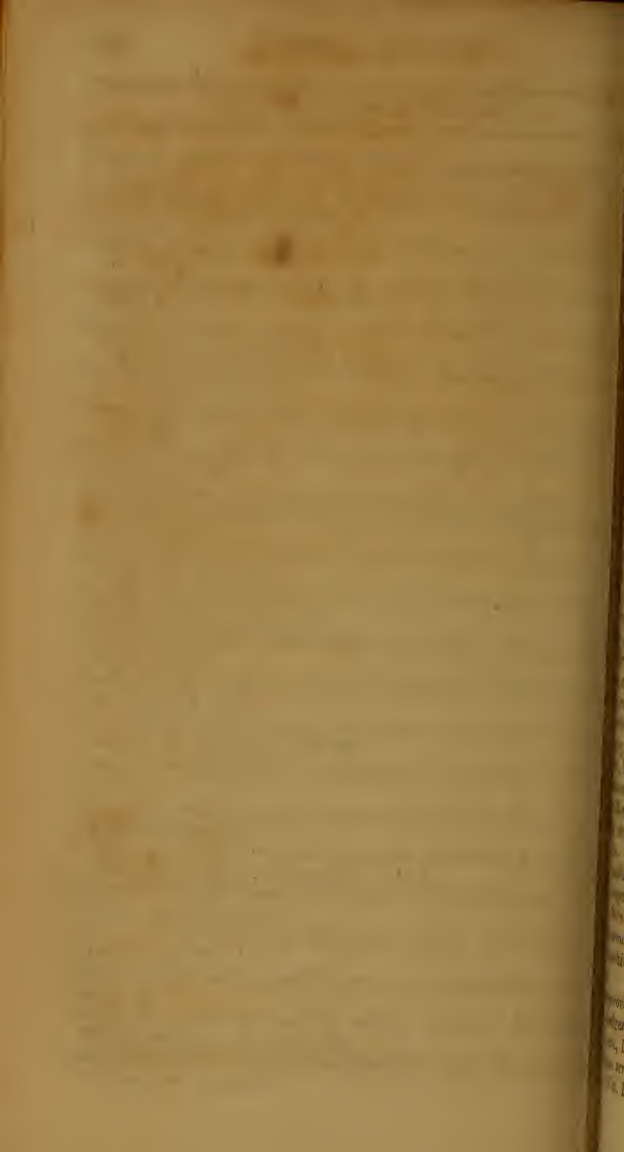

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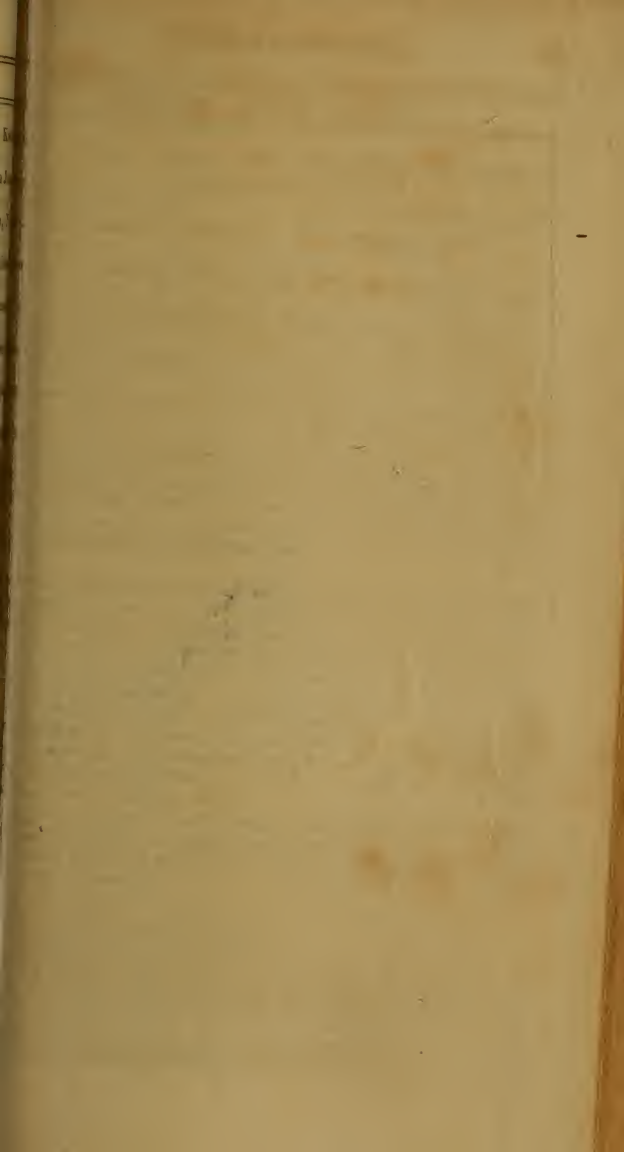
PATENTS.

The general law concerning the issuing of patents, pro for citizens only; but a subsequent one provides also for who have resided two years, or upwards, in the United States.

In applying for a patent, it is necessary to attend to every legal form. The following is the mode of application.

Every inventor, before he presents his petition, shall pay the treasury of the United States thirty dollars,* for which will be furnished with duplicate receipts, one of which he deliver to the Secretary of State, when he presents his petition and the money thus paid shall be in full for the sundry services to be performed in the office of the Secretary of State, consequent to such petition. This petition must be addressed to the Secretary of State, and may be in the following or a similar style:

If not a citizen, the following addition must be made to the declaration, "that he verily believes himself to be true and original inventor or discoverer of the art, &c. *And that the same hath not, to the best of his knowledge, or belief been known or used, either in this or any other foreign country.* _____." "Also that he hath resided in the United States for two years and upwards."

It is not necessary that the time of residence should immediately precede the application.

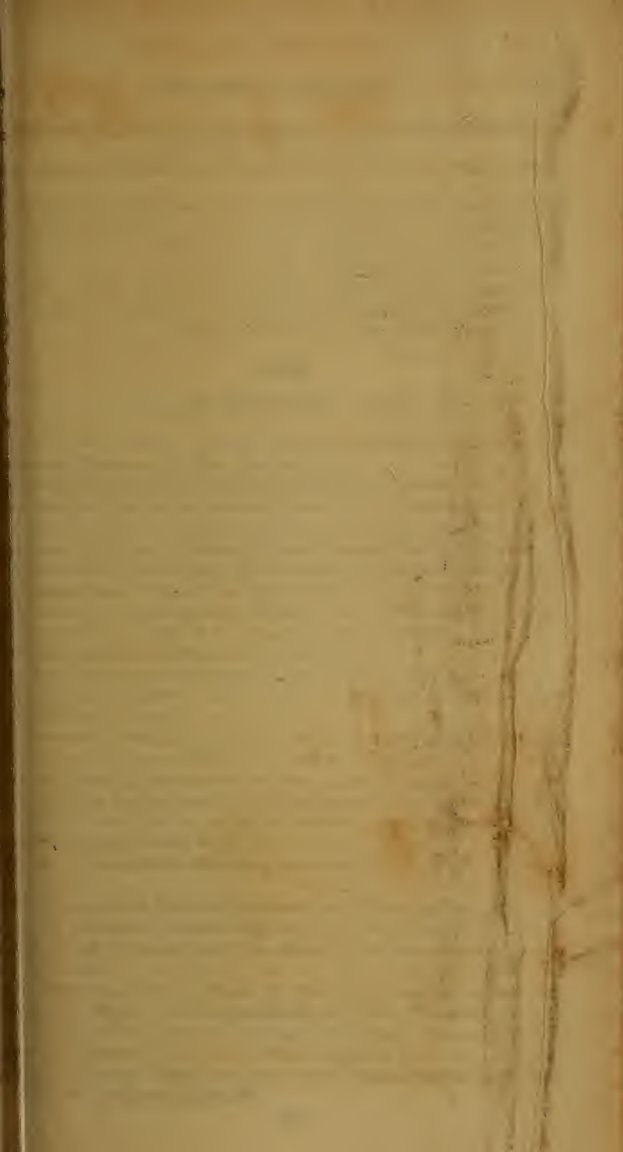
If any inventor or discoverer should die intestate, before application be made for a patent, his legal representatives may apply for the patent, in trust for the heirs at law, otherwise trust for the devisees.

The specification must be accompanied by a good drawing in perspective, of the whole machine, or apparatus, where the nature of the case admits of drawings; or with specimens of ingredients, and of the composition of matter, sufficient quantity for the purpose of experiment, where the invention is of a composition of matter. And such inventor shall, moreover deliver a model of his machine, provided the Secretary shall deem such model to be necessary. It is requisite in giving a drawing of the machine, to give also sectional drawings of the interior when the machine is complex; and every drawing shall be accompanied with explanatory references. If the machine be complex, a model will likewise be necessary, not only to explain and render it comprehensible to a common capacity, but also to prevent infringements of rights.

The drawings ought not to exceed a quarto size, and if confined to octavo they would be still better, where it can be done conveniently and distinctly.

The papers must all be sent to directed to the superintendent of the Patent Office, under cover to the Secretary of State, which, of course, renders them free of postage; but if more be sent, their freight or carriage hither must be paid, and before packing them, the name or names of the inventor or inventors should be written thereon, with the name of the machine, and the date.

The Congress, being impressed with a high sense of the value of the inventions of our citizens, have purchased an elegant

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METHOD OF SECURING COPY-RIGHTS.

sions, contained in the acts of Congress of May 31st, 1790, and
April 29th, 1802.

1. Before the publication of any book, map, or chart, a printed
title thereof must be deposited in the office of the Clerk of the
District Court where the author or proprietor shall reside.

It is the duty of the Clerk of such Court to record such title, in
a book to be kept by him for that purpose, in the words following:

and the said Clerk shall give a copy thereof to the said author or proprietor, if required to do so.

For recording the aforesaid title and certificate, the Clerk shall be entitled to receive sixty cents from the said author or proprietor, and sixty cents for every copy under seal, actually sent to such author or proprietor, as aforesaid.

2. The author or proprietor shall, within two months from the date of the above certificate, cause a copy thereof to be published in one or more of the newspapers printed in the United States, for the space of four weeks. And he shall, in addition, (in the case of a book or books,) cause a copy of the said record to be inserted at full length, in the title page, or in the page immediately following the title; and if a map, chart, engraving, historical, or other print, he shall cause the following words to be impressed on the face thereof: "Entered, according to act of Congress, — day of —, 18—, by —, of the State of —," which must be printed on every such map, chart, or print.

3. The proprietor or author, to be entitled to such copy-right, must be a citizen or resident of the United States.

4. He must, also, within six months from the publication of his book, &c. deliver or cause to be delivered to the Secretary of State, a copy thereof, to be preserved in his office.

5. The author or proprietor, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall, on complying with all the requisitions of law, be entitled to the sole right and liberty of printing, publishing, or vending, such book, map, &c. for the space of fourteen years after recording the title thereof in the clerk's office, as aforesaid. And if, at the expiration of said term, the author be living, and a citizen of the United States, or a resident therein, the same exclusive right shall be continued to him, in the same manner, for the further term of fourteen years. In the latter case the title must be a second time recorded and published as before directed; and that within six months before the expiration of the first term of fourteen years.

6. If any other person shall, (after the recording and publishing of any book, map, &c. as aforesaid, and within the times prescribed by law,) print, publish, or import from any foreign kingdom or state, or cause the same to be done; or knowing such book, &c. to be so printed, published, or imported, shall expose to sale, or cause to be sold, any book, &c. (without obtaining from the proprietor thereof, permission in writing, to be signed in presence of two credible witnesses,) any copy thereof, such offender shall forfeit every copy thereof, and every part, being part of the same, to the author or proprietor of

such book, map, or chart, who shall forthwith destroy the same. And every such offender shall forfeit and pay fifty cents for every sheet found in his possession, printed, &c. contrary to the true intent and meaning of the law: Provided action shall be commenced against him within one year after the offence shall have been committed. One half of the forfeiture goes to the prosecutor, and the other to the United States.

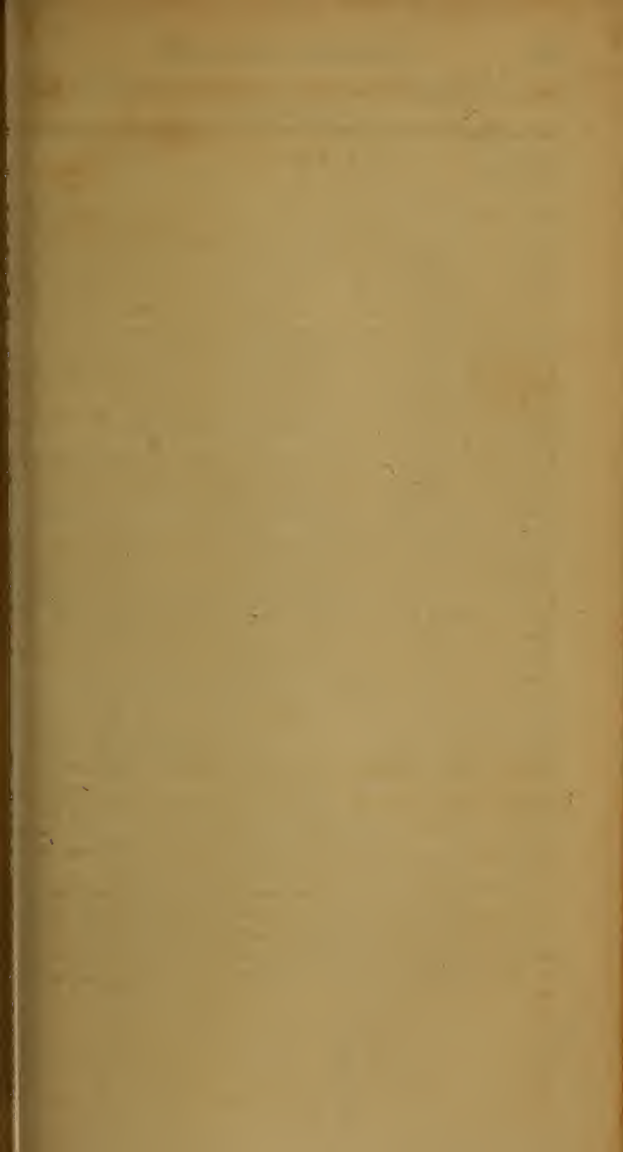
Any person who shall print or publish any manuscript, without the consent of the author or proprietor, (he being a citizen or resident of the U. States,) given as above, shall be liable to suffer and pay to the said author or proprietor, all damages occasioned by such injury.

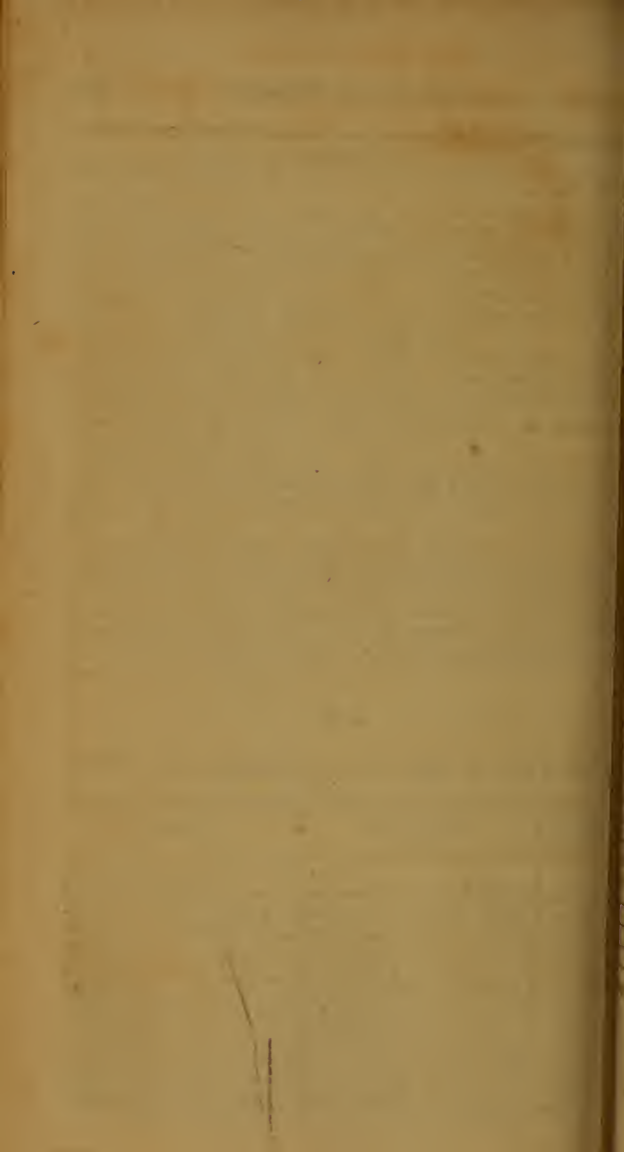
The law is the same with regard to historical and other prints; with this exception, that offenders forfeit one dollar for every sheet printed, published, imported, or sold, contrary to law.

Any person not legally entitled to the right of any book, map, chart, historical or other print, who shall insert therein, or in press thereon, that the same has been entered according to act of Congress, or words purporting the same, or that the copy right thereof has been obtained, shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars; one half of which shall go to the prosecutor, and the other half to the United States.

Explanations and decisions made by the Treasury Department

- Angora Goat's hair, or wool, being understood to be used, in this country, entirely in the manufacture of hats, has been regarded in the light of *undressed furs*, and therefore *free of duty*.
- Books, printed, a non-enumerated article.
- Balsams, *medicinal* as well as *cosmetic*, have been considered liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent. the new tariff making no discrimination between them.
- Belts for swords, with gold or silver thread *wove* in with the silk or other materials, do not come under the denomination of *embroidery*, but should be viewed as a non-enumerated article.
- Brazil Pebble, prepared for spectacles, considered in the light of *precious stones*, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 7 1/2 per cent.
- Blankets, being an exception agreeably to the new tariff to *woollen manufactures of all descriptions*, and not being otherwise enumerated, are considered liable to an ad valorem duty of 15 per cent.
- Brass runners and tips for umbrellas, as other manufactures of brass.
- Bootees and laced boots, charged as manufactures of leather.
- Corks manufactured, a non-enumerated article.
- Clocks and time pieces, do.
- Camel's hair, same as Angora goat's hair or wool.
- Carpeting, considered as manufactures of wool, or of which wool is the material of chief value, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 25 per cent. until the 30th of June, 1819; after that pay to 20 per cent.
- Carpeting, Brussels, not to be considered as *stuff goods*, but same as preceding.
- Colmenar wine, classed *as all other wines*.
- Copper rods, bolts, spikes, or nails, 4 cents per lb.
- Do. in pigs, bars, or plates suited to the sheathing of ships, *free*.
- All other descriptions, of copper, except those already particularly mentioned, are considered as *non-enumerated*, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 15 per cent. viz :
- Copper bottoms cut round and copper bottoms raised at the edge.
- Copper in plates or sheets, weighing more than 34 ounces per square foot, commonly called brazier's copper.
- [Copper in pigs, bars or plates, suited to the sheathing of ships, is, agreeably to the new tariff, *free of duty*. But this indefinite

cession of the law leaves room for a variety of practices as the description of copper suited to the sheathing of ships. It is therefore well to define what is considered, by this department, as coming under that denomination; in forming a conclusion on which point common usage and the general opinion of experienced persons on the subject have governed. According to this criterion, none but copper in sheets, about 14 inches wide and 48 inches long, and weighing from about 14 to 20 ounces per square foot, can be properly regarded as suited to the sheathing of ships.

Copper bottoms cut round, and copper bottoms raised at the ends, were decided by the Supreme Court of the United States (Cranch's reports, vol. 5, p. 236,) not to be manufactures of the United States, and therefore, under the old tariff not liable to duty; but this description of copper not being suited to the sheathing of ships, is, agreeably to the new tariff, to be considered as a non-manufactured article, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 15 per cent.

Embroidery, contemplated in the new tariff as chargeable with an ad valorem duty of 7 1-2 per cent. is considered to mean that kind of work which is done with the needle, and thread of gold or silver. When not done with the needle, or if done with the needle, but with thread, silk, or chenille, &c. it cannot, in the fiscal sense of the word, be considered as embroidery.

Feathers for beds, and ornamental feathers, being conceived not to have been intended by the legislature to be placed on an equal footing with the former, the latter have been considered to be liable to an ad valorem duty of 15, and the former, of 30 per cent.

Chains, seals, and keys for watches, gilt pins, ear rings, &c. are not, in a fiscal sense of the word, come under the denomination of jewelry, but are embraced by the appropriate term gilt wares of all kinds, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 15 per cent.

Woolsey frocks and wove pantaloons, used as under garments, are considered in the light of clothing ready made, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

Carpeting, same as carpeting. Carpets, considered as manufactures of wood, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

Iron, in bars and bolts, manufactured by rolling, 150 cents per cwt. Manufactured without rolling, 75 cents per cwt. Tacks, nails and sprigs, not exceeding 16 oz. per thousand, 5 cents per lb. Exceeding 16 oz. per thousand, 4 cents per lb. Nails,

4 cents do. spikes, 3 cents do. anchors, 2 cents do. in pigs, 5 cents per cwt. in castings, 75 cents do. in sheets, rods, hoops, 250 cents do.

[Iron in bars, when manufactured by *rolling*, is liable to a duty of 150 cents per cwt. ; and when manufactured by *hammering*, of 45 cents per cwt. But there has been a difficulty experienced by some of the officers of the customs in distinguishing that manufactured in the one, from that manufactured in the other, of the ways mentioned. The following general indications as to the manner of ascertaining the process which may have been observed in the manufacture of iron, have been communicated from this department. A bar of iron, the principal process in the manufacture of which was by *rolling*, will be smooth and even, and on being carefully measured in different parts of it, will be found to be of the same breadth and thickness throughout. But a bar of iron manufactured by *hammering*, will be rough and uneven, and on a similar scrutiny, will be found to measure more in some parts of it than in others, and for this reason, that it cannot be drawn out by this process of manufacture, in such precise forms and dimensions as when manufactured by *rolling*.]

Iron bolts, is understood to be universally manufactured by *rolling*.

Marble, a non-enumerated article.

Piano fortes, same as harps.

Stockings, silk, are considered as coming under the general classification of *clothing ready made*, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

Stockings, worsted, are to be classed as *stockings of wool*, and liable to an ad valorem duty of 20 per cent.

Sandal wood, imported in dust or powder, being used exclusively in dyeing, is considered free of duty.

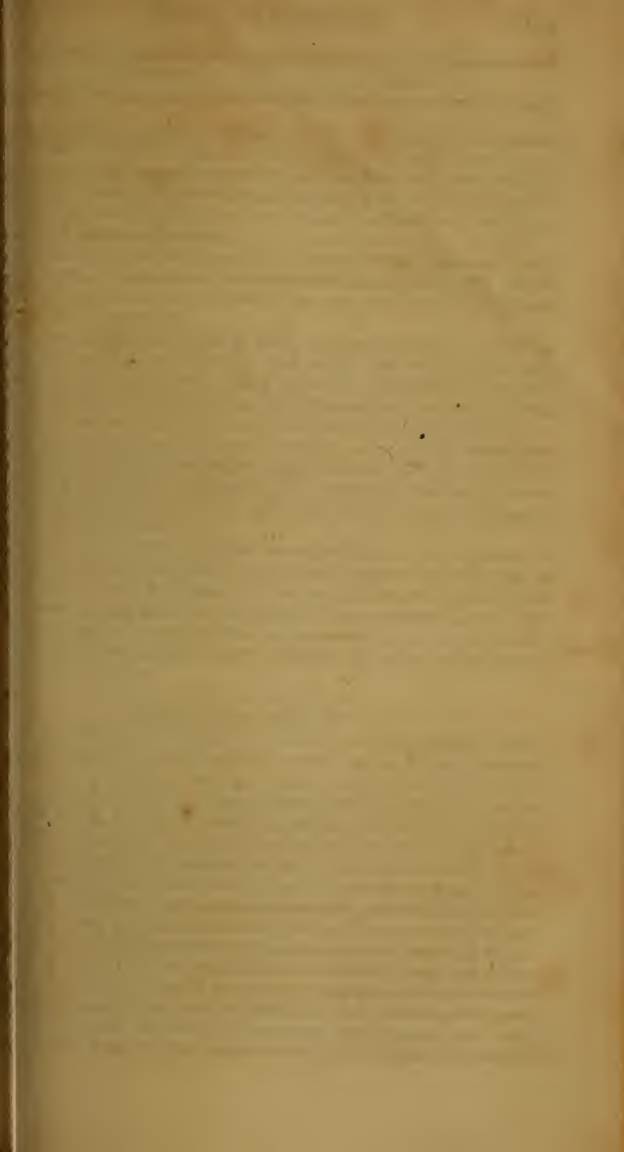
Spanish brown, or any genus of earths commonly used as paint is to be regarded in the light of *ochre*, and liable to a specific duty accordingly.

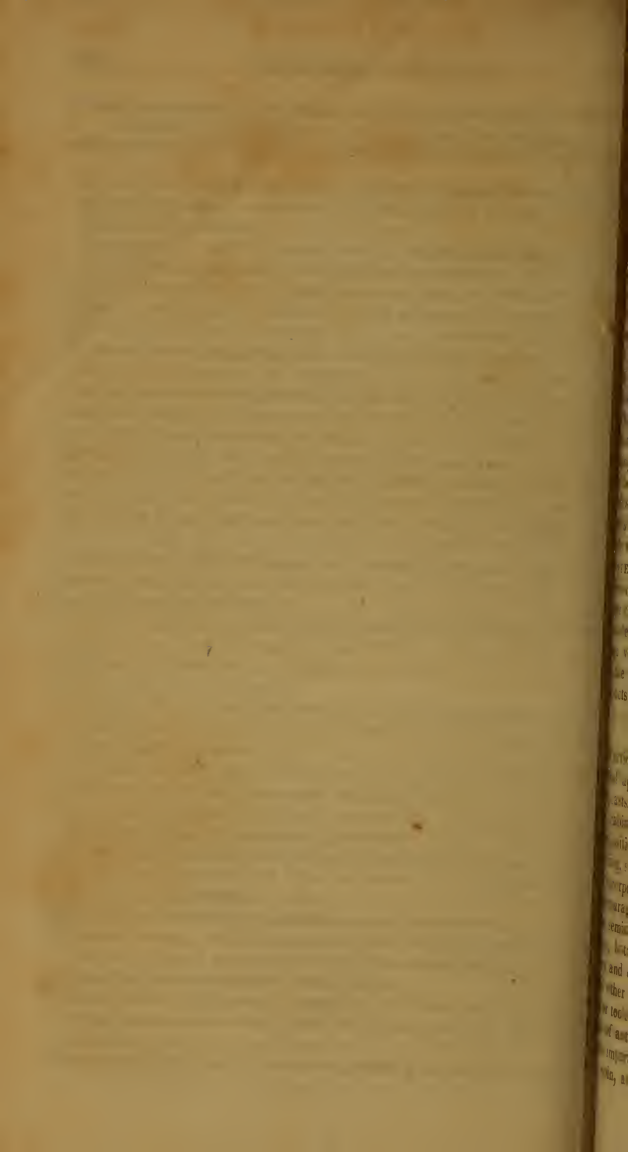
Tin plates, considered a non-enumerated article.

Vergis, being a dyeing drug, is liable to an ad valorem duty of 7 1-2 per cent as coming under the classification of dyeing drugs-not subject to other rates of duty.

Valentias and toilenettes, composed of wool and cotton and sometimes contain silk, liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

Worsted webbing or stockinet; for pantaloons, is to be regarded

in the light of *woollen manufactures*, or of which wool is the material of chief value, and chargeable with duty accordingly. *Woolen rugs*, mentioned in the new tariff as an exception to *woollen manufactures of all descriptions*, are a kind of goods used for bed covering, and are considered liable to the same rate of duty as *blankets*.

Worsted and stuff goods, such as *bombazettes*, *camlets*, *calicoes*, *ratinetts*, *wildboars*, *shalloons*, *moreens*, &c. which are composed entirely of wool are subject to an ad valorem duty of 15 per cent.

Iron handles, the handles being made of *wrought iron*, and being fixed to them after having been cast, and the bottoms and sides being made smooth by grinding after that operation, has been decided, that *said irons* should be considered in the light of *manufactures of iron*, and pay duty accordingly.

Printing cards, being composed entirely of what may properly be denominated *consolidated paper*, it has been decided, that *siting cards* are embraced by the classification of *paper of every description*, and are, therefore, liable to an ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

NOTE—The rates of duties here specified are with reference to importations in *vessels of the United States*. An addition of 10 per cent. is to be made to those rates when the importations are made in vessels *not* of the United States, except as to such foreign vessels as are, in this respect, placed upon an equality with the vessels of the United States, by treaty stipulations, or acts of congress.

ARTICLES FREE OF DUTY.

All articles imported for the use of the United States; philological apparatus, instruments, books, maps, charts, statues, casts, paintings, drawings, engravings, specimens of sculpture, cabinets of coins, gems, medals, and all other collections of antiquities, statuary, modelling painting, drawing, etching or engraving, specially imported by order and for the use of any society incorporated for philosophical or literary purposes, or for the encouragement of the fine arts, or by order and for the use of any seminary of learning; specimens in natural history, mineralogy, botany, and anatomical preparations; models of machinery and other inventions; plants and trees; wearing-apparel and other personal baggage in actual use, and the implements or tools of trade, of persons arriving in the United States; ores of antimony; bark of the cork tree, unmanufactured; animals imported for breed; bar stones, unwrought; gold coin, silver coin, and bullion; clay unwrought; copper, imported in

any shape for the use of the mint; copper and brass, in bars, or plates, suited to the sheathing of ships; old copper and brass, and old pewter, fit only to be re-manufactured; in pigs or bars; furs, undressed, of all kinds; raw hides and skins; lapis calaminaris; plaster of paris; rags of any kind of cloth; sulphur or brimstone; barilla; Brazil wood, brazil, to, red wood, camwood, fustic, logwood, Nicaragua, and other die woods; wood unmanufactured, of any kind; zinc; tellurium or spelter.

TONNAGE DUTY AND LIGHT MONEY.

That the discriminations in relation to the different rates of tonnage duties may be perfectly understood, the following explanations are made, which also embrace the subject of light money, viz.

1. Vessels *not* of the United States (except such foreign vessels as are entitled to the benefits of the convention with Britain) on their entry from a foreign port or place, to or from which the vessels of the United States are *not* ordinarily permitted to go and trade, are liable to

Tonnage duties, 200 cents per ton. Light money, 50 cents per ton, on unregistered vessels owned by citizens of the United States.

2. Vessels *not* of the United States (except such foreign vessels as are entitled to the benefits of the convention with Britain,) on their entry from a foreign port or place to or from which the vessels of the U. States are ordinarily permitted to go and trade, are liable to

Tonnage duties, 50 cents per ton. Light money, 50 cents per ton, on unregistered vessels owned by citizens of the U. States.

3. Foreign vessels entitled to the benefits of the convention with G. Britain, on their entry from a foreign port or place, are liable to

Tonnage duties, 6 cents per ton. Light money none.

4. Recorded vessels, on their entry from a foreign port or place to or with which the vessels of the U. States are not ordinarily permitted to go and trade, are liable to

Tonnage duty, 200 cents per ton. Light money 50 cents per ton.

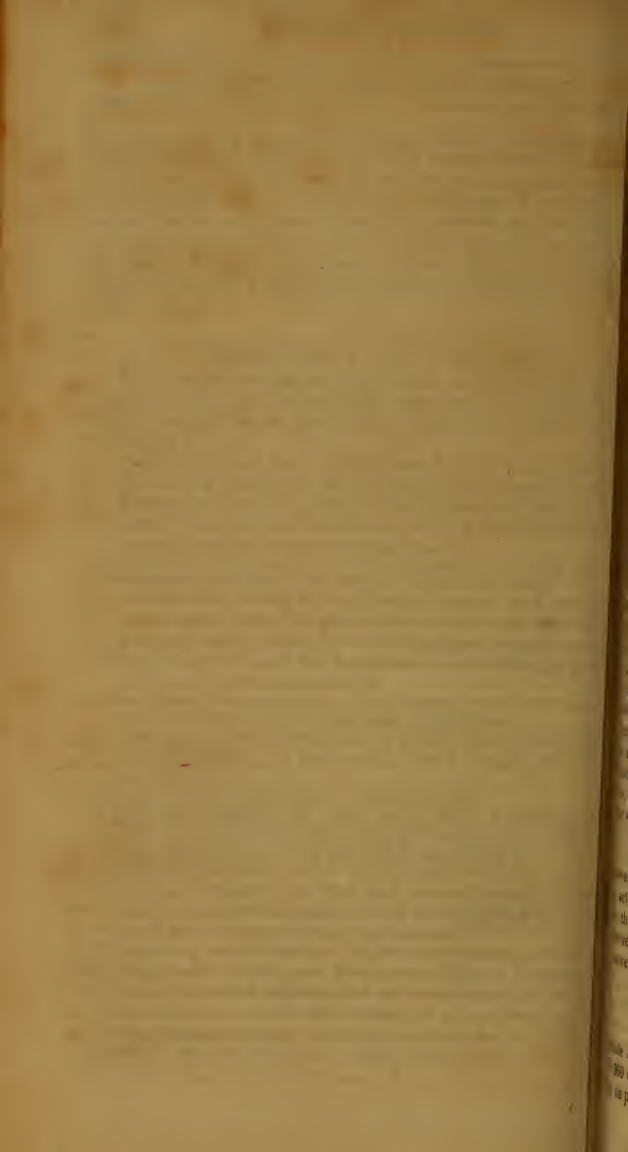
5. Recorded vessels, on their entry from a foreign port or place to or with which the vessels of the United States are ordinarily permitted to go and trade, are liable to

Tonnage duties, 30 cents per ton. Light money 50 cents per ton.

6. Registered vessels, on their entry from a foreign port or place, unless the officers and at least two-thirds of the crew are citizens of the United States, or persons not the subjects of any foreign prince or state, are liable to

Tonnage duties, 50 cents per ton. Light money, none.

tonnage duties, 50 cents per ton. Light money, none.

But Registered vessels which shall be entered in a district in one state from a district in another state, except it be an adjoining state on the sea coast, or on a navigable river or lake, having on board goods taken in one state, to be delivered in another state, of whose crew at least three-fourths are American citizens, or persons not the subjects of any foreign prince or state, are liable, *on every arrival, to only*
tonnage duties, 6 cents per ton. Light money, none.

Enrolled and Licensed vessels for the coasting trade or fisheries (except as excepted in the 5th section of the navigation act) unless three-fourths at least of the crew thereof are American citizens or persons not the subjects of any foreign prince or state, are liable, *once a year, to*
tonnage duties, 50 cents per ton. Light money, none.

But Enrolled and Licensed vessels for the coasting trade or fisheries (except as excepted in the 5th section of the navigation act) of whose crew three-fourths, at least, are American citizens, or persons not the subjects of any foreign prince or state, are liable, *per annum, only to*
tonnage duties, 6 cents per ton. Light money, none,

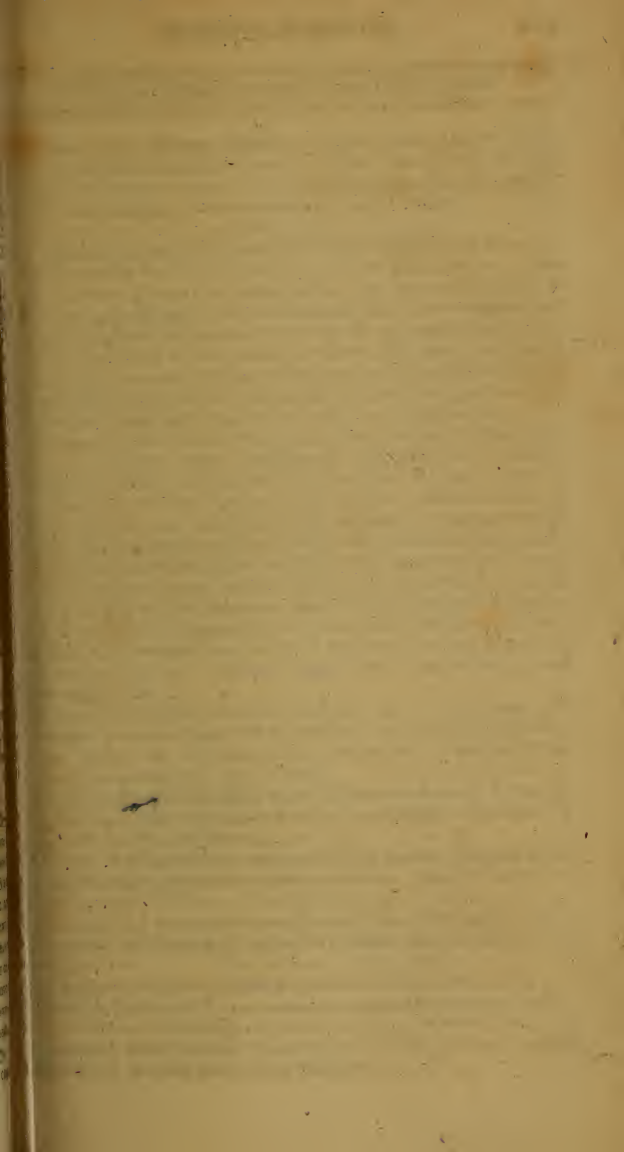

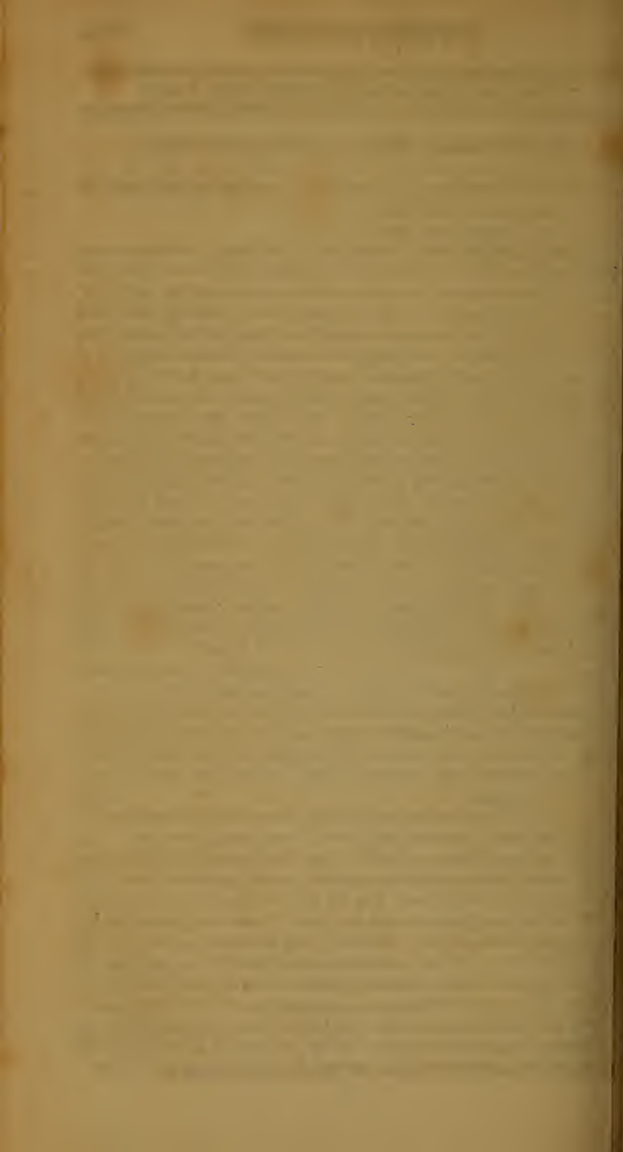

the place from whence imported, if from the Cape of Good Hope or beyond it, 20 per cent. is added thereto; and in like manner 10 per cent. from all other places, including all charges, except commission, outside packages, and insurance.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING DRAWBACK.

In every case the duties must amount to \$50 or more. And in every case of entry of merchandise, for drawback, and the same regularly shipped under the inspection of an officer, and weighed, or measured as the case may require, 20 days from the clearance of the vessel is allowed by law for signing bonds to produce certificates of landing out of the United States. Merchandise to be entitled to benefit of drawback must be shipped within 12 calendar months from date of importation.

Merchandise for drawback, cannot be exported to the dominions of any foreign state, immediately adjoining the U. States. All goods must be exported in the original package, without any change whatever, except liquor in casks, coffee in casks or other packages, and cocoa in casks or other packages, which may be filled up from other packages of the same importation; to be put into new packages corresponding therewith, and marked and numbered as the original one; and in case the original package shall, in the opinion of the officer appointed to examine the same, be so injured as to be rendered unfit for exportation, and in no other case; and all this must be done under the inspection of a proper officer, appointed by the collector, and naval officer, &c.

Drawback of duties not allowed in the case of goods imported from foreign vessels from the dominions or possessions of any foreign power to and with which the vessels of the U. States are not permitted to go and trade.

There shall not be an allowance of the drawback of duties for the amount of the additional duty on merchandise imported in vessels of the United States.

Drawback of duties not allowed in the case of foreign dried and pickled fish and other salted provisions. Nor of fish oil or tanning cards.

Allowance of drawback—on spirits, 2 cents per gallon and 3 per cent on the amount of duty. On other merchandise, $\frac{1}{2}$ 1-2 per cent.

Drawback on domestic distilled spirits, not below 1st proof,
From molasses,.....10 cents per gal.
other materials,..... 6 cents do.

Provided, the quantity exported shall be 150 gallons, and in vessels not less than thirty tons burden.

EXPORTS. To what countries.

Sec. 4th of act passed 20th April, 1818.—And be it further enacted, that no drawback shall be allowed of the duties payable on any wines or spirits which shall be imported into the U. S. after the 1st day of June, 1818, unless such wines or spirits shall have been deposited in public or other stores, under the provisions of the act, and there kept from their landing to their shipment.

N. B. From and after the 1st day of June, 1818, the credit on duties from all places situated on the eastern shores of America, north of the equator, or in its adjacent seas, bays and gulfs, salt excepted, shall be, one half in 6, and one half in 12 calendar months; and on goods, (other than wine, salt and tea) imported from any other place than Europe and the West Indies, one third in 8, one third in 10, and one third in 18 calendar months.

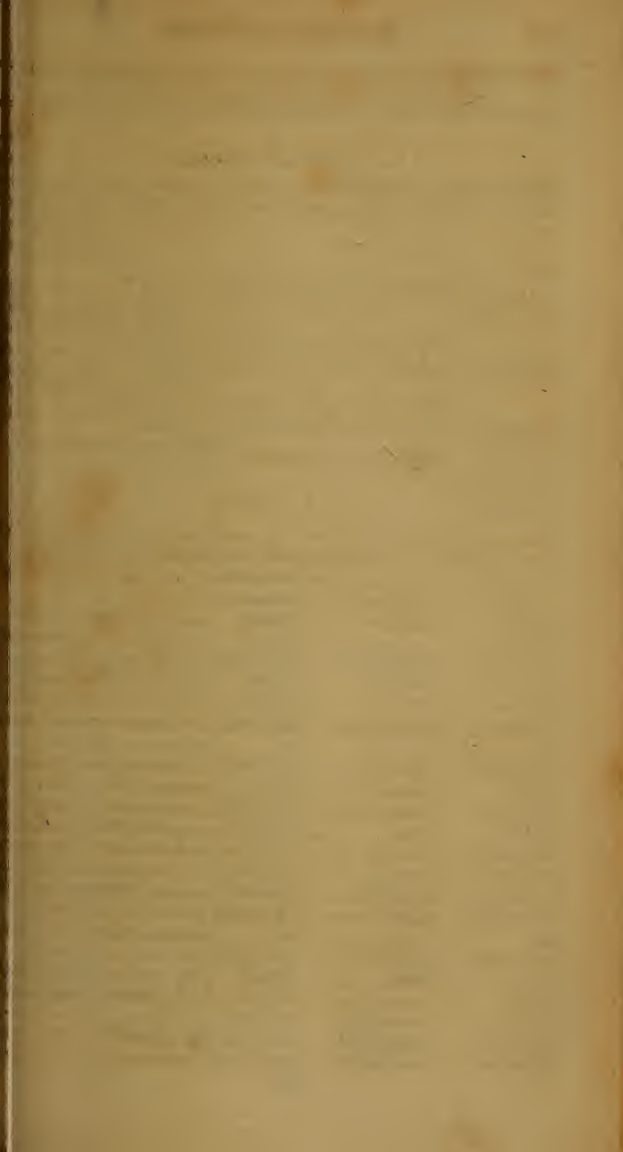

The Coins of the United States are struck at the nation Mint, which was established by act of 2d April, 1792; and remains, by law, at Philadelphia. The institution consists of Director, who has the principal management; an Assayer, Chief Coiner, an Engraver, a Treasurer, and a Melter and Refiner.

The money of account of the United States is directed by law to be expressed in dollars, or units; dimes, or tenths; cents, hundredths; and mills, or thousandths; a dime being the tenth part of a dollar; a cent the hundredth part of a dollar; and a mill the thousandth part of a dollar. The mill is merely a nominal thing, there being no actual coinage of that denomination.

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COINS AND CURRENCY. *Foreign.*

l accounts in the public offices, and all proceedings in the courts of the U. States, must be kept in conformity to this relation. The alloy of the gold coins, is silver; that of silver, copper.

GOLD.

Gold coins ceased to be a tender for the payment of debts or demands, from and after the first day of November, 1819.

Copy of a letter from Robert Patterson, Esq. Director of the U. S. Mint, at Philadelphia, to the Secretary of the Treasury, dated 22d Dec. 1819.

Sir—Agreeably to the general directions contained in your letter of the 31st of December, 1816, I have had assays made of every species of foreign coins therein mentioned; namely, the gold coins of Great Britain, France, Portugal, and Spain, and the crowns of France, and the five-franc pieces." The assays of the foreign gold coins might, perhaps, have been omitted, they have now ceased to be a legal currency; they have, however, for the present, been included in the assayer's report,

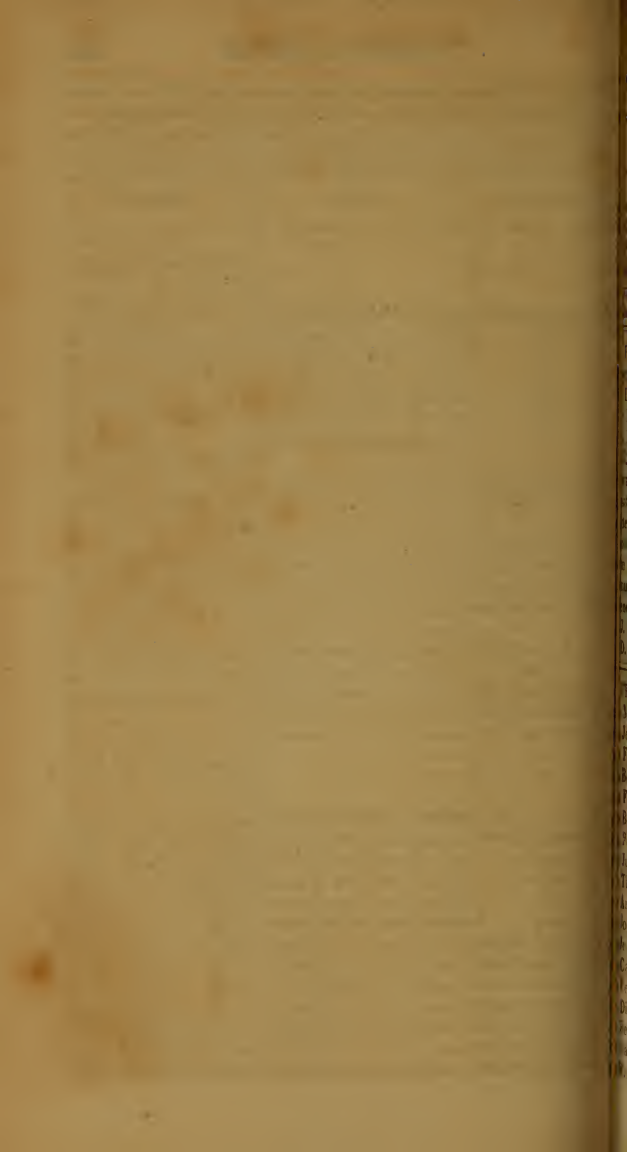
1. That the gold coins of Great Britain, being of the same quality with those of the United States, their intrinsic value will be at the rate of 100 cents for 27 grains.
2. That the gold coins of Portugal, being 1-16 of a carat in inferior in quality to those of the United States, their intrinsic value will be at the rate of 100 cents for 27 9-469 grains.
3. That the gold coins of France will be at the rate of 100 cents for 27 81-173 grains.
4. That the gold coins of Spain will be at the rate of 100 cents for 28 60-111 grains.
5. That the silver French crowns will be at the rate of 117.3 cents per ounce.
6. That the silver five-franc pieces will be at the rate of 116.3 cents per ounce.

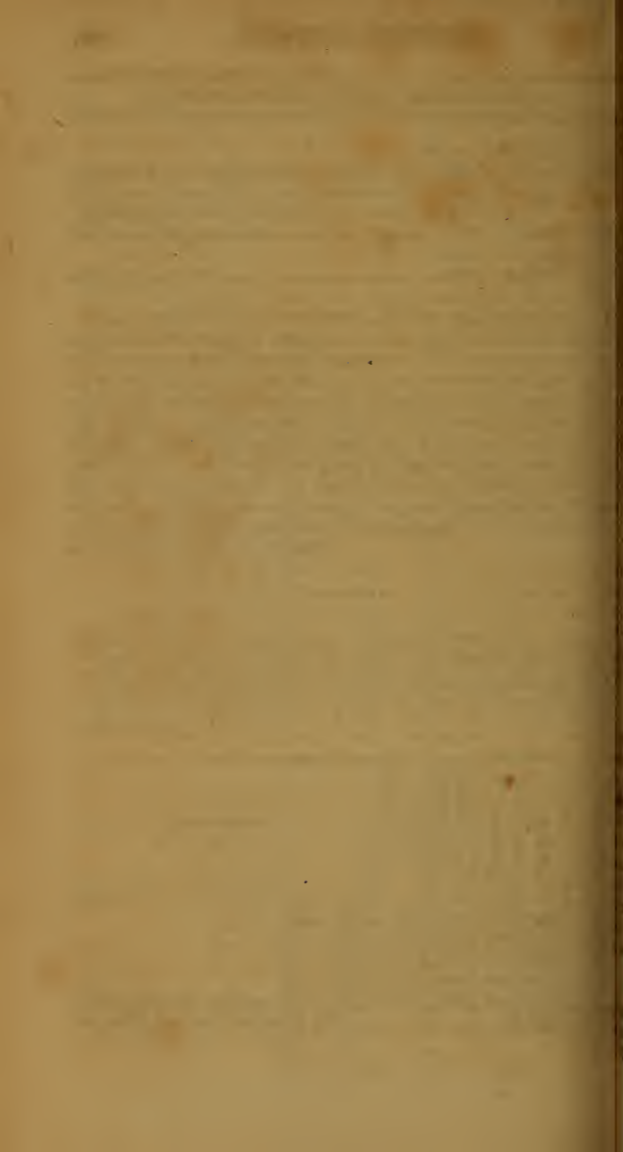
Note.—Although the recruiting service has generally been successful, this return exhibits an aggregate of several hundred less than those of preceding quarters. This may be explained by the following considerations: The terms of the last of the war men, many of whom were enlisted in 1814, expire about this time; to which must be added the unusual number of desertions. To balance this, however, there are more than 600 recruits on their march to join, which, together with detachments not included in the monthly returns made at the headquarters of regiments and corps, and the recruits at different rendezvous, made, it is believed, the aggregate of the army 9,000 at the close of the year 1819.

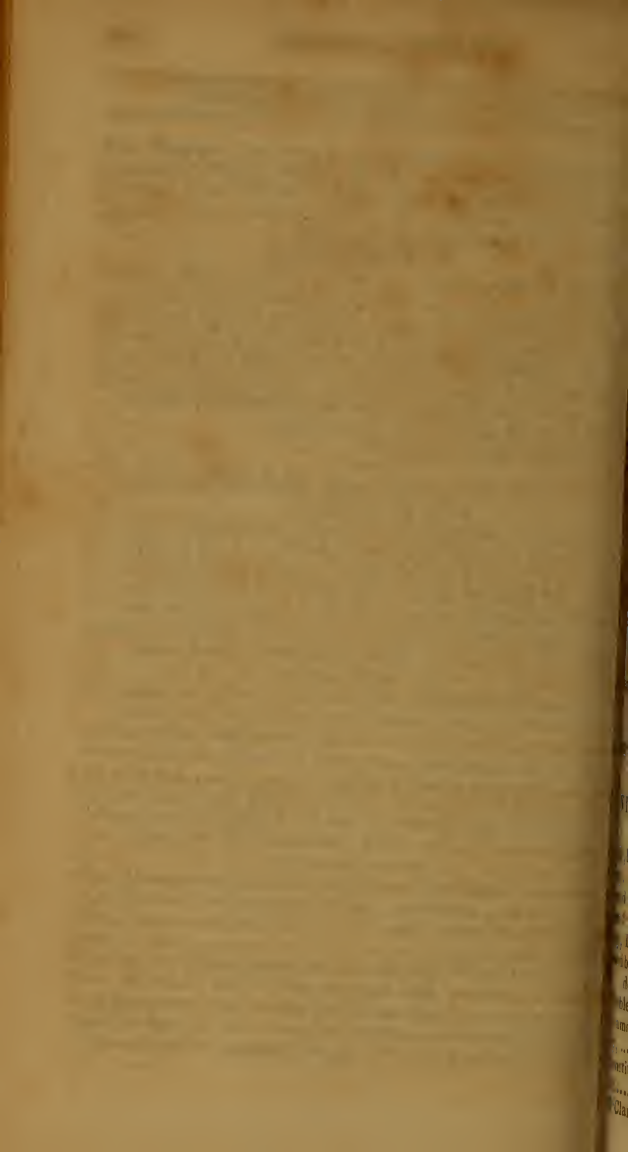

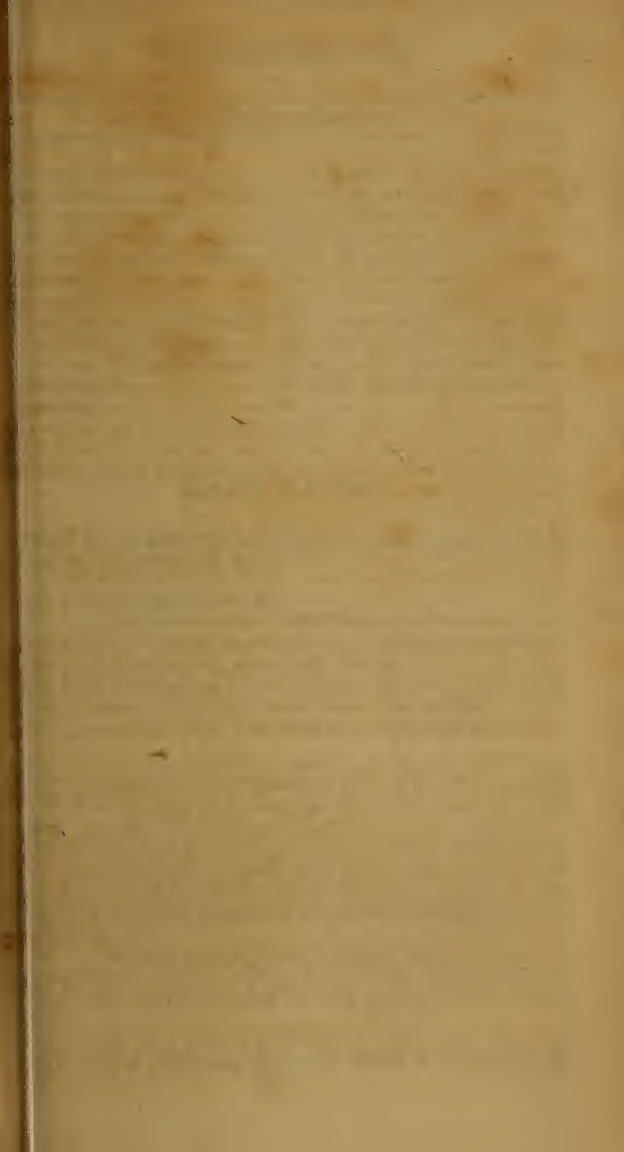

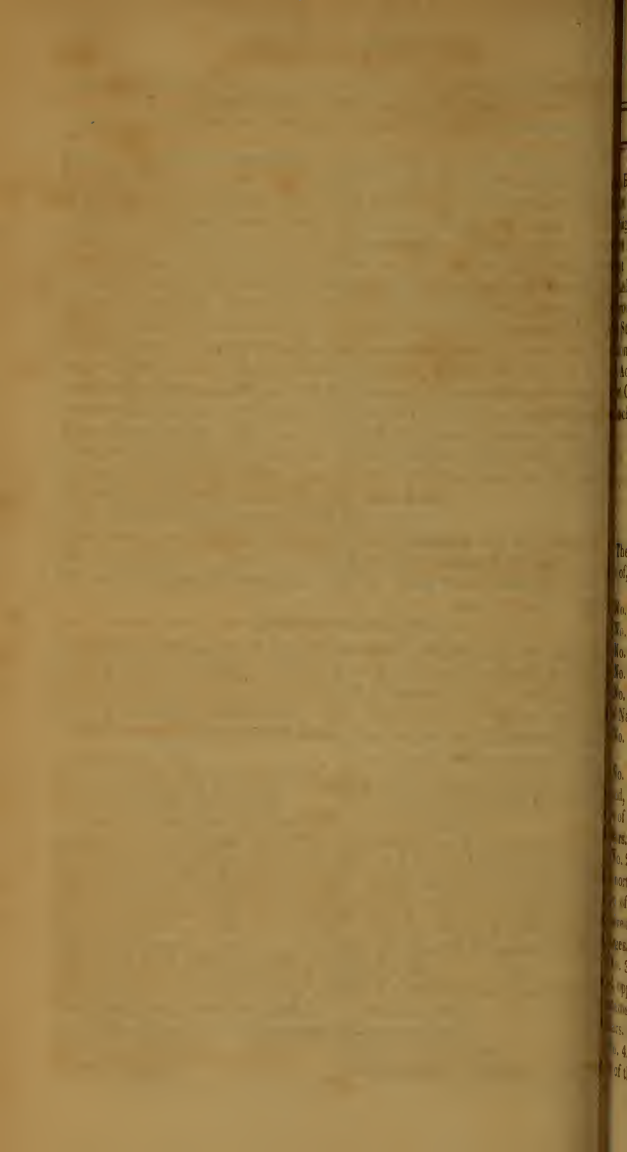

No. 1. The navy yard at Portsmouth, N. H. is situated on an island, on the east side of Piscataqua river, within the jurisdiction of Massachusetts, contains fifty-eight acres, and cost 5,500 dollars.

No. 2. The navy yard at Charlestown, Mass. is situated on the north side of Charles river, on a point of land east of the town of Charlestown, contains thirty-four acres, exclusive of extensive flats, and cost 39,214 dollars, including commissions and charges.

No. 3. The navy yard at New-York is situated on Long-Island, opposite to the city of New-York, on the Wallabout Bay, contains forty acres, including the mill pond, and cost 40,000 dollars.

No. 4. The navy yard at Philadelphia is situated on the west side of the river Delaware, within the district of Southwark, ad

POST OFFICE ESTABLISHMENT.

GENERAL POST OFFICE.

This establishment is under the superintendence of a Post Master General, who is aided in the discharge of its duties by two Assistants. He has the sole appointment of all deputy-postmasters throughout the United States; the making of all contracts for carrying the mail; and, in brief, the control, according to law, of every thing relating to the institution. The revenue arising from the General Post Office has, for the most part, been expended upon the extension and improvement of the establishment, by which means the accommodation of the mail conveyance for letters, newspapers, pamphlets, &c. has, in a most extraordinary degree, been extended to the inhabitants of every part of the Union, even to the most remote territorial settlements.

Eight pages of quarto, or sixteen of octavo, or twenty-four of duodecimo, are rated as *one sheet* each; and all other sizes in the same proportion.

The mail is transported in stages, each day in the year, 10,124 miles.

The mail is transported in sulkies, and on horseback, each day in the year, 10,616 miles, making 20,737 miles per day.

If you divide the post roads of the United States into two different post routes, the mail will travel each week, in *stages*, nearly equal to three times around the globe; and divide all the post-roads in the United States into four equal or distinct post-routes, on which the mail is carried in stages, sulkies, and on horseback, it will be equal to a travel of six times, *each week*, around the globe, averaging one post-office for every fifteen miles of post-road.

The mail is transported by a direct or corresponding line of stages, from the Anson, in the district of Maine, via Washington City, to Nashville, Tennessee, a distance of *one thousand four hundred and forty-eight miles*, in a south-western direction.—The mail is transported by a direct line of stages, from St. Mary's, in Georgia, to Highgate, in Vermont, via Washington City, a distance of 1,369 miles, in a northern direction.—These remarks apply to March, 1818.

 METHOD OF DOING BUSINESS AT THE PUBLIC OFFICES.

All the accounts of the government are finally settled at the Treasury Department; for which purpose it is divided into the Office of the Secretary, (who superintends the whole, but who is not, therefore, absolute, with respect to the power of adjusting claims or of paying money;) into two comptrollers, five auditors, a register, and a treasurer.

The first auditor receives all accounts accruing in the Treasury Department, and, after examination, certifies the balance and transmits the accounts with the vouchers and certificate to the first comptroller for his decision thereon.

The second auditor receives all accounts relative to the pay and clothing of the army, the subsistence of officers, bounties, and premiums, military and hospital stores, and the contingent expenses of the war department.

The third auditor receives all accounts relative to the subsistence of the army, the quarter master's department, and generally all accounts of the war department, other than those referred to the second auditor.

The fourth auditor receives all accounts accruing in the navy department, or relative to it.

These second, third, and fourth auditors, examine the accounts respectively, certify the balances, and transmit the accounts, with the vouchers and certificate, to the second comptroller for his decision upon them.

The fifth auditor receives all accounts accruing in, or relative to, the department of state, the general post-office, and those arising out of Indian affairs, examines them, certifies the balances, and transmits the accounts with the vouchers and certificates, to the first comptroller, for his decision upon them.

The first comptroller examines all accounts settled by the first and fifth auditors, and certifies the balances arising thereon to the register; countersigns all warrants drawn by the secretary of the treasury, if warranted by law; reports to the secretary the official forms to be issued in the different offices for collecting the public revenue; and the manner and form of keeping and stating the accounts of the several persons employed therein. He superintends the preservation of the public accounts subject to his revision, and provides for the regular payment of all moneys which may be collected.

The second comptroller examines all accounts settled by the second, third, and fourth, auditors certifies the balances to the secretary of the department in which the expenditure has been incurred; countersigns all warrants drawn by the secretaries of the war and navy departments, warranted by law; reports to the secretaries the official forms to be issued in the different offices for disbursing the public money in those departments, and the manner and form of keeping and stating the accounts of the persons employed therein. It is also his duty to superintend the reservation of the public accounts subject to his revision.

It is the duty of the first comptroller to superintend the recovery of all debts due to the United States; to direct suits and legal proceedings, and to take all measures, authorised by law, to enforce prompt payment of all debts to the United States.

The auditors of the public accounts are empowered to administer oaths or affirmations to witnesses in any case in which they

may deem it necessary for the due examination of the accounts with which they are charged.

The register of the treasury keeps all accounts of the receipts and expenditures of the public money, and of all debts due to or from the United States; receives from the comptrollers the accounts which have been finally adjusted, and, with their vouchers and certificates preserves them; he records all warrants for the receipt or payment of moneys at the treasury, certifies the same thereon, and transmits to the secretary of the treasury copies of the certificates of balances of accounts adjusted.

The treasurer receives and keeps the moneys of the United States, and disburses the same upon warrants drawn by the secretary of the treasury, countersigned by the proper comptroller and auditor, and recorded by the register.

From the preceding description of the duties and powers of the several accounting officers of the treasury department, every one having accounts to settle with the government, may know, at once, where to apply.

Besides the disbursement of moneys for the great objects of government, there are contingent funds appropriated yearly by congress. These are expended for such objects as could not well be foreseen, by some one of the clerks or other officer belonging to each of the departments, who is specially charged with that business, to whom the accounts of such contingencies must be presented. He takes a receipt in his own name, and at the end of each quarter of a year is brought to a settlement himself, for all his disbursements, at the treasury department.

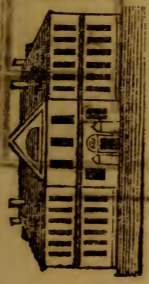

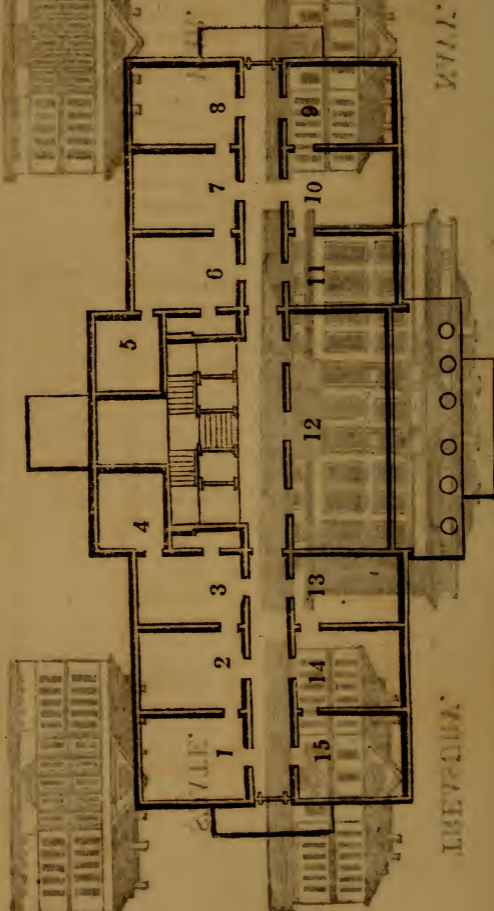

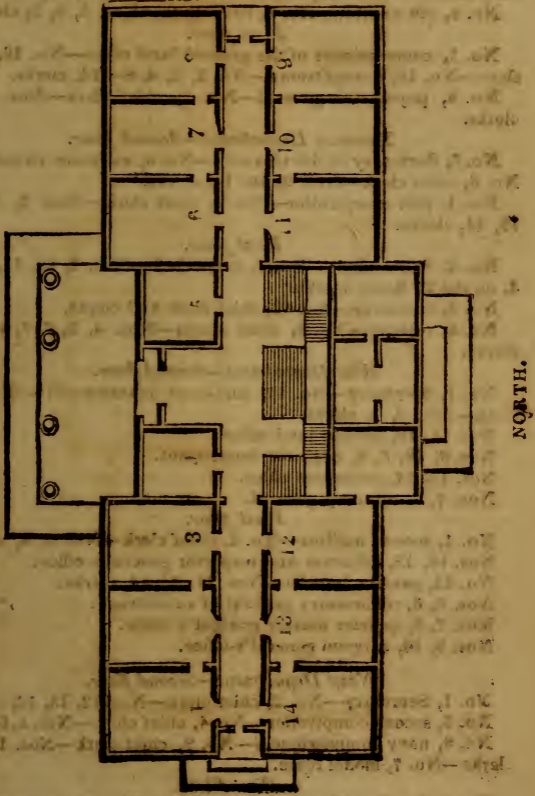

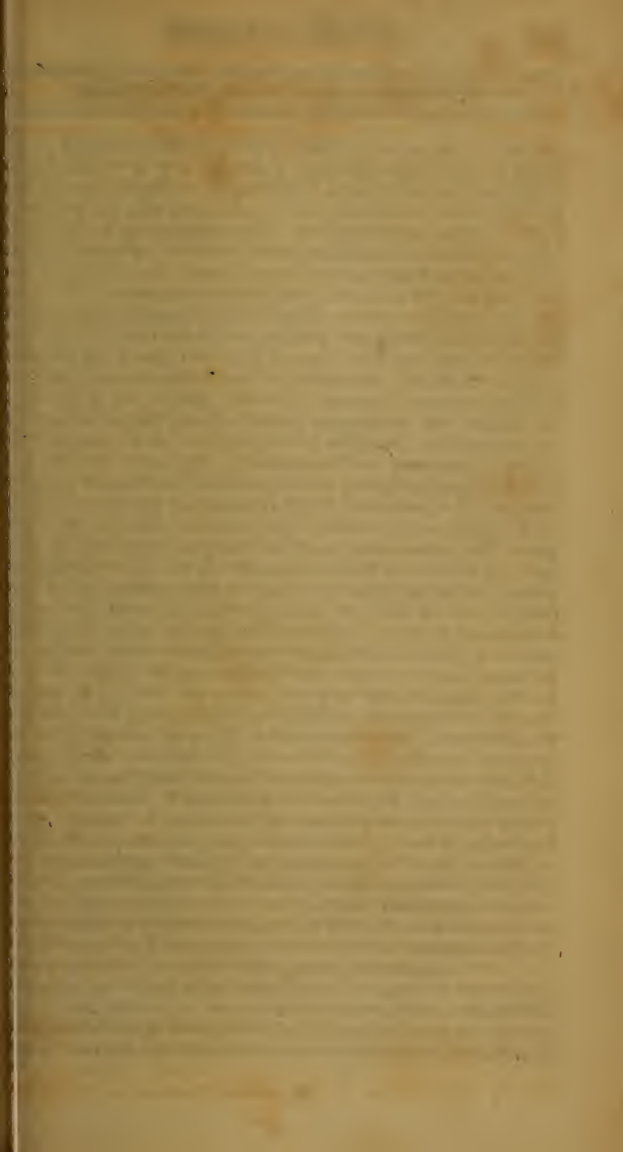
CITY OF WASHINGTON.

Washington City, in the district of Columbia, the metropolis of the United States of America, situated, on tide-water, on the north-eastern bank of the river Potomac, in latitude 33 deg. 33 min. N. ; longitude of the capitol 77 deg. 00, being intended as a first meridian. It comprehends all the lands beginning on the east side of Rock creek, at a stone standing in the middle of the road leading from Georgetown to Bladensburg, thence along the middle of the said road, to a stone standing on the east side of the reedy branch of the Tyber, thence south-easterly, making an angle of sixty-one degrees and twenty minutes with the meridian, to a stone standing in the road leading from Bladensburg to the eastern branch ferry, then south to a stone eighty poles north of the east and west line already drawn from the mouth of the Tyber to the eastern branch, then east, parallel to the said east and west line, to the eastern branch, then with the waters of the eastern branch, Potomac river, and Rock creek, to the beginning. It was planned under the directions of general Washington, then President of the United States, from whom it takes its name, by Pierre C. l'Enfant, in the year 1791. The positions for the different edifices, and for the several squares or areas of different shapes as they are laid down by Mr. Andrew Ellicot, were first determined on the most advantageous ground, commanding the most extensive prospects, and the better susceptible of such improvements as either use or ornament may call for. Lines or avenues of direct communication have been devised, to connect the most separate and most distant objects with the principal, and to preserve through the whole a reciprocity of sight at the same time. Attention has been paid to the passage of those avenues over the most favourable ground for prospect and convenience. North and south lines, intersected by others running due east and west, make the distribution of the city into streets, squares, &c. and those lines have been so combined as to meet at certain given points with those divergent avenues, so as to form, on the spaces first determined, the different squares or areas. At certain intervals there are squares which are to remain always open, unoccupied by buildings, for the purpose of promoting a free circulation of air: these are intended to be planted with trees, as some of the avenues already are, particularly the Pennsylvania avenue, which has been most improved, and which, from the western front of the capitol, in a straight line to the president's house, affords a beautiful vista. The avenues bear the names of those states which belonged to the

Union when the plan of the city was devised; since which time three others have received the names of Ohio, Louisiana, and Indiana. The capitol is the dividing point of all the streets those running north and south of it being designated by the letters of the alphabet, as A street north, A street south; and both north and south, the streets extend to the letter W. Those running east and west, are designated numerically, as 1st street east, 1st street west, &c. In the eastern direction these streets extend to 22, and in the western direction to 27. The stream called the Tyber, runs through a part of the city of Washington water from it may be conveyed to the high ground where the capitol stands, and after watering that part of the city, may be appropriated to other useful purposes; and the waters of both the Tyber and Reedy Branch may be conveyed to the president's house. The grand avenues, and such streets as lead immediately to public places, are from 130 to 160 feet wide, and are divided into footways, walks of trees, and a carriage way: the other streets are from 80 to 110 feet wide. The stream of the Tyber is tributary to a canal, which was cut, in 1811, by a company incorporated for the purpose from the eastern branch communicating, for the benefit of the intermediate population, with the main body of the Potomac. The ground on which Washington stands was ceded, in full sovereignty to the United States, by an act of the general assembly of Maryland; and the proprietors of the soil cheerfully surrendered their lands to be laid out as a city, gave up part to the United States, and subjected other parts to be sold to raise money as a donation, to be employed according to the act of congress for establishing the permanent seat of government. The principal public buildings and establishments at the metropolis consist of—1. The capitol, which is to be composed of a central edifice and two wings. The two wings were in a considerable state of forwardness in 1814, when the British army under general Ross, who was afterwards slain in battle, near Baltimore, by a sudden incursion gained possession of the city, and set fire to those wings, to the president's house and other public structures not connected with the operations of war; reducing the whole of the combustible part to ashes, together with a fine, extensive library, which had been from time to time, purchased for the use of the congress. The wings of the capitol are now re-built, and the central building has been commenced.

The foundation stone of the north wing of these buildings was laid, in the presence of general Washington, on the 16th of September, 1793, and that of the central building on the 24th of August, 1818. 2. The president's house, situated about



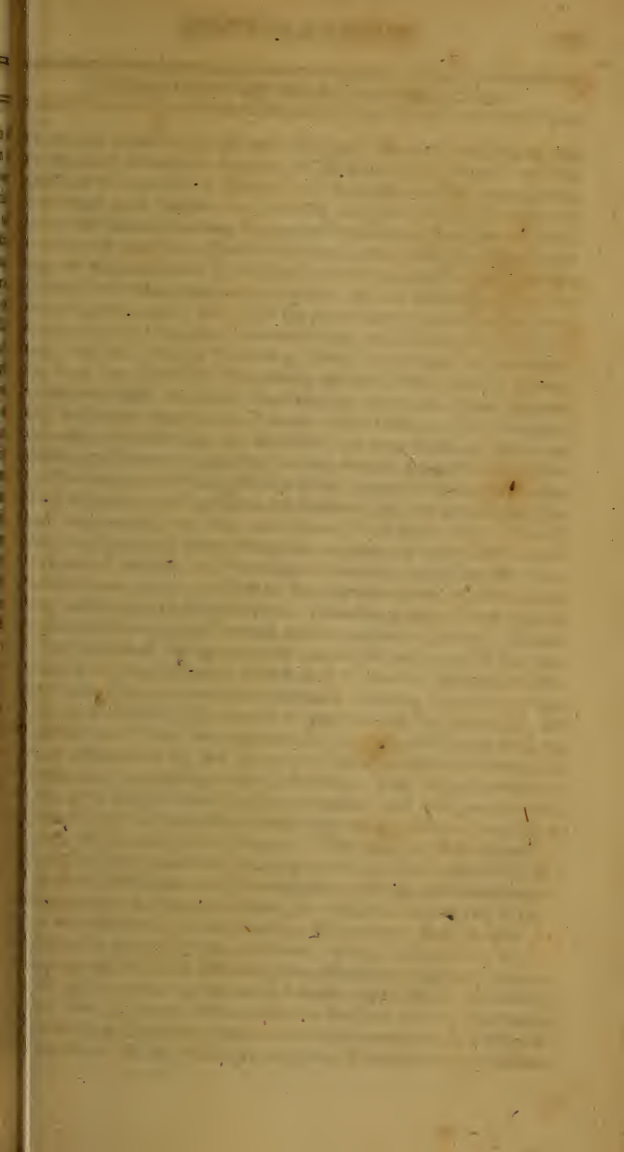

mile and a half west of the capitol, on the avenue leading to Georgetown. 3. The buildings, with two new ones, of equal dimensions, erected in a line east and west of the president's use, for the accommodation of the principal heads of the departments of government, and of subordinate officers. The walls of these are of brick. 4. A comfortable marine barrack, with a house for the residence of the commandant of the marine corps. 5. An extensive navy-yard, where a 74 gun ship has lately been launched, and a frigate is now building. In this yard is an elegant marble monument, erected by the American officers to the memory of their brethren who fell before Tripoli: this monument was mutilated by the British on the 25th August, 1794. 6. A fort, which, from the extreme southern point of the island on which the city stands, commands the channel of the Potomac. And, 7. The general post-office; where the post office is also kept. The style of the architecture of the capitol is Corinthian, and that of the president's house Ionic; and both buildings are constructed of free stone. The capitol square is enclosed by strong and handsome iron railing; and being planted with trees, and otherwise ornamented, will afford a delightful walk for the inhabitants and visitors of the city. Prior to the conflagration of the public buildings, in 1814, many doubts had been expressed whether the seat of the national government would remain at Washington; and, at the session of congress which immediately ensued that event, a serious debate was made to the transfer the offices of government to another place; but the motion to that effect having failed; congress, with great liberality appropriated large sums of money for rebuilding the public edifices, and voted to replace the library by the purchase of that of Thomas Jefferson, formerly president of the United States; it consists at present of about ten thousand volumes. Those who had been most forward in promoting the removal of the seat of government were now most ardent in voting to promote the prosperity of the city, thereby giving to it an unquestionable character of permanency. There is a bridge, about one mile long over the Potomac, on piles, built in 1809; and one over the eastern branch. Of turnpikes, there is one to Alexandria, complete; one to intersect the Little River turnpike, also complete; one to Bladensburg, which has been continued to Baltimore; and one leading to Montgomery court-house. Besides the canal from the eastern branch to the Tyber, there is one, which is of much use to the city, to pass the Little Falls, above Georgetown, through which is brought the greater part of the flour used in the district, and exported thence, and

by which the massy marble columns were conveyed to the capitol. In Washington and its vicinity there are also an extensive cannon foundery, a paper mill, a window glass manufactory, which supplies the market, and exports to a considerable amount, and powder mills. The eastern branch has a sufficient depth of water for the smaller class of frigates without lightening; and vessels drawing fourteen feet water come up to the bridge on the Potomac, near to which there are two wharves; and from which, to the mouth of the Tyber, there are, at common high tide, about ten feet water. The Tyber itself is shallow, having a soft muddy bottom, easily removed, so as to admit vessels of eight feet draught to the market-house on Pennsylvania avenue, and on it there are at present four wharves.— There are four markets in the city, held three times in each week; one is well supplied and numerously attended. There is a city library, a theatre, a medical and a botanical society, and a female orphan asylum. The Pennsylvania avenue is supplied with spring water by wooden pipes and hydrants. There are also pipes and hydrants from a spring in the vicinity of the New-Jersey avenue, and another at the navy-yard market. There is a steam-boat that runs regularly to Aquia; and, besides the ordinary line of stages, there is a new one to Wheeling, on the Cumberland road. Of banks there are three, and a branch of the bank of the United States, and an insurance office, there are, likewise, seven printing offices in Washington, and two daily papers, with an equal number of tri-weekly ones, and a paper published once a week. Stores are increasing; and, for the accommodation of citizens and strangers, public baths have been erected. To these may be added an infirmary; and there is a lottery, authorized by congress, for erecting a penitentiary, a city hall, and two Lancasterian school-houses. The population of the city, according to the census in 1810, amounted to 8,208, of which 2,304 were people of colour. The whole population, in 1800, was 3,210; giving, in ten years, an increase of about 150 per cent. In 1819, the population was 11,299; the number of buildings 2208, 925 of which were of brick. Of places of public worship there are ten, of which two are episcopal, one Roman catholic, one presbyterian, one associate reformed, two baptist, two methodist, and one society of friends. The seat of the national government was removed to Washington in the year 1800, during the presidency of Mr. Adams. The superintendence of the public buildings, and the regulation of the city generally, were, in the first instance, placed in the hands of a board of commissioners. On the first of May, 1802, the

ward was abolished, and the affairs of the city confided to the direction of a superintendent, subject to the control of the president of the United States. In addition to this superintendent, there was instituted, in 1815, a board of three commissioners for superintending the reconstruction of the public edifices; but, in the year 1816, this board was also dissolved, the office of superintendent annulled, and the supervision of the national buildings, and of the affairs of the city in which the general government are directly concerned, committed to one commissioner. Congress assumed legal jurisdiction over Washington on the 27th of February, 1801, declaring, at the same time, that the laws of Maryland, as they then existed, should remain in force; and this is the case at the present time, with the exception of such alterations as the congress have enacted, and they are but few. A new code of laws for the whole district of Columbia is now in the progress of formation, the judges of the district circuit court, together with the district attorney, having been designated, by an act of the national legislature, for the performance of that duty. These judges, consisting of three, compose a court for the trial of civil and criminal causes, in Washington county, including the city. From this court an appeal lies to the supreme court of the United States, which sits at Washington. There is a convenient county court, likewise an orphans' court, and a register of wills. There is no city tribunal for the trial of causes of any sort, if the magistrate is excepted, which is composed of justices of the peace, who, upon arrests for criminal offences, have the same powers as are commonly vested in justices of the peace of the several states. They are appointed by the president and senate, and are authorized by law to give judgment upon warrant for a sum not exceeding twenty dollars. The city corporation consists of a mayor and eight aldermen, and twelve common councilmen, divided into two branches, who regulate the affairs of the inhabitants by ordinances. The mayor was formerly appointed by the president; but he is now elected annually, by a board of aldermen and the common council, and these latter are themselves chosen every year, (with the exception of a portion of the former,) by the people. The mayor is a justice of the peace in virtue of his mayoral office. There are many pleasant heights about Washington, affording agreeable situations for country seats, and from whence there is an enchanting view of the adjacent vales, and the waters of the Potomac. The water is remarkably pure, the springs numerous and the climate healthy. Education has not been heretofore overlooked.

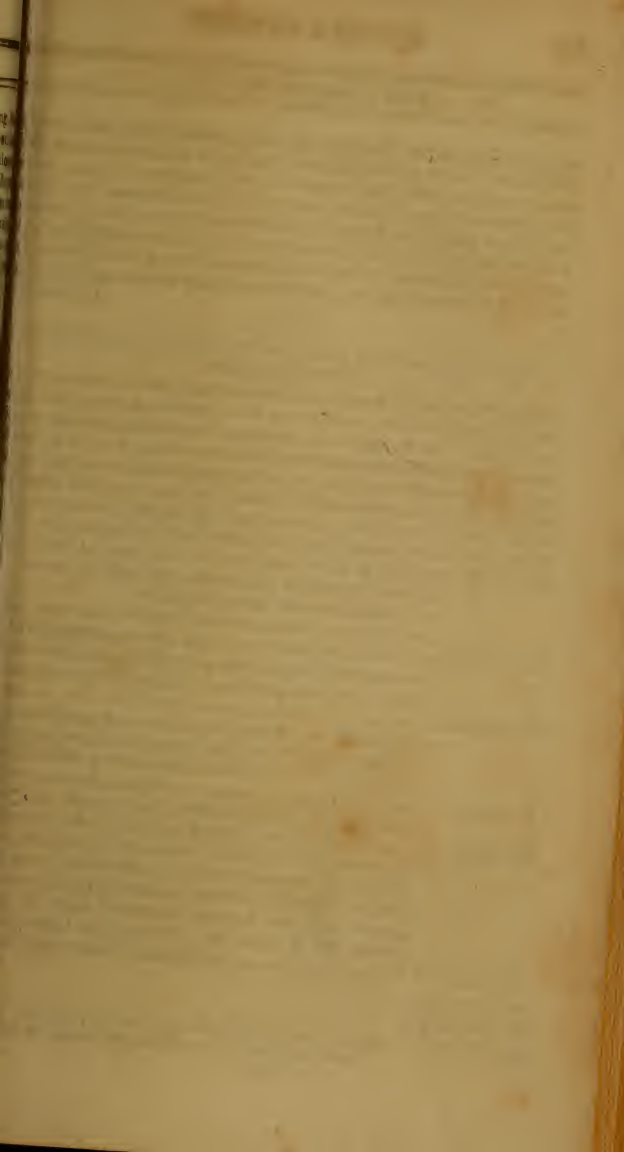
There are academies, both male and female; and among the schools at present established, there is one upon the Lancasterian plan, and, until lately, a school upon the plan of Pestalozzi. Within a range of six miles adjacent to the city, there are eleven flour mills; and, with very little expense there might be an excellent fish market. The price of living is not proportionably higher than in other parts of the Union. The population is orderly; and there has been hitherto no occasion for a city water

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The Weights and Measures of the City of Washington are regulated according to the standard used in Maryland, and there is a person appointed to keep the standard, who is the sealer of weights and measures, and is obliged to have an office near the Centre-Market, on the Pennsylvania Avenue. The person who holds this office at present is Mr. Jacob Leonard.

CITY LOTS.

Lots in the City of Washington, belong either to the public or to individuals. Those who wish to purchase of the public must apply to the commissioner of the public buildings, who has the power to take the acknowledgment of deeds. Deeds may be acknowledged, also, before two justices of the peace, before a judge of the circuit court of the District of Columbia. If the sale of a lot, or lots, is made by a non-resident, acknowledgment must be made in the presence of a person competent to verify in the city. Deeds must be recorded within six months. If the taxes remain due and unpaid on any improved lot of ground, it is the duty of the collector of the ward in which it is situated to sell it at public auction so as to raise the sum necessary to pay the taxes. But notice must first be given of the intention, by advertisement, in some newspaper printed in the City of Washington. If the property belongs to persons residing out of the United States, six months notice must be given; if out of the District of Columbia, three months; and if in the District of Columbia, six weeks. If the purchase money is repaid within two years, with ten per cent per annum interest, the lot may be redeemed. If the purchase cannot be found, or refuses to accept, the purchase money shall be paid to the clerk of the county court. If no redemption is made within two years, a title in fee simple vests in the purchaser.

owner, and the former proprietor can only claim the surplus of the purchase money after the taxes have been paid. In the case of a sale of improved lots for taxes, thirty days notice of sale given. In this case, the mayor is obliged to give notice to the owner or agent within thirty days of such sale being made, and the purchase money is tendered and repaid, with an addition of twenty-five per centum; within twelve months from the day of sale, the owner becomes entitled to his former right and possession.

UNITED STATES' PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF WASHINGTON.

To correct a very prevalent error, that the City of Washington, has been a burden, and an expense to the United States, the following statement is given; by which it is shown, not only that such is not the case, but that after charging the city with all the expenses incurred in erecting the Capitol, the President's House, and the Public Offices, originally; with all the appropriations made by Congress for their re-erection, since they were burnt by the British, in 1814; and with all the moneys that will be required to complete them, a balance will be left in favour of the city, of several millions of dollars.

STATE GOVERNMENTS.

Size, boundaries, and geographical position of each State in the Union, with the number of inhabitants in 1810.

Vermont lies between lat. $42^{\circ} 44'$, and 45° N. and between long. $71^{\circ} 33'$ and $73^{\circ} 26'$ W. The whole north end is on the parallel of 45° . Its mean length is 157 1-2 miles. Its breadth on the Canada line 90, and on the Massachusetts 40. The average breadth is 65 : the number of square miles is 10,237, and acres 6,552,000. It is bounded north by Lower Canada ; east by Connecticut river, which divides it from New-Hampshire ; south by Massachusetts ; west by New-York and the deepest channel of Poultney river, East Bay and Lake Champlain. Inhabitants, 217,895. Representatives 6.

New-Hampshire lies between lat. $42^{\circ} 41'$ and $45^{\circ} 11'$ N. and between long. $70^{\circ} 40'$ and $72^{\circ} 28'$ W. It is 168 miles long from north to south. Its greatest breadth is 90 miles ; in lat. 44° it is 60 miles, and at the northern extremity but 19. It contains 9,491 square miles, or 6,074,240 acres. It is bounded north by Lower Canada ; east by Maine and the Atlantic ; south by Massachusetts ; and west by the west bank of the Connecticut. A part of that river is within the jurisdiction of Vermont. The extent of sea coast is 18 miles. Inhabitants, 214,460. Representatives 6.

The District of Maine lies between lat. $43^{\circ} 4'$, and $48^{\circ} 12'$ N, and between long. $64^{\circ} 54'$, and $70^{\circ} 40'$, W. The northern, eastern and southern frontiers are each about 240 miles long, and the western 160. The average length and breadth is about 100 miles, and there are about 40,000 square miles, or 25,600,000 acres, nearly one half of which are settled. It is bounded on the north by Lower Canada, from which it is separated by the Highlands ; east by New-Brunswick, by which it is separated by the St. Croix, and a line drawn due north from its source to the Highlands ; south east and south by the Atlantic ; west by the Piscataqua about 40 miles, and a line running thence due north, which divides it from New-Hampshire. Inhabitants, 228,705. Representatives 7.

Massachusetts lies between lat. $41^{\circ} 23'$, and $43^{\circ} 52'$, N. and between long. $69^{\circ} 50'$, and $73^{\circ} 10'$, W. Its length, on the northern line, is 130 miles ; on the southern, from New-York to Cape Cod, 190. Its breadth, in the west, is 50 miles ; further east

it is about 100 ; and on the Cape in some places it does not exceed 15. The number of square miles is 6,250. It is bounded on the north by Vermont, New-Hampshire, and Massachusetts Bay ; on the east by the same bay and the Atlantic ; on the south by the Atlantic, Rhode Island and Connecticut ; on the west by Rhode Island and New-York. Inhabitants 472,040. Representatives 13.

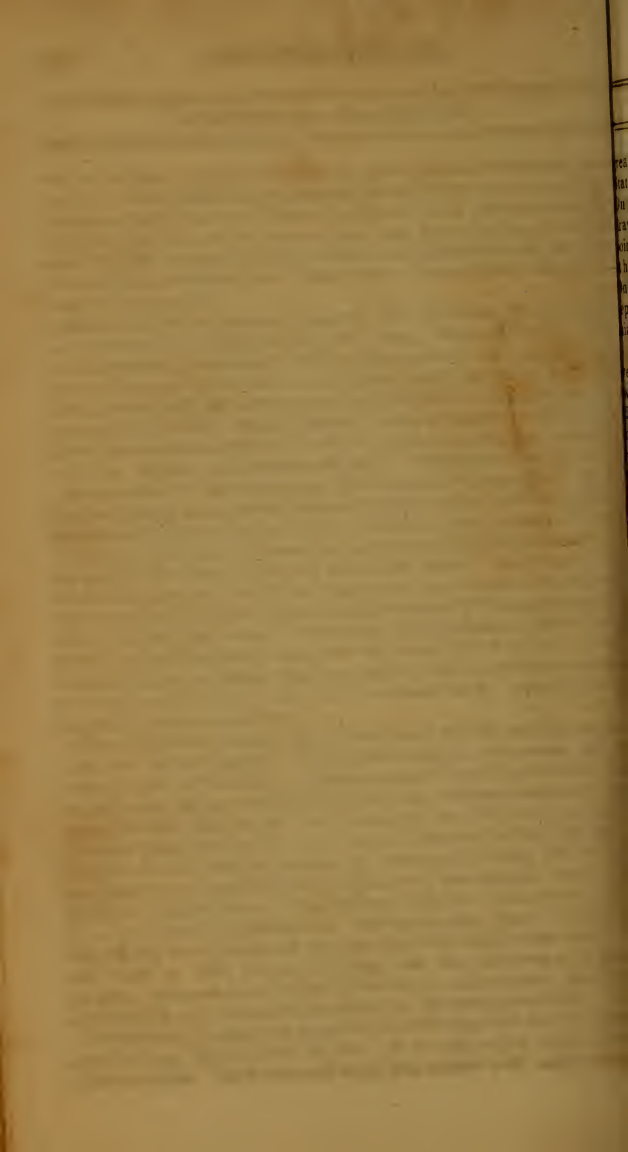
Rhode Island is situated between $41^{\circ} 17'$, and 42° N. lat. and between $71^{\circ} 6'$, and $71^{\circ} 52'$, W. long. Its north line is 29 miles long, and its west 49. The coast west of the bay measures 22 miles, the mouth of the bay 16, and the coast east of the bay 5—in all, 43 ; whilst the greatest width measured on a parallel is 37 miles. Rhode Island contains about 1580 square miles, of which about 190 are water, and about 90 are included in the islands. Inhabitants 76,931. Representatives 2.

Connecticut. The divisional line between Connecticut and Massachusetts, is about 72 miles in length ; that between Connecticut and Rhode Island about 45 miles ; the seacoast from the mouth of Pawkatuc river, in a direct southwesterly line to the mouth of Byram river, is about 90 miles. The line between Connecticut and New-York runs from lat. 41° to lat. $42^{\circ} 2'$, 72 miles. Connecticut contains about 4,674 square miles ; equal to 2,991,360 acres. This state lies between lat. 41° and $42^{\circ} 2'$, N. and between long, $71^{\circ} 29'$, and $73^{\circ} 21'$, W. It is bounded north by Massachusetts ; east by Rhode Island ; south by Long-Island Sound, and west by New-York. Inhabitants 261,942. Representatives 7.

New-York lies between lat. $40^{\circ} 40'$, and 45° N. and between long. 73° and $79^{\circ} 55'$, W. The greatest length of the state, from east to west is 340 miles. The greatest breadth from north to south, is 300 miles ; the breadth, from the commencement of the Pennsylvania line to the St. Lawrence, is 195 ; the average breadth, between that line and Lake Ontario, is 90 ; and the breadth at the western extremity of the state, only 10 miles. The number of square miles, exclusive of the islands, is about 45,000. Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, and the Atlantic bound it on the south : Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Vermont, from which it is separated in part by Lake Champlain on the east ; and it has Lower Canada, the St. Lawrence, Lake Ontario, Niagara river, Lake Erie and Pennsylvania, on the north and west. Inhabitants 959,049. Representatives 27.

New-Jersey is situated between lat. 39° and $41^{\circ} 24'$, N. and between long, 74° and $75^{\circ} 29'$, W. It is 160 miles long from north to south. Its least breadth in the centre is 42 miles ; the

greatest breadth in the north is 70, and in the south 75. The state contains about 8,320 square miles, or 5,324,000 acres. On the north is New-York, from which it is separated by a line drawn from the mouth of Mahakamak river, in lat. $41^{\circ} 24'$, to a point in Hudson river, in lat. 41° . On the east and southeast it has Hudson river, New-York bay, and the Atlantic ocean. On the southwest and west, Delaware bay and river, which separates this state from the states of Delaware and Pennsylvania. Inhabitants 245,560 Representatives 6.

Pennsylvania. The greatest length is 307 miles from east to west; the greatest breadth is 180; and the common breadth between the two parallels 160. It lies between lat. $39. 42,$ and $41. 17,$ N. and between long. $74. 32,$ and $80. 27,$ W. The state contains about 46,800 square miles. It is bounded on the north by Lake Erie and New-York; on the east by a small part of New-York, and Delaware river, which separates it from New-York and New-Jersey; on the south by the states of Delaware, Maryland and Virginia; and on the west by Virginia and Ohio. Inhabitants, 810,091. Representatives 23.

Delaware is 96 miles long from north to south. Its greatest breadth is 36 miles, and its least 10. The area is about 2,120 square miles. It lies between lat. $38^{\circ} 29, 30,$ and $39^{\circ} 54,$ north, and between long $74^{\circ} 56,$ and $75^{\circ} 40,$ west. It is bounded on the north by Pennsylvania, east by Delaware river and bay and the Atlantic, and south and west by Maryland. Inhabitants 72,674. Representatives 2.

Maryland. The northern line of the state is 196 miles long. At the broadest part, on the east of the Bay, it is 120 miles wide. At the narrowest, a little above Hancoctown, it is only 3 miles; at Cumberland 6; and at the western boundary 40. The number of square miles is about 14,000, of which about one-fifth is water. It lies between lat. $38. 44,$ and $39. 44,$ N. and between long. $75. 10,$ and $79. 20,$ W. It is bounded north by Pennsylvania and Delaware; east by Delaware and the Atlantic; south by Virginia and the Chesapeake; southwest by the Potomac, which separates Maryland from Virginia; and west by Virginia. Inhabitants 380,546. Representatives 9.

Virginia. This state lies between lat. $36. 30,$ and $40. 40,$ N. and between long. $75. 25,$ and $83. 40,$ W. Its length on the southern line of the state, is 440 miles. Its greatest breadth is 90. The number of square miles is estimated at 70,000. A narrow strip of land runs northward between Pennsylvania and the Ohio river; another strip passes between Kentucky and Tennessee; and the counties on the Eastern shore are the lower

part of a Peninsula, separated from the rest of the state by the width of the Chesapeake. Exclusive of these, Virginia is compact. It is bounded north by Pennsylvania and Maryland; east by the Atlantic; south by North Carolina and Tennessee; west by the Cumberland Mountains and Big Sandy River, which divide it from Kentucky; and northwest by Ohio river, which divides it from the state of Ohio. Inhabitants, 974,622. Representatives 23.

North Carolina is situated between 33. 50, and 36. 30, N. and between 75. 45, and 84. W. Its length, in lat. 35. 7, is 430 miles. The greatest breadth is 180. In the west it terminates in a point. The eastern part is much the broadest, and the whole extent of the coast is not less than 300 miles. The number of square miles is 43,000. It is bounded on the north by Virginia; on the east and south east by the Atlantic; on the southwest and south, by South Carolina; and on the west and northwest by Tennessee. Inhabitants 555,500. Representatives 13.

South Carolina. This State lies between lat. 32. and 35. 8, N. and between long. 73. 24, and 83. 30, W. The greatest length of the State, from the mouth of the Santee to the northwest angle, is upwards of 340 miles, but it is generally much less; and, at the furthest extremity, it terminates in a point. It contains 24,080 square miles, of which 14,510 are between the falls of the rivers and the Atlantic, and 9,570 above the falls. It is bounded on the north and northeast by North Carolina; on the east by the Atlantic; and on the southwest and west by the Savannah and Tugulo rivers, which separate it from Georgia. Inhabitants 415,115. Representatives 9.

Georgia lies between lat. 30. 42, and 35. N. and between long. 80. 20, and 85. 54, W. Its length is 270 miles. Its breadth, at Savannah, is 25 miles; on the southern boundary 170; and on the northern 120. It contains about 62,000 square miles. It is bounded on the north by the parallel of 35. which divides the State from Tennessee, and North Carolina; on the northeast by Savannah river, which separates it from South Carolina; on the east by the Atlantic; on the south by East Florida; on the southwest corner, for about 30 miles, by West Florida; and on the west by the State of Alabama. Inhabitants 252,453. Representatives 6.

Kentucky lies between 36. 30, and 39. 10, N. lat. and between 82. 50, and 89. 20, W. long. Its length, on the southern line, is 300 miles. Its greatest breadth is 180 miles, and its least 40. The Ohio winds along the whole of its northern side. The

umber of square miles is 50,000. The Ohio, on the north, separates this State from the States of Indiana and Illinois, and from a part of the State of Ohio; Big Sandy River and Cumberland Mountains separate it, on the east from Virginia; Tennessee lies on the south, and is divided from Kentucky by the parallel of 36. 30; the Mississippi on the west separates it from the Missouri and Arkansaw territories. Inhabitants 66,511 Representatives 10.

Tennessee is in length 400 miles, and in its breadth 400 1-2; and lies between 79. 38, and 88. 38, W. long. and 35. and 36. 0, N. lat. It is bounded on the north by Kentucky and Virginia; east by North Carolina; south by Georgia, and the States of Mississippi and Alabama, and west by the Mississippi river. Inhabitants 261,727. Representatives 6.

Ohio. This state lies between lat. 38. 10, and 42. N. and between long. 80. 30, and 85. 45, W. It is 200 miles long and is many broad, containing exclusive of the waters of Lake Erie and Sandusky, 39,128 square miles, equal to 25,043,637 acres. It is bounded east by Pennsylvania; south by the river Ohio; west by Indiana, and north by the Michigan Territory and Lake Erie. Inhabitants 261,727. Representatives 6.

Louisiana. The boundaries of this State begin at the mouth of the river Sabine; run thence, by a line to be drawn along the middle of said river, including all islands, to the 32d degree of latitude; thence, due north, to the northernmost part of the 33d degree of north latitude; thence, along the said parallel of latitude, to the river Mississippi; thence down the said river to the river Iberville; and from thence, along the middle of said river, and Lakes Maurepas and Ponchartrain, to the Gulf of Mexico; thence, bounded by the said gulf, to the place of beginning. These were the limits by the act of Congress of 8th April, 1812. By act of the 14th of April, 1812, they were enlarged, by adding to the foregoing all that act of country, beginning with the junction of the Iberville, with the Mississippi; thence, along the middle of the river, the river Amite, and the Lakes Maurepas and Ponchartrain, to the eastern mouth of the Pearl river; thence, along the eastern branch of Pearl river, to the 31st degree of north latitude; thence, along the said degree of latitude, to the river Mississippi; thence down the said river to the place of beginning. Inhabitants 76,556. Representative 1.

Indiana is bounded on the east by the meridian line which forms the western boundary of the State of Ohio; on the south by the river Ohio, from the mouth of the Great Miami river to

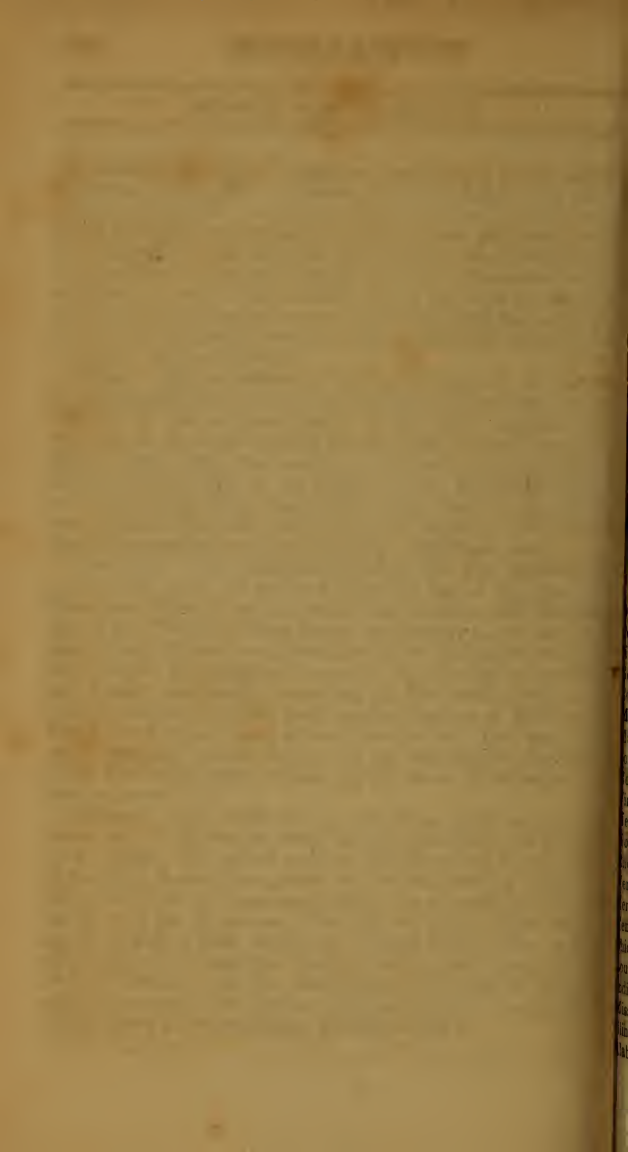

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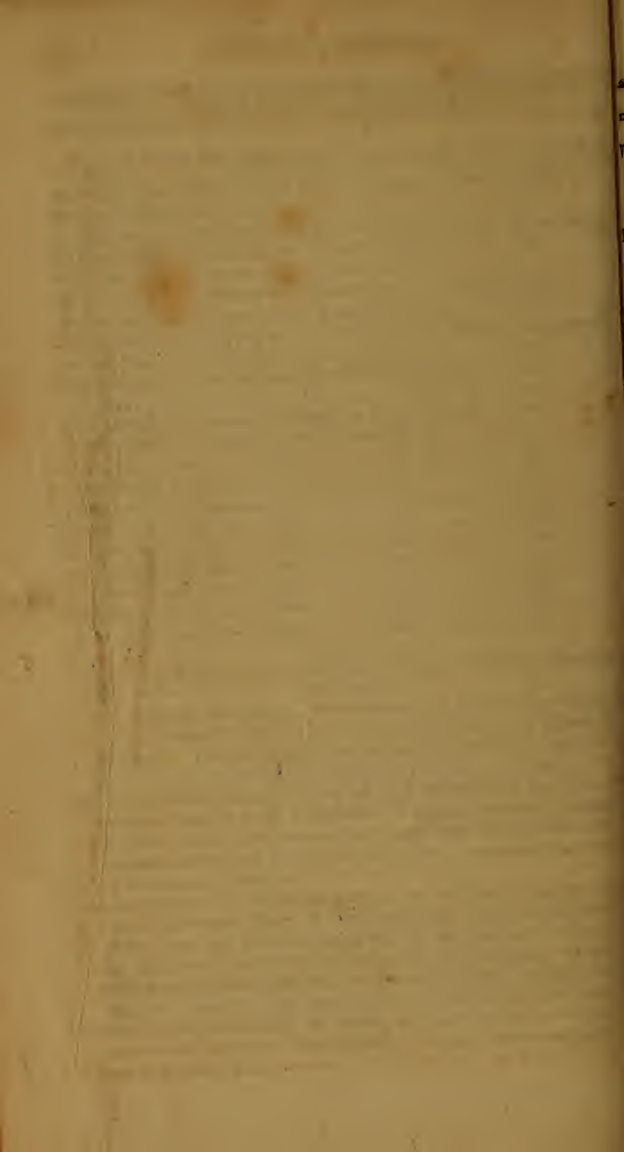
Election of Governors of the several States, their qualifications, powers, &c.

New-Hampshire—Annually, in March, by the people; must be an inhabitant 7 years; 30 years of age; estate of £500, half freehold. Has a negative in the making of laws; and, with the council, appoints the officers of the state generally.

Massachusetts—Annually, on the first Monday of April, by the people: must be an inhabitant 7 years: freehold estate of £1000 in the commonwealth; must declare himself of the christian religion; and, with the council, appoints the officers of the state generally.

Rhode-Island—[This state retains its original charter, which serves it in the place of a constitution. That instrument is silent as to the qualifications, &c. of the governor. The charter vests all power in the *Governor and Company*. All judicial and executive officers are annually elected by this governor and company, who are themselves chosen by the freemen.]

Connecticut—Annually, in April, by the people: must be an elector of the state; and 30 years of age: has a negative to making laws, &c.

Vermont—Annually, on the first Tuesday in September, by the people: must have resided in the state four years. The governor, with the council, of this state, appoints to office, grants pardons, sees that the laws are executed, &c.

New-York—In April, at the end of every three years, by the people: must be a wise and discreet freeholder of the state; may convene and prorogue the legislature, grant reprieves, &c. and, with consent of the council, appoints to office, &c.

New-Jersey—Annually, by the council and assembly. He is president of the council, chancellor of the state: and the governor and council are a court of appeal in the last resort, in all causes of law, &c.

Pennsylvania—On the second Tuesday of October, by the people, at the end of every three years; but cannot hold the office longer than nine in any term of twelve years: he must be 30 years of age, and an inhabitant twelve years. He appoints to the offices in the state generally; remits fines and forfeitures, &c.

Delaware—On the first Tuesday of October, at the end of every three years, by the people; but cannot hold his office more than three in any term of six years: he must be 36 years old: six years an inhabitant of the state, and 12 of the United States. He appoints to office, remits fines, &c.

Maryland—On the second Monday of December, of each year, by the general assembly: must be 25 years of age, and above five years a resident of the state: the same person cannot continue in office longer than three years successively, nor be eligible again until the expiration of four years after he has been out of office. The governor and council appoint to office, &c.

Virginia—Annually, by joint ballot of the general assembly: he cannot continue in office longer than three years successively, nor serve again until the expiration of four years after he has been out of office. With the advice of the council he grants reprieves and pardons, appoints justices of the peace, &c.

North-Carolina—Yearly, by the senate and house of commons; but not eligible longer than three years in six: must be thirty years of age; above five years a resident; and must have, in the state, a freehold, in lands and tenements, above the value of £1000. He is advised by a council; grants reprieves and pardons, &c.

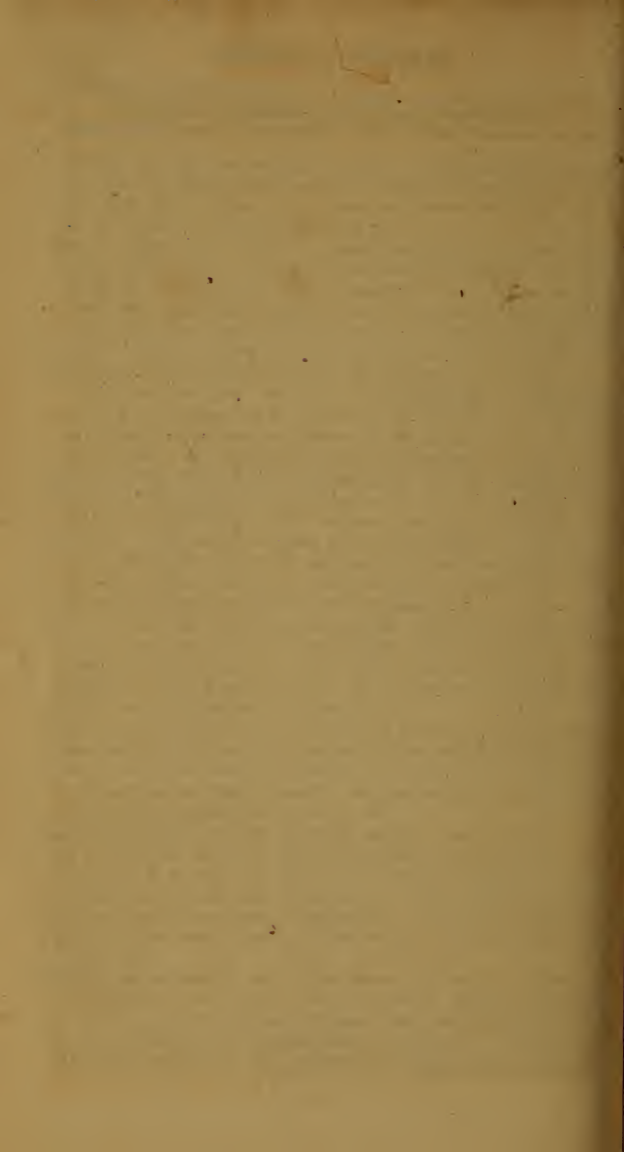
South-Carolina—Every two years, by the senate and house of representatives: must be 30 years old: a resident and citizen of the state for ten years; and possessed of a settled estate

He has a negative in the passing of laws, grants reprieves and pardons, &c.
- Louisiana**—Every four years, by the people; but ineligible for four years thereafter: must be 35 years of age; a citizen of the United States, and six years an inhabitant of the State; and must hold a landed estate of 5000 dollars, agreeably to the tax list. He appoints to office generally; and, with the approbation of the Senate, grants reprieves and pardons, &c.
- Kentucky**—Every four years by the people; but is ineligible for the next succeeding 7 years: he must be 35 years of age; a citizen of the United States, and an inhabitant of the State six years. - Mississippi**—Every two years, by the people: must be 30 years old: a citizen of the United States 20 years; a resident of the State 5 years, and seized of a freehold estate of 600 acres of land, or of real estate of the value of 2000 dollars, twelve months previously to his election. He grants reprieves and pardons, remits fines and forfeitures, fills up vacancies in office, &c.
- Indiana**—At the end of every three years, on the first Mouday in August, by the people; but cannot hold the office longer than six years in any term of nine. He grants reprieves and pardons; and, with the judges of the supreme court, has the revision of all bills before they become laws, &c.

Alabama—Every two years, by the people: not eligible more than four years in every term of six: must be 30 years of age; a native of the United States, and four years a resident of the State. He has a negative in the passage of laws, grants reprieves and pardons, remits fines and forfeitures, fills up vacancies in office, &c.

Connecticut.—Every white male citizen of the United States who has gained a settlement in the State, attained the age of 21 years, and resided in the town in which he may offer himself to be admitted to the privilege of an elector at least six months preceding, and has a freehold estate of the value of seven dollars in the state; or has been enrolled and served in the militia; or has paid a tax in the next preceding year; and is of a good moral character; may vote for senators, representatives, and governor. New-Jersey—All inhabitants, of full age, worth fifty pounds proclamation money, clear estate, and who have resided in the county in which they claim a vote for a year immediately preceding the election, are entitled to vote for representatives in council and assembly. Election annual.

Pennsylvania—Freemen of the age of 21 years, having resided in the state two years next before the election, and, within that time, paid a state or county tax, assessed six months before the election, enjoy the rights of electors ; and sons of persons qualified, between 21 and 22 years of age, may vote without having paid taxes. Election for representatives and senators annual : governor triennial.

Delaware—Every white freeman, 21 years of age, a resident of the state two years next before the election, and, within that time, having paid a state or county tax, assessed six months, before the election, is an elector of governor, senators, and representatives. 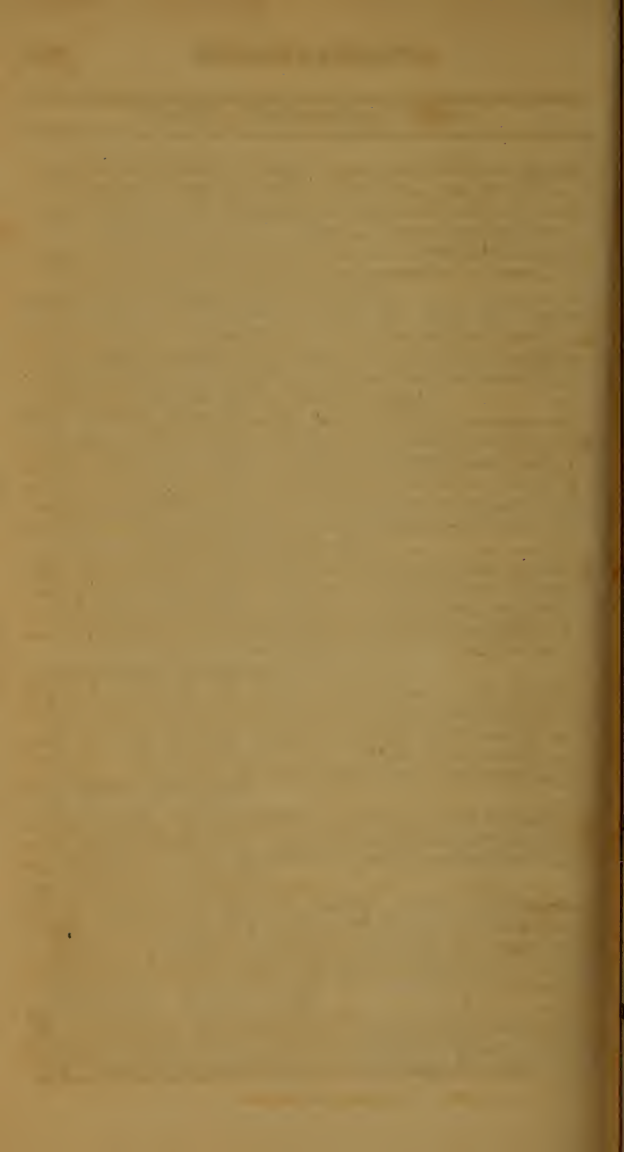
Maryland—Every free white male citizen, of 21 years and upwards, a resident of the state for a year, and of the county six months next preceding the election, may vote for delegates. Virginia—The right of suffrage for senators and delegates in this state is restricted to free white persons possessing a freehold estate in the commonwealth, which renders the number of electors always small.

North-Carolina—Freemen of 21 years of age, inhabitants of any county twelve months preceding the day of election, possessed of a freehold of 50 acres of land, for six months next before the day of election, may vote for senators ; and paying taxes, without a freehold, may vote for members of the house of commons. Election annual.

South-Carolina—Every free white man, 21 years old, being a citizen, two years a resident, with a freehold of 50 acres of land, or a town lot, in possession six months before the election, or

having paid a tax of three shillings sterling the preceding year for the support of government, may vote for members to serve in either branch of the legislature. Election of senators and representatives biennial.

Louisiana—Free white male citizens of the United States, 21 years of age, residents of the county in which they offer to vote one year next preceding the election, and having paid a tax within the preceding six months, are electors of governor, representatives, and senators. Election biennial.

Kentucky—Every free male citizen, (Negroes, Mulattoes, and Indians excepted,) of 21 years of age, a resident of the state 2 years, or of the county or town in which he offers to vote one year, next preceding the election, is an elector of representatives, senators, and governor. Election of senators and representatives annual: of governor quadrennial.

Ohio—All white male inhabitants, above 21 years of age, residents of the state one year next preceding the election, having paid a state or county tax, enjoy the right of electors. Election for governor biennial: for representatives and senators annual.

Tennessee—Every freeman, of 21 years of age and upwards, an inhabitant of the state, and possessing a freehold in the county wherein he may vote, and being an inhabitant of the state; and every freeman, being an inhabitant of any one county in the state six months preceding the day of election, is entitled to vote for members of the general assembly and governor. Election biennial.

Mississippi—Every free white male person, 21 years of age or upwards, a citizen of the United States, a resident of the state for a year next preceding the election, the last six months within the county, city, or town, in which he offers to vote, enrolled in the militia, or having the qualifications of citizenship and residence, shall have paid a state or county tax, is a qualified elector of representatives, senators, and governor. Election of representatives and senators annual; of governor biennial.

Indiana—Every white male citizen of the United States, 21 years of age and upwards, a resident of the state for one year preceding the election, unless enlisted in the army, is entitled to vote in all elections. Election for representatives and senators annual: for governor triennial.

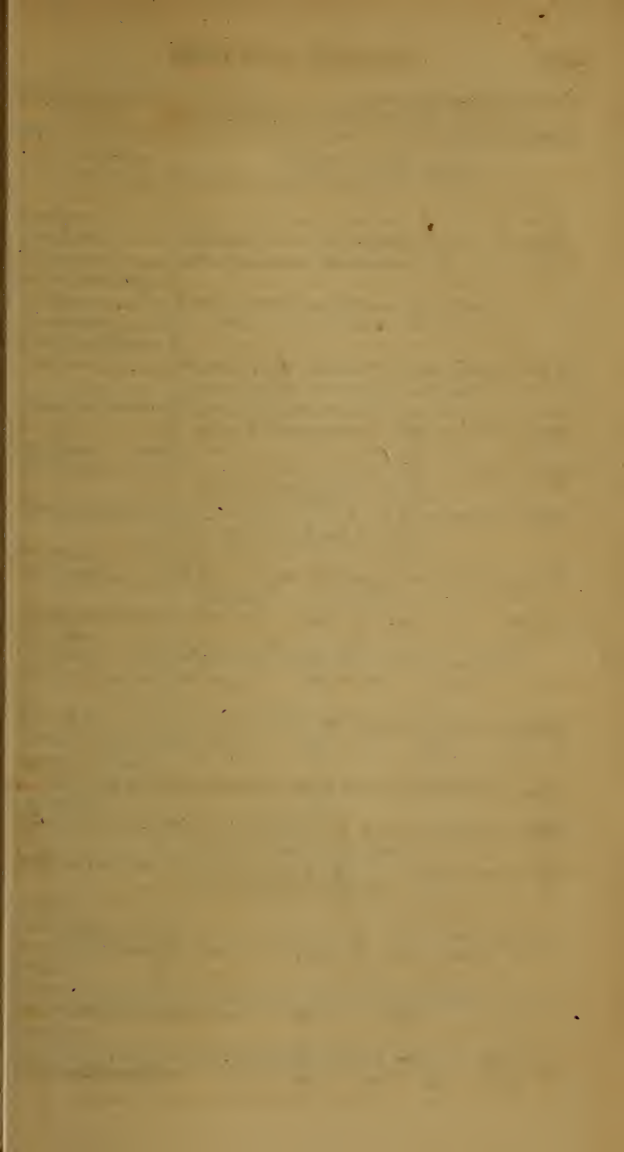

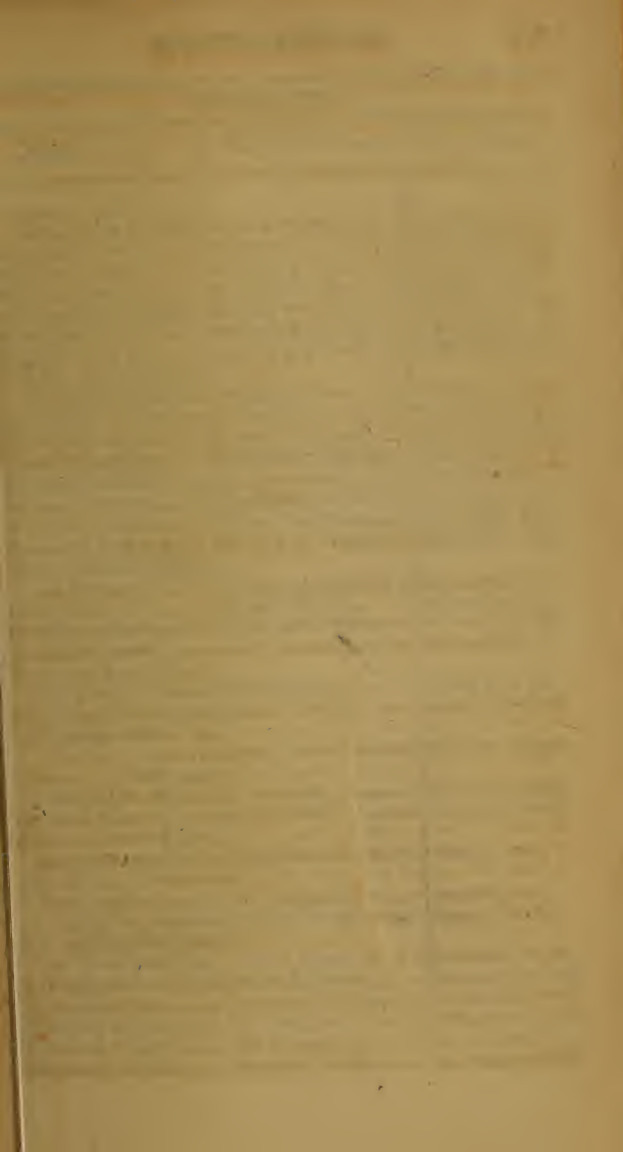
POWERS OF THE STATE LEGISLATURES.

The powers of the state legislatures are so various and so intermixed with those of the executives, that it is difficult precisely to define them in the brief span which could be allotted for that purpose in this work. Suffice it to say, that they partake in a greater or smaller degree, in the power of appointments to office; that they have the chief controul in the enactment of all state laws; that they possess the power of impeachment; have prime authority in the raising of revenue; and, in their character of representatives of the people, are either directly or indirectly, by constitutional prescription or established usage, the principal checks to governmental abuses in the states respectively, and the grand conservators of public justice and morals.

HISTORICAL REVIEW.

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The attention of the American public, during the past year, has been drawn to the affairs of South America, but chiefly to the relations between the United States and Spain. In the Northern Pacific Ocean the conduct of Lord Cochrane, an Englishman in command of the Chilean naval forces, has given some uneasiness. The violent character of that officer has led him to adopt measures detrimental to neutral commerce with Peru and the Northwest Coast; and, in the prosecution of these measures, it is not so clear that his lordship does not mingle with his public duties views of private gain, which induce him to invade the rights of individual property. Government has not been inattentive to his proceedings, and the frigate *Macedonian* has been sent into those seas to give greater security to the trade under our flag. On the eastern side of South America, Government despatched, during the year 1819, two vessels of war under the command of Commodore Oliver H. Perry, who had communications with the authorities of Venezuela, tending to confirm the friendly relations between them and the United States. In the fulfilment of this duty, that valuable officer died, and was honourably buried on the island of Trinidad, which lies at the mouth of the river Orinoco. Commodore Perry's mission has been followed by the appointment of a minister from Venezuela, in the person of Don Manuel Torres, who, with a happy discretion, and a prudent conduct, has strengthened the ties of amity between his country and ours. Illicit privateering has very much interrupted the commerce of the United States. The West-Indies, in particular, have been the scene of the most heinous atrocities in that quarter, under flags pretended to be Mexican, Venezuelan, Buenos-Ayorean, and Artigan, numbers of vessels have been plundered, the crews beaten, and in several instances murdered. It is believed that our government strongly feels the necessity of putting an end to these outrages; and it is a fortunate circumstance, that all the independent Spanish governments, with perhaps, the exception of that of Artigas, concur in the propriety of doing so. A squadron of our navy has been kept up in the Mediterranean, which has served to hold the Barbary powers in check, and as a practical school for our officers and seamen. With regard to Spain, the treaty which was concluded on the 22d of February, 1819, between the American Secretary of State, and Don Luis de Onis, and ratified by the executive of the United States, by and with the unanimous advice and consent of the Senate, has not been ratified

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by the Spanish monarch. The king of Spain has not assigned, as the law of nations requires, any strong and solid reasons for his refusal to ratify, nor has he hitherto sent a minister to make explanations, according to the promise given to the envoy of the United States at Madrid. Notwithstanding this breach of faith on the part of the Spanish sovereign, it is still believed by well-informed men that the treaty will become effective, the American executive having been, throughout the whole transaction, so guarded, so frank and sincere, that Spain has no claim upon the friendship of other nations for support against the fair claims and upright conduct of our administration. At home, the navy has been in a gradual progress of augmentation and improvement; and especially by the adoption of a rigid scrutiny, with respect to the qualifications of midshipmen, additional surety has been afforded for superior intelligence and efficiency in the officers of the naval department.

The Military Academy at West-Point continues to flourish: the several divisions and detachments of the army are usefully employed in the construction of roads, in agriculture, and the formation of new military posts on our western and north-western frontiers. Fortifications, at various points of defence, have been pushed on with vigour; and the public buildings at Washington, in a true spirit of economy, have been hastened towards completion with rapidity, in such a manner as in future to avoid the great expenses occasioned by cessations and recommencements of these edifices, by which there has been, on former occasions, much waste of public money. The principal thing which has occupied public attention at home, is the state of the currency. After the United States had enjoyed, during many years of the wars of the French Revolution, a full sweep of commerce and the carrying trade, the belligerent powers of Europe, by means of unlawful orders in council and decrees, possessed themselves of the greater portion of the fruits of this traffick. Great Britain alone took from our merchants and ship-owners 917 vessels, with more or less of their cargoes: France captured and seized more than two hundred: so that in all, the active capitalists of the United States experienced a loss of upwards of 1000 vessels, with merchandise in proportion. At a moderate computation, this loss may be estimated at from 20 to 30 millions of dollars. But our merchants were unwilling at once to sink under it; and, to keep themselves up, they resorted to fictitious capital through the medium of new banks. A reference to the date at which banks began so greatly to multiply in the United States will verify this assertion. From the commercial cities, the banking

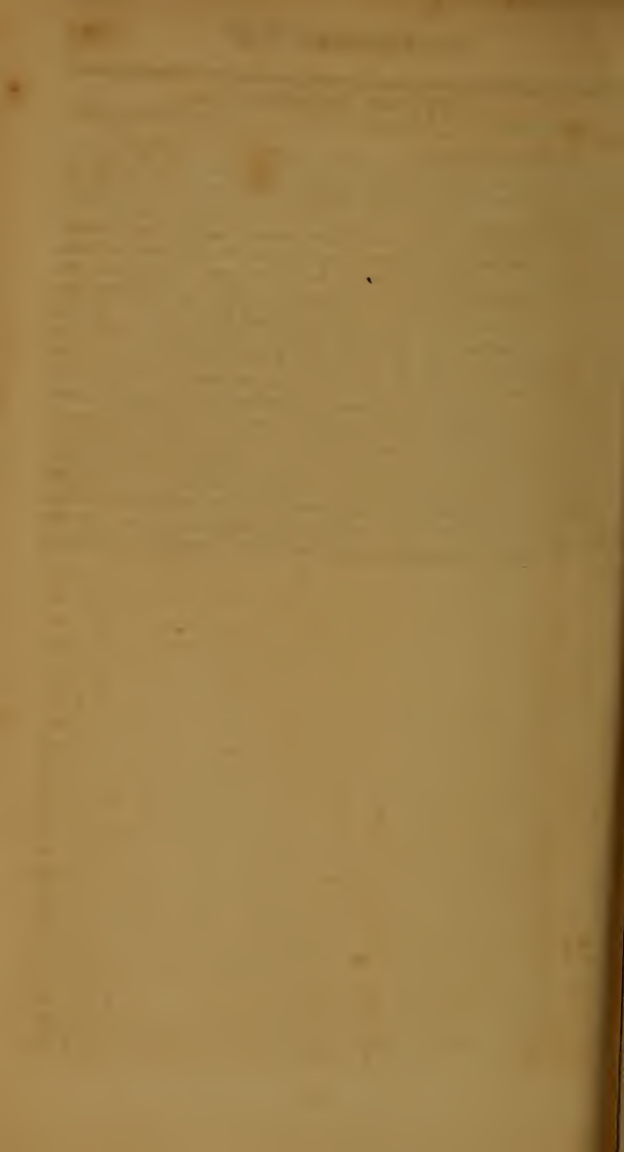
system got into country towns and villages; for as soon as it was perceived how easy it was to make paper money upon vague securities, men of speculative dispositions and small estates rushed to that resource as to a mine of gold; bank notes were multiplied almost without limit; property nominally rose in value, and thousands of individuals thought they were thereby getting richer, when, in fact, it was only the spurious paper money that was depreciating. In this state of things a wild speculation took the place of a steady industry: every body would be rich at once; and the slow accumulations resulting from labour were looked upon with disdain. The crimes of forgery and counterfeiting increased in every direction; the deductions suffered upon depreciated bank notes operated as an enormous tax levied on the pockets of the people, and a demoralization of society was obviously taking place in every section of the Union where this pernicious paper currency prevailed. At length a salutary reaction has begun. Men have found that labour is in the order of Providence, and that frugality is an essential virtue in the moral world. Subsequent suffering, equal in degree to the previous folly, must however, be felt by the community. Men who have speculated largely, and hold in their hands the titles of property, but are indebted in more than the amount of that property, must surrender it for the benefit of their creditors. Counterfeits in wealth, like counterfeits in coin, must be reduced to their real value among their fellow-citizens. Banks must be restored to the principles upon which alone they can beneficially exist, and insolvent banks must be extirpated. In this condition of home affairs, the great point is, to induce our legislators to *let them alone*. Pecuniary concerns between man and man, and between individuals and incorporated institutions, will, by the ordinary administration of justice, soon find their level. They are finding that level now. Various projects are spoken of to relieve society from the pressure of the times. But who will believe in the magic of a legislative act, to make prodigality frugal, luxury temperate, and the vanity of dress and equipage economical? Nothing but *actual suffering* can effect a cure. Meantime, as it regards the *nation*, all the wealth that was in the country prior to what is called these "hard times," is here still; and the only calamity is that it must change hands. Those who are really poor, though nominally rich, must give up the property; and those who are truly entitled, must obtain possession of it.

The past year has been remarkable as it respects the amelioration of the condition of the people of colour, and the exten-

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sion of slavery in the territories of the Union. The American Colonization Society, after the most indefatigable exertions and considerable expense, are making ready to send over a number of families of free coloured people to the coast of Africa. Government agents have already been sent with a few of the same description of persons for the purpose of receiving and safe keeping any negroes who may be captured by American cruisers from slave-ships attempting to introduce them into our country. The extension of slavery in the Missouri territory, and in the unsettled regions beyond it, has been sharply contested by our public writers and by the orators in both branches of Congress. Whatever may be the consequences of these efforts with regard to the blacks, it is evident that the present period is an important epoch as it concerns the prevalence of slavery among civilized nations. The doctrines of christianity and the sentiments of an enlightened philanthropy are incessantly operating, like the action of light on the atmosphere of our globe, on the intellects of the whites in behalf of the Africans; and at this time it is impossible to calculate the effects that may be produced in relation to the fate of that unfortunate race.

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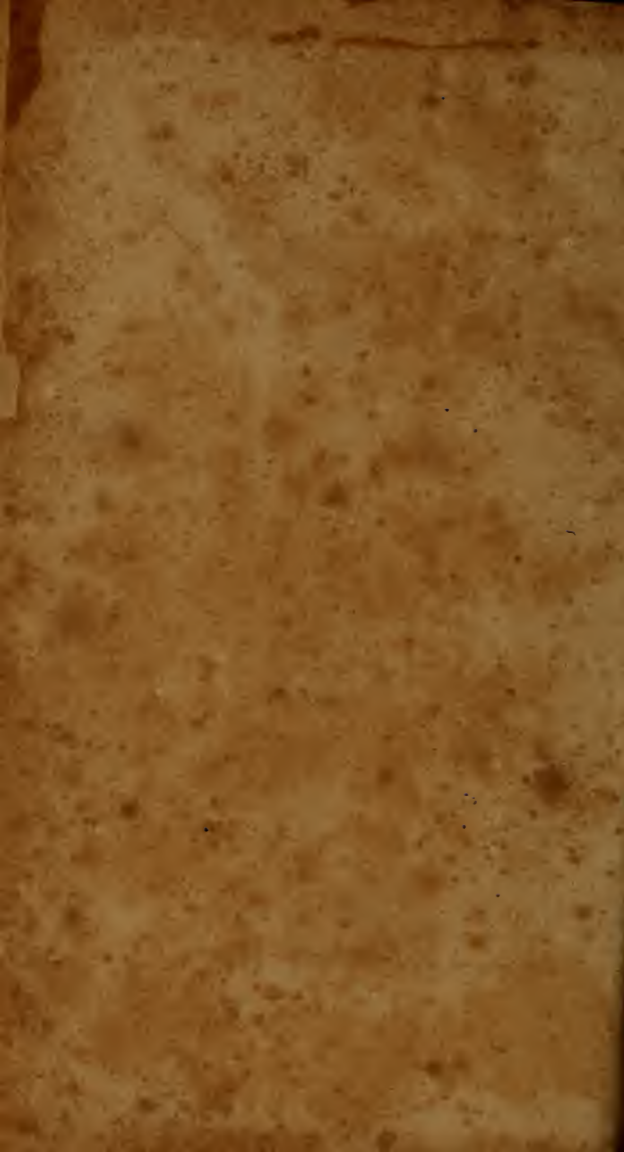
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
